


1st Vice District Governor Rick Brisee

SOME OF THE ALTERNATIVE WAYS THAT CLUBS CAN CONTINUE TO MEET DURING THIS PERIOD OF SELF-QUARANTINE AND SOCIAL DISTANCING

Texting: Most Lions already have this technology on their smart phones. Conversations and results are quick and easy; all you need is the recipient's phone number.

Twitter: Participants need a Twitter account but is a way of sharing events via social media.

Facebook: Free social networking website that supports both public and private inter-person conversations. Upload photos, videos, and messages. Be aware that what is posted publicly can be seen by almost everyone!

Snapchat: a mobile app and service for sharing photos, videos, and messages with others. Once a message is viewed, it is automatically deleted which makes it useful for sharing quick updates with friends without accumulating media or messages on your mobile device.

Email: One of the most widely used informational platforms using the internet. Useful for conversations, videos, and attaching documents. Messages are usually automatically archived on your computer or device.

E-Clubhouse website: A free website for your Club designed with easy fill-in-the-blank fields. The site allows you to: build and maintain a website for your club using a simple set of tools to promote your Club's activities and recruit new members.

Landline: So 20th Century! but still useful in contacting members one-on-one.

Also: postcards, greeting cards, letters of encouragement, reminders, etc.

VIDEO CONFERENCING RESOURCES

ZOOM: An American remote conferencing services company that combines video conferencing, online meetings, chat features, and mobile collaboration.

Free – host up to 100 participants but limited to 40 minutes. A clock visible to the host will count down the time. \$14.99/month, host. Includes up to 100 participants; meeting duration is 24 hrs

Plans can be upgraded to include more participants, if needed. If you or your Club needs assistance in setting up a Zoom account, please let us know.

Free Conference Call: A remote conference calling service. Minimum cost of \$4.00/mo, but they advertise that you can pay whatever amount you think is fair. They also have \$6.00/mo and \$15.00/mo plans that offer upgraded features.

GoToMeeting: A web-hosted service for meetings, desktop sharing, and video conferencing using a software package that enables the user to meet with other computer users, customers, clients, or colleagues via the internet using real time.

Google Hangouts: Google's application for video conferencing. Connect your Club, District, or MD from anywhere using easy-to-join video calling. Hangouts Meet is included with Google's G Suite and is free to non-profits.

Skype: a telecommunications application specializing in providing video chat and voice calls between computers, tablets, mobile devices, an X-Box consoles, and smartwatches. Skype will also provide instant messaging services. This is a one-on-one service.

Facebook Messenger: Developed by Facebook. Users can send messages and exchange photos, video, stickers, and audio, as well as react to other users' messages. The service also supports voice and video calling.

Doodle Poll: Useful in scheduling meetings with ease instead of exchanging numerous e-mails while trying to determine a common meeting date. Fee required.

DO'S AND DON'TS OF VIDEO COMMUNICATION

Video Conference Do's:

Do be on time.

Do pay attention.

Do be aware that when the camera is on, you are visible to others!

Do be aware that family members that pass in front of the camera may also be visible, so everyone should be dressed appropriately.

Do be aware of lighting as you may appear as nothing more than a silhouette or disembodied voice in a darkened room.

Do mute your mike on Zoom when not speaking.

Do unmute your mike before speaking.

Do turn your video off if you need to step away.

Video Conference Don'ts:

Do not participate on a mobile phone while walking or driving.

Do not eat or snack. Remember that the camera is on and sees all.

Do not text or play on your phone. Again, the camera sees all.

Do not talk over others; raise your hand and wait to be called on before speaking.

Do not use any funny or obscene gestures.

Do not have barking dogs or crying kids on screen and especially while unmuted.

Do not participate on the call or video conference while in the bathroom. No one wants to know that.

Fellow Lions.

As everyone deals with the challenges brought on by the Coronavirus pandemic, from social distancing and separation from our loved ones, to learning how to deal with meetings via zoom and conference calls, now is the time to embrace our Lions motto of "We Serve".

These are definitely challenging and unprecedented times for all of us. Our clubs have had to cancel our fundraisers and many service projects have been put on hold. We're not doing KidSight screenings and Diabetes awareness & educational programs. Youth activities and summer camps have been cancelled. Support for our local food pantries is critical right now. Demand is at an all-time high, especially with children not benefiting now from school lunch programs.

However, many clubs are still serving by reaching out and supporting the front line responders that are helping to keep all of us safe. Clubs may not be able to conduct a food drive, but financial donations are always welcomed. The pantries are able to turn these donations into purchases for pennies on the dollar from the Regional Food Banks. Donations of hand sanitizer is a great idea - many local distillers are now producing it. Supporting our local restaurants through a meal program for the local EMS or hospital personnel is another idea. Volunteer to be a driver to make the deliveries! Smiles of gratitude may be covered by a mask, but you'll feel the warmth that comes from helping out!

Our District has also stepped up! Many front line personnel are under the strain of dealing with long shifts and stressful situations. The District has secured a grant from LCIF in the amount of \$10,500 that is being used for meals over the next few weeks to support staff at 5 Capital Region Hospitals - Ellis, Samaritan, Memorial, St. Peter's and Albany Medical Center. The meals are being provided by Popeye's restaurant. Each meal is individually wrapped and is adorned with a Lions label signifying our gratitude and thanks to the meal recipient.

We've also secured an emergency grant of \$2,500 from the Brandel Murphy Youth Foundation to be used for the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York. This grant will help feed many children whose families rely on the Food Bank to keep our local pantries stocked. Once we've moved beyond the current situation Lions volunteer days will be scheduled at the Food Bank and Patroon Land Farm. We're also in the process of securing 500 surgical grade face masks that will be shared with front line personnel in the Utica, Potsdam, and Plattsburgh regions. These masks should be available by early May.

Take some time to identify where you too can help out. There are still many ways that we can fulfill our motto of "We Serve"! Please continue to be safe and I look forward to seeing everyone again soon!



Like most clubs, our services to our community have slowed and our meetings have been non-existent or conducted utilizing methods never before considered. Since we don't know when our country will be "opening up" again or what we will be looking like when it does open, most of our conversations have centered around discussions regarding revising planned community services and fundraisers as we attempt to assist those most severely affected by the viral outbreak in our community. Like most, our members have been adhering to the "new rules" by staying at home to remain as healthy as possible.

On March 10, just before our country was shut down by the corona virus, two members from our club joined members of the New Hartford/New York Mills-Whitestown Lions to hear a young woman from Syracuse (Shanae Clapper) who described her intention to have her head shaved as part of a fundraiser for St. Baldrick's Foundation. It was scheduled to be held at Kitty Hoynes Irish Pub & Restaurant on Fayette Street in Syracuse on March 29. St Baldrick's Foundation, partners nationally with Sport Clips Haircuts. It is an all-volunteer and donor powered association committed to supporting the most promising research directed at finding cures for childhood cancer and giving survivors the opportunity of living long, healthy lives. Most donations come from these head-shaving events, although they can be made on-line.

At our March 12th meeting we discussed this presentation and the club decided to donate \$100 to this most worthwhile cause. In addition, club members and DG Ed, since his visitation to our club coincided with the discussion of this topic, contributed an additional \$85. Childhood cancer is one of LCI's global causes. For most of the Lion-year we had periodically discussed how to best support this effort. Contributing to Shanae's head-shaving seemed to be a perfect fit and we applaud her for almost doubling her personal goal of \$2,500 and raising \$4,755. In addition, when the shutdown imposed by the virus necessitated cancellation of her public event on March 29, she conducted her own virtual head-shaving event streamed on YouTube on April 11. Congratulations to Shanae on both counts!

Additional information about this organization or possibly holding your own head-shaving event is available on their website (www.stbaldricks.org).

On April 21st five members of our club (down from the numbers who have assisted in past months because of the virus outbreak) assisted with the monthly food distribution at

our local pantry. Distribution was once again accomplished in a drive-through environment in the parking lot with volunteers only able to load bags of food into the trunks of cars. This resulted in a more expeditious and safer manner of distribution. Client numbers continue to rise (up almost 100% since February) as a result of the pandemic and the stories of furloughs, termination of health insurance and delays in applying for unemployment benefits were constantly heard from both new and existing patrons. Kidspaks containing all sorts of kid-friendly nutritious food were distributed to more than 400 children. These types of food bags also continue to rise due to school closures. More of the same is expected in May. We will be there to do our part... and the weather should be better!

Two of our members who serve as zone chair people participated in two "ZOOM Cabinet Meetings" discussing the recently obtained \$200,000 LCIF MD-20 Covid-19 Emergency Food Grant for emergency workers; the application for a \$2,500 Emergency Grant from the Brandel-Murphy Youth Foundation to be utilized by local food banks who are now supplying more food to the children affected by the pandemic and how to equitably distribute 400 N95 masks that will be obtained for our district. These masks are targeted for first responders, especially those whose supplies are low. The final distribution numbers by region within the district are yet to be determined. We along with our fellow clubs in Region "L" await the receipt of these masks in order to distribute them to our first responders (EMTs) most in need.

We will continue looking to modify and optimize our service projects and fundraisers to adequately service the needs of our community in these changing times.

Wishing all clubs every success as you do the same – remember, we're all in this together!


Glens Falls Lions Club

Due to the concerns with the Coronavirus, the family is delaying the service and will plan one when it is safer to travel and when loved ones can actually gather and celebrate the incredible life of this amazing man. Until then, we remember Johnny, Dad, Poppy, Pops, Gramps, Capital S in our hearts and cherish the memories of the time we had, and look forward to the day when we will be reunited with him in the presence of our Risen Savior, Jesus Christ, where he is now enjoying eternity, free of cancer, free of pain, perfectly whole, and perfectly at peace.

The blueberries have survived the winter and are budding very nicely.

Lion Greg will look into signage and fencing.

Lions Greg and Irv will get an Easter bunny costume to distribute chocolate bunnies to selected families.

We received a grant from Stewart's for \$1750.

2VDG Michele O'Hare had asked us to sponsor NABA for an LCIF grant to transform their second floor into a vision center, which we agreed to do, but this has been postponed until the fall.

Lions Eva Bass, Irv Ackerman with Courtney, and Greg Sheldon spent a part of Easter Sunday distributing 70 chocolate bunnies that came from the Lions Eye Institute's fund-raiser. That's Irv in the bunny suit. Says Lion Irv, "We built our list from Lion Eva's food resource program she works for, which delivers food to kids in need, in Arbor & West Hill neighborhood. I also visited several kids in Watervliet that I knew could use a boost."

MD20, which comprises New York State and Bermuda, has received a \$200,000 grant from LCIF specifically for feeding the doctors, nurses, and other front-line hospital personnel who are working with COVID-19 patients. About half of that will go to the NYC area, where the need is greatest.

District 20W has formed a committee to apply for a share of this grant. The western and northern portions of our district have experienced relatively few cases and the clubs in those areas are instituting various programs to address their local needs. Those clubs have agreed that the Capital Region should be the sole beneficiary of the 20W grant.

The 20W committee's grant application asking for \$10,500 to provide 2100 individually-wrapped meals to Albany Med, St Peter's, Albany Memorial, Samaritan, and Ellis hospitals over 6 weeks has been approved.

Popeye's, which has locations in Albany, Troy, and Schenectady, has agreed to provide the meals but they cannot deliver them. WE WILL NEED VOLUNTEERS TO PICK UP MEALS AND DELIVER THEM TO THE HOSPITALS. You won't have to go into the hospital; they'll meet you and take the meals from you. I recognize that half

our membership is of an age that puts you in the vulnerable category, but we're hoping that the other half of us will be able to step up for this important project. Also, if you know of a friend or family member who's willing to drive, that's ok too; it need not be a Lion. (Our grandson has signed up.) This project will run through June 8. We will also be asking for help from the other clubs in the region. The schedule and sign-up instructions are on the district web site at e-district.org/sites/20w/projects.php.

A group of our newer Lions (Irv Ackerman, Jordan Alexander, Eva Bass, John Bianco, Greg & Jodi Sheldon) has put together a formal proposal. They're suggesting that we donate 100 bottles of hand sanitizer to the Albany Police Department at a cost to us of \$280, including a custom label identifying us as the source of the donation. This would be a pilot project, with the idea that if it's successful, we would expand it to other PDs within our bailiwick.

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers.
(Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
