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

On July 1st we will be beginning the most unusual Lions year any of us have ever seen. The COVID-19 virus still hasn't been contained even though we in New York have made significant strides in reducing the effects in our state. We still don't know what the Fall and Winter will bring. Despite all this, I know that clubs are still doing service, raising funds and trying to maintain their membership intact. This may seem like a monumental task, but I believe that we as Lions are up to it. We will just have to adapt the way we do business.

Our incoming District Governor, Rick Brisee, is ready to hit the ground running, as is his leadership team. Our District, as well as the Multiple District, has opted into the North American Membership Initiative (NAMI). This is a program that LCI has been testing for the last two years in selected districts in the US and Canada. The program tries to redirect membership efforts more directly to the clubs with support more intensely from LCI and local leadership. Leadership groups will be meeting monthly to assess how goal setting and membership plans are progressing. If a plan isn't working, we should know early enough to tweak or even change the plan for an individual club to help them become successful. This will require cooperation from the club leaders to the Zone, District and LCI area leaders. This initiative is not a sprint! It is a marathon. Our country has not had positive membership growth since 1980, a long time. We won't correct that in one or two years. This will be an ongoing effort for all of us.

Due to the current situation we are in, District Governor Rick and his team will be placing a lot of emphasis on retention. We need to make every effort to keep our present members and make sure they are involved in the clubs. LCI has announced an accommodation to try and help in this respect. NO club will be cancelled for nonpayment of dues until Dec. 31, 2020. Additionally, new club charter fees and entrance fees will also be waived until Dec. 31, 2020. Dues will still be payable by the end of the calendar year, but this will hopefully give members who have been financially impacted by the virus more time to pay their dues.

As we gear up more fully next month, we will be providing more information on NAMI and be in better contact with all clubs to make all of us more successful. Please reach out to me or any of Governor Rick's team with any problems or input you may have. Everyone please do what you must to stay safe and well.

Clinton Lions Club

Like most clubs, we're learning how to live and service the needs of our community with the guidelines imposed upon us due to the virus pandemic – no more face-to-face meetings, fundraisings restricted or eliminated, etc. On the other hand, we've become more technically aware of the 21st century tools available to utilize for conducting meetings and conducting the business of our club. Our competency increases with each use! Our first monthly meeting was a Board of Directors meeting held via the software product Zoom. We discussed year end budgeted contribution reductions to specific organizations due to cancellation of major fundraisers and alternative methods of fundraising in light of what appears to be the "new normal" – at least for the near term.

A modified budget for the remainder of the year was subsequently developed and e-mailed to all members, a vote taken via e-mail and another Zoom meeting (second meeting of the month) conducted with the entire membership to discuss our approach going forward. The membership voted for a direct mail campaign to all residents in the Town of Kirkland. The mailing will contain a letter outlining specific services we provide to the community. It would ask recipients to consider making a contribution to the club either by mail or via a GoFundMe page we will establish. It will further explain that contributions received from this appeal will allow us to continue our service to others even though our planned fundraising events have been postponed due to governmental guidelines imposed to curtail the spread of the virus. The final paragraph will thank recipients for their time & consideration and extend our hope that they remain safe & healthy. Let's hope it's successful!

Members of our club continued assisting at our local Country Pantry on Distribution Day. It continues to be held outside in

the parking lot and will until further notice. Clients remain in their vehicles wearing masks. Volunteers then load their vehicles with

pre-packaged

boxes and bags of food as they drive through the various stations. Because the virus pandemic has caused many people in our immediate to be furloughed from their jobs a second distribution day per month has been added. Food for this second distribution day is being supplied by the Regional Food Bank in Syracuse, supplemented by additional food donations and financial support from the community. The number of people availing themselves of the food resources for their families has also increased. In January/February this year the pantry was supplying food to 350 people. That number has now risen to over 1,000!

Although we had to reduce individual amounts, we once again provided graduating seniors with awards this past month. Six (6) graduating seniors at three area high schools were awarded a total of \$2,100 - 75% of what we awarded last year.

The community conducted our Country Pantry Donation and Community Collection Day on Saturday, June 6. The weather was fantastic and residents cautiously ventured out after being restricted to their homes for months. Our club was responsible

for traffic control since the people were asked to remain in their vehicles in single file. Paper to be shredded, old electronics and cans & bottles were removed from their vehicles along with any food

contributions for the pantry. Our club rented the services of a commercial shredder (Confidata) which shredded the paper on site in the confines of the truck. The operation could be viewed via a closed-circuit television camera showing the operation of shredding inside the truck. This is the third consecutive year we have sponsored the shredder and every year the number of people availing themselves of the service grows.

Our Chamber of Commerce in collaboration with the village mayor, Hamilton College, local businesses, restaurants and service organizations established a temporary outdoor dining space in the heart of our village across from the Village Green. Hamilton College provided the new tables and chairs/benches for the space. Concrete jersey barriers from the village DPW protect the diners from passing vehicles as they enjoy take-out food and drinks from local restaurants and coffee shops. The tables are socially distanced (six feet apart from each other) and the area can accommodate approximately 12 people at a time. Our Lions Club welcomes the commitment to provide cleaning and trash support through the week. The al fresco dining area opened on June 15.

Together with our Leo Club we donated \$500 to the James Steates family of our community to assist with travel and medical expenses associated with the recovery and continuing surgeries required for their daughter Madison. Madison graduated from Clinton Central High School on

June 27. She's one

of the two recipients of our club's senior award to a former Middle School Leo Club member. While visiting at a friend's house on June 17, she was attacked and mauled by a dog. Initially taken to St. Elizabeth's Medical Center in Utica, she was immediately transferred to Upstate Medical Center in Syracuse, where four doctors were awaiting her arrival. Multiple hours of surgery were required to begin the repair to her jaw, nose, eye and neck. Now recuperating, she faces future plastic surgeries and dental repair.

A strong and courageous young woman, she returned home days before walking across the "stage" to receive her diploma. She was accompanied by her brother due to blurred vision in her left eye. One of her closest friends, the valedictorian of this year's graduating class organized a GoFundMe page for assistance with on-going medical expenses. The initial goal was \$10,000. That was exceeded within 24 hours. To date almost \$27,000 has been raised!

This is why we're Lions... to be there when needed... only wish there was more we could do!

Thanks DG Ed for your efforts as Governor this year and wishing every success to our DGE Rick.

Sauquoit Valley Lions Club YEAR END DONATION/65 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

The Sauquoit Valley Lions wrapped up the year distributing donations of \$2,900. Donations were made to: Sauquoit Valley Friends and Neighbors (local food pantry), Town of Paris Historical Society, the Clayville Library, Mercy Flights, the CABVI, the Lions Eye Bank, LCIF, Feed our

Vets, Freedom Guide Dogs and the Sauquoit Valley CSD Foundation. The Club donated in excess of \$5,500 throughout this year to support; those in need, juvenile cancer research, our youth and the community at large.



Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
