Many Clubs have been unable to meet since self-quarantining began in March, and that was a wise decision given the circumstances. In making calls to set up my visitation schedule, I heard that restaurants where Clubs have historically met are not re-opening again or the meeting room is too small to accommodate the Club while practicing our social distancing requirements, so there are still challenges ahead for many of us.

meetings, but there are some Clubs that have yet to do that. I wish to remind everyone again that there are several Zoom accounts available within the District, so please take advantage of them to remain in contact with your members and community.

The pandemic has certainly changed the way we meet and service our communities but it does not have to stop our Lion activities.

The same goes for community service activities. While many or even most fundraising activities have needed to be cancelled or postponed indefinitely, we can still come up with creative activities to participate in.

Alternative service activities may include smaller projects that only require one or two volunteers instead of the traditional large number.

Some examples may be:

- Sponsoring a school backpack program that only

requires one or two volunteers to shop and make the delivery.

- Adopt-a-highway program takes place outdoors, of course, but may be handled by only a small number of members at one time.
- Clearing a hiking trail to make it more accessible to handicapped users – may only take one or two individuals per time.
- Improving a local playground or ball field – can be handled by one or two members. It is outside and you can spread out while working.

These are just some ideas; I am sure you can come up with others that only take a small number of volunteers at once and at minimal or not cost.

We do have to change the way we have done things in the past, but we do not have to stop completely. We are Lions, Lions are creative, and Lions serve!

As we enter August this is when we start to plan our upcoming club meetings, service projects and fundraisers. Many clubs have traditional fundraisers that we use as a means to support the service projects that focus on our global causes of sight & hearing conservation; diabetes awareness & education; hunger; childhood cancer; environment and youth. Unfortunately many of these fundraisers have had to be cancelled due to the pandemic, putting a strain on club financial resources. Yet, our most important resource - our Lions members - continue to remain on the front lines, ready to serve and help wherever we can!

Even if our clubs cannot physically meet we are still in a position to be able to serve!

Food insecurity is an issue right now. Children and families aren't receiving the support that they have in the past with summer programs. The Regional Food Banks that serve our area are continually hosting drive through pick-up for those in need. Volunteers are needed - reach out to your local pantries to see how you can serve. Additionally, you can stretch your club financial resources by applying for a grant. The Waterford Lions and Town of Schroon Lions clubs were both recently awarded Brandel Murphy Youth Foundation matching grants to support their respective Youth Backpack Programs.

Proper nutrition is a key at this time. Look for opportunities with the food distribution events and at the pantries themselves to share diabetes educational materials. The Association of Diabetes Care & Education Specialists (ADCES) is a great resource for materials. Lions International has a partnership with ADCES to work together in our communities. Certified Diabetes Educators are a great resource to partner with. We can also avail ourselves of ADCES tip sheets that can be found on their website (<https://www.diabeteseducator.org/living-with-diabetes/Tools-and-Resources>).

NABA and CABVI continue to work with our local schools to provide Kid Sight screenings. This is a critically important service that we as Lions help to provide. Reach out to these partner organizations to determine how they can provide essential screenings in your community.

The opportunity and need to Serve is always present, regardless of the challenges and times that we are currently living through. Our first District Cabinet meeting on September 12th at SUNY Canton will focus on these opportunities. You may also contact me at any time to discuss programs that we can offer.

So let us stand together. And let us remember just how important we are to our communities and the world.

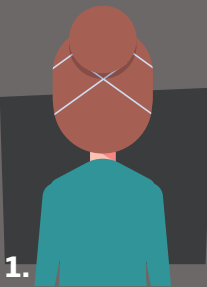

Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



1.

If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



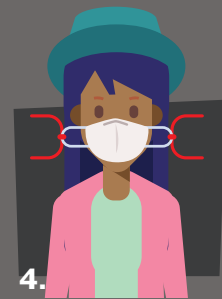
2.

Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



3.

Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line up with each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



4.

Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Rephrase remarks when not understood.



Take turns when speaking.



Make sure hearing aid users have them on.



Keep background noise in the room to a minimum.



Face each other (at a safe distance).

When removing your mask...

Check to make sure hearing aids are still in place after removing a mask as they may come off with mask removal.

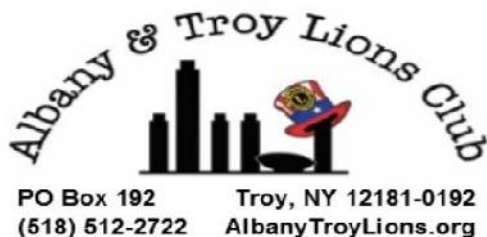

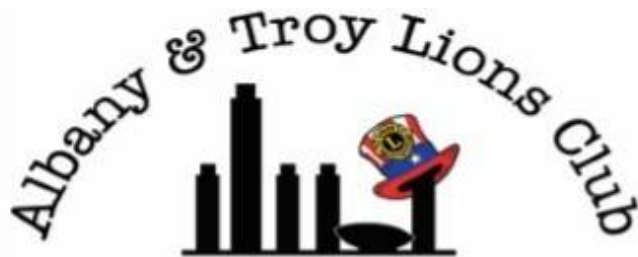

Clinton Lions Club

In past years during the month of July, we would have sponsored a picnic for members of our local Senior Citizens Center and been knee-deep in preparing for our annual Garage Sale at our local hockey arena. But due to the virus pandemic and current reopening guidelines both of these events had to be canceled. Cancellation of our annual Garage Sale had a big impact on both the community and our club. Not only had area residents become accustomed to attending it, but this event had become our biggest annual fundraiser. Hopefully we can rekindle the interest of community residents in the purchase of “pre-owned treasures” next year.

Things have changed at our local Country Pantry on Food Distribution Day. The total operation is completely accomplished in the parking lot in a “drive-through” procedure. Clients remain in their vehicles as food staples and associated personal items are placed into their vehicles at various loading areas as they move through the line following registration. Clients must be wearing masks as they progress from one station to the next. A refrigerated trailer truck is located at one of the stations. It contains frozen meat and cold produce. These items are placed in the client’s vehicles directly from the truck to keep them as fresh as possible.

The number of people receiving food has also increased since the virus pandemic hit in March. The pantry now serves three-to-four times the number of people (including children) it was serving in a January/February timeframe. There is no longer a

pre-established day of the month for distribution since much of the perishable food is procured from the Regional Food Bank in Syracuse and must be taken when its available at the Food Bank.

It appears this type of distribution will continue and we are preparing to function in this manner through the winter months. Distribution days are also becoming more frequent as the effects of the virus continue to impact our economy and people’s inability to afford food. A minimum of eight members from our club continue to support the pantry serving those in need.

As our region of the state has begun to reopen businesses, we have also begun to once again collect used eyeglasses for recycling. This month we collected over 150 pair of glasses and three hearing aids from a few of those previously established businesses throughout the area.

As a result of the virus pandemic and the inability of people to eat inside in the small eateries/coffee shops in our village, the Chamber of Commerce in concert with our village mayor, Hamilton College and local businesses established an al fresco dining space in the heart of our village across from the Village Green. Concrete jersey barriers protect the diners from passing vehicles as they enjoy take-out food and drinks from local restaurants and coffee shops. The tables are socially distanced (six feet apart from each other) and the area can accommodate approximately 12 people at a time. It encourages people to purchase take-out food orders/coffee from one of our local eateries in the village. This space is very popular with those who visit our Farmer’s Market held on our Village Green every Thursday.

(Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
