I hope you all had safe and enjoyable holidays. Although Covid-19 still has the upper hand we soldier on in our world of service. Here are some things from the International level:

- * **DISTRICT CONVENTIONS** Continue although many are converting to virtual events.
- * FEE WAIVERS CONTINUE The International Board of Directors has voted to extend the waiver of charter and entrance fees through June 30, 2021. The Board has also agreed to not suspend any club over dues owed during the same period. The Board does, however, encourage clubs to work with LCI to get caught up on back dues balances and avoid financial suspension at a later date.
- * MONTREAL INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION The International Board and Executive Officers earlier approved planning this convention as an In-Person event, a Virtual Event and a Hybrid Event to cover all bases. As I write this report on January 13, 2021 there is not a final decision on the final convention format. It appears,

however, that chances are better than average this will end up being a virtual event only.

There are numerous variables that could make it an impossibility to hold a safe in-person event. I will share this information with you the minute the final decision is made.

- * WE'RE STILL SERVING As of November 30, 2021 Lions have served 136,202,361 people since July 1, 2021. Amazingly, that is with only 42% of clubs reporting service activities. There is no way to know the true number or share it with the world without full reporting.
- * CLUBS AND MEMBERSHIP Since July 1, 2021 LCI has added 1791 ew clubs and 84,062 new members. More than 55% of the new clubs are Specialty Clubs. Unfortunately, Constitutional Area 1 (the United States and ffiliates) is a -5213 members over the same period). CA 1 has added 73 new clubs, yet dropped 120.
- * Endorsements continue to pour in from around the globe for **FIRST VICE PRESIDENT DOUG ALEXANDER**. 1st V.P. Doug will be our next International President. We need to support him every step of the way. Look for the ad in this magazine, visit the website and stay in touch with his campaign.

THE FIGHT AGAINST DIABETES

MD20 Lions can be proud of the leadership role that our Multiple is playing in the fight against the Diabetes epidemic! Lions Clubs International is implementing a U.S. diabetes test study in collaboration with one of our partners in the diabetes fight, the Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialists (ADCES). This study will provide an opportunity for clubs to work with professional ADCES educators in their area to learn more about diabetes and provide increased diabetes awareness and education in their communities.

We have a number of MD20 clubs that participated in a webinar on January 26th hosted by ADCES and LCI staff to launch the program. The orientation discussed the test study, the expectations for the participating club and finalized how the club's participation would take place. The club will be matched with the local ADCES diabetes educator in the community who can begin working with the club at mutually convenient times.

The overall aim of the study is to:

- Help clubs learn more about prediabetes and diabetes; Help clubs educate community members about their risk for developing diabetes; and, Ensure that community members with diabetes receive the education, healthcare, and support they need to live healthy and active lives.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and changes in the way Lions and Leos are currently able to provide community service, this study will take place as follows:

- Club members will have the option to work with their local ADCES diabetes educator to receive trainings about diabetes awareness and education through **virtual meetings**; These educational sessions will be easy to access so that club members can increase their knowledge about prediabetes and diabetes in the comfort of their own homes; and, Club members will also receive links to helpful ADCES resources to reinforce their learnings.

Upon completion of the training with ADCES, a club can decide to work with the ADCES educator to host virtual diabetes events or choose to wait until club members can safely conduct in-person diabetes activities once COVID-19 pandemic restrictions are lifted in their area.

LCI is seeking at least 30 clubs/districts nationally to become involved in this test study, so to have the representation that we have from our multiple is tremendous! By participating in this opportunity, clubs and club members will:

- Create a **one-on-one relationship** with their local diabetes educator and partner; Feel empowered to confidently serve your community to promote diabetes awareness and education; Be better equipped and prepared to conduct diabetes awareness activities in their community; and, Enhance any diabetes project with which they are currently involved.

Over time these studies will help to create the model for Lions and Leos worldwide to serve their communities and take the lead to fight diabetes!

LIONS CLUB INTERNATIONAL

Dr. Jung-Yul Choi, International President

Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience, and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

- <u>Everyone's invited</u> Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.
- <u>Registration fees</u> The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.
- <u>Current registrants</u> Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.
- <u>Elections</u> Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.
- <u>Convention updates</u> Check our convention website LCICon for convention updates and details as they become available.

This global health pandemic has forced us all to make decisions and changes that place health and safety first. However, we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions, we continue to find new ways to stay connected, safely serve our communities and continue our global mission of service.

We appreciate your understanding during this challenging time for our organization and the world, and thank you for your incredible service as a Lion. Dear Lion Leader,

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic is continuing to impact the work of Lions around the world. As you know, it has also created financial hardships for our Lions and the people for whom we care.

To support the incredible men and women serving with us, the International Board of Directors unanimously passed another resolution to help our clubs.

Here is an overview of the new resolution approved by the Board of Directors:

- <u>Charter and entrance fees waiver</u> We have waived all charter and entrance fees from January 1 through June 30, 2021.
- <u>Flexible payments</u> No clubs in good staning on December 31, 2020 will be suspended or canceled through June 30, 2021 for late payment of dues. Full-payment is required to be received before June 30, 2021 to avoid suspension or cancellation.

Please note that clubs placed on financial suspension on December 31, 2020 will remain on suspension until the full balance is paid. Those clubs will still need to address their outstanding dues or make arrangements for repayment with the Accounts Receivable Department at Lions Clubs International to avoid cancellation scheduled for March 1, 2021.

These additional measures will help Lions facing financial hardships and give our clubs the support and encouragement they need during these challenging times. For more than a century, Lions have taken on the greatest challenges facing humanity, and together, we will overcome this.

The world needs Lions now more than ever, so thank you for your outstanding service and commitment to our communities and the world.

ID GARY BROWN'S TAKE ON THE DECISION CONCERNING THE CONVENTION

As your Director and a member of the LCI Board, I can tell you that the Montreal decision was an extremely difficult one. In the end, however, it simply came down to risking our health and the health of every other attendee. I (we) just can't justify that. I know it's difficult to deal with everything these last twelve months have thrown at us but here's the important bottom line: Over these last several months our service has touched the lives of more than 156,000,000 people. They are hoping we'll still be there when they need us. I know we will.



THE NEW YORK STATE AND BERMUDA FOUNDATION IS YOUR FOUNDATION



The **Town of Dover Lions Club** (District O) has been a vital and active community asset for many years. Back in the 1960's, the Town of Dover Lions constructed a three-acre in-ground, concrete-lined pool for the community on ten acres of donated land. In the mid-1970's, the Club transferred the property to the Town and a baseball field and concession facility were added. For the next three decades, the park and facilities were enjoyed by residents and hosted the Town's summer day camp. When a fire destroyed the concession building in 2000, it was replaced with a 40' x 60' barn-style building with a kitchen and space for indoor recreation and storage. The park's convenient location, within walking and biking distance of the Dover Plains hamlet, further added to its popularity as a town amenity. However, by 2010, after decades of use and despite town efforts to repair the aged and deteriorating concrete lining, the pool was decommissioned and the park left unutilized for years.

In 2018, with inspiration and the charge by Lions Clubs International to develop a Centennial Project, the Dover Lions decided to renovate the park for new community use. Some Dover Lions helped the Town apply for and receive a \$100,000 county grant to construct a new driveway, handicapped parking, and installation of an ADA-equipped restroom for the vacant park building. In the spring of 2020, the Dover Lions donated \$5,000 toward building improvements including construction of a children's vision/hearing screening office (with two-way mirror for security). Last fall, the Dover Lions restored the children's playground and relocated a former entrance booth to the play area with plans for its reuse as a children's safari-themed "cub house." With assistance of a \$5,000 matching grant from the New York State and Bermuda Lions Foundation in October 2020, the vision to utilize the building as a community space and Lions clubhouse is becoming a reality with the purchase of kitchen appliances and installation of LED lighting fixtures, new water heater and HVAC system. The Foundation's grant assistance has helped advance the project's anticipated completion by over a year! Thanks to the Foundation, by spring of 2021 we expect to complete renovation of the space as a Lions clubhouse once COVID-19 social gathering restrictions are lifted and the Town opens the space for public use.

As Lions, the communities we serve turn to us to help with projects and programs that help make meaningful differences in the quality of life for children, elders, families, and our fellow residents. Where can a local Lions Club turn when they need financial help with a major program or service project? The **Town of Dover Lions** turned to the **New York State and Bermuda Lions Foundation** and with its grant assistance, helped achieve their vision of transforming a former municipal storage building into a new community meeting space, children's vision/hearing screening office and future Lions clubhouse. The Foundation's goal "to make possible the completion of projects crafted by Lions by putting together small donations and making those funds available as grants for larger programs" was key to advancing our Club's combined volunteer efforts and prior \$5,000 donation toward completion of this multifaceted project.

Fellow Lions: What project or need in your community can you meet with the financial support of your Foundation? We are here to serve you and expand your community service projects. Please contact your district's trustees or the Foundation for advice. Remember that the funds we provide for your projects and emergency grants (up to \$2500) come from you through our annual fund-raising drawing (2021 tickets have already been sent to each club) and through your annual donations as individuals (\$25), club memberships (\$100) and sponsorships of Robert J. Uplinger awards (\$300). Please support us so that we can support you!

DISTRICT 20-R2

Despite the pandemic, District 20-R2 has had a fairly eventful half-year. We started the term by delivering the last of the frontline worker respite meals funded by the MD20 LCIF COVID-19 Emergency Relief Grant. And even before she took her oath of office virtually on June 29th, DG Riki Ito held a successful fundraiser to feed sandwiches to over 300 day and evening shift staff, plus front desk security, at Isabella Geriatric Center in Washington Heights.

While some Clubs still have not met at all since February or March, a few have even resumed convening in person in backyards and other outdoor spaces. DG Riki and FVDG Maribel Salabarria attended one such meeting that was held on the communal deck of the Club President's residential complex, and DG Riki has joined numerous other Clubs' meetings via Zoom. All Cabinet and Open District meetings have also been held virtually so far.

20-R2 started the year with 42 Clubs, but the NY Cuban LC has closed, and we are likely to lose at least one other Club before June. Conversely, IPDG Medadie Sy's NY Phil-Am LC has launched ten Branch Clubs, and hopes to have an Alpha Leo Club soon, as well. In an effort to cultivate future leaders, DG Riki has joined forces with 20-R1 District Governor Giuseppe Coco on a yearlong series of New Leaders Training Sessions featuring speakers from across MD20. The virtual format of this past year's USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum made it easier for more Lions from our District to attend, and many have also taken advantage of the plethora of webinars available from LCI and LCIF.

One thing that the pandemic has not stopped (or only briefly paused) in 20-R2 is Service. In fact, our Clubs have been busier than ever due to increased food insecurity and shortfalls in other basic needs. 
ples to provide for the feast, along with face masks, hand sanitizers and traditional sweets to over 200 people, to mark the celebration of Diwali.

This year, despite the challenges of dealing with a pandemic, Clubs in District 20-K2 found different ways to fund raise and provide service to their communities. In November the District Food Drive was kicked off by "The Great North Shore Ramble" sponsored by the Jericho-Brookville Lions to raise money to support Feed the Need a mobile food pantry. This year's road rally allowed all to socially distance by having everyone drive the "route" at their convenience.
