As it has for the past year, the pandemic still affects what Clubs can and cannot do: how we can still serve our community, whether we can hold some form of fundraising, and whether or not it is safe to meet in-person, among other issues. These are all important decisions that every Lion and every Club needs to make, but it is encouraging to know that most Clubs are still meeting in some form and Clubs continue to serve their communities, although it may be in a slightly different form than usual.

I would like to remind Club presidents and secretaries that the District owns an expanded Zoom account and it is free for any Club to use so they can meet either for their regular member meeting or as a board. It is first-come-first serve, but Clubs are free to book months in advance to reserve your best day and time.

submission instructions. It seems that more Clubs are now taking advantage of this now and that is great! That is why we have it. If your Club has not yet explored this option, I strongly encourage you to consider it

To gain access, just let me or Cabinet Secretary Barbara Bentley know, and we will share the user ID and password and you can then arrange the meeting and send the link out to your members. It works really well and is easy to use. As an alternative, some Clubs are using free conference calling and if you do not have an account, I have one that you are free to borrow at any time.

At our recently completed Council of Governors meeting, the current thinking is that we will hold a hybrid State Convention. Current state guidelines allow for up to 250 people to meet using social distancing and face masks, so we are operating under those rules for the moment.

As of now, that means that the Council, last year's Council, the DG and VDG candidates and their sponsors, the International family, and all of the partners-in-service will use up almost all of those 250 spots.

That is today's guideline. The drop-dead date for the state and hotels is April 15th and a lot could change between now and then, based on the vaccination distribution and the continuing infection rate. It may be that by April, more will be allowed to attend, and when or if that happens, the District will send out an advisory notice immediately.

In the meantime, I would like to remind you that reporting your Club activities is still important. As a Multiple, we have around a 43% reporting rate and our District is under that

number with some Clubs not reporting for over two years. There have admittedly been issues with the LCI website in the past, but most have been cleared up. If you are still having difficulty, please let me or your Zone or Region Chair know and we will get you any needed help.

Most Clubs will be holding Club elections in the coming weeks and it is equally important to report the in-coming officers to LCI and to our in-coming District Governor. Congratulations are in order for VDG Michele O'Hare whose name will be placed in nomination at the State Convention as our 2021-2022 District Governor. Also, congratulations to 2VDG Ricky Laurin who was selected as our 2021-2022 Vice District Governor.


We still do not have a candidate for 2VDG for next year, so if you have ever considered it, please contact myself or any Cabinet Officer and we will be happy to speak to you.



Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience, and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

Everyone's invited – Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.

Registration fees – The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.

Current registrants – Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.

Elections – Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.

Convention updates – Check our convention website LCICon for convention updates and details as they become available.

This global health pandemic has forced us all to make decisions and changes that place health and safety first. However, we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions, we continue to find new ways to stay connected, safely serve our communities and continue our global mission of service.

We appreciate your understanding during this challenging time for our organization and the world, and thank you for your incredible service as a Lion.




Crossword Puzzle

Lions Clubs of District 20-W // Avoiding E-Mail Scams

Increase in Cybersecurity Threats

In recent months, e-mail scams and other forms of cybersecurity attacks have become more prevalent because of the pandemic. As more business is being carried out using virtual methods such as e-mail correspondence and virtual meetings, new cybersecurity risks and threats have emerged. In the last week, we have seen increased e-mail scams circulating in District 20-W. Member awareness and education is more important now than ever to avoid falling victim to these attacks.

E-mail Imposter and Gift Card Scams

The most common scam that has been observed by IT cybersecurity teams are e-mail scams where bad actors create e-mail accounts that impersonate and pose as high-ranking individuals within an organization. In Lions Clubs, these are generally individuals like the district governor, vice district governor, and club presidents. The bad actor will ask the recipients of the scam e-mail if they are available and to do them a favor of buying gift cards and sending them the gift card information. Due to many Lions personal information being publicly available on Lions Clubs websites, it is very easy for these bad actors to identify high-ranking members and begin sending the scam e-mails to other members within a district or club.

How to Avoid These E-mail Scams

There are many ways to avoid e-mail scams like the one mentioned above. Here are several tips to avoid these e-mail scams:

- Always double check the e-mail address of the sender Usually the scammer will create a new e-mail account and set their display name to impersonate a high-ranking individual. Depending on your e-mail client, you may need to click or hover over their display name but be sure to double check the email address of the sender. In most scam attempts, the e-mail address of the individual who is being impersonated will not match their primary e-mail address that you should be familiar with.
- Do not open any attachments or click any links If you receive an unexpected e-mail with attachments or links, do not open them or click on them. Always contact the sender via phone or in-person and double check with them that they did in fact send you an attachment or link before opening them. Be especially cautious of shortened URLs that use services like tinyurl or bit.ly.
- Be aware of generic greetings, misspelling, and improper grammar Many times scam e-mails will have generic greetings that do not directly address the recipient, misspelling, and improper grammar. These can all be signs that an e-mail is fraudulent.
- Contact the individual you believe sent you the e-mail Speak to the individual that sent you the e-mail either by phone or in-person to verify that the e-mail is genuine and that they sent the e-mail to you. Verify the authenticity of requests, especially when you are being asked to buy something.



Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line up with each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Rephrase remarks when not understood.



Take turns when speaking.

Continued Collection of Used Eyeglasses

Two club members continue making their monthly rounds in and around the community collecting used eyeglasses. The glasses are then initially inspected for further usefulness and repackaged into large boxes to await transportation to recycling center(s).

Community Appeal Letter

Since our two major fundraisers were canceled last year and both are in serious jeopardy of cancelation again this year, our membership voted to mail a first-ever informational/subtle appeal letter to our community. The letter explained who we are, what we do in the community and listed major projects the club has supported since our inception. Furthermore, we stated the continuance of some of these services were at risk of reduction or elimination due to the virus impact on our ability to conduct many of our long-established public fundraisers for financial support.

Via a direct mailer we sent the letter to all the households in our community/township (two zip codes). Residents began receiving it the beginning of February. Our response, while not financially making up for the canceled fundraisers, has been better than expected. Donations continue to come in, although the numbers have dropped off from the first couple of weeks. Many donations were accompanied by notes/comments supporting our past efforts with the hope we will be able to continue our work in the community. We anticipate donations will continue for a while longer. In addition to the financial assistance from the community, we know our letter has established our visibility with some residents while reinforcing it with others... everything can't be measured entirely on

dollars and cents!

SPRING ARRIVES SOON

LIONS LOAN-OUT EQUIPMENT

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers. (Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
