During my recent Zoom visitations, I have been asking Clubs to consider whether some form of hybrid meeting option should be introduced or maintained on a permanent basis. may be a preferred way to participate in Club and community activities.

Children in many families are involved in all sorts of groups, sports, and activities these days, so the continued use of Zoom in addition to meeting in-person, may be a way of accommodating younger parents hard-pressed to carve out a several hour block to attend a meeting in-person. I would ask that Clubs examine their own member needs but to not discount the continued use of Zoom or some other social media platform, even when resuming in-person meetings if it will help attract and retain younger, and sometimes even older members, who may prefer to not travel during the evening hours.

Our State convention for the Multiple District is still scheduled for May 14th-15th in Syracuse, NY. This will be a hybrid convention with a limited number of Lions attending in-person while most will be able to participate virtually. The exact number that can and will attend in-person will be determined by New York State as well as any restrictions attendees will need to follow. Today that number is 150 individuals, but that may change either up or down between now and April 15th, which is the deadline given to us by the hotel.

The current 150-person level will be filled by last year's Council of Governors, this year's sitting Council, next year and the following year's Council, the International family, Committee members, and seminar presenters.

We have eight different seminars scheduled on a variety of topics with more information to follow shortly. The registration fee for virtual attendees will be \$30. per person and will include your choice of two seminars. The opening Parade of Flags will be virtual, having been previously filmed.

Voting will be virtual with a site set up to record votes. As usual, each Club will be allocated one voting delegate per

ten members but all LCI and MD-20 dues must be paid in full in order for Club delegates be eligible. Unpaid dues will disqualify Club delegates from voting, although every Lion can still register to attend the virtual events.

We will be voting in Lion Michele O'Hare as the 2021-2022 District Governor, Lion Ricky Laurin as our 2021-2022 Vice District Governor, as well as voting in the first Board of Directors for the MD-20 ALERT Foundation. The importance of having your Club's delegates qualified to vote cannot be overstated.

Each Club delegate must pay the \$30. registration fee in order to vote even if that is the only thing a delegate wishes to participate in. This is to make certain that those voting are in fact Lions in good standing, and to eliminate any potential voting irregularities.

On another matter, each District decides individually whether to hold a District Governor testimonial on the pre-assigned date, postpone it to later in the year, or cancel it altogether. Our DG testimonial is scheduled for June 20th and it is intended to take place. More information will follow once a venue has been selected and any continuing pandemic restrictions are known.

It is encouraging to see more Clubs taking advantage of the District's free Zoom account so please continue to make use of it.

As we get closer to some form of life as we knew it, we will be able to once again find more opportunities to serve our communities. In the meantime, if there is anything myself, your Cabinet officers, or the District can do to help, please reach out to us.

Current registrants – Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.


Elections – Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.

Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line up with each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Make sure hearing aid users have them on.



Keep background noise in the room to a minimum.

WORKPLACE EYE HEALTH AND SAFETY

March is Workplace Eye Health and Safety Month, and the emphasis on workplace eye safety is evolving. With more Americans working remotely, we may not realize how much damage is being done to our eyes, before it's too late.

According to Washington Eye Physicians & Surgeons, more than 2,000 eye injuries occur daily on job sites across the country, and one in ten of those injuries will require missed days of work to recover. From the total amount of work-related eye injuries that occur, 10-20 percent will cause temporary or permanent vision loss. Safety experts and eye care providers agree that the appropriate eye protection can lessen the severity of injuries, or even prevent 90 percent of them.

While many think that eye injuries only occur in construction, trade, or manufacturing jobs, it's important to know that nearly 40 percent of work-related eye injuries happen in healthcare facilities, laboratories, and offices. Yes, offices – that means the home offices so many of us have been using since the beginning of the pandemic, one year ago this week.

Recent studies show eye safety is in jeopardy in office settings because too much time on a computer can be just as hazardous to eyesight. The most common eye problem is known as Computer Vision Syndrome (CVS). While consistently being on your computer will not permanently damage your vision in most cases, it can cause some challenges. Minor irritation may include your eyes feeling fatigued, dry, and irritated. Other issues can cause retina problems from the blue light on the screen, and also elongate the shape of the eye, causing nearsighted vision. We are finding this a lot more with children on computers. Because of this, more children are wearing prescription eyeglasses than ever before.

Too much screen time and not enough breaks also cause headaches, inattentiveness, neck pain, back strain, poor posture, and added stress on the body. Research shows that staring at a screen for extended periods lengthens the interval between blinks, preventing eyes from staying lubricated and moistened (Source: Eye Med).

To assist with CVS, CABVI representatives suggest practicing the following tips:

1. Reposition your screen. Adjust your screen to be at a right angle away from any direct light source. Invest in an anti-glare screen for your monitor to make the computer work gentler on your eyes.

2. Use the 20-20-20 rule. This rule reminds you that every 20 minutes, you should look at an object at least 20 feet away for at least 20 seconds.

3. Don't forget to blink. While it may sound ridiculous, write yourself a note and place it on your monitor. Write "Blink Often" or any other message that will remind you to regularly close your eyes to keep them from getting dried out.

4. Use artificial tears. Over-the-counter eye drops can be extremely helpful in preventing dry eyes and keeping your eyes comfortable. CABVI representatives prefer preservativefree artificial tears because they work much better and last longer. We even suggest using them at night before bed to give your eyes a refresher before you sleep.

5. Drink water. Adequate hydration can make a big difference, especially during the winter months when heaters and furnaces can make the air particularly dry.

6. Schedule regular comprehensive eye exams. Nothing can replace the importance of having an eye exam by a licensed ophthalmologist at regular intervals.

7. Invest in a quality Blue Blocking lens. The lenses you wear can be made with the blue light blocking technology in your prescription. If you don't wear glasses, or you prefer to wear contacts, you can get non-prescription blue-light blocking lenses and frames to help you.

Please take eye-safety seriously. If you are having experiencing issues, or have concerns, or new problems that seemed to happen for no reason, problems than normal, or new problems or experiencing vision changes such as blurred vision, pain, etc., contact your eye doctor immediately. It's always best to have a thorough exam by a licensed ophthalmologist.

Greater Herkimer Lions Club Pushing Through the Pandemic

The Greater Herkimer Lions Club despite the difficult year that 2020 presented we prevailed in our charitable and community service efforts. This report will outline what was accomplished and later in the report what is planned for 2021. The club added 3 new members in 2020, with four more members anticipated in 2021, bringing our club membership to 31 members.

2020 activities started with the onset of the Covid 19 pandemic. Starting in the early phase of the pandemic our club joined forces with five other civic organizations to make an effort to serve the first responders and frontline workers supporting our communities. The joint effort headed up by the Greater Herkimer Lions Club president Rudy Scialdo Jr.

decided together to show support of both our essential workers but support local businesses. It was decided to do this by purchasing pizzas from various local pizza shops in our area then deliver to



the frontline workers. The cooperating organizations were the Herkimer Rotary Club, Little Falls Rotary, Frankfort Kiwanis, Herkimer County Hunger Coalition, and finally the Mohawk Community Club. Starting in the Mid-April time frame and continuing for six weeks to mid-May 175 pizzas were delivered by club members to local Police, Troopers, Ambulance Corps, Sheriff, Emergency Room workers, at 16 different locations throughout the Mohawk Valley. The equivalent volunteer hours of 140 hours for this effort. In addition, the club distributed 30 N95 masks to ambulance crews in the valley. Thanks to Joe Conigliaro, Greg Eisenhut, and Rudy Scialdo II for distributing the masks.

The GHL Club efforts continued into April with our Annual Canal Cleanup, where we clean a portion of the NYS Canal Walk of debris and garbage. This effort had volunteer hours of 20 hours.

In May we completed our Annual Commemorative Flag Ceremony, where the American Flags are placed or replaced on the Veterans graves at Oak Hill Cemetery. GHL supports this effort of placing 2500 flags with a \$500 donation to purchase the flags for the graves. The events had 60 hours of volunteer time.

In June we held our low-cost health screening event or AMBA where individuals can obtain low-cost health screenings for various chronic disorders. This year's event provided this service for 100 individuals. Volunteer hours for this event totaled 45 hours.

Our final event for the year was our 34th Annual golf Tournament. This event is our largest event we sponsor in

a given year. It is also responsible for generating most of the revenue for our yearly charitable support. Although it was a difficult year, we prevailed under the Covid Protocols and



the event ended up being our third biggest fund raiser in the 35 years of holding this tournament. Raising approximately twelve thousand dollars. The tournament hosted 120 golfers at the Stonebridge Golf and Country Club in Frankfort. A special thanks goes out to the staff at the course for the great job they did to make this event possible and in keeping all the attendees safe while having an enjoyable time at the tournament. Total volunteer hours were 175 hours. As is our tradition the Lion of The Year Honor was announced and awarded to a Lion voted on by the club members.

In December 2020 we supported the Gram Lorraine Program by sponsoring six children with Christmas gifts that they would not have received without the program.

That summed up the



activities our club sponsored during 2020, the following is what we have planned for 2021. Total volunteer hours added up to 600 hours. Moving onto 2021 our continuing community projects are, continued placement of Lions Club international signage at entrances to the villages represented by our club. We are also currenting working on placement of benches along the NYS Canal Walk passing through our locales, and welcome signage on the CSX

In February we held our annual month-long raffle, a daily drawing for cash prizes. This event generated one thousand dollars and totaled 50 hours of volunteer time. This is a listing of the coming events and their respective dates.

LIONS EYE INSTITUTE BUNNY SALES

Club members have completed our sale of chocolate bunnies in assistance to the Lions Eye Institute annual fundraiser. This year our Leo Club members in the local Middle School assisted us with sales as they were returning to a more normal school schedule. Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers. (Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
