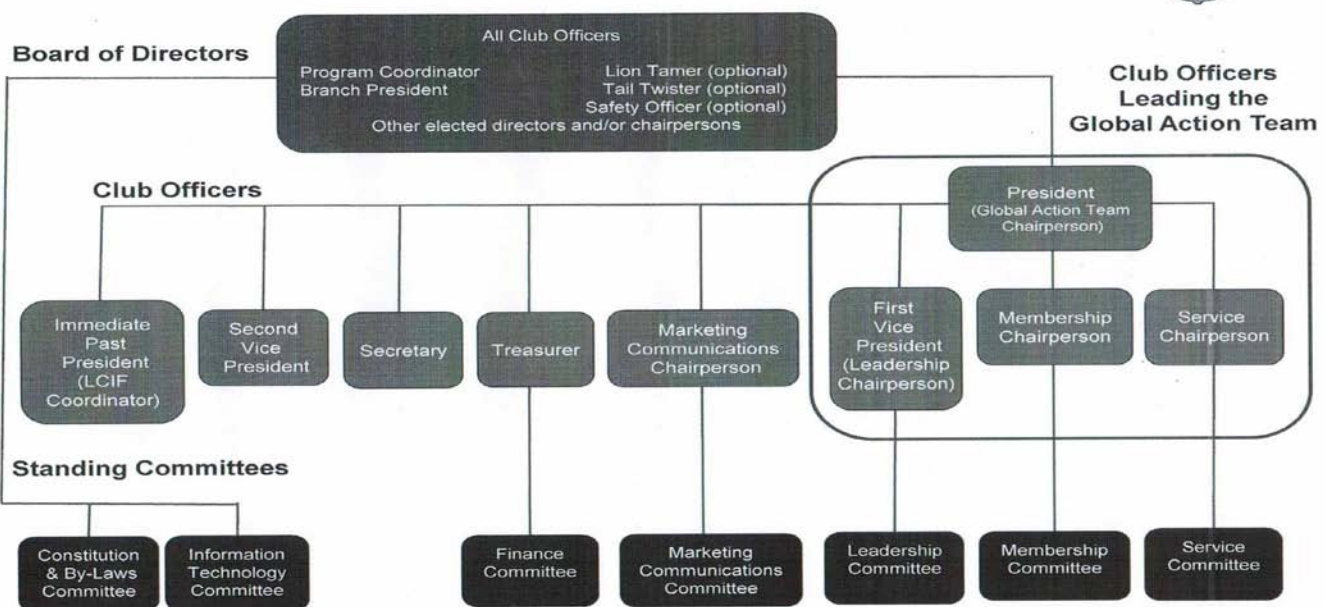

Lions Clubs International

Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience, and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

Everyone's invited – Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.

Registration fees – The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.

Current registrants – Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.

Elections – Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.

Convention updates – Check our convention website LCIcon for convention updates and details as they become available.

This global health pandemic has forced us all to make decisions and changes that place health and safety first. However, we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions, we continue to find new ways to stay connected, safely serve our communities and continue our global mission of service.

We appreciate your understanding during this challenging time for our organization and the world, and thank you for your incredible service as a Lion.

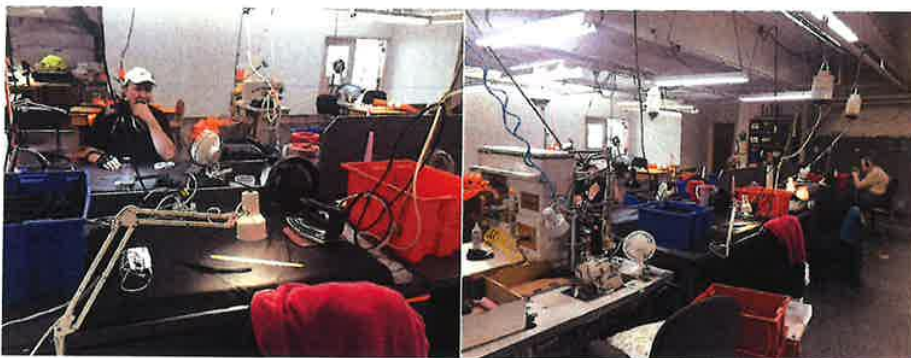

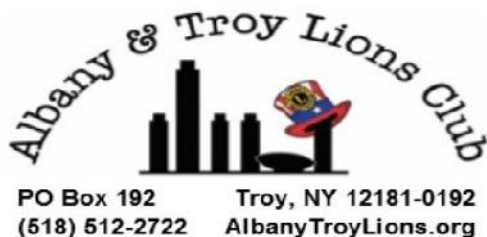

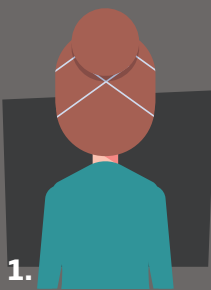

Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



1.

If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



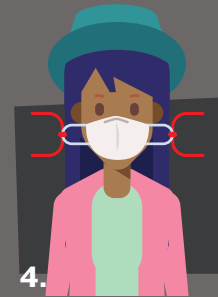
2.

Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



3.

Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line up with each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



4.

Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Rephrase remarks when not understood.



Take turns when speaking.



Make sure hearing aid users have them on.



Keep background noise in the room to a minimum.



Face each other (at a safe distance).

When removing your mask...

Check to make sure hearing aids are still in place after removing a mask as they may come off with mask removal.

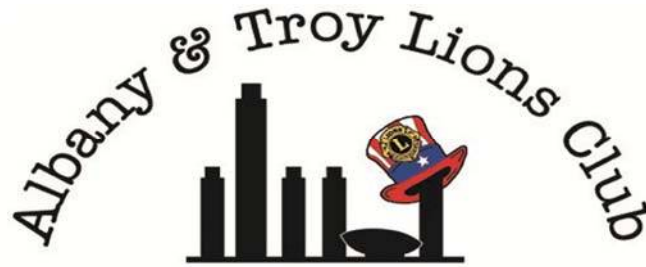

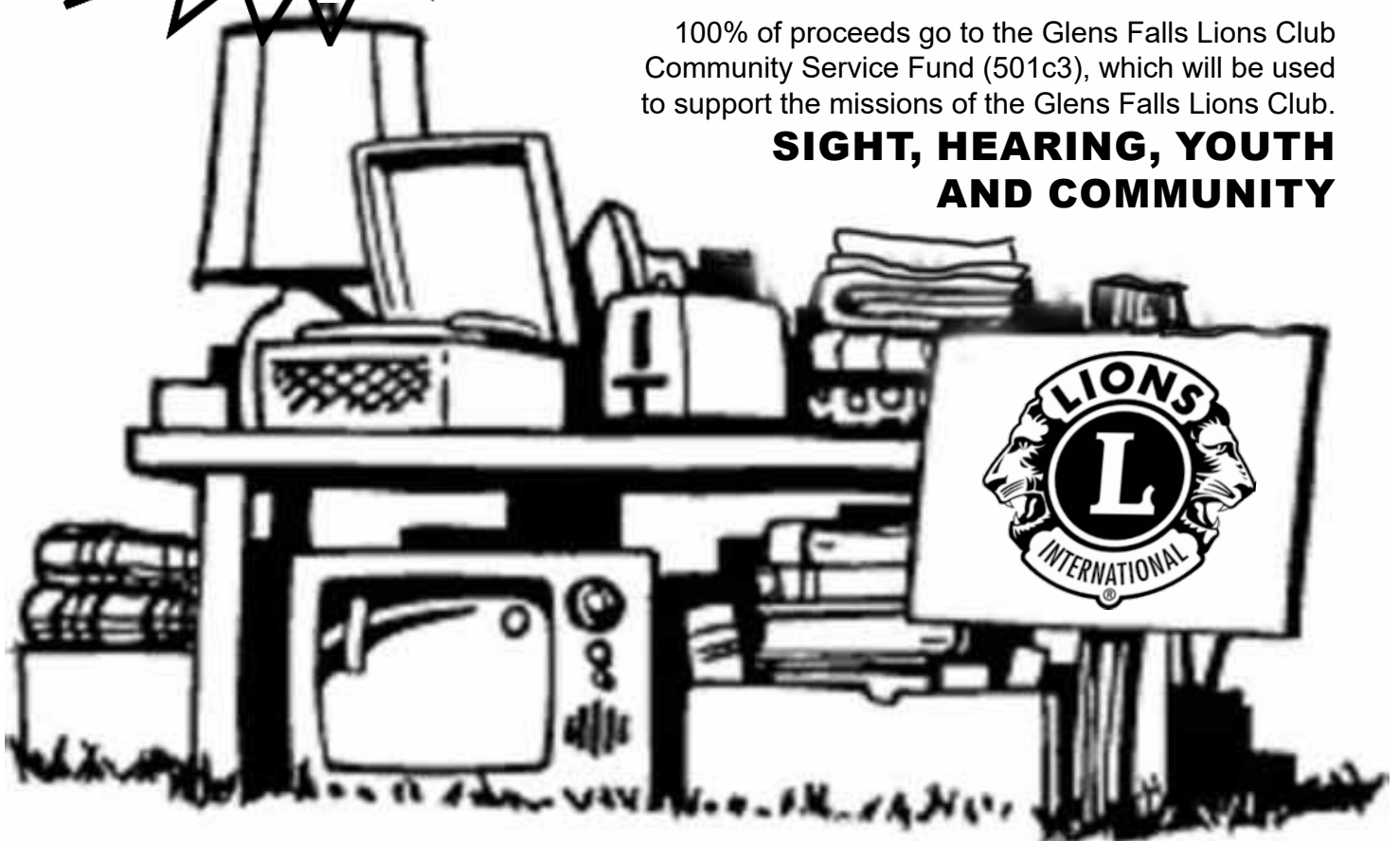

YOUTH FIELDS

The vision of young athletes hitting the fields at Broadalbin Town Park took full form this month after a years-long community effort to get the park built.

“It’s been a long time coming, there have been a lot of battles to get it where it could be open,” said Keith Buchanan, Broadalbin Youth Commission fundraiser coordinator, on Thursday.

The effort by the Broadalbin Youth Commission to construct a park with playing fields capable of serving the hundreds of local kids who participate in seasonal youth sports began over a decade ago. The park on Union Mills Road officially opened to the public last weekend as members of the spring youth soccer league took to the fields for the first time.

“To see the kids play is remarkable. It’s very refreshing we’re getting back to normal and kids are enjoying themselves,” said Bill Suchy, Broadalbin-Perth Lions Club president, of the opening weekend. “I don’t think I saw a frown in the bunch.”

“We’ve had nothing but positive comments,” said Buchanan. “I feel elated.”

The newly constructed park features two full-sized soccer fields, three baseball and softball fields, a basketball court, a pavilion with a concession stand, a picnic area and public restrooms. An intermediate baseball field with a practice football field is still under construction.

Before the park’s construction, Suchy said, sports leagues organized by the Broadalbin Youth Commission played at Perth Bible Church’s fields.

“We knew that we needed one site for not just the Youth Commission, but also for the taxpayers so people in the community could have a place to go,” Buchanan said.

Efforts to secure land for the park by the volunteer members of the Youth Commission in partnership with the town were already underway before Buchanan got involved about 15 years ago.

Eventually, 20 acres of land along Route 29 was purchased for

the park, but the presence of wetlands on the property posed a huge financial burden for advancing the project. The setback was overcome when Stewart’s Shops bought the property for an expansion project.

The funds from the land sale allowed the town to purchase a 24-acre property on Union Mills Road neighboring the Town Barn and the Youth Commission continued planning and fundraising for the project.

The Youth Commission has been fundraising to cover the cost of constructing the park for years through annual events, including the Fulton-Montgomery County Home Show and Craft Fair, Junkin-the-Trunk Flea Market, Broadalbin Youth Commission Golf Tournament and chicken barbecue dinners.

“It was always the commitment of the Youth Commission to pay for the park,” Buchanan said.

Construction of the \$1.1 million park finally got underway three years ago with a \$500,000 grant award from the state Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation and a \$200,000 contribution from the Youth Commission. The town borrowed the remaining balance for the project and the Youth Commission is working toward repaying the debt.

The park has also benefited from local contributions and donations from private individuals and organizations. Adirondack Mechanical Corporation donated labor and materials for the installation of an irrigation system and Lowe’s donated and constructed a storage shed at the site.

While initial construction is now complete and the park has opened, additional improvements are planned. Future fundraising efforts by the Youth Commission will be aimed at the installation of a walking path, sand volleyball court, expanded picnic area, lighting for the fields and paving.

Additionally, although the pavilion and concession stand is up and operational, it is not yet complete. The Broadalbin-Perth Lions Club over the past decade has been fundraising to assist with that project. The restrictions of the coronavirus pandemic slowed those efforts over the past year as in-person events were hampered.

However, the Lions have finally reached their \$20,000 goal and the check presented to the Youth Commission this weekend will cover the cost of finishing touches for the pavilion and concession stand.

The Lions have operated concessions for the Youth Commission for several years, Suchy said. Contributing to the



pavilion and concession stand at the new park seemed like the perfect fundraising project for the volunteer organization to undertake in addition to its annual charitable efforts, he said.

“We felt it was a worthwhile activity to benefit the community, that’s why we stepped in and are assisting as much as we can,” Suchy said. “We feel great about it. We look forward to continuing to do more with the Youth Commission, whether it’s a large program like this or on the smaller scale.”

While volunteers will continue working to bring further improvements to the park, both Buchanan and Suchy gushed about the efforts of the community over many years that culminated in the opening of the park.

“It looks gorgeous,” Buchanan said. “We have probably one of the best parks in Fulton and Montgomery counties.”

“I hope we’re setting an example for other people to get involved,” Suchy added.

Sessions our members attended were on Diabetes Awareness & Education, Membership Ideas and Mental Health. All three were excellent. They introduced us to new ideas/tips and provided us with future contact names and information. Hats off to all who participated in conducting this most unique and informative type of convention!

VILLAGE AL FRESCO DINING AREA

With the beautiful weather we've been experiencing recently, many visitors to our community and residents alike have been enjoying the outdoor eating venue in the village. Two days a week club members continue

preserving the cleanliness of this area by picking up any leftovers, wiping

down tables and preparing garbage containers for sanitation personnel pick-up the following morning. This area will be open well into the fall season and will be enjoyed by many as they enjoy take-out food and beverages from local restaurants and coffee shops.



MONTHLY FOOD DISTRIBUTION ASSISTANCE

Six club members helped with the food distribution to seniors in the area the second Monday of May. We unloaded the scheduled delivery from the Regional Food Bank in Syracuse, NY, combined boxes of dairy products with previously packaged bags and loaded both into a van and cargo hold of a donated charter bus for delivery to two area senior residences. The following Monday (May 17th), eight members assisted other community members serving 450 families at the regular monthly distribution. After unloading the delivery from the Regional Food Bank, it was staged and packed into client's vehicles as we directed them safely through the parking lot of Annunciation Church in Clark Mills, NY. As a result of these collective efforts, approximately 209 seniors and 675 adults and children received supplemental food this month. Recipients continue to be most grateful of the support they are receiving from the operation of the pantry, its volunteers and supporters.

USED EYEGLASSES

This month our collections of used eyeglasses ballooned as a result of our participation in the Community Collection Day on May 22nd. 538 used eyeglasses were collected in total with over 350 being obtained as a result of inclusion in pre-event advertising of the Collection Day. We also collected three hearing aids which will be forwarded to our District Hearing Conservation Society.



ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAFETERIA ASSISTANCE

Kindergarten students are a great deal of fun... and very energetic, as we are discovering as we assist with the lunch hour program at our local school district. Each day one of our members continue providing help for an hour as the young students, who have missed most of their first year in school, have returned to school on a full-time basis. Wearing club identifiable clothing, we assist other aides and food service personnel opening milk cartons, handing out straws, condiments, napkins (lots of them), general cleanup and delivery of prepared food to classrooms. The time goes fast and we're more than happy to lend a helping hand as the kids acclimate to real school life.

COMMUNITY CLEAN-UP DAY & DIABETES SELF-TEST DISTRIBUTION

Although later than usual our community's Collection Day was conducted on May 22nd. Intended to be a fundraising/food donation day for our local Country Pantry, area residents are informed via posters and news media to bring their recycling to the Village Green where they can "exchange" it for food/monetary donations for the pantry. Various organizations accept electronics, old books & jewelry, bottles & cans, health & beauty products, or in our case eyeglasses & hearing aids. In addition, our club sponsors a commercial shredder for three hours. It is utilized by residents for on-sight shredding of confidential documents. The shredding, taking place inside the truck can be viewed via closed circuit television providing residents the opportunity to watch the actual shredding of all documents. This year 6,750 pounds of paper was shredded (almost twice the amount as last year).



In addition, as a show of gratitude, the Country

Pantry provided a plastic bag containing articles provided by each participating organization to residents making donations to the pantry. We provided the Country with enough pre-diabetes self-assessment tests for their "bags of goodies". These self-assessment tests were obtained from the American Diabetes Association. We reproduced the test with the Lions Clubs Logo and they were handed out to approximately 145 people in our community. Plus, as mentioned above, we collected recycled eyeglasses and hearing aids that will be forwarded to our associated recycling/distribution centers.

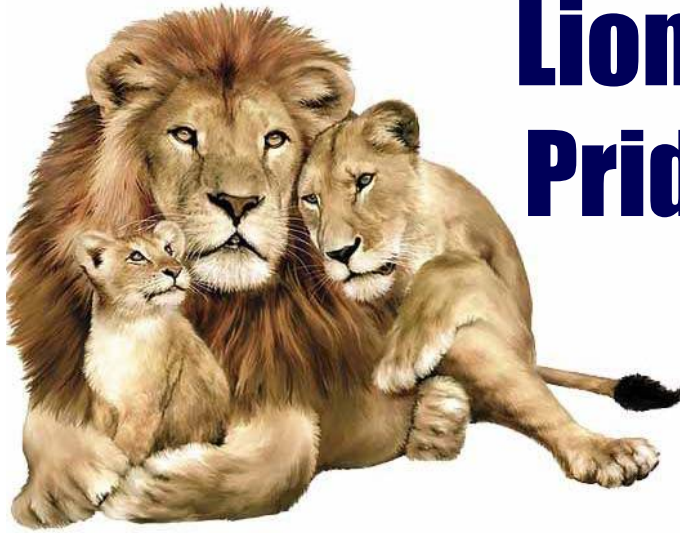

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers.

(Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
