Deduction Update from NABA's Development Department

IRS Statements and Announcements:

Expanded tax benefits help individuals and businesses give to charity during 2021; deductions up to \$600 available for cash donations by non-itemizers

IR-2021-190, September 17, 2021

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today explained how expanded tax benefits can help both individuals and businesses give to charity before the end of this year.

The Taxpayer Certainty and Disaster Tax Relief Act of 2020, enacted last December, provides several provisions to help individuals and businesses who give to charity. The new law generally extends through the end of 2021 four temporary tax changes originally enacted by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Here is a rundown of these changes.

Deduction for individuals who don't itemize; cash donations up to \$600 qualify

Ordinarily, individuals who elect to take the standard deduction cannot claim a deduction for their charitable contributions. The law now permits these individuals to claim a limited deduction on their 2021 federal income tax returns for cash contributions made to certain qualifying charitable organizations. Nearly nine in 10 taxpayers now take the standard deduction and could potentially qualify to claim a limited deduction for cash contributions.

These individuals, including married individuals filing separate returns, can claim a deduction of up to \$300 for cash contributions made to qualifying charities

DIABETES AWARENESS AND EDUCATION

November was Diabetes Awareness month. World Diabetes Day is November 14th. In addition to sight and hearing services, Lions clubs provide for diabetes education and awareness.

Guest speakers from Lions District 20-W on October 18th were Lion Barbara Bentley and PDG John McDonald, who presented a program on diabetes awareness and education to members of the Town of Wright/Schoharie Valley Lions Club.

Lion Barbara, who is the District Diabetes Chair and a Certified Diabetes Paraprofessional, said their main goal is to raise awareness and help educate people in our communities. Lions clubs assist in this effort by distributing Lions International bookmarks, and a printed brochure "Are You at Risk for preDiabetes?" to food pantries, libraries, and health fairs. The brochure has a prediabetes risk assessment in it.

Pre-diabetes is a condition where blood glucose levels are higher than normal but not high enough to be considered diabetes. Nine out of 10 people with this condition don't know they have it. Warning signs can include blurry vision, cold hands and feet, dry mouth, and excessive thirst. People with pre-diabetes are at risk to develop Type 2 (adult onset) diabetes.

Being more active, keeping weight in check, and eating healthy are ways to prevent and even reverse Type 2 diabetes. Healthy eating includes, among other things cutting down on added sugar in foods and sugary beverages, eating more vegetables, and choosing whole grains and high fiber foods.

The Lions club will conduct a holiday fundraiser by selling farm fresh Schermer pecans for the holidays. Further information can be obtained by calling (518) 296-8076.

He has since been going for regular testing and is now an active 7th grader. I am very thankful to NABA for the early diagnosis which made such a difference to his growing years.

My daughter Riane has been a volunteer at NABA from 4th grade when she was first introduced to them through WHMS. Now, as a college freshman at RPI, she continues to find it very rewarding to be part of the NABA family. I also hope to be able to contribute in any small way that I can to the organization.

Thank you once again for the amazing work that you do. It is

HOLIDAY APPEAL

Dear Friends of NABA,

My name is Sandra Wade. I am a mother of six children and for 25 years, I was a server at Scotty's Truck Stop. In an effort to treat my vision loss, I was sent to specialists in Albany for my vision problems. My doctor referred me to the Northeastern Association of the Blind at Albany (NABA) for a low vision exam.

NABA recognizes the unique needs of those with remaining vision. When vision cannot be corrected with regular eyeglasses to 20/70 or better, the condition is known as low vision. Simple tasks such as reading, writing, shopping, cooking, and watching television became difficult. I love to craft and I was worried that I would no longer be able to crochet or paint.

I went to the Dr. Harry M. Judge Vision Rehabilitation Center, where NABA evaluated my functional vision and my ability to use equipment for maximizing my remaining vision. At NABA, their certified low vision specialist, Monica Casey-Gee, OD, conducted a low vision examination to assess how magnification would allow me to function with the sight I had left. She declared me legally blind. She then determined the correct amount of magnification needed and the type of device best suited for me. She prescribed lighted magnifiers, closed circuit television, as well as distance aids. She also told me that a NABA Vision Rehabilitation Therapist and a Social Worker from NABA would help me in learning to manage daily tasks to remain independent. To say the least I was very depressed.

I then had a visit from Nat, the NABA social worker, who came to my apartment to meet with me. He was so kind and understanding. Adjusting to and coping with my vision loss was very difficult emotionally. Nat guided me in developing coping, problem-solving, and decisionmaking skills, while reducing my stress and anxiety. He taught me to get toothpaste on my toothbrush without making a mess. He taught me how to separate my change and bills. He also registered me for the STAR (Special Transit Available by Request) program from CDTA.

Nat helped guide me to available resources and services that helped me with my vision loss and increased my independence, safety, and quality of life. David, a Rehabilitation Teacher from NABA, came to visit me next. He brought me a talking calculator that helped me manage my checking account independently. He gave me a large print calendar so I could schedule my own appointments. I received magnifying devices, which helped me make the most of my remaining sight. David instructed me on how to use my magnifier so I can read and crochet again.

But best of all I have a larger light magnifier that allows me to paint again. I can now paint and express myself. A bit of knowledge and assistance from NABA helped my life get back to normal.

I wasn't really going out on my own, then my sister took me to the Wilton Plaza. With all the tools from NABA, I was like a 79-year-old kid in a candy store. I could go to the Dollar Store and Price Chopper and shop on my own. What a great

feeling to be independent.

NABA has given me a new life. I realized that there really was light at the end of the tunnel and I am so blessed. Without NABA, I could not have done any of this.

For anyone out there that may have a vision problem — or if you know of someone with a small or major vision problem — please contact the Dr. Harry M. Judge Vision Rehabilitation Center at NABA. It will change your life.

During the holiday seasons, I would like to ask you to make a contribution to NABA so that others, like me, might continue to enjoy independence and dignity. Your contribution will help NABA continue to provide services and programs to people of all ages who are blind and visually impaired in the 16 counties that it serves. A donation of any amount will help this vital organization in its very important mission.

Pollowing our joint meeting with the Sauquoit Valley Lions last month, we returned to our original meeting place, Alteri's Restaurant in the village of Clinton the second week in October. Due to flu-like illnesses of several members and positive COVID test results of two others, attendance was down. Topics discussed were our annual White Cane Fundraiser the weekend before Christmas and organizing/staffing the Red Kettle Campaign for the local unit of the Salvation Army. For the past four years, we have taken the lead in running this campaign in our town with all proceeds going to our local unit of the Salvation Army.

The monthly meeting of our local Chamber of Commerce Networking Breakfast this month was held at the headquarters of the Central Oneida County Volunteer Ambulance Corps (COCVAC) in Clark Mills, NY. Three of our members represented the club. The ambulance corps responds to most emergency situations in the central portion of our county. They also are in the process of conducting an educational campaign throughout their service area. This campaign is making residents aware of their capabilities and their abilities to train groups in such lifesaving techniques as CPR. Most recently their personnel have been contracted by NYS to administer COVID vaccinations at various public gatherings. We will be looking to have one of our club meetings in early 2022 at their facility. This will enable our entire club to hear of their capabilities and observe the technology they employ when responding to emergencies.

Despite a mixture of rain and snow showers with occasional gusts of wind, eight (8) club members joined other community

volunteers on November 15th assisting with the local Country Pantry monthly Food Distribution. This month we packed 659 cars (representing 785 individuals) with food donated by area residents and procured from the Syracuse Regional Food Bank with donations from area residents. The food included fresh produce,

local food markets allowing clients to procure meat products for their Thanksgiving Day meals. Food received by clients is intended to supplement their grocery requirements for a minimum of three days. This month for the first time since the pandemic commenced, the pantry ran out of food for clients. In keeping

with November being Diabetes Awareness Month, the first 400 clients served at the pantry this month received LCI Diabetes Informational Bookmarks purchased from Lions Clubs International. The bookmarks contained contact information for our club including our website.

Two-hundred-seventy-four (274) pair of used eyeglasses and two (2) used hearing aids were collected from local area collection sites this month. These items were added to those in local storage to be forwarded to recycling centers at some future date.

Many donations are requested this time of year. We made a

total of \$2,500 in contributions to the following organizations: our local Country Pantry, the two volunteer Fire Departments that service our community, the local unit of the Salvation Army and our local Bloodmobile, the Brandel-Murphy Youth Foundation and Hospice. In addition, we supported raffles of local and district Lions Clubs.

Finally, we once again are organizing and for the most part

staffing the annual Salvation Red Kettle Drive in our community. It began the day after Thanksgiving and will continue until the weekend of December 18th. The following weekend (just before Christmas in order maximize donations due to the increased number of people shopping) we will conduct our annual WhiteCane Fundraiser at local businesses in the village. Because of the COVID situation, we were unable to conduct this annual event last year... we're keeping our fingers crossed.

If you have an IRA and are now 70 ½ or older, you may be required to withdraw a portion of that savings annually. If

the Required Minimum Draw (RMD) is paid to you, you will owe taxes on the distribution. However, you may instead choose to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to a qualifying charity, such as the Empire State Special Needs Experience, Inc. When such a distribution (up to \$100,000) goes directly to the charity, the tax liability is eliminated. For a QCD to count towards your current year's RMD, the funds much come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, generally 12/31.

If you are facing a decision regarding the distribution of your IRA, please consider blessing our camp and special campers by directing your distribution to the Empire State Special Needs Experience, Inc. Your charitable gift will help us continue to provide quality summer programs to our special needs campers and while doing so, respite for their care-givers.

MD20 Delinquent Dues Policy (from the MD20 Policy Manual)

This applies only to clubs in excess of \$1000 beyond 120 days past due or owing any amount for more than 90 days after a second billing cycle has passed. This basically means haven't paid in 450 days.

MD20 Delinquent Dues Policy

Any club in arrears to Multiple District 20 for dues in excess of \$1,000 beyond 120 days, or in arrears to Multiple District 20 for dues in any amount for more than 90 days after a second consecutive billing cycle has passed without full payment having been made, shall be subject to the following administrative actions:

- 1) Once the above default date is triggered, the Council Secretary-Treasurer shall send a letter to the delinquent club's president, secretary, treasurer and any PDGs therein informing these club leaders that the arrears situation must be addressed immediately. The letter must advise the leaders of the delinquent club that the failure to address the situation will result in the club being recommended for placement on status quo with the possible loss of the club charter (see Appendix A). A copy of this letter shall be sent to the district governor in whose district the delinquent club is located.
- 2) If the delinquent club's leaders fail to respond to the above referenced letter within 30 days thereof, by way of immediate payment or the execution of a payment plan to address the arrears, then the district governor in whose district the delinquent club is located, or his/her representative, shall make immediate contact with the club leaders to accomplish the following:
 - a) a review of the club roster to determine the accuracy of each member's status and contact information, and the accuracy of the club officer information listed on the PU101;
 - b) a review of the billing procedures utilized by the club for the collection of member dues;
 - c) a review of club accounts to confirm the appropriate segregation of charitable and administrative funds;
 - d) the creation of a plan to address the arrears owed to MD20 from administrative funds, which may include a per capita tax on members for any past dues uncollected and the appropriate billing and collection of same.
- 3) The district governor in whose district the delinquent club is located must submit proof that the steps outlined in paragraph 2 above were accomplished within sixty (60) days of the letter referred to in paragraph 1. Such proof must be in writing and acknowledged by the signature of the district governor, the first vice district governor, the zone chair assigned to the club in question, as well as the club president and the club secretary. Said proof may be in the form of the review and recovery report provided in Appendix B. This sixty (60) day deadline may be extended by the Council Chair for good cause shown.
- 4) If a delinquent club fails to cooperate with the district governor, or his/her representative, in reviewing the club's membership information, billing procedures, and finances as required in paragraph 2 above, and/or fails to enter into a payment plan to satisfy its arrears within sixty (60) days of receipt of the letter referred to in paragraph 1, then the district governor must request that LCI place the delinquent club on status quo in accordance with the policy set forth in Chapter V of the LCI Board Policy Manual. Said status quo request may be in the form provided in Appendix C. This sixty (60) day deadline may be extended by the Council Chair for good cause shown. A district governor may rely on the collection attempts made by his/her predecessor in order to satisfy the preconditions for a status quo request.
- 5) If the district governor in whose district a delinquent club is located fails to submit the proof required by paragraph 3 above prior to the close of the council meeting next occurring after the 60-day deadline (or any extension of same granted by the Council Chair), or fails to request that a delinquent club be placed on status quo in accordance with the policy set forth in Chapter V of the LCI Board Policy Manual after appropriate efforts were made to address the club's delinquency, then the Council Chair may direct the Council Secretary Treasurer to:
 - a) withhold district dues disbursements to that district until such time as the requirements are met, except that under no circumstances may such payments be held beyond June 1 of the Lionistic year in question.
 - b) withhold any MD20 reimbursement to the district governor for expenses related to travel to and from the International Convention.
- 6) The Council Secretary-Treasurer and the MD20 Office are directed to provide the delinquent club and the district governor in whose district the delinquent club is located all necessary documentation and assistance to verify the history of the arrears, including proof of billing, payments and collection attempts. The Council Secretary-Treasurer and the MD20 Office shall work with the delinquent club and the district governor at every stage of this process to agree on appropriate terms for the collection of arrears.
- 7) The Council Secretary-Treasurer shall report to the Council at every council meeting the status of all attempts to collect delinquent dues within the various districts, and the Council shall act on any appropriate requests consistent with these policies and procedures.

Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line up with each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Rephrase remarks when not understood.



Take turns when speaking.



Make sure hearing aid users have them on.



Keep background noise in the room to a minimum.



Face each other (at a safe distance).

When removing your mask...

Check to make sure hearing aids are still in place after removing a mask as they may come off with mask removal.

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers. (Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
