

GUIDING LIONS/MY LION/ENVIRONMENTAL

GUIDING LIONS

To help enhance your leadership skills, Lions Clubs International encourages you to take the Certified Guiding Lion training. The Certified Guiding Lion Course will help you understand the role of a Guiding Lion and, develop a plan to guide clubs to becoming self-sufficient and strong. The course will also, provide you with tools to help club officers better manage their clubs and establish a system for tracking development.

Even if you are an experienced Lion, you will benefit from this course as it provides the most comprehensive overview available of a Guiding Lions' roles and responsibilities.

The Certified Guiding Lion Program is designed to assist clubs that are newly chartered or established. Guiding Lions are assigned for a two-year term by the district governor in consultation with the sponsoring club (for a new club) or established club president. Guiding Lions are limited to serving no more than two new clubs at any point in time.

The Guiding Lion webpage was developed to provide you with helpful information, resources, links and much more to assist you in your role as a Guiding Lion. It also provides all the material available in the kit for your immediate review and use.

In addition, we developed the Facilitator's Guide and PowerPoint to support you when a Certified Guiding Lion Workshop has been scheduled.

MYLION

To obtain information using MY Lion and the importance of reporting service activities. Clubs are completing many activities but are not reporting them in MyLion.

The benefits of reporting activities are:

- Telling the club's story, communicating with the public, letting the public know the benefits of having a lions club in the community. The community should be aware that the lions club provided food for families and the number of volunteer hours it took to accomplish the mission.
- Marketing the club's service and recruiting members are important for growth. Letting the public know what we do

and how we do it may attract new members. The public needs a reason to participate in a venture therefore we need to offer something of interest and with an opportunity to serve.

- We should look to partner with other organizations the Rotary, Elks, Kiwanis, VFW American Legion etc when doing large service projects. The club service report provides evidence of your club's effectiveness and may help persuade others to join with your club to complete the mission.
- It will enlighten future leader of the club's service history.
 Provides valuable information to Lions around the world who may want to do a project similar to the one your club is doing.

SERVICE PROJECTS

The below service projects offer opportunity to serve at a very low cost to the club:

- Recycle dry cleaner hangers, take the wire hangers back to your local dry cleaner.
- Place the soap, shampoo, lotion, hair conditioner, mouthwash etc. into a sandwich bag and donate to a local shelter.

With the above report you will find the activity, people served, volunteer hours, funds raised, funds donated by your club. There is a report form there for you to fill out. This report lets the world know what your club is doing. Click on the item listed under activity and you will get the history of that activity.

To find out what your Leo club is doing go to MyLCI and click on find a club and then click on active Leo clubs. There you will see what your Leos club is reporting.

ENVIRONMENT

The state Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has opened the application period for qualified landowners to get a free bag of tree and shrub seedlings. Each bag contains 25 seedlings, which can be planted near streams, rivers, or lakes to help stabilize banks, protect water quality, combat climate change, and improve wildlife habitat.

DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos said streamside plantings help decrease erosion, slow floodwaters, and sequester carbon. "I encourage New York landowners with waterside properties to participate in DEC's 'Buffer in a Bag' program to bolster the State's efforts to protect water quality and help safeguard communities from flooding," he stated.

To qualify, landowners must have property with at least 50 feet bordering a stream, river, or lake, and provide photos or a map of the planting location. Previous recipients are encouraged to reapply to continue to build riparian buffers.

Applicants are eligible for one bag of seedlings and recipients are chosen on a first-come, first-served basis. A total of 350 bags will be available statewide for this round of applications. Visit DEC's website for more information about the application process and requirements. Applications are due by 3 p.m. on April 7.



Lion Bonnie Haase Memorial Volunteer Position



Timeline



Lions KidSight USA Foundation PROJECT SEE CLEARLY 2022 TOP TEN AWARDS FOR 2022-2023

I hope all is going well with each of you and you are back to doing robust children's vision screening. The first part of this message is a reminder that the Project SEE CLEARLY 2022 Top Ten awards for 2022-23 require you to enter your screening data into our database. Only those who enter screening info there will be eligible for the prizes. I have attached the description of the contest and awards for your use. Some of the highlights of the attached document are that 1. The data entered through May 30, 2023 will be counted and 2. There will only be three club level recognitions per multiple district reporting. If you want your club to be eligible for recognition the data must be entered as a club level screening and not part of the aggregate reporting by a district or multiple district.

Another item I want to bring to your attention is that some Lions have noticed that occasionally screening data is entered and shows up when searching for that event, but does not always appear when asking for a report. This occurs when the event's time span is designated as extending from one month to another. i.e. January 20 – February 10. In this case if you ensure your report query extends past the ending sate for the event your data will be properly reflected. If your report query ends prior to the end of the event the data will not be reported. For instance if your event ends on Feb 10 and you ask for a report as of January 31 the event will not be displayed. If you ask for a report through March 1 the event will be displayed.

One other item that has been a minor issue is that if you are just getting caught up in your reporting the system will prevent you from adding a new event beginning prior to October 1, 2022. This defect is being worked on. However, for now, if you are entering data previous to that just use October 1, 2022 as your start date. I am working to get this fixed.

On behalf of all of us working with Lions KidSight I thank you for all you are doing for children's vision screening. You are truly making a huge difference in the lives of children of your communities.

GUEST SPEAKERS Schoharie County Office for the Aging

Cheryl Plant, an Aging Services Specialist with the Schoharie County Office for the Aging, was a recent guest speaker at the Town of Wright/Schoharie Valley Lions Club. She spoke about services provided for older adults over age 60 in Schoharie County.

The Schoharie County Office for the Aging advocates for and provides services to county residents 60 and older, and their caregivers. services are designed to promote health, safety, dignity and independence. Services are funded by the Title III Older Americans Act; New York State funds EISEP and CSE; grants, local government and donations.

New York Connects provides residents of all ages and their caregivers information and education on long term care resources. Services include outreach, information and referral, case management, in-home, nutritional, legal, and other programs.

Expanded In-Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP) A program designed to assist older individuals to remain safely in their homes. Services include bathing, hair care, skin care, laundry, cleaning, shopping, errands, etc. EISEP is a cost-share program and the fee for service is based on an individual's monthly income and housing expenses.

Caregiver Services Caregiver services are designed to provide assistance, support, respite, and training. Services are available to those persons of any age caring for anyone 60 and older, or anyone 60 and older caring for a disabled younger person.

Nutritional Services

Congregate Meals Senior Centers in Cobleskill (Mon.-Fri., Golding Park, 103 High Street), Jefferson (Tues./Wed./Thurs., Community Center, Rt. 10), and Sharon Springs (Mon./Wed./Fri., Firehouse, Beachwood Road) offer a hot noontime meal that provides 1/3 of the recommended daily allowance. A reservation by 1:00 p.m. the day before is recommended. Donations are accepted from those aged 60 and older, or the spouse of a senior regardless of age. Younger guests are welcome but they will be charged a set fee.

Home Delivered Meals A meal filling 1/3 of the daily-recommended allowance guidelines is offered to seniors meeting program guidelines. Meals are delivered to the senior's home. A regular, diabetic, or modified consistency meal is available. Donations are accepted, however no one is denied a meal due to an inability to contribute.

Nutrition Counseling Nutrition counseling is available to any county resident 60 years of age or older. Appointments with the registered dietician can be made by calling the Office for the Aging's Nutrition Coordinator. The dietician will visit the client, evaluate his or her needs, and develop a care plan to meet those needs. Written instructions and handouts are provided.

Nutrition Education Nutrition and related consumer and health instruction are provided by a registered dietician. Group presentations are scheduled once a month at each senior meal site (see above), and handouts are sent to home delivered meal participants monthly. Articles also appear in the senior newsletter bi-monthly.

Home Energy Assistance program (HEAP) This is a federally funded program that assists the client with payment of electricity, gas, oil, coal, propane or wood expenses necessary for heating. HEAP is a program based on income eligibility and the guidelines usually change from one year to the next. 'The program generally runs from November - April. Applications must be filed annually. When the season begins, interested clients should contact SCOFA for information.

Legal Services Legal assistance is provided through a referral from the Office for the Aging. The client must be a resident of Schoharie County, and aged 60 year or older. The services include, but are not limited to: Legal Advice; Representation, and Appropriate Referral to elder citizens concerning: Entitlements, Support of Patient Rights, Landlord/Tenant Issues, health Insurance Claims and Consumer Protection Concerns. A referral to other sources of legal assistance may be provided on th basis of need or eligibility. There is no fee for legal

assistance, but donations are encouraged so that the program can be expanded and services provided to all older persons who have need of them.

The Town of Wright/Schoharie Valley Lions club works in cooperation with the Schoharie County Office for the Aging and maintains an adaptive equipment loan-closet with a supply of hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, canes and commodes. These items are loaned to individuals at no charge. The Schoharie County Office for the Aging operates a Lions Hearing Loan Out Center at their office. The Lions Hearing Conservation Society has Loan Out Centers where individuals can borrow a variety of amplification and alerting devices for the deaf and hard of hearing. This enables you to try devices and find the one that best accommodates your hearing loss, free of charge. Also, if you need financial assistance in purchasing devices, the local Lions Club may be able to assist. Schoharie County Office for the Aging is located at 113 Park Place in Schoharie. For information call 518-295-2001.

Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line upwith each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Rephrase remarks when not understood.



Take turns when speaking.



Make sure hearing aid users have them on.



Keep background noise in the room to a minimum.



Face each other (at a safe distance).

When removing your mask...

Check to make sure hearing aids are still in place after removing a mask as they may come off with mask removal.

LIONS LOAN-OUT EQUIPMENT

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers. (Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
