LISTENING

To be a good speaker, it is imperative that one become a good listener too! While it is unerring that there are plenty of ways to grasp and soak up knowledge, what can be better than listening to some wise

words and learning from other people. However, this needs a very crucial and vital trait or skill, which is good listening.

- Listening is one of those senses that assist in grasping the information better. Be it following the lectures, sounds, or video, the ability to hear is pivotal. Accordingly, this skill may be perceived as crucial for the communication process too.
- While some traits are natural, some skills may need to be absorbed. Listening skills can be one of those skills. However, much to the belief that skills can only be inculcated into kids, some games and activities can help

adults brush and enhance their skills to a great extent.

- Consequently, here we look into various noteworthy listening games and activities that can make adults great listeners.
- Listening skills are a must to communicate well with others. But did you know all listening are not the same and can be divided into active and passive listening skills?
- <u>Passive listening</u> is different and allows others to speak without interruptions or reacting to the same. The person is not reacting but listening by paying attention is what passive listening skills are about. It's actually a one-way process of communication where the listener is not responding back (may or may not be paying attention to what the other person is saying).
- On the flip side, <u>Active listening</u> is about responding and talking with the person who started the communication. Your reply shows that you can understand and grasp the things he is talking about. Active listening is a focused listening skill that we use in our daily conversations.



Hello Lions and Leos,

At this time, the Individual reports from LCI show that we have 16 deceased members, have added 70 new members and dropped 77 members. This gives us a net -23 members. Obviously, we cannot control the deceased number, but only the other two numbers, which show a net loss of 7. Clearly, we need to make up the entire -23 to maintain status quo on our membership. Remember, this is not just a numbers game to look good. More members means we can perform more service and develop more leaders. Each club should be looking back on their history with pride in all the good things they have accomplished in their communities. But, everyone should also be looking forward to determine how they will continue their legacy.

In any event, we should continue on the path that we all know and should use to maximize our membership. The first is simply "just ask ". We know what we do as Lions and know how important our service is to our communities. The second is to keep your present club members on board with the club's service agenda so that they want to stay and be active members. This means that all club members should work to keep each other involved in the club and not just leave it to the officers.

I hope that by now that all of you are somewhat familiar with the Global Membership Approach. Every club should start to utilize the **SWOT** process. This involves assessing your clubs' **Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats**. This process is an optimum process, when done honestly and in a sense of real self-examination, to lay out your goals for the future. The District leadership's job is to establish better communication lines between your club and us so we can help you in the way that you feel you need help. We want to see a bottom up process so that you do not see dictates coming down to you. We want you to utilize the communication chain to send your concerns to us to build your club your way. Your Zone Chairs are your first line of communication, but you may contact me or any of the Governor's team, if that works better for you.

Orientation of new members is the prime way that we help keep them in the club and interested in providing service to their community. The District will be conducting zoom orientation for new and existing members to keep everyone fresh and up to date on all aspects of Lionism. If you are interested, please contact me and I will make sure you are included.





GAZEBO RESTORATION PROJECT





The gazebo was a prominent part of the Great Cambridge Fair from 1890-1943. The Great Cambridge Fair was the precursor to the Washington County Fair and widely attended for many years.

In 1974 as part of Cambridge's bicentennial celebration, the gazebo was moved from the old Fairgrounds to Lions Park adjacent to Cambridge Central School. The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) started the project and were soon joined by the Masons and the Order of the Eastern Star.

Thanks to community fundraising all arches and the posts supporting



them were saved, as was the cupola.

Over the years, the gazebo has been maintained by contributions from the Lions Club, the American Legion, the Boy Scouts and others. In 1984 Lions Park was updated with picnic tables and benches to allow more people to enjoy the nightly concerts at the gazebo. The Cambridge Community Band, oldest in America, has performed at the gazebo since 1890.



At our second meeting of the month, we hosted a membership recruitment/information night. Three prospective community minded individuals were invited. Our program consisted of an overview presentation about our club, Lions Clubs International and some of the many service projects and fundraisers we have been involved with in recent years. The presentation introduced our prospective members to the various ways we meet the needs of our community while having some fun accomplishing our mission. Three current members described how they became Lions and shared some of their most memorable experiences in the service to others.

The tone of the presentation/meeting was light-hearted and welcoming with questions and comments being entertained throughout the evening.

Before our adjournment, we introduced our guests to the Clinton method of tail-twisting and our 50/50 raffle after explaining how the proceeds from these two parts of our meetings feed the club's administrative fund. When all funds are collected, proceeds to our club will around \$1,300 plus any donations the "chocolate lovers" wish to make. In addition, the Lions Eye Institute in Albany receives a profit from this fundraiser.

We continue collecting used eyeglasses from around the community (this month we obtained over 200 pair) and we are looking forward to a never-before-tried fundraiser – hanging baskets of flowers for Mother's Day, our car wash on May 6th and our upcoming participation in the Community Collection Day on May 13th. On this day residents bring

any number of items (electronics, redeemable containers, old books, etc.) for recycling to the Village Green, where we assist in the unloading into larger containers/trucks for proper disposal & redemption. In addition, that day we also participate in cleaning up the winter debris from around the village green and the downtown section of our community.

Wearing a mask with your hearing aids



Clever tips to protect your ears and hearing aids while wearing a mask



If you have long hair, pull it back into a bun and loop the elastics around the bun.



Create a "mask extender" out of fabric or ribbon about 4 inches long. Buttons sewn on either side allows for a place to put the elastic other than your ears.



Sew 2 large buttons onto a soft headband, placing the buttons to line up with each ear. Looping the elastic around each button will take the strain off your ears.



Use masks with string or ribbons that tie in the back. There are YouTube videos on creating masks that tie, which puts absolutely no pressure on the ears.

Communicating when wearing a mask



Speak slowly, clearly and at a normal volume.



Rephrase remarks when not understood.



Take turns when speaking.



Make sure hearing aid users have them on.



Keep background noise in the room to a minimum.



Face each other (at a safe distance).

When removing your mask...

Check to make sure hearing aids are still in place after removing a mask as they may come off with mask removal.

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers. (Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and TV listening.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using the telephone with a hearing aid.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability. Telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
