

SERVICE PROJECTS YOUR CLUB MAY LIKE TO DO Lions Clubs International Service Programs

- Type 2 Diabetes Screening: Clubs can make a difference by organizing a screening project in their communities. Get started by using the step-by-step guides and resources provided by Lions International.
- Strides for Diabetes Awareness: Strides activities are a fun and engaging way for Lions and Leos everywhere
 to promote diabetes awareness. A Strides event can be any physical activity, from a run to a dance competition! Get creative with Strides, and use positivity and exercise to open the door to diabetes awareness and
 prevention. One Strides event held in your community is all it takes to begin fighting back against the spread of
 diabetes.
- <u>Lions Eye Banks</u>: Eye banks recover, evaluate, store and distribute human eye tissue for vision restoration, research and education. Eye surgeons rely on eye banks to supply them with tissue for sight-saving procedures. A Lions eye bank is sponsored by a Lions club, district or multiple district and has an established working relationship with a medical facility.
- Vision Screening: Eighty percent of all visual impairment can be prevented or cured. The first step to prevention is awareness. The second is early detection through vision screening. Around the world, Lions partner with medical professionals and community leaders to screen young children, primary school students, and adults to identify those at risk for vision loss.
- <u>Lions KidSight: Lions KidSight provides vision screening and referral services to youth starting at the age of 6 months. These screening services are vital in ensuring youth receive early intervention and necessary eye care.</u>
- Eyeglass Recycling: Refractive errors can be easily corrected with eyeglasses, yet millions living in low- and middle-income countries lack access to basic eye care services. Lions have recognized the urgent need for corrective lenses and collect usable glasses in their communities to support the Lions Recycle For Sight Program.
- Youth Camps and Exchange: The YCE program is comprised of two major parts: international exchanges and
 international camps. Together, they foster a spirit of understanding and encourage peace among the people
 of the world. YCE does not involve tourism, academic study or employment. Instead, youth are encouraged to
 use their travel opportunity to share their own culture while experiencing a new one.
- <u>Diabetes Camps: The Diabetes Camps program is designed to help enhance the quality of life for young people living with diabetes. This program fosters relationships that will help participants expand their diabetes management skills and increase knowledge of the disease.</u>
- <u>Diabetes Support Groups: Diabetes peer support groups allow your club, district or multiple district to actively support the diabetes community through hands-on service.</u>

BINGHAMTON LIONS 100TH NY-BERMUDA (aka MD20) CONVENTION REGISTRATION Q&A

Here are a couple of questions that have arisen along with the answers to assist and help you register for our Friday, May 3 – 5th 2024 Convention – "It's Historic!"

HOW DO YOU REGISTER?

A. Attendees go to https://md20lionsconvention.org

Then click **Register** that you see in several places on the website. When they click register, they will be prompted to fill out information. When they check out, they have a '**Zeffy'** option to help allow Lions Clubs to keep every cent they are trying to raise by having attendees help pay the banking/credit card transaction fees and cost of the Zeffy registration platform we are using. Competitor pricing like Eventbrite charge up to 8% for this service. Attendees DON'T have to leave anything but they can choose to help out and there are suggested amounts...or the attendee can put their own donation or nothing.

WHEN LIONS REGISTER ONLINE, DOES IT HELP CUT DOWN OUR PRINTING COSTS?

A. HUGELY!

IF PEOPLE REGISTER ONLINE WILL THERE BE A NEED TO HAND THEM ANYTHING TO CHECK-IN AT THE CONVENTION REGISTRATION TABLES?

A. When registered attendees will receive a receipt with a Registration QR Code that they show when they checking at the Convention. They also receive links to purchase their meals that will also produce individual Meal QR Codes that they need to bring as proof of purchase on their smart device or by printing them to show them. Otherwise they can't get into the meal that they have purchased.

WHAT IS THE PROCESS FOR THOSE THAT WANT TO REGISTER ONSITE THE DAY OF THE CONVENTION?

A. They can register on site, but they can't purchase any meals as not only does the price for everything go up, meal orders are cut off a couple weeks before the convention to allow the convention staff to coordinate the 1000s of meals they serve during the convention.

If registering onsite they will need to register when they check with a volunteer Lions convention staff who can assist those not able to use the Internet or technology – and that's okay!

Please note however that this is time consuming for our volunteers so we are asking to register BEFORE attendees get to the convention, unless they are just not able to. Essentially at the check-in table we're going through the exact process to register you as they would have if they registered online.

Not to mention when they register online at www.md20lionsconvention.org, they are helping save Lions \$\$\$\$\$ to reduce the actual cost to the multiple Lions for running the convention.

DOES ANYONE NEED TRAINING TO REVIEW AND LEARN THE NEW REGISTRATION PROCEDURE?

A. Only our volunteer staff who are working the registration tables to register people who didn't register online.

In truth, the actual registration system is very easy by just following the prompts but if there are questions you can certainly reach out to Maria P at the District Office or Aaron D through the contact form on the www.nylionsclubs.org website or the convention site. Zeffy.com - our registration technology partner - also has superb customer service to answer questions.

Since we are a volunteer organization, especially as we get closer to the convention, it may take a day or two to get back to those that need questions answered. So the earlier everyone registers, or tries to register to know they have an issue, the better.

We can't wait to see you - it's historic!





PROTOCOL FOR THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S OFFICIAL VISITATION

For the District Governor to have a successful visit to your club, please adhere to the following recommendations:

Experience has shown that it is a good practice for each Club to hold a formal orientation session for all new members as a way of introducing them to the history and service opportunities available to them as Lions.


To help with this, the District holds an orientation session via Zoom at least twice per Lions year; typically one in the Fall and one in the Spring.





MD20 Dues Increase Information

Fellow Lions,

At the MD20 convention, next 3-5 May, your delegates will have the tremendous responsibility to approve, or not approve, the MD20 dues increase that has been put in the ballot by the Council of Governors last October. The outcome of this vote will have a significant impact on the finances of MD20 and its capability to support the New York State and Bermuda Clubs and Districts. Here is all the information you need to make a sound decision.

Why it is necessary to raise dues?

• The last dues increase was in 2011. Since then, we have experienced a slow but constant increase in the

- cost of living which has had an impact on expenses and the formation of the yearly budget.
- Regarding the income, Membership on July 1st, 2011, was 16,557, on December 31st, 2023, was 13,126. A decrease of 3,431 members which resulted in \$54,896 total loss (3,431x\$16=\$54,896). This loss has also severely impacted the formation of the yearly budget.
- Last October, the Council of Governors tried to balance our books and approved many changes to reduce expenses and increase revenue, including cuts to DG's reimbursements (\$6,500 savings), eliminating the following "Gift Pins": MD20 Flag Ceremony Pins (\$500 savings) and International Parade Pins (\$500 savings), increasing convention booth and registration fees.
- Despite the above changes, the MD20 Budget 2023-24 was approved forecasting an outflow of **\$9,525.00.**

What is in the ballot?

After a lengthy discussion, the Council agreed there was no way to avoid the dues increase and voted to create a ballot item at the 2024 MD20 Convention.

The Council considered several options and decided to adopt the Financial Committee's recommendation to increase the MD 20 dues \$5 in three years: \$1 in 2024, \$2 in 2025, \$2 in 2026.

Final Considerations.

- The approval of this recommendation will not only resolve the problem of next year budget outflow but also stabilize the budget for the years to come, giving time to rebuild the membership up to a level sufficient to sustain our districts and clubs.
- The Council of Governors strongly recommends the approval of the proposed dues increase.

Kidsight Screening

Lions are known throughout the world for their work to improve the lives of the visually impaired and prevent avoidable blindness. The Broadalbin-Perth Lions have embraced this global cause and have taken action locally by reaching out to the Broadalbin-Perth Elementary School to provide a day of vision screening for 122 pre-kindergarten through first grade students, coordinating efforts with the Northeastern Association of the Blind at Albany (NABA).

Tzigane Lajeunesse, LPN, and Lions' KidSight Coordinator at NABA, was thrilled at the number of students participating and the support of the school and Broadalbin-Perth Lions. "This is one of the largest groups we have handled and we are so pleased that the school and the Lions are working with us to ensure that these youngsters have the opportunity to have their vision screened so early in their lives."

KidSight is NABA's vision-screening program designed specifically for children ages eighteen months to five years. A specialized camera is used to detect potential vision impairments in the individuals screened. Each year, an average of twelve percent of the children screened for vision impairments are "flagged" as having a potential vision problem.

These children are then referred to a doctor for a follow-up visit and treatment if necessary. NABA collects data on the outcomes of those that were recommended for a follow-up visit. Statistics have indicated that lowincome families are less likely to follow up and schedule a visit with their doctor. Families also reported that transportation and available time as barriers. NABA works with these families in various ways to ensure that the children are seen by a doctor.

Broadalbin-Perth Elementary School Nurse, Christine Yatzor, also was a member of the screening team. "This event helps us identify those students who may be in need of glasses or some other form of vision assistance which will ultimately help them in school."

BPES Principal Kerri Barker said, "We are excited to partner with the Lions and bring this program to our students". She explained that when students can see clearly, their success in school improves tremendously.

Broadalbin-Perth Lions Club President Bob Townsend was quite pleased with the day's event. "It was well organized and ran like clock work," said Townsend. This was the first time the club undertook this endeavor, and Townsend believes that this activity will become a regularly scheduled event with schools in his club's area.

According to Lions Clubs International, eighty percent of all visual impairment can be prevented or cured. The first step to prevention is awareness. The second is early detection through vision

screening. Around the world, Lions partner with medical professionals and community leaders to screen young children, primary school students, and adults to identify those at risk for vision loss. The venue for Lions' vision screenings varies from schools, to workplaces, to community health fairs, and the screening methods depend upon the age group. But the results are always the same. Early identification leads to timely referral, professional treatment, and improved or restored sight.
