

Membership Growth Strategies

- Invite prospects to service projects, not just meetings
- Launch specialty clubs or branches (e.g., teachers, first responders)
- Strengthen Leo-to-Lion transitions
- Reflect the diversity of your local community
- Use your personal and professional networks

Retention Starts with Belonging

- Welcome members with clear purpose and warmth
- Offer flexible meeting formats: in-person, virtual, hybrid
- Check in regularly—ask how members are doing
- Plan for leadership succession early
- Foster an inclusive, fun culture that values every Lion

- Recruit through service first—action attracts action
- Be transparent about your needs—people want to help with a purpose
- Modernize your image—highlight both service and fellowship

"It Starts with You - A Personal Invitation to Serve with Lions"

There are many ways to promote to the public the great things that your club does to make a difference in people's lives. With all the communication channels that we have access to, getting our message out certainly makes people aware of your service. Unfortunately, this does not necessarily encourage people to become members. It needs to be personal. Here are a couple of ideas that might help as your club embarks on growing membership.

- 1) Have direct conversation with community members.
 - a. Share why you became a LION and why it is so rewarding
 - b. Share Real Moments of Service of which you are part of
 - c. Use photos in your conversation
 - d. Share information about your members a common goal of "Service"
 - e. Highlight social media posts, news articles, and other public acknowledgments of the fun your members are having through service and fellowship.
- 2) Share rewarding experiences that you have had with the Lions
- 3) DO NOT overwhelm with details on organization structure, club politics, leadership styles, etc.
- 4) Request feedback and give time for questions make it interactive
- 5) Extend an invitation to be part of a service event and/or meeting
- 6) Follow up with the individual requesting feedback and extend an invitation to join your club.
- 7) Exchange Social Media Contact information Facebook, Email Address, WebSite, Phone number,
- 8) Follow up in a short period of time

PDG Michele O'Hare has shared with your President a presentation on this topic. I encourage you to ask about it, and involve/engage your Membership Committee.

CLUB EXCELLENCE AWARDS CRITERIA UPDATES

Important Updates

From LCI

The Club Excellence Award acknowledges the dedication and legacy of service within individual clubs and is the foundation for excellence awards presented to Zone Chairpersons, Region Chairpersons and District Governors.

Membership

- Induct a minimum of two or 20% new members, whichever is greater (not including transfer, reinstated or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the club's membership count on June 30th of the previous Lion year.
- Or sponsor a new Lions club.

Service

• Report a minimum of four service activities to Lions International. Three of these activities must show participation in each of the three International Weeks of Service.

Leadership

- Report newly elected club officers in Lion Portal by May 15 of the current Lion year.
- A minimum of 10% of the club's members complete any three courses in the Lions Learning Center.
- The club president for the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms.
- A minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club president) complete Club Officer Training (online with the Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between May 1 December 31.

Donations

• Contributed to LCIF a minimum of the club's membership total on June 30th of the previous Lion year, multiplied by US\$20.

This month in addition to the normal food items that filled their vehicles, as the clients exited the parking lot, they were treated to charcuterie cups assembled by volunteers in the pantry's "new food truck" as they exited the parking lot. With the shutdown of the charcuterie cups for snacking Federal Government, distributions are expected to serve larger numbers
