Update on Diabetes;

IPDG John McDonald gave us the Diabetes update, some of the highlights of his presentation are;

- A year ago Chuck McFarland of the American Diabetes Educators was introduced to Lions
- AADE has 14,000 educators
- The big focus is on Education and Awareness
 - o What to eat
 - How to treat
- There is a Saratoga and Albany region Diabetes Coalition
- Champion diabetes education
- To be a diabetes educator you need to be in the medical field, however there are also courses for awareness on line that can be used for information sharing
- A diabetes event will be held in the Rochester area
- A webinar will be available for Health Fairs, so they can talk to clubs, presented by a diabetes educator
- The Ogdensburg Lions, working with a local hospital, received a grant from LCI, that project is scheduled to be completed by December 2019
- NABA will be applying for a grant to expand their facility to offer these types of services also

Per Lion Barbara the pre diabetes coalition is looking to bring someone to Saratoga Hospital from Albany to be a speaker

Approval of Minutes from September and November;

GAT Team Updates; Membership;

Status of Membership

- Congratulations to Broadalbin-Perth, Central Mohawk, Clinton, Clifton Fine, Duane, Greater Amsterdam, Hadley-Luzerne, Holland Patent, Mechanicville –Stillwater, Lake Placid, Lisbon, Long Lake, Marcy Telephone, Newcomb, Plattsburgh, Raquette River, Saratoga Springs, Speculator, Town of Hoosick, Town of Schroon and Waterford for positive membership Growth.
- 2. District has YTD added 81 and dropped 69, net +12.
- 3. So far we have 20 clubs with at least a positive membership increase of 1. Great work! Now we need the other 33 clubs to do the same.

Areas of concentration

- 1. Retention discuss why and how to stop the losses; difference between loss of long time members vs. 1 to 3 year losses.
- 2. New Members various approaches; depends on individual skills, geo area; personal associations; club service projects; community needs assessment; all based on **asking**.
- Extension forming new clubs; Clifton Park, Colonie and Schenectady are areas we are concentrating on, but need district help to identify individuals in areas to start prospecting; need individuals to become guiding lions.
- 4. Leadership necessary to accomplish any goal. GLT will address; We need leaders to set and accomplish goals.

Orientation

- 1. An absolute must when inducting a new member.
- 2. Orientation Programs clubs should have a formal program for each new member; I will be working to provide a format and scheduling orientation programs through the year.

Reporting

1. For the most part every club is keeping up with their reporting to LCI. I will be in contact with those that are delinquent for 3 months or more.

Service;

Presented by IPDG Lion John McDonald

Some key points presented by IPDG John;

- Service is not a light switch that can be turned on and off
- Reporting is critical, and it does not need to be a "Lion" project to be reported
- Food drives are important, recently the Saratoga Lions did a food drive in conjunction with Price Chopper and they collected 8700 pounds of food that were distributed among 6 Saratoga Food Pantries. They have posters that they place next to their collection area as well as advertising the drive on Facebook, they have a relationship with Price Chopper's corporate office that allows them do this event at their stores
 - DG Michele asked if other clubs could be included this effort at different locations
 - IPDG Lion John said that it should be possible, he will contact Price Chopper corporate to see if this would be doable
 - Their posters don't have dates on them so they are reusable, they cost about \$25 each to create
- Continue doing vision screenings
- Support the Hearing Society
- Lion Diane Lange was asked if she would be willing to do Childhood Cancer presentations at some of the clubs, she agreed
- Grants are available for Lions projects, one would be the Brandel Murphy Youth Foundation and there are more

Presented by PCC Mark Whitney

Key points presented by PCC Mark;

- Service is the key, that's how everything starts
- "Everything good starts when you start helping someone else"
- Zone Chairs will need to become more involved, if you are interested in becoming a Zone Chair contact one of the Leadership team members
- For the USA/ Canada forum last year in Ohio there were 108 people from the USA in attendance from NYS, the next forum will be in Spokane,WA
- Lion Holly McConchie attended the emerging leadership training last year and Lion Rick Brisee attended the advanced leadership training last year.
- Mentor your new leaders
- There is a lot of on line training available for future and existing leaders, invest in the leaders

Campaign 100 Update;

Presented by PDG Paula Flisnik;

She explained what it covers and where the money goes. LCI is looking for 300 million dollars to be donated through this initiative

Every dollar you give is returned to Lions dollar for dollar

They would like 100% of the clubs to participate even if it's only a smaller amount of money Participants will receive a pin in acknowledgement of their donation

You can donate directly on line via LCIF using LCIF.org/donate

PDG Paula also update us on CABVI's working with Nigeria by sending needed items to over 5000 people so far including medical services, hunger, clean water (how to clean water so it's drinkable) school supplies and so forth. This initiative will be featured in the Lions International Magazine in May. The Marcy Telephone Lions Club donated shoes to this effort

Johnstown Gloversville Lions Clubs merger;

Gloversville President Lion Verna Plummer, Johnstown co-Presidents Lion Colleen Ioele Decristofaro and Lion Diedrie Roemer presented their merger plan

They will keep the Gloversville charter from 1939 and give up the Johnstown charter, the name of the merged club will be the Greater Johnstown Lions Club

Their members voted unanimously to merge

Lion IPDG John McDonald made a motion to merge these two clubs and become the Greater Johnstown Lions Club, Lion Ed Pike 2nd the motion. Everyone approved, motion carried

Grants:

LCIF Ogdensburg Grant

PDG James Shaw updated us with the progress at the hospital where the grant is being utilized to prepare better facilities for their Diabetes education

NABA LCIF Grant

DG Michele O'Hare said that NABA will be applying for a grant from LCIF to assist with improving services at their facility to allow a separate area for diabetic education

Hearing Society update;

VDG Rick Brisee presented the following information;

- Hearing society has new pins, everyone here received one with a change from Y2 to Upstate on them
- The hearing society's major things are the Loan Out Centers and the Affordable Hearing Aid Center
- Lion Rick told us about all of the items available at the Loan Out Centers which allows a "try it before you buy it" option to those in need
 - Each loan out center has at least 18 to 24 pieces of equipment that can be borrowed as long as the need exists
 - \circ At this time there are 9 centers, mostly in the Capital District
 - The society would like to cover the Northern and Western areas and are looking for suggestions from Lions that know that area, the best place for a center would be in an Audiologists office
- Lion Rick has 3 names, he will be contacting them to discuss the affordable hearing aid program and the Loan out Centers
 - He is looking for more names and is asking for help from the Lions that cover those areas
- The main funding for the Society are the recycled hearing aids from club collections, as well as direct donations from Lions Clubs
- New stickers will be sent to all clubs to put on their eye glass collection boxes to advise donors that we collect hearing aids as well

- The Affordable Hearing Aid program that started on 6/1/2018 has had a total of 24 orders and a total of 41 hearing aids that have been provided
 - This is still a need based program and the forms that need to be filled out are on the District Web Site, guidelines are listed as well
- 2 models of hearing top of the line hearing aids are usually offered, one model costs \$200 and the other \$375, if a club can't afford to help with those costs the Hearing Society will assist
 - The professional fees are paid for by the recipient as much as possible
- Nominations for Officers need to be in by April and the term would start on July 1st
- The society is looking to form an actual board of 9 regular members, 7 elected and 2 appointed by the current DG
 - Looking for volunteers, meeting times flexible, let Lion Rick know if you are interested
- There are 2 other Hearing Societies, one in the Finger Lakes area and one Downstate but they do things differently than we do here
- Clubs/Zones/Regions and all work together to provide needed equipment
- During the summer the Society hands out hearing protectors to clubs in areas that have county fairs where there are tractor pulls and lawn mower races

Awards;

PDG Milledge Smith "Smitty" from District Y told us about FDI (Faculty Development Institute) LCI realized that a lot of people didn't know how to instruct others so really no one learned that's how the Institute started. This institute teaches you how speak and make it effective using eye contact, your voice inflections, your hands and so forth. People that would like to be presenters need to apply, it's 4 days of training and once done the person needs to go back to their District and do a presentation. One of those that attended was PCC Mark Whitney, and the presentation he gave at the district level was the Zone Chair training. Therefore today PDG Smitty presented PCC Mark with his training completion Pin

Food Pantry help;

Lion Mary Zimbler presented Lion Jim Winkler and Lion Bill O'Mara plaques for their continued help with the food pantry.

The food collected today will be given to the Sauquoit Valley food pantry

Lions Quest Chair Report District 20 W Cabinet Meeting 1/26/19

Recent developments:

David Hubman, 1_{st} Vice District Governor of 20-Y and I met recently with the administration of Oneida Herkimer BOCES (OHM) to discuss the expansion of Lion's Quest training in Central N.Y.

We have been invited to attend a Lions Quest presentation to OHM component school administrators. Amy Lamitie, a recently trained Lions Quest Facilitator and an employee of OHM BOCES, will present the strengths of the Lions Quest curriculum to the group of administrators. We are optimistic that this initiative will elevate interest in enacting the program at all levels of the component school district's in their efforts to meet mandated Social Emotional Learning (SEL) training. David Hubman will also be interacting with neighboring Madison Oneida BOCES on opportunities there as well.

We have pledged our support in securing funding through LCI Grants and local Lion Club contributions. With two Lions Districts working together opportunities for LCI Grant support is enhanced.

How can I assist Clubs in 20-W with the implementation of LQ? I have ideas on how best to approach the subject of Lions Quest with your local BOCES or school district. There are significant grant monies available from LCIF to pay for training and materials to implement a Lions Quest program. In addition, NYS public schools are required to implement SEL training and Lions Quest can help meet that need.

(315) 794-0908 The History of Lions Quest The ideas behind Lions Quest date back to 1975, when a teenager named Rick Little set out on a "quest" to help other young people develop the skills and strength of character needed to succeed as adults. Rick conducted a survey of over 2,000 high school students to determine the issues that concerned them most and consulted experienced teachers who suggested including a teacher workshop which would serve as a classroom model. The program was so successful at the high school level that soon middle and elementary schools were asking for age appropriate positive vouth development programs. Little eventually founded and served as chief executive officer of the International Youth Foundation. LCIF In 1984, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) gave its first grant to Quest International to help further expand the program. From that point, support of Quest became a key tenet of LCIF's service to youth. For the next eighteen years, LCIF supported Quest at the organizational level through grants and technical collaboration. and at the local level through club involvement in community implementation of the program in schools. LCIF took formal ownership of Lions Quest on September 30, 2002. To date, LCIF has awarded more than 360 grants for a cumulative total of more than \$20 million to expand or establish Lions Quest programs across the United States and around the world. Since that time, the program has grown to include 40 languages in over 90 countries across the globe. Lions have been key to the success and expansion of Lions Quest, supporting the program through local funding, coordinating teacher training, co-hosting parent

meetings, speaking to youth, and undertaking joint service projects with students.

What I also discovered was that those who did not know anything about Leo's were often in clubs where a Leo program was not existent or had declined so much that the Leo club was dismantled and forgotten.

Many of the clubs that responded advised that they work with other youth organizations even if they do have a Leo Club in their area. These include: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, Sports teams and University students. I was very proud to have learned that so many Lions clubs work with the youth and urge those that don't to do so.

On one of her visitations, the District governor learned that some clubs had absolutely no idea what a Leo club was. So secondly, I wanted to take a few moments to point out some key facts about Leo's to educate those that do not know who they are or where they started. **Keep in mind too that I am willing to go to clubs in the District and do a presentation on the Leo's.** I love talking about them and feel that Leo's are a great resource for our Lions Clubs and are a wonderful way for developing new Lion's Members.

- There are over 7,000 Leo clubs in 145 countries, with over 175,000 members.
- Leo's were first formed in 1957, in Pennsylvania.
- Leo stands for Leadership, Experience, Opportunity.
- They enjoy volunteering just like we do (You'll read about some of the great things our Leo's have done below).

- A Lion's club can sponsor a Leo Club for \$100.00 a year. You just need 20 Leos to sign up to get the Charter.

- Alpha Leo clubs are designed for young people between 12 and 18 years of age. This track focuses on the individual and social development of teens and preteens.

- Omega Leo clubs are tailored for young adults between 18 and 30 years of age.

- Keep in mind that two or more Lions Clubs can sponsor a Leo club together! So, if you are close to another club and want to help, this might be the perfect thing for you.

November- We hosted a Veterans' breakfast for 62 local Veterans. We made and laminated placemats with letters to each Veteran. We invited the Senator and Assemblywoman for our area along with the County Clerk. We had representatives from each department there to thank our Veterans. We had several Veterans from the Riverledge Nursing Home with us as well. The Leos met each Veteran in the school lobby and escorted them to our dining area and seated them. The Leos then served them coffee or juice and sat to eat with the Veterans. A Leo led in the Pledge of Allegiance and the blessing of the food. They assisted with serving breakfast and speaking with each Veteran about their service. After breakfast each Leo introduced "their" Veteran and spoke about what branch they served in and in what capacity. Each Veteran was given time to speak if they wanted to. We also had a Leo recite the poem, In Flanders Field and present each Veteran with a poppy pin. We had Veterans from every branch of the service. December- We made and signed over 100 Christmas cards for troops, to go in stockings for elderly and for HCS staff. We brought cookies, candies and other treats to our meeting.
