DG Lion Michele O'Hare called the meeting to order at 9:40 A.M.

King Lion Jim Hadjis of the Lake Placid Lions welcomed everyone to the area and gave a brief history of the Lake Placid Lions Club chartered in 1939 and some of their service and fund raising projects.

Presentations; Childhood Cancer The representative from Ronald McDonald House could not make this meeting; he will be attending a meeting next year. Lion Diane Lange, our Pediatric Cancer Chair, updated us on some initiatives that are under way, and would like the help of all Lions Clubs help with the hope bags handed out to families and children that are suffering as well as possibly reading to the children, cooking and so forth at the Ronald McDonald house

Our other speaker on Childhood Cancer was Morgan O'Hare, she presented the following information; Good Morning,

It is an honor to be here today with all of you. My mother, Michele O'Hare, has told me on several occasions about all of the exciting work you do and needless to say, I am incredibly impressed. You give tirelessly to your communities and I am most inspired by the vision screenings you provide for children ages 18 months to 6 years old. You are directly changing the lives of parents and families who may be unaware and/or health illiterate. You instantly flag and refer patients so that they can get the care they need and deserve to live a healthy, "normal" life. Although I was not screened by the Lions, I want to share my personal story with you today as it relates to the vision and mission of the organization.

Cancer: A six-letter word generally defined as, "a disease due to the abnormal growth of a specific cell line in particular organ that has the potential to spread to various other organs." However, I know this word has a slightly different meaning for each of us. This one word tells of stories both good and bad, it triggers emotions, memories, maybe times we never want to remember again. It makes us think of family members, friends, loved ones, anyone who has fought or is currently fighting this terrible six-letter word, cancer. We have all been affected by cancer, one-way or another and this morning, I want to share with you how this six-lettered word has contributed to my resilient strength and positive outlook on life.

I was three years old when I was diagnosed with Retinoblastoma, which is a rare cancer of the eye seen primarily in children. My parents were devastated. What was going to happen to me? I was three; I certainly had no clue. It was tough, but we got through it. After a few surgeries to remove my left eye, chocolate ice cream from the nurses' station at *Will's Eye* in Pennsylvania, and countless rewinds of the movie, *Babe*, I was finally able to go home and live a normal life, cancer free. Well...sort of. While the physical tumor may have been removed, cancer had found several ways to continue being a part of my life. I had to miss fieldtrips to get my prosthetic checked in Boston. I had to see three other doctors multiple times a year for checkups. I had to wear special safety goggles (that by the way, I almost always found a way to avoid wearing, please don't tell my mother) during gym and other physical activities. I had to

wear my glasses at all times even when I could see the chalkboard perfectly. I had to explain to my friends at slumber parties that my eye stayed open when I slept and that I wasn't a one-eyed Cyclops or One-Eyed-One-Horned-Flying-Purple-People-Eater.

However, despite all of those things, cancer has been a part of my life in a different way that some people may not fully understand. That six-letter word has shaped who I am in every way possible. It has made me positive. Without Retinoblastoma, I am not entirely sure who Morgan O'Hare would be today. Despite the difficulties I had growing up, from day one I have seen Retinoblastoma as a blessing, and nothing less.

Having one eye has been the most influential contributor to the positive outlook I have on life. I can say with confidence that it has taught me three valuable lessons that I strive to live by every single day.

Number One. "Don't take yourself too seriously." This is by far the most important lesson my eye has taught me (which by the way is plastic not glass). Yes, we are all human and life is not perfect no matter how hard we may try to make it. Yes, sometimes having one eye can be challenging too, but you learn to embrace that. You walk into doors and clothing racks, sometimes even people. Other times you feel like you are walking by yourself when someone stands on the left side. Or the best is when people can't figure out where you are directly looking and you end up saying hello to random strangers who seem to be very confused and freaked out. Oh well, that is life for a one-eyed-woman and there is no way around it. At the end of the day though, I love to laugh, to smile, and make fun of myself. I even purposefully try to make people uncomfortable when they feel awkward or are too afraid to ask me questions. I love making other people smile; it makes me happy and it gives me joy. Life is far too short to take yourself seriously. So, the next time you accidentally push the pull door or miss your mouth trying to eat a big cupcake, just laugh it off, and everything will turn out okay in the end.

Lesson number Two. "Be open-minded." Having one eye has helped me to understand how other people think and their approaches to life and all that it offers. I try to always find the positive in every situation and try to see things from the other person's shoes. In college, there was a student-initiated campaign last year, "I Love My Body Week". Essentially, there were pictures of student volunteers posted all around campus with personal comments they wrote about why they loved a particular body feature. My picture had read, "I love my eyes (with the "s" crossed out) because it helps me see others' points of view" and to be honest, I absolutely do. I can remember one time when a good friend of mine did not exactly feel the same way. It was a

day burned into my memory that I will never forget. He put his hand in the middle of my face, splitting it into two. He said, "You would be so *perfect* if the right side of your face was exactly like your left and you had two eyes." At the time, I felt like I had gotten hit with a baseball bat square in the stomach. But now, that is not the case. Yeah, sure, so one eye is slightly lower than the other and it does not blink all the way, but I love it that way and would not change that for the world. We are guilty of judging other people, but I beg you to try and look beyond the superficial characteristics of the people around you. Dig to find the meaning and passions of those people. Be open-minded to what you learn and accept them for who they are. We can learn a lot from our colleagues if we just listen and keep an open mind free of judgment. Even when you may be the one judged, I encourage you to stay positive, try and understand where the other person may be coming from, ignore negativity, and be more accepting of others even when they may not accept you.

And lastly, lesson number Three. "It is not how hard you *can* hit, but how hard you can *get* hit and keep moving forward." This powerful quote from just a short scene in Rocky is both fiancé and my favorite line. Life likes to throw all of us curve balls and push us down for a plethora of reasons every now and again. Cancer was one hurdle I had to confront one way or another and I am a stronger woman for it.

With my parents, sister, friends, and loved ones by my side, I have grown to become a confident, (relatively) mature woman who is unafraid of taking risks and experiencing new things. I would not be who I am if it were not for the people in my life and those who I choose to surround myself with. I am forever grateful for them because without their strength, hope, continuous support, and love.

I have gone through the surgeries, the doctor visits, the difficult, frustrating days of constantly bumping into things, and I have found a way to be strong and positive. Those strenuous times do not define me; rather it is how I have chosen to respond to the challenges that does. Thank you for your time today and for allowing me to share my story and the lessons I have learned with you. Thank you for the inspiring work you do each and every day with dignity and compassion. You are helping the children of today, see tomorrow.

#### **Update on Diabetes**;

IPDG John McDonald presented an update of our mission with Diabetes

• 2 years ago LCI added Diabetes to our mission

- The goal for LCIF is to engage Lions
- Increase access to care
- Increase awareness

The Brookfield Connecticut Lions started a camp for children with diabetes, which allows children to share information with their peers. They have also started vision screenings for seniors

The Saratoga Lions invited Chuck McFarland, from AADE to come and speak in the past about what they are and do. Lion Barbara Bentley has since taken the online course to become a certified educator, the course costs \$150 and is 18 hours long, the Saratoga Lions covered the cost of her course, in the future LCI might be covering those costs.

AADE draft between their organization and LCI will be passed at the national board meeting in Iceland in April

The Center for Disease Control will be sponsoring a pilot program throughout the country and the Saratoga Lions will be one of the trial sites working with AADE. A joint diabetes tool kit will come out in Milan for education and resources

Gary Brown will be lobbing in Washington DC for a National Day Diabetes this coming November

NABA is applying for a grant similar to the grant just given to the Ogdensburg Lions so they can update their facility to offer more vision/hearing and diabetes education working with Saratoga Hospital and Albany Medical Center. (a copy of the grant request will be attached to the minutes)

On May 15<sup>th</sup> at 5PM there will be a press conference in Ogdensburg and they would like as many Lions there as possible.

# Leo Clubs report;

Lion Katrina Plummer presented an update on Leo's (copy of her presentation will be attached to the minutes)

- April is Leo awareness month
- A survey about Leo's was sent to all clubs, only 7 clubs responded, the survey was sent out again in hopes for additional responded
- She is willing to come to any club or Leo meeting if help is needed.

- CABVI brochure was passed out about Beacon of Hope Outreach, "When 2 women who are Lions met, A Global Nigeria Project Initiative was the result" (copy of the brochure will be attached to the minutes)
- PCC Kelly is doing training to become a Certified Guiding Lion
- Officer training will be done in 2 parts t this year, part one will be on line and part two will be on 5/9 at the Holiday Inn in Saratoga
- LCI's web page will be down March 29<sup>th</sup>
- All clubs should report their officers for next year as soon as possible
- For a great training event encourage everyone to attend the US Canada forum in Spokane this year
- If your club is going to the State Convention and they want to vote all of their dues need to be paid before that
- Presently there are 15 clubs on suspension as they still owe dues to MD 20
- The testimonial will be held in May at the Holiday Inn in Saratoga
- The strategic survey deadline was extended to the end of April so more people can respond
- This year our support was for the Hunger project, we would also like to do an environmental project as a district

#### Food Pantry;

Bob Jones from the Lake Placid Food Pantry spoke about their program;

They are under the Ecumenical Charities program;

- they have a thrift shop that serves 50 plus families
- twice a month they go to the regional food bank in Latham and bring back 1200 to 1800 pounds of food
- the Church of Latter Day Saints helps them
- they serve/hand out 300 turkey dinners at Thanksgiving
- they pick up donated food from Hannaford weekly outdated items are not accepted they can not hand those out
- their facilities are donated

#### **GAT Team Updates**;

#### Membership:

PDG Ed Stano presented a membership update (his report is included in the meeting reports which will be attached to the minutes) he also spoke about the following;

- 2 clubs in the northern part of our district merged as well as the Johnstown/Gloversville clubs that should make all of them stronger
- He spoke about the club health report
- He is worried about where he sees members drop within a year or two of joining a club

- Make more people aware of what the clubs do
- PDG will try to get to all the clubs and speak about membership
- Call people that don't come to meetings to find out why they are not attending
- Try to get those members that might not show up for meetings to participate in service projects or activities

- Still trying to get a new club into certain areas. He will take the list of suggestions from the survey and work on those areas
- He will be attending Zone meetings

#### Service;

IPDG John McDonald spoke about service in our district as well as at the club level;

- He spoke with the Anthem project people about doing something for the regional food bank in the spring as well as those events that we have done with them in the Fall
  - We will be doing a project as the regional food bank on April 27<sup>th</sup>, form 9am to 12:30 and a 2<sup>nd</sup> shift from 12:30 to 3:30 pm
- Suggest doing a food drive at the local club level
- Kid Sight screenings are critical do them! The Saratoga Lions just did one last week working with NABA
- A Ronald McDonald house representative will be at the next District Meeting in September to speak about their services to those families impacted with Children in the Hospital with Cancer
- Lion Diane Lange our Pediatric Cancer Chair is willing to come to meetings to speak
- For those County Fair's that have tractor pulls the hearing society had ear plugs that can be passed out to viewers, if you can help pass them out, wear a Lions shirt and let VDG Rick know you can help. In the north country where they have lawnmower pulls the same thing applies, volunteer to hand out ear protection
- Report your service hours, we are a "service" organization
- Share your club information in the newsletter
- Use and share the diabetes handouts
- NABA is applying for a Grant from LCI to assist in their 1.2 million dollar project, donations would also be appreciated from all clubs, that grant will be presented for approval at the September district meeting
- Make sure if your clubs need something to apply for grants from all of the Lions organizations that are available to help you

## **Hearing Society;**

VGD Rick presented an update of their activities;

- The program was started June 1<sup>st</sup> of 2018
- 31 cases have been handled so far
- 52 hearing aids have been facilitated
  - o 1 was associated with a Zone project
  - o In one instance 2 clubs worked together

- One from District O also took advantage of the program
- Recycled hearing aids fund their program
- They would partner with any club that asks
- They will have a display at the State Convention
- Looking to establish 2 loan out centers in the northern part of our District
  - o Approaching someone in Ogdensburg and in Potsdam
  - o Let him know if you know of anyone interested
  - o DG Michele said there was in interest in Schroon
- The bylaws are being reworked, there are presently 47 board members, they are trying to streamline that, this effort should be done in a few days
  - o Each King Lion in the district will get a letter stating the change
  - Looking for volunteers to hand out ear plugs at county fairs for tractor pulls and lawnmower pulls
- April 29<sup>th</sup> at 7pm will be the annual meeting at the Eye Institute in Slingerlands, anyone can attend

# QUESTIONNAIRE OVERVIEW

- Questionnaire sent out, in September, to all clubs.
  - -It asked if the member knew:
    - What LEOs were
    - If their club has/had one or considered starting one
    - What projects they work with their Leo's on
    - If they don't have one, what other groups do they work with
- Total questionnaires received back: II (From 7 clubs)
- Many of the questionnaires I got back were from clubs that already have a Leo Club or have had one in the past.

# **QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS**

- Seven responses came from clubs who already know who the Leos are and who already work with their club.
- Three were from clubs who have had Leo clubs in the past but no longer have one.
- The last one was from a club who has never had a Leo club.

This got me thinking, why did we not receive more back? Were the clubs who didn't know what Leos were afraid to respond?

# STEPS TO FORMING A NEW LEO CLUB

# There are Six Easy steps to forming a new club

- Step I: Establish a Framework

  Determine if the new Leo club will be community or school-based, Alpha (12-18) or Omega (18-30).
- Step 2: Identify Potential Leos

  Obtain the names of Leos from schools, universities, colleges, houses of worship, youth groups, friends and relatives.
- Step 3: Invite Prospective Leos to an Informational Meeting

  Explain the philosophy of the Leo Club Program and answer questions concerning: requirements for Leo club membership, the relationship to the sponsoring Lions club and Leo service activities.

  Distribute the Alpha Application for Leo Club Membership (Leo50-A) or Omega Application for Leo Club Membership (Leo50-O) and invite interested youth to join the Leo club.

# STEPS TO FORMING A NEW LEO CLUB

# Step 4: Host a Formation Meeting

Organize a Leo club formation meeting to elect Leo club officers, discuss potential projects, accept The Leo Club Constitution and Bylaws and determine the place and time for club meetings.

# • Step 5: Complete Required Paperwork

Complete the <u>Leo Club Organization Report (Leo-51)</u> with proper signatures. Attach a list with the names of the club's founding members and return it to the Leo Club Program Department. The entire certification process can take four to six weeks.

# Step 6: Plan an Installation Ceremony

Once the Leo Club Organization Report form has been approved, the sponsoring Lions club should organize a meeting to present the Certificate of Organization and install Leo club officers. Launch the Leo club with an installation ceremony.

# **COST OF LEO CLUB**

- Leo Club Organization Fee is \$100.00. It is a one time fee and includes all of the following:
  - The costs involved in processing the Leo Club Organization Report
  - A Certificate of Organization
  - A Leo club officers' kit
  - A Leo club sponsor kit
  - Leo lapel pins for each original Leo club member
- Lions clubs are also billed \$100.00 annually to sponsor a Leo club This pays for Leo Club Program materials, mailings, club record maintenance, communications, awards and program resources.
- If a Leo club is canceled, the <u>Leo Club Termination Form (Leo-86)</u> must be received by the Leo Club Program Department by October 31 to receive levy credit for the current year only.

# WHY SOME CLUBS ARE HAVING A HARD TIME WITH LEOS

- Kids are busy, they are involved in sports, other clubs and work. It makes it hard for them to join another club
- Most schools have other volunteer organizations, like Key Club, National Honor Society, Interact Club as well as others.
- So, what do we do then? Well, consider the following:
  - Maybe take a look at forming a community based Leo club instead of a school based one.
  - Find something for them to do as a service activity that is unique and not something that other clubs in the school already do
  - Pick a meeting day when other school clubs don't meet, or do an online/telephone group so Leo's can join in when they have the time.

# ARE LIONS WORKING WITH OTHER YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS?

# STARTING OUR 3-5 YEAR PLAN

- Start at least 2 new Leo Clubs within our district
- Have a program at one or two of the cabinet meetings for our Leo's to participate in
  - Allow them to have their own separate cabinet meeting one in the norther part of our zone and one in the southern part of our Zone.
  - If travelling is hard with Leo's maybe have a Skype meeting or other visual conference meeting to allow them to express their ideas
- Have a Leo fundraiser or service project within the district, maybe one north and one south.
- Have two Leo's sitting on the Cabinet as non voting members at our cabinet meetings.

# STARTING OUR 3-5 YEAR PLAN CONTINUED

- Make sure that Leo Club advisors are communicating with the President and Secretary of their club as well as the District Leo Coordinator
  - I cannot stress the importance of communication! Send me information on all the good things your Leo Clubs are doing, both for district reports as well as to share for fun. Send it to the District Newsletter too. We all want to know what they are doing.
  - Club presidents and secretaries should speak to the Leo Advisors and make sure that they are communicating with the district. We have had so many communication issues in the past, and it really ends up hurting our Leo's



# A Global Nigeria Project Initiative was the result...





March 24, 2018, United Nations Lions Day, saw the establishment of a service partnership between the Central Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired (CABVI) and the Beacon of Hope Outreach Ministry (BOHO). That day PDG Paula Flisnik, (CABVI's Director of Community Relations) and Lion Lady Celestina Ekezie, (NY Barahona Lions Club Service Chairperson and Founder/CEO of BOHO) met for the first time and realized that their conversation would be the first of a continuing relationship with a positive impact on the less privileged.

When Lion Lady Celestina described the medical and educational services offered by BOHO, PDG Flisnik suggested that CABVI and other Lions could donate items and raise money to meet BOHO's goal to help Nigerians. CABVI donated vision screening materials and equipment, examination gloves, pencils, sheets and towels valued over \$3,000. CABVI's products and textiles are manufactured by people who are blind and visually impaired. PDG Flisnik contributed personal hygiene items and sewing supplies for making sanitary pads from the donated sheets and towels. The Lions Club District 20-R2 Foundation financially supported the shipping of donated items and medical professionals fees. The New York Barahona Lions Club helped raise money from fellow Lions, and the Marcy Telephone Lions Club donated shoes. Over 2000 Lions eyeglasses were donated. BOHO raised funds, solicited donations of medication and equipment, collaborated with local Nigerian Lions Clubs and community stake holders. Lions volunteers who provided assistance were Lions Clubs from different Nigerian states. These clubs included Lion Vivian Ume-Ezeoke, Enugu State; Lion Prince Edukere, Uyo State; Lion E. Victoria, Rivers State; and Lion Frances Ikwechegh, Anambra State.



In January 2019 the Global Project Initiative Mission Trip to Nigeria served approximately 5000 people from 50 rural communities at four sites. Participants received free medical, vision, and dental screenings, free prescribed medications and eyeglasses, and treatment for diseases such as malaria, high blood pressure, and diabetes. The mission provided public health education lectures and resources such as school supplies, health education materials, sanitary pads for girls, and shoes and clothing. Participants attended workshops on the preparation and use of soap, bleach, and insecticide to prevent diseases, promote healthy living, and assist with poverty reduction and unemployment.



The Girls Initiative, a project developed by Edna Chukwurah, MD and Nwando Ekezie, a medical student and daughter of Lion Lady Celestina Ekezie, empowers rural preadolescent and adolescent girls through health education and skills training. More than 500 girls received free medical services and attended workshops on overall personal hygiene, menstruation and sanitary health, sexual awareness, HIV/AIDS, abuse prevention, character building, and skills acquisition training.



The Global Project Initiative, which promotes Lions Serving Their Roots, and the BOHO mission programs translate into Lions United in Service, improving the lives of more than 5000 people in need, keeping them healthy and educated, empowering them with skills, restoring hope, reducing crime, alleviating poverty, and bringing positive change in their communities. # Lions District 20W Cabinet, Concerning vision-related activities

This is my report about Vision-related activities in the district, as of February , 2019.

> As mentioned At the September meeting, DG Michele feels our efforts should primarily concentrate on assisting and reporting on, the activities of the vision-related service providers in our district, which is why we arn't currently reporting on Visions Center on Blindness, as we have in the past. Instead, over the next two reports, i'll briefly summarize currant and planned initiatives of the major providers in the district, during there current and upcoming fiscal years.

In this report, we'll discuss plans of several of the agencies working with the blind and vision-impaired communities.

This year, the Central Association for the Blind and Visually impaired, (CABVI.), is reaching a major milestone. Founded in 1929, it was one of the Utica Lions Club's early major projects, because the club played a major role in founding it.

Planned events to commemorate this include an active volunteer recognition luncheon in April, a formal celebration at CABVI.'s annual meeting in may, and the projected opening of the agency's new Vision and Wellness Center, in August, prior to the retirement, that month, of long-time Executive Director, Rudy DAmico. A search is currently underway for his replacement.

As part of its expanded Blind Hockey Program, CABVI. Will be hosting the US. Blind Paralympic Hockey Team, which will be training at a site in the Utica Area.

CABVI. Is currently renovating a building in Syracuse, where it plans to reestablish an employment program for the blind, formally offered at that location by Aurora.

In cooperation with a woman working in Nigeria, The agency will be sending personal hygiene and educational supplies, to schools working with girls with and without vision impairments, who are students in that country. Many of these items are manufactured and packed by blind workers, in the agency's industry program.

Two years ago, the Glens Falls Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired, (GFABVI.), Celebrated 80 years of existance, during which Current Executive Director, Lion Phil Jessen, has been in his position for more than half of it! The agency was founded in 1937, and Lion Phil became its Executive director, in 1977.

To address the current shortage of vision rehabilitation therapists, particularly in rural areas such as GFABVI.'s, the agency is developing certificate programs to train Vision Rehabilitation Therapy Assistants, who will train people who are blind or otherwise visually impaired, in basic orientation and mobility skills, as well as home management and basic adaptive technology use. These certificate programs must be approved by the New York State Commission for the Blind, and will only allow orientation and mobility training, in or around the home of the person receiving service. For o & M training out in the community, a professional O & M instructor is required.

On Saturday, April 27th, GFABVI. Will be sponsoring an accessible art and blind artist exhibition, at the Charley Wood Theater, Glens Falls, from 1:00 to 6:00 PM. This will give people who are blind a chance to experience various art works, and the public the opportunity to experience the capabilities of artists who are blind.

The North Country Association for the Visually Impaired, (NcAVI.), is located in Platsburgh, and is celebrating its 31st year of service, having been founded in 1989. It's the youngest of the agencies serving the vision impaired community in our district.

The agency works with the other agencies in the district, to serve consumers in Plattsburgh, and the Adirondack Region. Its current executive director is Amy Kretser.

The agency added job placement services, and hopes to offer a recreation day, if there's sufficient interest, to publicize ways in which the vision impaired community can participate in local recreational opportunities.

The agency is working with the YMCA. And other Adirondack educational and recreation organizations, to assist them in making there offerings accessible to vision impaired visitors. An example was the Access Adirondacks program, where trips to various Adirondack-oriented museums and recreational opportunities were

arranged, to acquaint the agencies consumers with these opportunities, and how they were being made accessible to them.

It also offered an accessible art program and art classes, designed for the needs of the vision impaired community.

The agency facilitates a number of support groups, including one recently started for veterans in its service area, who have vision impairments.
