

What is the Leade	ership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program?
Multiple District Level:	This grant program offers funds to support the training of confirmed first and second vice district governors at the multiple district level. Eligible expenses (refer to the Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program Reimbursement Policy) will be reimbursed in an amount not to exceed: • US\$100 per confirmed first vice district governor participant (not to exceed actual expenses incurred). • US\$75 per confirmed second vice district governor participant (not to exceed actual expenses incurred). All multiple districts are eligible to participate in this grant program. All completed applications will be awarded a grant.
District Level:	This grant program offers funds to support the training of zone chairpersons within the district. Eligible expenses (refer to the Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program Reimbursement Policy) will be reimbursed in an amount up to US\$500. All districts are eligible to participate in this grant program, however funding is limited and not all applicants will be awarded a grant.

What is the applic	cation process?
Multiple District Level:	All Global Action Team- Global Leadership Team (GLT) multiple district coordinators on record with Lions Clubs International (1 per Multiple District) are eligible to apply for grant funds by submitting a completed 2019-2020 Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program application.
	All completed applications will be accepted.
District Level:	All Global Action Team/Global Leadership Team (GLT) district coordinators on record with Lions Clubs International (1 per District) are eligible to apply for grant funds by submitting a completed 2019-2020 Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program application.
×	All districts are eligible to participate in this grant program, however funding is limited and not all applicants will be awarded a grant.

Multiple District Level:	The Leadership Development Division will provide guidance regarding specific curriculum topics to be included in each training program. Additional and/or elective topics are determined by those responsible for training in the multiple district, including the Global Action Team GLT coordinator, and must be designed to suit the distinct needs of the multiple district. First vice district governors: the multiple district level first vice district governor training curriculum is a key component of the board-approved training program for first vice district
	governor/district governors-elect and must be incorporated. The mandated curriculum will be provided by the Leadership Development Division of Lions Clubs International in August 2019.



	Second vice district governors: the training program effectively combines online training (Phase 1) and an instructor-led training workshop (Phase 2) to maximize learning and meet the needs of second vice district governors. While it is recommended that second vice district governors be trained using both components, Phase 2 must be presented in order to be eligible to receive funds from this grant program. The training curriculum is available on the Lions Clubs International website.
District Level:	The required zone chairperson training curriculum is available on the Lions Clubs International website.

For what time period is this grant to be used?

The 2019-2020 Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program is to be applied for training occurring from July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020. For example, a district holding zone chairperson training may choose to train current zone chairpersons or wait and use the grant to train 2020-2021 incoming zone chairpersons who are identified later in this fiscal year.

What is required to obtain reimbursement from the grant program?

To receive reimbursement from the grant program, the following must be submitted to the Leadership Development Division at Lions Clubs International.

- 1. A completed <u>2019-2020 Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program Application</u> must be on file with the Leadership Development Division
- 2. <u>2019-2020 Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program Reimbursement Form</u> (completed with all itemized eligible training program expenses)
- 3. Receipts for eligible expenses (see <u>2019-2020 Leadership Development Multiple District and District Grant Program Reimbursement Policy</u> for additional information)
- 2019-2020 Leadership Development Daily Attendance Sheet (with participant signatures as certification of attendance)
- 5. Agenda/outline for all days of the training program
- 6. Completed Leadership Development Final Evaluation Report

It is imperative that the completed Reimbursement Claims are submitted promptly and received within <u>60 days</u> of completion of the training program in accordance with Lions Clubs International policy. <u>Claims received after 60 days will not be eligible for reimbursement.</u>

Reimbursement will be made payable to the applicable multiple district/district.

Campaign 100 Model Clubs

A program for clubs to help reach LCIF's goal of raising US\$300 million by June 30, 2022.

To be recognized as a Model Club, a club has to commit to donate a minimum of \$500 per member average (PMA) during the 5 years from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2022. This includes member donations, proceeds from fundraising events, gifts from the club treasury, Local Business Contributions, Non-Lion Individual Donations, etc.

Membership levels vary during the 5 years. For calculating the \$ commitment, the number of members on the date of commitment is used. For example, if a club has 40 members on the date of the pledge, that number is used. The minimum commitment is \$20,000 (40x500). It stays the same weather the membership count increases or decreases.

Family members who are affiliated with a club are not included in calculating the minimum goal to achieve Model Club status.

All fundraising that is directed towards LCIF from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2022. Hence club's contributions since July 1, 2017.count towards this goal.

The minimum per-member average is the total average over the course of the campaign – not in a single year. There are no mandated milestones for donations, though it greatly helps in setting periodic goals. Obviously an ongoing plan greatly helps to reach the goal.

To quote LCI: Please utilize the strategies that will be most effective in your club. We recognize each club is unique. Consider your club's special fundraising skills and resources to see how it will contribute to your Campaign 100 success!

Model Club recognition occurs upon achieving each of the three milestones outlined below:

Milestone One: Upon SUBMISSION OF COMMITMENT FORM, Model Clubs listed in printed/digital media, displays at convention, etc.

Milestone Two: Upon ACHIEVEMENT OF DECLARED PMA GOAL, Model Clubs receive a banner patch and accompanying physical recognition items. PMA milestone can be achieved with cash donations and/or documented pledges submitted to LCIF.

Milestone Three: FULFILLMENT OF COMMITMENTS. Once all pledges are fulfilled and receipt of all contributions toward the minimum PMA are received by LCIF, Model Clubs receive physical and public recognition once again, which may include a special dinner for club leaders present at convention (Milan, Singapore, Montreal), a banner patch, and banner topper. Public recognition (scrolling screen at International Convention, etc.).
