#### **Cabinet Business:**

#### Secretary Report:

CS Barbara Bentley presented the April 2021 minutes for approval.

DG Michele O'Hare asked for a motion to accept the Secretary's Report.

- o A motion was made by PDG Jim Shaw. Seconded by ZC Bill O'Mara.
  - Motion unanimously passed

#### • District Governor's Report:

DG Michele discussed the need to work as a team. She included the Lions Code of Ethics on the agenda and we all must make sure we follow them.

The International President's motto for the year is "Service from the Heart".

The State Convention will be in Niagara Falls in May 2022 and all are encouraged to attend. The International Convention will be in Montreal June 24-28, 2022.

DG Michele announced that RC Holly McConchie has taken the role of District Administrator to help clubs report membership and service.

Reminder to submit stories and fundraiser/event flyers to Lion Karen Rager for the newsletter by the 28<sup>th</sup> of each month.

Our district goals and objectives will be sent out to every club president and as a district we will be looking at our strategic plan.

DG Michele is asking club presidents to submit the chairs of their committees to her.

DG Michele shared the "Five Outcomes of Successful Change" (see attached). Change is

important especially to grow new clubs and gain new members.

At our November Convention, we will be joined by our visiting ID TJ Ernesto and his wife from San Antonio Texas along with IPID Gary Brown and PID Bob Libin.

#### • Treasurer Report:

CT Eric Unislawski presented the Treasurer's Report and proposed budget (see attached). He reported that 29 of the 50 clubs have submitted their dues.

DG Michele O'Hare asked for a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report.

- o A motion was made by ZC Jim Winkler. Seconded by PDG Jim Shaw.
  - Motion unanimously passed

### • GMT Report:

The GMT was reported by DG Michele since PDG Ed Stano was unable to attend. She thanked the clubs for their reporting of membership.

# • GST Report:

PDG John McDonald refered to his recent newsletter article that touched on our partnerships with NABA, CABVI, and also the Leos.

He spoke about the diabetes bookmarks that can be placed in food pantry bags.

In November, there will be a visit to the Ronald McDonald cottage in Lake George with our visiting ID.

They will be continuing monthly GAT calls with the Zone and Region chairs to share ideas. PDG John stressed the most important think to remember is to report service. If the secretary is unable to report, then clubs can appoint a club administrator to do so. If they are unable to do that, they can reach out to the District Administrator, RC Holly, for help. Reporting benefits LCI when they are looking at major partnerships so they can show the number of volunteers hours we are doing and the number of people reached.

DG Michele reminded those in attendance that we are Lions at all times. We can count service if we are volunteering with other organizations as well.

#### • GLT Report:

PCC Mark Whitney estimates that only 1/5<sup>th</sup> of everything we do is being reported.

It all starts with service that leads to membership that leads to retaining members that leads to attracting new members that helps develop new leaders.

PCC Mark stressed that the Zone chairs are the key communication link to making it all work between the club and the leadership team.

PCC Mark spoke about the online learning programs and the training being done in the district. Secretary training has been done and will be looking to training for other leadership roles. There are courses online for all Lions on public speaking, Roberts Rules of Order, conflict resolution, etc.

It was announced that PCC Kelly Clark will be doing Guiding Lion training for our district in the very near future. It would be beneficial to take the training to help our own clubs too.

#### • Leo Club Report:

Lion Joe Wagner encouraged clubs that do not have a Leos club at this time to look at either starting one with their schools or a community based club.

He would like to start three new Leos clubs within our district and the district has approved \$200 to help start up a new Leos club.

Lion Joe reported that at a state level, there was a grant provided and our district has been paired with District Y for a hunger grant for the state. Looking to do a hunger relief project possibly in the Utica area.

#### Communications and Marketing Report: (see attached report)

ZC Bob Townsend sent assessment out to all of the clubs in the district.

He is looking on working at getting the message for service events out through other partners in addition to word of mouth.

He recommends a website such as "Lions of Upstate NY", as District Y uses "Heart of NY Lions Clubs"

ZC Bob spoke about needing a greater push to the external population.

He will be looking into working with Districts Y, E2 and O on newspaper distribution.

# **Program:**

Panel Discussion: Developing Your Club Your Way

Led by PCC Mark Whitney

Panel: Lion Joe Wagner, Saratoga Springs Lion since 2017 Lion Preem Cabey, Albany-Troy Lion since 2019

Joe Wagner: LEO stands for Leadershio Experience Opportunity and it is a great way to start encouraging younger members to join clubs. Starting a young professionals Lions club is a great way to give younger members of the community to join and grow skill sets as leaders.

Preem Cabey: It is very important to work with other organizations to spread the Lions message, especially with the youth in the community. She started first Leos club in Albany-Troy and those 21 were attracted by a mutual relationship with Preem.

Joe Wagner: PR and marketing geared for younger members is very important since they are very familiar with social media platforms and that is the way they communicate these days. Get them involved in a PR or marketing level and that will also give clubs ideas on how to market with newer marketing strategies to get newer members in the community.

Preem Cabey: Leos communicate within their own social circles. The 21 Leos in the Albany-Troy club share in five different activities including boxing, art, and refuge welcome center, and these groups are where they come together and communicate. Word of mouth sharing about the Leo club and other platforms that other young people use is working. She encourages them to not only use digital forms of communication, but also use hand written letters.

Joe Wagner: He aspires for leadership roles given in the Lions club, but needs to remember to keep a good balance. It can become overwhelming! As you have new members, gauge their level of interest on what they want to take on. Help them know it is ok to say no and that they can ask for help if it becomes overwhelming, expecially for families with children. If they can only show up for service projects and not leadership roles, that is OK !!!!

PCC Mark noted that when it comes to leadership roles in most cases it's not NO, it's not now. But they may still be able to connect through service projects.

If you inspire people with support and encouragement, they can aspire to be leaders. It would be very helpful to have job descriptions for committees.

PCC Mark concluded by saying that as Lions we fail to train the ones coming up behind us. Bring them along! LCI has list that goes back 5 years for presidents so you can look for leaders.

Also, encourage the Lions leadership program.

Three things that discourage young people from joining Lions:

- Not open to change; hybrid
- Don't overwhelm
- Make sure you have fun; modify traditions

#### **LUNCH BREAK**

#### **Committee Reports:**

#### • Camp Badger:

Lion Tom Kevlin presented the committee report for Camp Badger (see attached).

#### NABA:

DG Michele reported that the NABA building is in need of money for a new roof. Hannaford has CLINK bags for bottles to help raise money.

#### • Childhood Cancer:

Lion Diane Lange shared that September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and she has provided everyone in attendance with a yellow ribbon.

She has three goals this year:

- 1. To put together a resource book to find where the hospitals are, foundations, speakers, etc.
- 2. She would like to have a "co-chair" from every club.
- 3. To get more Leos involved.

#### • Diabetes:

Lion Barbara shared that her goal to start the year would be to work on a district wide disbetes service project, done within each zone.

She also shared bookmarks that can be used by all the clubs in the district at their events or to be used in the bags that go out from the food pantries.

In addition, she has developed a simple brochure that contains the pre-diabetes risk assessment test that the district will be printing and sharing with clubs that would be interested in using them.

#### • District Coordinator:

ZC Holly McConchie shared that it is her goal to get all the clubs in our district reporting. If they are unable, they are encouraged to reach out to her so that she can do that for them.

### Hearing Society:

IPDG Rick Brisee reported that ear protection had been given out at many fairs during their tractor pull events.

He encouraged everyone to get the word out regarding the Affordable Hearing Aid Program. They are working with 18 audiologists, but mostly in the capital district. If anyone has an office further north they can recommend, please share with IPDG Rick.

# • Hunger:

Lion Bob Maxam shared several ways to do food collections including bringing non-perishable items to meetings, collecting at grocery stores and having Leos help with collections.

He also suggested volunteering at our local food pantries.

(Donation presented to Local Food Pantry in Long Lake)

#### Cyber Security

Lion Joe Wagner spoke about the presentation he had previously done for the district on cyber security and how we can protect ourselves. He is also available to do that at a club visitation

He is working with Lion Jerry Gordon to put the district directory behind a "secure wall" online.

#### • Orientation and Retention

IPDG Rick Brisee spoke that it is very important for new members to have orientation. The

first date of the district orientation will be on Saturday, October 23<sup>rd</sup> for no more than an hour. Anyone can attend.

#### Peace Poster

PDG Joan Scott encouraged clubs to get involved in the Peace Poster contest that can be done with children 11, 12 and 13 years old.

This year's theme is "We are all connected".

Peace posters are to be brought to the distrct fall convention in November for judging or if you can not bring it, she asked that you get it to her directly.

# • Sight

DG Michele O'Hare shared that there are already screenings on the books with schools within our district.

### Brandel-Murphy Youth Foundation

PDG John McDonald shared the back ground behind the foundation, how it was founded by Lions Past International President Al Brandel and his partner in service Lion Maureen Murphy. The Brandel-Murphy Foundation has a grant program that supports youth grants up to \$2,000. It is a matching grant.

Twenty-two grants have been provided to District 20W since the Foundation's inception. Check presentation from the Brandel-Murphy Foundation was made to the Chazy Lions for their backpack program in the amount of \$1,200.

#### New York State & Bermuda Lions Foundation

PDG Jim Shaw reported that the upcoming raffle tickets is how the foundation is funded. He shared that the NYS&BLF has \$37,500 in their budget for grants this year. They will provide up to a \$5,000 matching grant. There will be a powerpoint presentation in the near future on how to fill out the grant application correctly.

Clubs that purchase three raffle tickets are awared an RJU that can be given to anyone.

#### Lions SEE

PCC Mark shared that the three directors for our distrtct were himself, DG Michele and PDG Paula Flisnik.

Lions SEE can award two \$500 grants to each district over six months. Go to LionsSEENY.org for more information. (It is not a matching grant)

Also, KidSight USA has a great video that can be shared with teachers, parents, health care professionals, etc.

#### Alert Building

IPDG Rick Brisee discussed the Alert building, that is a state project on the grounds of Camp Badger.

The Alert building houses emergency supplies for flooding, etc that may occur within the multiple district.

#### **New Business:**

- DG Michele O'Hare reported that the district now has 1,315 members.
- PDG John McDonald reported that the Multiple District received approval from the council to
  move forward with submitting a diabetes grant to LCIF for \$135,000 in order to expand Project
  IDEAS (Improving Diabetes Education Access & Support), being done in District Y, throughout
  the multiple district. Doing so will help educate more Certified Diabetes Paraprofessionals and

develop a statewide website for information.

Since the council's approval, the rules changed. The diabetes grant is no longer non-matching, but now needs a 25% match. About \$33,000 is now needed and the grant must be submitted with 25% of 25%, or about \$8,500. The are looking for pledges from the ten districts participating within the Multiple. They will also be looking to secure a grant from the NYS&BLF. PDG John is asking for approval from the cabinet to pledge \$2,600 from District 20W over the next two years.

DG Michele O'Hare asked for a motion.

- A motion was made by CS Barbara Bentley to pledge the \$2,600 from District 20W over the next two years for the Multiple District Diabetes Grant.
   Seconded by Lion Priscilla Laurin.
  - Motion unanimously passed
- PDG John McDonald reported that LCI will be awarding 30 Kindness Matters Service Awards.
  The district leadership team met and agreed to submitting Camp Abilities Saratoga, a service
  project of the Saratoga Springs Lions, as our districts submission.
   DG Michele O'Hare asked for a motion to make that submission.
  - o A motion was made ZC Bill O'Mara. Seconded by RC Holly McConchie.
    - Motion unanimously passed
- PDG John McDonald made the announcement to the cabinet that he will be seeking the Multiple District endorsement for International Director in Niagara Falls in May 2022.
   At this time he is able to announce and campaign only in his own district, but the formal announcement will be made at the PDG meeting on October 16<sup>th</sup>.
- PDG Milledge Smith announced that he will be seeking the Multiple District endorsement as well.

Having no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at 2:53pm.

**DESIRE** to participate and support the change

KNOWLEDGE of how to change

**ABILITY** to demonstrate skills and behaviors

**REINFORCEMENT** to make the change stick

# **AWARENESS**

# What Builds Awareness of the Need for Change?

- Communications from others
- Access to information.
- An event
- An observable condition
- Readily available business information
- Catastrophic disaster
- Gradually weakening financial performance

# **Example Activities for Building Awareness:**

- Change sponsor direct messages
- Leader conversations
- General district communications

# **Potential Resisting Factors:**

- Comfort with the status quo
- Credibility of the source or sender of the message
- Denial that the reasons for change are real
- Debate over the reasons for change
- Rumors or misinformation

# **DESIRE**

# Motivators for Participating in a Change:

- Likelihood of gain or achievement (incentive)
- Fear of consequence (risk or penalty)
- Desire to be part of something (to belong)
- Willingness to follow a leader you trust
- Belief that alternative is worse

# Tactics for Building Desire:

- Active and visible primary change sponsor
- Personal engagement by leaders
- Proactive management of resistance
- Strong involvement in creating the needed solution
- Incentive programs aligned with the change

# **Potential Resisting Factors:**

- Comfort or security with how things are now
- · Fear of the unknown
- Change not aligned with a person's selfinterest or values
- No answer to What's In It For Me?
- Negative history with change on a personal level (low confidence of success)
- An individual's personal situation financial, career, family, health
- An organization's track record with change

# KNOWLEDGE

# To build knowledge, individuals must have:

- Training and education
- Experience
- Access to information Mentoring

# Potential Challenges and Resisting Factors:

- Gap between current knowledge levels and desired knowledge levels
- Insufficient time (conflicting demands)
- Inadequate resources available for training

- Lack of access to the necessary information
- Capacity to learn

# Tactics for Building Knowledge:

- Formal training programs
- Job aides
- One-on-one coaching
- · User groups and forums
- · Troubleshooting guidance

- Negative consequences including peer pressure for desired behavior

Lions Camp Badger is operated by the Empire State Special Needs Experience, Inc., a project of the Lions Clubs International Multiple District 20 (New York State and Bermuda). The camp became a statewide Lions project in 1980.

In 1942, a dormitory was leased from the College to house the program. Beginning in 1945, the program leased space from Ithaca College at their summer camp located where Lions Camp Badger is today. The College had leased the property (about 600 acres from the federal government). The camp had been built in 1929 by the Department of Forestry and during the 1930's was used as a C.C.C. camp.

By 1955 the summer program had grown to 75 students and a staff of 15-20. It was the second oldest program of its type in the nation.

The program continued to grow and in 1964, Mr. Badger, along with 4 others incorporated the program as the Ithaca Speech Clinic, Inc. In 1972, Mr. Badger was able to purchase land in Vermont for \$45,000 which was swapped with the federal government for what is now Lions Camp Badger.

In 1980, the name of the Clinic was changed to the Empire State Speech and Hearing Clinic and Ed Badger sold the property to Multiple District 20 of the Lions Clubs International. Over the years many improvements were made to the camp and programs. Enrollment many years was over 100 campers.

By 2010, it was obvious that the 6 week school based program was no longer viable and the Board made a decision to close the school program and begin a regular camping program of one to two week durations. The first week long program was held in 2011. In the same year the camp was awarded a 5 year family support grant by the

Broome Developmentally Disabled Service Organization (DDSO), a division of the New York State Office of People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD). The first session of this program was held in 2012 for young adults aged 16 to 26.

The Board of Directors of the Empire State Special Needs Experience is committed to expanding the camping programs for the Special Needs population. The Board also hopes to expand the use of Lions Camp Badger by other groups and encourage other organizations to operate programs at the camp. One such group, Project New Hope, operates several weekends for returning veterans and their families.

This year again the camp has been virtual due to the Covid 19 concerns. We have 40 campers for a week of activities such as crafts, photo making, learning about horses, making friendship bracelets, video from local fire department, tour of England from a teacher in England, watercolor painting, making pine cone bird feeders and tie dye shirts. Of the 40 campers 15 are new campers. Instruction includes zoom meeting and videos covering the projects.

A second session was held for a vocational camp helping to teach skills needed for employment.

Zoom virtual concert 08/05/21 with the band flame. Up to 100 could be in attendance

Golf tournament was held 08/14/21 at the Wellsville Country Club. Over \$5,000 profit was made.

07/24/21 Camp Badger hosted the MD council of governors to a tour of the camp and a chicken BBQ. Dinner prepared by the Ithica and Spencer-Vanetten Lions Clubs. 65 in attendance

Super raffle tickets are still available until 09/03/21. \$50 per ticket with a \$1,000 prize to 10 winners. Drawing on Labor Day weekend.

How can we help camp badger- Have your club add camp badger to the projects you support yearly. Honor/Memorial donations-your donation will be recorded in our book of memories and an acknowledgement card will be sent to the individual or to the family of the deceased.

Memorial Garden Paver stone placed near the chapel and overlooking the camp. Amazonsmile -Amazon will donate ½ of 1% of eligible amazonsmile purchases. Lions Mint Program Camp badger receives \$5 for every case ordered from Sayklly's Candies- Lions Mint Division. - Our local Chamber of Commerce in concert with village businesses once again has established a small al fresco dining area to allow visitors & shoppers to sit and enjoy take-out food and drinks while enjoying the fine summer weather. Two days a week one of our members assists in the upkeep and cleanliness of this area. We clean the area and prepare trash cans for next day pickup.
- At our end-of-year picnic, we honored retiring Town Police Chief, Dan English, with a **LIONS EYE BANK VISION OF HOPE AWARD** in recognition of his four decades of service to our community. In addition, we presented writing portfolios to an Oneida County Deputy Sherriff and Chief Dan's replacement in the Town Police Department. These officers joined us in wishing former Chief Dan the best. The cover of the portfolios contained a Lions logo with the inscription "Clinton Lions appreciate your service"
- At a recent local Chamber of Commerce breakfast meeting, we presented the Kirkland Town Library (KTL) with a Robert J. # Saratoga Springs Lion Club

# Greetings!

Despite the on-going constraints incurred due to COVID-19, the Saratoga Springs Lions Club nonetheless engaged in a number of significant service-related activities during recent months. We were even willing and able to resume meeting safely in person on several occasions throughout May and June, before the variant Delta raised its ugly head!

Here is a summary of what has been happening in our Saratoga Springs Lions neighborhood:

- \* Camp Abilities Saratoga continued to offer virtual mini-camps throughout the spring. An extension of the week-long 2020 Virtual Summer CAS program, these stimulating three-hour camps (offered on an every-other-month basis) became well-accepted and embraced by our blind, visually impaired and deaf/blind campers, as well as their families. The week-long 2021 Virtual Summer Camp Abilities Saratoga was held August 8th through August 13th with eleven campers in attendance. In other CAS-related news, Lion Joe Brady was busy overseeing the purchase of a new CAS storage trailer, with custom outfitting falling under the direction of Lion Rich Martin. The acquisition of this trailer was made possible through the generosity of a grant received from the Alfred Z. Solomon Charitable Trust.
- \* As a follow-up to the Fresh Pasta Meal-In-A-Box sales event which had previously taken place on a weekly basis outside of Mama Mia's Restaurant, our club continues to benefit from the sale of fresh pasta that Lion Giuseppe Grisio makes available at his restaurant for purchase by customers. Beginning in late spring, customers who made a restaurant purchase of at least \$20 plus a box of fresh pasta became eligible to win a \$100 gift card to Mama Mia's Restaurant in an every-other-week drawing sponsored by the Saratoga Springs Lions.
- \* Various activities and efforts are ongoing as Saratoga Springs Lions attempt to provide assistance to the food-needy population within our community:
- Saratoga Springs Lions continue to support the local food pantries and food banks by providing them with needed food, personal items and monetary assistance. Our Lions also volunteer hours to man the food pantries where they assist in a number of different capacities.
- Our Lions have been partnering with Pitney Meadows Community Farm of Saratoga Springs, transporting the farm's fresh produce to local food pantries and distributing produce at various local drive-through food pick-up locations.
- \* The Communications Committee Co-chairs Mike Baxter and Joe Wagner have been rebuilding the club's website, focusing upon content management and information updating. Also, Lion Joe has been working with District Leadership to create a cyber security program designed to provide better protection for the online District Directory.
- \* As in past years, Lion Phil Klein ordered and distributed Lions Chocolate Easter Bunnies to fourteen Northern District Lions Clubs. As per Lion Phil's suggestion, a permit was secured from the City of Saratoga Springs which allowed Lions and Leos to engage in a "Bunnies on Broadway" fundraising sales campaign. Saratoga Springs Leos also sold chocolate Easter bunnies at the high school.

- \* The Sight Conservation Committee has been busy in recent months as Committee Chair Lion Gail Hessney and other Lions assisted NABA with their vision screening sessions for children. The most recent vision screening took place August 7th at the Big Truck Day sponsored by the Saratoga Springs Children's Museum, held at the Maple Avenue Middle School. To date, there have been a total of 199 children screened of which 36 were flagged for potential vision problems.
- \* The Environmental Awareness Committee Co-Chairs Lions Sal Bonsangue and Joe Wagner rallied a number of Saratoga Springs Lions who participated in an April 24th major clean-up session along a designated stretch of route 50 in the Town of Wilton, coinciding with various other Earth Day activities. Their efforts made a noticeable difference at that busy highway area. The Lions' clean-up efforts were appreciated and recognized by Sustainable Saratoga as well as by members of our community.
- \* The Diabetes Committee continues to forge ahead in its efforts to inform and educate the public on the topics of pre-diabetes and type 2 diabetes, while providing preventive tools and skills to those in need of establishing better nutritional habits. The committee has also provided assistance to individuals who are in need of financial assistance to obtain critical supplies used to monitor blood sugar levels on an on-going basis. Cabinet Secretary, Diabetes District/Club Chair Lion Barbara Bentley and MD-20 NYS Diabetes Chair, PDG Lion John McDonald moderated the informational Diabetes Panel during the recently held Virtual New York State & Bermuda Annual Convention 2021. Lion Barbara has made a number of other presentations promoting diabetes awareness and related health issues. She was invited to speak on behalf of LCI at the United Nations' 65th Session in March, a virtual event held in conjunction with the Commission on the Status of Women. Lion Barbara's topic, "Lions Promoting Diabetes Awareness and Education," was very informative and well-received by her audience.
- \* Scholarship Committee members were faced with a challenging task as they scrutinized student applications with the purpose of selecting the most deserving recipients of the 2021 Saratoga Springs Lions Club annual scholarship awards. Chair Lion George Igler reported that eight high school senior scholarship recipients received a total of \$32,500 in scholarship awards. These monies will be paid out over a period of four years. A small, socially-distanced presentation ceremony and reception were held in June at the Universal Preservation Hall in Saratoga Springs. The ceremony was accessible to others via Zoom.
- \* Chair Lion Dan Kumlander reported that the Hearing Conservation Committee continues to provide funding to members in our community who are deemed in need of financial assistance to purchase quality hearing aids. Also, while on the topic of Hearing Conservation, Saratoga Springs Lions volunteered at the 2021 Saratoga County Fair as they distributed ear plugs provided by the Hearing Conservation Society of NYS to fairgoers who were in attendance at the tractor and truck pulls.
- \* Lions Respect Awards Chair Lion Joe Brady assisted in selecting the thirty-seven Saratoga Springs High School students who received 2021 Respect Awards. The annual Respect Awards Presentation Ceremony was held via Zoom in recognition of the accomplishments of the award recipients.
- \* The Nominating Committee engaged in careful consideration while selecting a slate of officers and board members to serve during the Lions Year 2021-2022. Chair Lion Sal Bonsangue presented the nominated candidates to the membership in a timely manner in accordance with the Lions Constitution and By-Laws. As a follow up to the official election and installation of officers, Lions

met in early July for the annual Old Board-New Board Picnic held at the home of Lion Phil and Lynne Klein.

- \* Although many of the usual fund-raising activities were curtailed considerably during 2020-2021, the Saratoga Springs Lions Club nonetheless continued to make meaningful contributions and monetary donations to various area organizations which share a vision similar to our own. The organizations and groups that have benefited in recent months from the club's generosity include while not limited to:

- \* Our club also offered a generous donation to the Lions Den Project, a fund-raising effort spearheaded by Zone Chair Lion Ed Moore of the Ballston Spa Lions Club. This ambitious project brought to fruition the construction of a new 4-H demonstration pavilion and welcome area at the Saratoga County Fairgrounds. Several of our Saratoga Springs Lions attended the Lions Den's dedication event which took place in June.

That just about wraps it up for the Saratoga Springs Lions Club's recent activities and events. More activities are in the planning stage with various committees working at full throttle in preparation for their respective event. For instance, the 5th Annual Dave Carr Sr. Memorial Golf Tournament is scheduled for September 10th, Saratoga Springs Lions plan to participate in their usual manner in the Saratoga-Wilton Elks Lodge 53rd Flag Day Parade to be held September 11th, and CAS will host an Open House on September 25th at the aforementioned Lions Den at the Saratoga County Fairgrounds. Also, the 9th Annual Night at the Brewseum, which had been postponed in early spring, is now re-scheduled to take place September 30th at the Canfield Casino in Saratoga Springs.
