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Types of Standard Grants

Humanitarian Grants:

Humanitarian Service Grants may be issued for permanent communal programs or institutes which satisfy humanitarian needs in harmony with the objectives of Lionism.

Vocational Assistance Grants:

Vocational Assistance Grants may be issued for programs meeting a broad range of educational and training programs which provide a means for people to become self-supporting or to improve upon their economic and social well- being. Funds shall not be granted to individuals for such purposes.

Operational Grants:

Operational Grants will provide supplemental funding for day to day operational needs of supported activities. These grants need 75% approval of the duly constituted Board of Trustees.

Please note

Not all of the grant regulations are listed in this brochure. It is highly recommended that applicants work closely with their District Trustees to help insure a successful grant application.

Grant Proposals

Grant proposals may originate from any Foundation Trustee on behalf of any club or district in MD20. The proposal must certify the significance of the need, the social value and the operational feasibility of the project.

Cabinet certification is required for all standard grants applications and is to be evidenced by the submission of the minutes of the cabinet meeting at which the application was certified.

All standard grants require matching funds.

The completed grant application must be received by the Foundation 30 days in advance of the next Foundation meeting.

No more than one grant will be made per sub-district at any given trustees meeting.

NYS&BLF grant funds are intended for projects in the development stages or for projects in progress. NYS&BLF grant funds are not intended to repay loans or establish reserve funds.

The grant application must be reviewed and signed by one (1) off the three (3) district NYS&BLF Trustees

The grant recipient must close the grant by submitting a thorough report upon the completion of the project to the Secretary of the New York State and Bermuda Lions Foundation.

Preston C. Carlisle Youth Athletic Center

The Ogdensburg Boys and Girls Club is pleased to announce the construction of the Preston C. Carlisle Youth Athletic Center. The new additional gymnasium which will include air conditioning and bleachers and will play a positive role in the lives of the youth we serve. The new gym will allow us to have programming opportunities for separate age groups and expand our offerings for teens and female athletes. Our basketball leagues which draw youth ages 6-19 from all areas of the county will be expanded and more evening opportunities for play will be available especially for our teens. A major benefit will be the counter programming we will be able to provide in each gym to ensure that when one gym is being used by a certain age group the other gym will always be available. Weekend tournaments will be able to be held on-site with both gymnasiums available, which will increase the number of participants taking advantage of the new facility. As we leave the pandemic and return to a sense of normalcy the Preston C. Carlisle Youth Athletic Center will help many youths leave behind a sedentary lifestyle and have a bevy of opportunities for physical activity. The first major construction at the club since 2002 will impact area youth for years to come.

The facility will have a tremendous impact on our members, especially the underserved and those who need us most, giving them a place to go with adults to serve as role models and mentors and who care about them. Preston C. Carlisle Youth Athletic Center Budget

We will continue to raise funds to meet the needs required for the facility and have a \$750,000 line of credit if needed. We anticipate the completion of the facility in the spring of 2022 with some outside and touch up work still needed to be completed. The Ogdensburg Boys and Girls Club serves over 500 youth a year in membership and an additional 500 in Community Outreaching impacting around 1100 youth a year from Ogdensburg as well as all the surrounding communities in our geographic area. The new facility should help us increase the number of youths served by 20 percent.

#6 - What project will the grant be used for?

To help fund one year of the Long Lake Central School's Backpack program which provides food for the weekend for eligible students.

The first backpack food program began in 1995. The program was developed in Little Rock, Arkansas out of the concern of a school nurse who was seeing many children in her clinic tired, sick, and falling behind in class because of hunger and food scarcity in their homes. She approached her local food bank, the Arkansas Rice Depot, to help her address the problem. Together, they launched the *Food for Kids* program which provided food for kids discretely in bags or backpacks to take home during the weekends when school meals were unavailable. Today, there are hundreds of *Backpack* food programs across the country serving thousands of children.

Long Lake parent volunteers and school staff worked together to become an accredited *Backpack* site. It is an incredible partnership with Indian Lake Central School District and the Albany Regional Food Bank. Food is obtained from the Albany Food Bank and brought to Indian Lake where Long Lake staff members transport it to the Long Lake school. On Fridays eligible students (approximately 43%) receive a bag of nonperishable, nutritional foods that are intended to replace the meals that these students would normally get at school. Often a voucher for milk at Stewart's is included.

The first year of funding was provided by the Long Lake School District with the understanding that fundraising and donations would sustain it. But the pandemic eliminated most of their planned fundraising activities. The Long Lake Lions Club made a commitment to the program and helped them their second year, but then neither the school group nor our club was unable to hold any of their planned fundraising. We only have \$1,590 left in our Combating Community Hunger account so are asking that amount to be matched.

#12 Impact on the community if project not implemented

If we do not receive the matching funds requested, then we will only have \$1590 to donate to the Long Lake Central School Backpack program. Two years ago, it cost \$183/student and we all realize how much food prices have risen in the last year. This is a "fledgling" program for Long Lake that needs time to become established and develop a good funding base which has been challenging during the pandemic.

It should be noted that these students' parents are hardworking people with limited financial resources to fall back upon and often little time between work commitments to prepare meals. There is no year round grocery store in Long Lake so even buying food requires a vehicle and time to travel out of town.

Without the Long Lake Lions Club contribution, the Backpack program in Long Lake could be jeopardized denying the participants the nutritional foods that they need not only for good health but also for their school performance. The money that we have left in our Combating Community Hunger account will pay less than half of what is needed for a year.

Our club intends to publicize our support for the project in the following ways:

- By including a postcard sized note in the actual food packs that says, "Long Lake Lions ---- We Serve" (Superintendent has agreed to this already.)
- By posting the receipt of the grant on our Facebook page
- By posting about the Long Lake Lions' support of the *Backpack* program on the Long Lake Central School District's webpage (Superintendent has agreed to this already.)
- By displaying a poster at our BBQs and other events listing this project along with others that we support in the community

GAZEBO RESTORATION PROJECT BY CAMBRIDGE LIONS CLUB

5. Other Club Officers/District Officers:

6. What Project will the Grant be used for:

The Gazebo that is in Memorial Park in Cambridge has fallen into disrepair and is in desperate need of new flooring and supports, along with historically accurate lattice work, railings and roofing. Estimates to repair range near \$20k in repairs.

12. Impact on Community if Project is not Implemented:

Without the necessary repairs the structure risks further dilapidation. Located in Memorial Park, adjacent to the Cambridge Public Library, the gazebo acts as a bandstand for the Lions Summer Concert Series, a centerpiece to Christmas in Cambridge celebration and the Cambridge Lions Remembrance Trees, and as an outdoor learning room for our summer student programs with the Cambridge Public Library.

14. Describe How the Project will be identified as a Lions Supported Program:

The gazebo has been a prominent part of the Cambridge community since its inception at the Great Cambridge Fair from 1890- 1943. The Great Cambridge Fair was the precursor to the Washington County Fair and widely attended for many years. In 1974 as part of Cambridge's bicentennial celebration, the gazebo was moved from the old fairgrounds to "Lions Park" adjacent to Cambridge Central School. In 1984 "Lions Park" was updated with picnic tables and benches to allow more people to enjoy the nightly concerts at the gazebo. In 2012 the gazebo was moved to its current location in Memorial Park, since then it annually played host to the Cambridge Lions Summer Concert Series and the Holidays Eternal Illumination. A plaque will be permanently displayed memorializing the restoration and importance of the Gazebo in the Cambridge Community.



GAZEBO RESTORATION PROJECT



In 1974 as part of Cambridge's bicentennial celebration, the gazebo was moved from the old Fairgrounds to Lions Park adjacent to Cambridge Central School. The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) started the project and were soon joined by the Masons and the Order of the Eastern Star.

them were saved, as was the cupola.

Over the years, the gazebo has been maintained by contributions from the Lions Club, the American Legion, the Boy Scouts and others. In 1984 Lions Park was updated with picnic tables and benches to allow more people to enjoy the nightly concerts at the gazebo. The Cambridge Community Band, oldest in America, has performed at the gazebo since 1890.



In 2012 the gazebo was moved to Memorial Park to make room for the CCS expansion project.

Located in Memorial Park, adjacent to the Cambridge Public Library, the gazebo acts as a bandstand, a centerpiece to Christmas in Cambridge celebration, and as a comfortable place to sit in the shade and enjoy the park.

The gazebo is woven into our community, whether it's serving as a cornerstone of our Memorial Day ceremonies, as a learning room for our students or as a backdrop for the Lions Club annual Trees of Remembrance.

Unfortunately it has fallen into disrepair and is in desperate need of new flooring and sup-



ports, along with historically accurate lattice work, railings and roofing.
