Cabinet Business:

Secretary Report:

CS Barbara Bentley presented the cabinet meeting minutes from November 6, 2021. PDG James Griffith asked for a motion to accept the Secretary's Report.

• Elections Report:

PCC Mark Whitney was called to present the Elections Report and the results.

He reported that 87% of the delegates voted and there was a total of 122 ballots.

Results of the election: PDG Milledge Smith was invited to give his concession speech.

PDG John McDonald, who prevailed in the election, was invited to give his acceptance speech and was endorsed as the District 20W Candidate for International Director.

• District Governor's Report:

DG Michele thanked PDG Paula Flisnik, PDG Ed Stano, PCC Mark Whitney, CS Barbara Bentley, and CT Eric Unislawski for all of the work they put into the election leading up to the convention. In addition, she also thanked Sergeant of Arms Lion Holly McConchie and Lion Rita Ware.

The Multiple District Peace Essay Contest winner was from District 20W and they will be receiving a \$100 check from the district.

Reporting is much better for membership, but not so well with service reporting. If clubs need help reporting, they can reach out to Lion Holly McConchie.

Work is being done on our district by-laws that we will be voting on at the state convention.

The strategic plan survey will be going out in March to all of the Lions in the district.

Upcoming Dates:

March 11, 2022 - UN Day.

May 20-22 2022 - The State Convention will be in Niagara Falls. Some positions are still needed to be filled. PDG Lettie Saheim volunteered for Nominations and PDG Milledge Smith volunteered for Sergeant of Arms.

June 23-29, 2022 - The International Convention will be in Montreal.

March 20, 2022 – Next cabinet meeting at the Holiday Inn in Saratoga

June 17, 2022 – District Testimonial at the Van Patten Golf Course at 6:30pm and \$45 per person.

April 1, 2022 – NABA will be recognizing District 20W Lions as Volunteer of the Year at Franklin Plaza in Troy.

DG Michele presented Lion Karen Rager with the New Voices Certificate of Recognition for Marketing for all the hard work she has done with our district newsletter.

• Vice District Governor's Report:

VDG Ricky Laurin shared that time is the most valuable asset that we have.

His main goal continues to be to support the District Governor and her goals. Also, to gather as much information that he can from clubs, members and potential members. PDGs have been building a foundation for years and we will only survive through continuous improvement and listening to continuous feedback.

He encouraged everyone to take advantage of the Lions Learning Center.

We should always be looking for continuous improvement.

GLT Report:

PCC Mark Whitney reported that 20% of our members have held a club officer or district officer position. There are a large number in training programs.

GST Report:

PDG John McDonald spoke of Lions being Lions 24/7.

He reported that with regards to the diabetes grant, though the Polar Plunge was cancelled on January 1st, all the pledges raised were honored and \$1,040 was raised.

He encouraged all clubs to continue to support their local food pantries and remember that hunger doesn't end with the holidays.

Out of our 50 clubs in the district, 40 report on a regular basis. He will be working with Lion Holly to help those remaining 10 clubs. Reporting is important because it helps see the health of the district and also helps LCI show how we are serving.

• GMT Report:

PDG Ed Stano reported that we were at a +15 at the time of the last cabinet meeting and as of this morning we were at a -1.

He encouraged everyone to do whatever can be done to retain members in the club before they are dropped.

We need members to do service and need leaders to implement that service.

Why do members drop? They were not adequately oriented. PCC Mark Whitney and PDG Rick Brisee have been doing a great job working on orientation programs. If you bring in a new member, be sure to schedule a new member orientation.

Every club needs a membership chair.

Reminder that reporting is very important.

• LCIF Report:

PDG Paula Flisnik reported that Campaign 100 started three years ago and was extended a fourth year due to COVID. \$55 million is needed in 6 months to reach the goal of 300 million.

It is important that we all donate, even if it is \$1.00

Legacy is important and is one of the planned pledges that is available, with your will. If it is a Life Insurance policy, you need to send beneficiary info.

DG Michele encouraged all clubs to contribute to LCIF, no matter how small the amount may be.

Committee Reports:

• LEOS:

Lion Joe Wagner shared that on December 4th, there was a joint district service project with the Leos of District W and District Y with the service grant for hunger relief that the Multiple District received. The Utica area was chosen for the service project at the Utica Food Pantry. 300 bags of food were prepared. There were 15 Leos and 12-15 Lions there at the project.

• Diabetes:

Lion Barbara Bentley reported on the different activities that took place around the district in November for National Diabetes Awareness month. She continued to encourage everyone to use the LCI diabetes bookmarks and the brochure that the district did that has the pre-diabetes risk assessment test.

Childhood Cancer:

DG Michele shared that our District Childhood Cancer Chair, Lion Diane Lange, asked everyone to remember that February 13th was Childhood Cancer Awareness Day.

Hunger:

DG Michele shared that District Hunger Chair, Lion Bob Maxam, thanked everyone for their hunger projects.

DG Michele took a moment to recognize Lions that serve over 50 years, including Lion Doug Salisbury that was in attendance.

Alert Building:

IPDG Rick Brisee discussed the Alert Building and how it was designed to respond to disasters in NY State. However, because the devastation was so great in Kentucky, and they had the capabilities to respond, they did. The tornado hit on Thursday/Friday and on Monday IPDG Rick and PID Ed Cordes were on the road and arrived in KY on Tuesday.

They need to replace what was given to Kentucky, so all clubs are being asked and encouraged to donate to the Alert Foundation.

IPDG Rick shared a video that was put together by PID Ed Cordes with pictures he and IPDG Rick took in Kentucky.

LUNCH BREAK

Afghan Refugee Discussion: Led by DG Michele O'Hare (See attachment)

There are 223 refugees in Albany, NY. She has met with the Albany-Troy Lions looking to help.

DG Michele asked what our clubs within our district want to do. We could try to obtain a Humanitarian Grant from LCI. Or, we could sponsor those already in Albany because they have resources and there is already a task force in Albany for this need.

DG Michele asked that this information be brought back to our clubs to see what we can do as a district.

International President Doug Alexander was on the Zoom and also offered comments.

New Business:

DG Michele shared that that last new club that was formed was the Marcy Telephone Club in 2015.

Specialty Clubs:

PDG Paula Flisnik spoke about the Marcy Telephone Club that was initially formed as a primarily blind club and operated virtually. Today, they are seeking members that are blind or sighted. Anyone not able to attend "traditional" in person meetings are welcome. Past President Lion Bob Cronin stated, "We need a few kind hearts."

PDG Anthony Paradiso spoke about a specialty club that came about from a parent of a child with autism and formed a club by reaching out to fellow educators, parents and their support network.

VDG Ricky Laurin spoke about a specialty club that would be made up of veterans.

• Burnt Hills/Charlton:

PDG John McDonald shared how PCC Frank Blair had a vision. He saw a gap in the area in the community of Burnt Hills and Charlton. They have held a couple of informational meetings and have a potential club president identified and Lion Andrea Penamora will be their Guiding Lion.

Guilderland:

PDG Ed Stano met a woman that is head of the Veterans and Community Housing that lives in Altamont and used to be president of the Guilderland Chamber of Commerce. If anyone knows of anyone that lives in the Guilderland area, where they are looking to form a club, they are encouraged to reach out to PDG Ed Stano.

GMT Report

January 16, 2022

Afghan Resettlement Program

A Call to Action for Service Clubs



The United States has evacuated close to 100,000 Afghans at risk of violence and persecution, many because of their service to the U.S. mission in Afghanistan. Governor Jack Markell, White House Coordinator for Operation Allies Welcome, has requested civic organizations join the national effort to resettle these Afghan allies in communities across the United States. Lions Clubs International has accepted this invitation and has invited other service club organizations to join forces with us.

Afghan Placement and Assistance Program (APA)

The APA is an emergency program in response to U.S. evacuation efforts in Afghanistan. Through the APA program, eligible Afghans are entitled to receive support relocating from their temporary living situations on U.S. military bases to local communities. To quickly expand capacity to meet the current need for large-scale placement of these individuals, the Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration within the Department of State has enabled national resettlement agencies to partner with civic organizations.

The Role of Lions Clubs International

LCI has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Church World Service (CWS), one of nine national resettlement agencies. LCI will serve as an Institutional Co-Sponsor. In this role, LCI will recruit and train local Lions clubs to welcome an Afghan individual or family into their community. LCI will also provide ongoing support and oversight to the clubs during the initial placement period. LCI will be responsible for ensuring clubs maintain appropriate case files, and for financial and outcome reporting.

The Role of Lions Clubs

Individual Lions Clubs in the United States will have the opportunity to participate as Local Co-Sponsor Groups. Participating clubs will provide their new neighbors with reception services, housing available for at least 6-12 months post-placement, basic household items and furnishings, adequate food supplies, and seasonally appropriate clothing. They will assist with school enrollment for school-age children, transportation support, and provide a cultural orientation. They will also assist with enrollment in English language training, employment services, health services, and public benefits. They will also provide financial assistance with basic living expenses during the 90-day co-sponsorship period.

Program Funding

The APA provides a fixed per capita grant of US\$2,275 for each Afghan individual welcomed by a Local Co-Sponsor Group. Local Co-Sponsor Groups are encouraged, but not required, to raise an additional US\$2,000 for each individual they welcome. These funds provide for the immediate needs of the individuals and families, including the goods and services outlined above. Additional funding for Institutional and Local Co-Sponsors may be available through grants from the Welcome Fund (welcome.us/welcomefund-grants).
