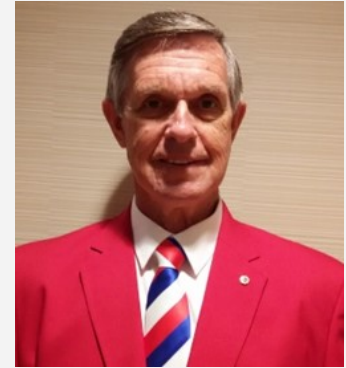

An Activity Guide for Lions Clubs

What Is Lions World Sight Day?

Lions World Sight Day (LWSD), which was created to recognize and reinforce the importance of eradicating preventable blindness, is held annually on the second Thursday of October. Lions clubs around the world are encouraged to participate by sponsoring local activities and programs, either on Lions World Sight Day or some time during October, to educate their communities about the need to conquer preventable blindness and preserve sight.

Why Should Your Club Participate?

The World Health Organization estimates that the number of blind people in the world could double in the next 25 years. To combat the leading causes of blindness and to assist in preserving vision, Lions clubs must take action.

Your club can join thousands of Lions in a global effort to educate the public about the importance of proper eye health care. Although Lions World Sight Day activities will be publicized on a global level, it is just as important to share this event's message with the people of your community. By publicizing your activities as part of a worldwide event, you will not only gain exposure for Lions World Sight Day, but also gain recognition for the programs that your club provides to your community.



5 Health Foods For Good Eyesight



Vitamin A



Carrot, mango, spinach packed with vitamin A prevent night blindness and age-related decline



Omega 3 Fatty Acids



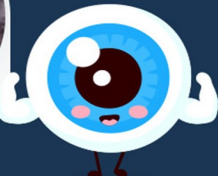
Walnuts, flaxseeds, salmon abundant in omega 3 acids lower the risk of high eye pressure and glaucoma



Citrus fruits



Oranges, lemons, sweet lime loaded with vitamin C reduce the risk of cataract and maintain eye health



Vitamin E



Almonds, avocado bestowed with vitamin E guards eye cells from free radical damage and boost vision



Zinc



Pumpkin seeds, chickpeas, cashews heaped zinc boosts eyesight and maintain the health of the retina



Eye Care Tips

We all know that eyes are very important for us but why do we tend to take them for granted.

We have been too busy taking care of our skin, hair, and other parts of our body but we have put aside eye care most of the time.



Following Tips Are Better For Eye Care

Enough Rest

Tip 1

Have you noticed that you get migraines from driving especially during the night when you encounter bright lights from other cars? I usually have them. Rest is one important role in taking care of your eyes.



Proper Diet

Fruits and vegetables are a great diet in taking care of your eyes. Usually yellow fruits and vegetables are the best ones.



Drink Lots of Water

Tip 3

The skin around our eyes is very thin and underneath it is full of blood vessels. Drinking lots of water can prevent puffiness around our eyes.



Eye Exercise

There is also some form of exercise for the eyes. Exercising your eyes can supply enough oxygen and can make them function much better. I even find these exercises relaxing.

Tip 5

Avoid Excessive Rubbing

Our eyes are one of the most sensitive parts of our body. The best thing you should do in taking care of your eyes is to avoid rubbing them.

WHITE CANE

History

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible.

In 1930, Lion George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. The Peoria Lions approved the idea, white canes were made and distributed, and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. News of the club's activity spread quickly to other Lions clubs throughout the United States, and their visually handicapped friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea by the blind and sighted alike quickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration among their sighted counterparts.

Also in 1931, in France, Guilly d'Herbemont recognized the danger to blind people in traffic and launched a national "white stick movement" for blind people. She donated 5,000 white canes to people in Paris.

Today white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US and in a few other countries, providing persons who are blind a legal status in traffic. The white cane universally acknowledges that the bearer is blind. For specific information contact your local government office for motor vehicles.

Lions and International White Cane Safety Day

International White Cane Safety Day is an opportunity to increase awareness about the white cane, which:

- Signifies that the pedestrian using it is blind or visually impaired;
- Alerts motorists of the need to exercise special caution and provide the user the right of way;
- Symbolizes the independence, confidence and skills of the person who is using it.

1964: the U.S. Congress approved a resolution authorizing the President of the US to annually issue a proclamation designating October 15th* as "National White Cane Safety Day."

1969: the International Federation of the Blind adopted October 15th* as "International White Cane Safety Day."

** The above referenced date is a suggested date. Lions clubs are free to hold awareness events according to the schedule of the club and the community it serves.*

Blindness Etiquette

When you Meet a Person Who is Blind

- Treat a person who is blind the same as you would anyone else. They do the same things as you do, but may use different techniques.
- Speak in a normal tone of voice. Blindness doesn't equal hearing loss.
- Talk directly to a person who is blind, not to their companion. Loss of sight is not loss of intellect.
- When entering a room, identify yourself; when exiting, be sure to mention that you are leaving. Address the person by name so they will know you are speaking to them.
- If you leave a person who is blind alone in an unfamiliar area, make sure it is near something they can touch—a wall, table, rail, etc.
- Being left out in empty space can be very uncomfortable.
- Be sure to give useful directions. Phrases such as “across the street” and “left at the next corner” are more helpful than vague descriptions like “over there.”
- Don't worry about using common, everyday words and phrases like “look,” “see,” or “watching TV” around a person who is blind.
- If a person looks as though they may need assistance, ask.
- Pulling or steering a person who is blind is awkward and confusing — it's really not helpful. Avoid grabbing their arm, and please don't touch or steer a guide dog's harness.
- Ask, “Would you like me to guide you?” Offering your elbow is an effective and dignified way to lead someone who is blind. Do not be afraid to identify yourself as an inexperienced human guide and ask for tips on how to improve.
- Be considerate. If you notice a spot or stain on a person's clothing, tell them privately (just as you would like to be told).
- In a restaurant, give clear directions to available seats. Your offer to read the menu aloud may be appreciated, but you shouldn't assume the person would not want to order their own food.
- When the food arrives, ask if the person would like to know what is on their plate. You can describe the location of food items by using clock positions: “Your coffee is at 3 o'clock”; “The sugar is at 1 o'clock.”
- Leave doors all the way open or all the way closed — half-open doors or cupboards are dangerous. Don't rearrange furniture or personal belongings without letting the person know.
- Be sensitive when questioning someone about their blindness. This is personal information and boundaries should be respected.

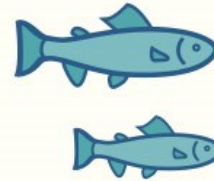

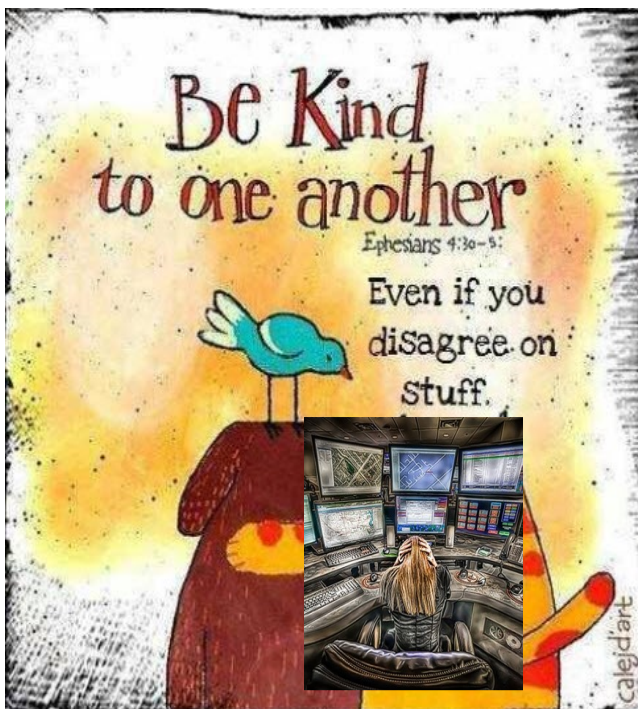

DISTRICT 26-M1 IMPORTANT LIONS CLUB DATES

1. Semi-annual Lions Club International dues billed by July 10, 2021, and must be paid by August 30, 2021.
2. Semi-annual District & State Lions Club dues billed by August 15, 2021, and must be paid by September 15, 2021.
3. Semi-annual Lions Club International dues billed by January 10, 2022, and must be paid by February 18, 2022.
4. Semi-annual District & State Lions Club dues billed February 1, 2022, and must be paid by March 1, 2022.
5. Lions Club officer Nominating Committee selected by March 15, 2022.*
6. Local club officer elections **Must** be held by April 30, 2022.
7. Newly elected club officers for 2022-2023 **Must** be entered into My Lion/ My LCI before the deadline from Lions Club International, May 15, 2022.

Information must be re-entered in My Lion/MyLCI even if there are no changes.

My Lion/MyLCI will lock all club officers out of the system if you do not complete your officer information for the next year by June 30, 2022. Getting re-authorized is time consuming. So please do it before the deadline.
