The District 27-E2 goal for donations in 2023-2024 to the LEBW is \$12,000, the same amount as the last Lion year.

The LEBW and Lions Gift of Sight (Minnesota) have started a partnership where they send their recovery technicians to recover corneal tissue in northwestern/western Wisconsin. We have seen a slight increase in the number of transports and expect that this may increase in the future.





Dear Lions Council of Governors Friends,

Here are some of our Restoring Hope Transplant House updates that we wanted to share. Blessings to you all for a wonderful new year. Thanks for all you do!

- We were honored to welcome the new Wisconsin Lions leadership group to RHTH this August. Exciting to meet so many new people and old friends and share the house and so many of our inspirational stories with such a supportive group of people. State Lions are in great hands with this compassionate group leading the way!
- Beaver Dam Lions Club Member Dawn Lyons-Wood stopped at RHTH this month with an \$8,000 donation to the house from the Emily C. Lyons annual golf event that celebrates the life of her daughter Emily who went on to save several lives as an organ donor in her tragic passing. Such an honor to included in such a special event held by a truly incredible Lions Club family.
- We have been invited to speak at a Lions Club 60 year celebration up in Door County this month along with Peter and Joann Cerniglia. It is a great honor to celebrate with such a dedicated club especially having been a Door County resident for so many years.
- We are proud to continue collecting eye glasses and plastic bags for Lions from the collections of our guests and the house. Great cause!
- We are grateful for the increased communication with Lions and Clubs
 wanting to tour RHTH. Lions groups always seem surprised at the
 welcoming nature and warmth of the house when they visit in person
 compared to thinking of RHTH more as a boarding house. Tours really do
 make a big difference to truly understand our story.
- We hope to do a better job of conveying the home-like environment of the house to others who are unable to make it here in person. From working

- on a video possibly to capturing more of the house in photographic displays, our Lions visitors always seem to understand the benefits of the house more than ever when they come for the experience in person.
- In recent weeks, we have hosted multiple families with Lions connections including one lady here 6 weeks following a double lung transplant whose dad was an active member of the Junction City Lions for 50 years and made deliveries for the Lions Eye Bank for 30 years. We had her tour the Eye Bank while in town to see her dads name listed for his years of faithful service.
- We recently sent a dear friend and guest back home to DePere following 9 plus months of staying at RHTH. During her boyfriends stint in the hospital, he had 8 drains in to fight infection which they said tied the record for the most drains they have ever used in a person. It was a painfully slow recovery, but we finally sent her home this past month. I can't even imagine the even greater financial and mental burdens this young woman would have endured if not for the community minded spirit of this house who helped her through it. When you think...why should our club support a house that doesn't directly serve our community, stories like Laura's and so many others who are your neighbors really make it all hit home. What we do collectively to make this house available to families in need really is lifechanging for so many people from all of our communities!
- In our last report we mentioned the likelihood of raising our nightly rates. With so many extreme cases of lengthy stays and financial burdens, we felt that our rate increase would be better to implement at the start of 2024. We continue to charge just \$45 per night...a fraction of the cost of all area hotels.
- We plan on putting RHTH ads in all Lions Club convention booklets this year
 as well as a table display to share more of our house and guest stories. We
 are grateful for opportunities to share our mission for 5-10 minutes in
 person or virtually. It helps us serve our families better and give our Lions
 an even better understanding of the importance of this house for our entire
 state and beyond.
- We are more and more connected to UW Health than ever before. We continue to work behind the scenes to build relationships and find ways to add value to our mutual partnership. Medical teams and specialized

- departments come for regular tours to RHTH just as our Lions do. Those meetings are invaluable for improving total family care.
- We are hoping to plan an RHTH Family Reunion in 2024 that would include families, volunteers, supporters and donors.
- Construction and expansion are still in the works behind the scenes as is fundraising earmarked specifically for that purpose. Additional cost savings measures are also in regular conversations.
- The last several months have been extremely busy with huge increases to normal post covid levels and having to turn families away sadly.
- There is a massive shortage of blood that so many of our patients require.
 Please consider giving blood whenever able at any nearby blood drives. It makes such a huge difference to those in critical need!
- Please know how much we all appreciate you all and wish you the very best in your service to Lions this coming year. As a Lions myself, I know how great of an honor this is for you all to be a part of. Congratulations and best wishes!



WISCONSIN LIONS FOUNDATION VISION SCREENING TRAIN THE TRAINER GUIDELINES

I. TRAIN THE TRAINER SELECTION

- A. The Vision Screening Chairperson is responsible for selecting the appropriate individual(s) within their District.
- B. Vision Screening Chairperson will set up and guide the Trainee through the training process to become a Certified Vision Screening Trainer.

II. TRAIN THE TRAINER REQUIREMENTS

- A. Trainee must demonstrate abilities to host training sessions, teach others, and have a thorough understanding of the Vision Screening Machine.
- B. Trainee must attend a Lions Vision Screening Training session.
- C. Trainee must complete the Lions KidSight USA Training Program and obtain certification.
- D. Once certified, the trainer must renew their Lions KidSight USA Certification every five years.
- E. Newly certified trainers will partner with an experienced trainer to conduct their first training session. The District Vision Screening Chair should be present to ensure the trainer is ready to conduct a training session on their own.

III. TRAINERS RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Ensure screeners can operate vision screening machine efficiently and accurately.
- B. Maintain availability to Vision Screeners within their District for questions that may arise.
- C. Maintain partnership with their District Vision Screening Chairperson regarding training sessions.

**Vision Screening Chairperson should submit new trainer names, contact information, and training certification dates to the WLF for data retention.

One Week - One Camp - One World

The Wisconsin Lions Youth Exchange 2023 summer exchange program wrapped up in August after hosting 30 foreign students from around the world at various locations around the state. We opened our homes to students from:

Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, Israel, Italy, Mongolia, Nicaragua,
 Poland, Romania, Spain, The Netherlands, Tunisia and Turkey!

Evaluations were obtained from the campers, staff and host families. The overall comments regarding the camp, staff and program were very positive! The committee met in September to recap the 2023 camp, go over camper/staff/host family observations and start the process/changes to the 2024 program & camp, based on the evaluations submitted.

The 2024 Camp dates are August 11-August 18 and we are shooting for 35 youth ages 17-20 for the Wisconsin program.

CALL TO ACTION: WE NEED

HOST FAMILIES: I would like to see our District 27E2 accept 4 (four) foreign students for the 2024 July-August time frame. Host families can hand pick their student, based on country desired or hobbies of the student, once the applications start coming arriving late November/December. Host families can choose the time period they'd like to host, ie the entire 4-5 weeks OR split that period with another nearby family for a different experience, keeping in mind they will be gone for a week at our camp.

OUTGOING YOUTH: A youth from your club that would like to experience a Lions exchange program in a different country.

CAMP COUNSELORS/STAFF: Someone from your club (over the age of 20) that would like to spend a week, food & lodging provided, at Camp Vista in August (see dates above) as a Camp Counselor or staff member, overseeing the fun, games, & food at camp with a group of extraordinary youth. (a cultural experience itself!)

We ask that you go back to your clubs, discuss and consider the needs above. Don't forget, it's a great service project!
