

I also thank everyone who attended the social on Saturday and or the Convention on Sunday.

On October 23^{rd,} we had our district full cabinet meeting and finalized the convention programs and the district social on 11/4 & 11/5/17. Thanks to Haverstraw Hispanic Lions club for hosting the cabinet meeting. The Zone and the Guiding Lions should submit the first quarterly report due in October to LCI and to the District Governor.

On October 27th-28th we had the 2nd MD 20 council meeting in Binghamton, NY. The council has selected PDG Ed Stano to be the MD 20 GMT coordinator. The GMTs are there to help our clubs and District with any membership related issues. These people will also be following up on membership reporting and retention of members. The council also appointed Diabetes chair PDG Liz Walker and Reading action chair VDG Marianne Treamaroli.

As the holiday celebrations begin and our 2nd quarter comes to a close, let us concentrate on our other important areas such as leadership, membership and service. Our district must grow more Leaders to lead the district. As you know our 1st Vice District Governor position is still vacant. We desperately need more Lions to come forward and take leadership positions within our district. I congratulate Lion Jack Ciaramella who attended the MD-20 Lions Leadership School in October at the Double Tree Hotel in Binghamton. I also congratulate PDG Dennis Hardy one of the two coordinators of the Institute. This program is very educational and productive. I hope that more Lions from our District 20-R1 go to this excellent leadership program. Please contact our District GLT PDG Michael Bryceland for help with leadership and training activities of clubs within the district. This includes online training for the new club officers and the Guiding Lions.

Our District has to reach the minimum required membership of 1250 for our district. It is encouraging to note that most of the clubs are working very hard towards this goal and bringing in new members. During my club visits I was honored to induct new members in many clubs. My sincere thanks to the clubs who believe in *the power of we*. While that is encouraging we are facing a membership retention problem. Our membership as of July 1st, 2017 was 1,068 members. We are now at 1,063 members. We have added 50 new members, but we have dropped 52 members and lost 3 members due to death. Also, it is sad to see that, three new clubs chartered just over a year ago dropped 44 of their members during the last 12 months. I asked our GMT Barbara Chuck and Zone chairs and the Guiding Lions of the new clubs to work closely and help those clubs who have faced the membership drop. PCC Angelo and IPDG Dina are working on rebuilding two additional diminishing clubs. We need to work together and harder to bring in new members and more importantly retain the current members to be a stronger district.

Our District is heavily involved in various Service Projects. Please continue to support and help the many hurricane victims and other natural disaster victims. Thank you, clubs and Lions, for your help. This year each District and clubs should have a Service coordinator. PCC Angelo is our District's Global Service Team Coordinator. If your club does not have a Service coordinator please elect one soon. I have visited more than half of our clubs by this time. At every meeting, I hear of the service projects that clubs are doing, but when I review reports on MyLCI, the projects are not being reported. Many clubs have done a Centennial project. Your new club service chairperson or Secretary of your club must report it to LCI. If you do not know how, please call and we will help you. Also, please send the news to me and the newsletter editor for publishing in the website and Newsletter. If you have inducted new members please send their details and a photo for publishing in the newsletter.

1. ID Ardie Klemish (Iowa) and her Partner in Service, PDG Ken Klemish arrived on Thursday, November 2nd.

2. On Friday, November 3rd, ID Ardie and PDG Ken accompanied by DG Mathai Chacko and Lion Usha were given a guided tour of West Point. That evening they attended a welcome dinner at Rini's Restaurant in Elmsford. Attending the dinner were: DG Mathai and Lion Usha Chacko, PCC Angelo and Lion Ellen Purcigliotti, CS Giuseppe Coco and Lion Krista, CT PDG Dennis Hardy, IPDG Dina Ciaramella, PDG Maybelle Twohie and PDG Karl Wallburg.

3. On Saturday, November 4th ID Ardie and PDG Ken visited the new \$9.4 million dollar Vocational Rehabilitation Center (VRC) at Visions/VCB in New Hempstead, Rockland County. The visit was hosted by PDG Maybelle Twohie. In the afternoon they visited Guiding Eyes for the Blind (GEB) in Yorktown. The visit was hosted by PDG Ed Klotz and PCC Angelo Purcigliotti.

4. That evening, 40 Lions attended the first District Social held at the La Quinta Inn in Armonk. Wine, sandwiches, wraps, crudités were served. The charge was only \$10 per person. ZC Carole Hoerter made all the food arrangements and the wine was provided by PCC Angelo. Each Lion introduced themselves and briefly described what their clubs were doing. The Cold Spring Lions presented 5 MJF awards and Bedford Village presented two. VDG Carl assisted by ID Ardie and Bedford Hills President, Bob Collins led the group in Lion's Celebrity Jeopardy. It was a fun evening and everyone agreed that we should do it again next year.

5. On Sunday, November 5th we held our District Convention at the Double Tree in Tarrytown. This year's Convention was dedicated to PDG Dick Mac Fadden and PDG Ray Icobelli both Blauvelt Lions. Highlights included our annual Memorial Service honoring our deceased Lions, a special Leo Program, 30 exhibitors, 4 workshops, a 30 prize raffle and a "Dining in the Dark" experience assisted by 10 members of the Westchester Council for the Blind. We were entertained by blind musician, Milton Koja and heard from two great speakers, Mary Mc Loughlin (Diabetes Awareness), and Motivational Speaker, Cheryl Mc Neil Fisher who was also blind.

6. The high point of the Convention was a moving and inspirational address by our visiting ID Ardie Klemish. DG Mathai reported on the State of the District and presented a PMJF to PDG Maybelle Twohie and a MJF to Bedford Hills President Bob Collins.
7. DG Mathai has sent thank you letters to all 30 exhibitors, 5 seminar presenters, 22 Club Presidents, our blind musician and two speakers! He is also sending thank you letters to the 30 groups and individuals who donated gifts to our raffle.

SOMERS LEOS TAKE THE PLUNGE Raise over \$25,000 for Special Olympics of NY



In an astounding show of support, Somers Leos took out all the stops for the Special Olympics Westchester Polar Plunge Fundraiser on Saturday November 18, 2017, with a team of 71 members. About 36 Somers Leos jumped in the water to support the Polar Plunge and although the temperature outside was about 47⁰f, the Leos ran into the freezing cold water at Glen Island Park, NY.

Special Olympics New York has 68,547 athletes training and competing year-round in 22 Olympics-style



sports. Athletes and their families or caregivers are NEVER CHARGED to participate! It costs \$400 to support training and competition for one athlete for one sports season. The Somers Leos achievement means they were able to sponsor just over 62 athletes for an entire season!

Somers Leo coordinators Paul LaSpina and Tracy Reimann were on hand to cheer on the team and Lion Paul even took the plunge himself! "The enthusiasm and accomplish-

ment of the Leos was so inspiring I wanted to help them celebrate their success" said Lion Paul, President of the Somers club.

There were a total of 20 Teams that entered the Westchester event. The Somers Leos took the top prize for most funds raised by a public school generating just over \$25,000 for Special Olympics.

Lion Paul said the idea to participate came about after discussing it with his son. Brandon thought it would be a great idea to entice our high school to join the party and not make this a LEO only event, and off we went with outstanding results. We originally set a goal of \$6k since we were first timers. As you can see that guickly

turned into over \$25,000! One of our LEOs has a brother who is a Special Athlete and he led us into the water.

VISIONS services for the blind and visually impaired

On a beautiful mid-summer afternoon on August 6, with nearly 200 people in attendance, VISIONS Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired proudly launched the brand new VI-SIONS Vocational Rehabilitation Center program with a Grand Opening Ribbon Cutting Ceremony.

VISIONS short-term, residential Vocational Rehabilitation Center is the first and only VRC in New York State for blind youth that offers intensive, pre-employment training consistent with new federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) requirements for students with disabilities in transition from school to work.

The new VRC, on the 37-acre campus of VISIONS Center on Blindness/VCB, enables blind New Yorkers to remain in the state for training, reducing costs for out of state travel and training. The NYS Commission for the Blind (NYSCB), part of the NYS Office of Children and Family Services is a strong supporter of the VRC project. Training, room and board costs are primarily funded by VISIONS contract with NYSCB. There is no cost to the blind students or their families.

Nancy Tate Jones, President of the Board of Directors of VISIONS said, "I would like to thank the Trustees of VISIONS Fund for the Blind that contributed over \$4 million to the VRC project and Governor Andrew Cuomo and the state of New York that provided a \$1 million grant from the Nonprofit Infrastructure Capital Investment Program. The Barker Welfare Fund and Lions Clubs International Foundation also made substantial grants to the project. My colleagues on the Board, Burton and Harriet Strauss, Jr., along with 100% of VISIONS board members have contributed to the successful capital campaign."

VISIONS Executive Director and CEO Nancy D. Miller said, "The grand opening of the new VRC is the culmination of years of planning to create a training program for blind youth in New York State. The VRC graduates will be 'job-ready' candidates for employers. The VRC has 32 beds and accommodates blind trainees with dog guides, blind wheelchair users and those with varied health conditions including diabetes."

The first class of students attended and completed their one-month VRC training in August and a new class of 14 blind students who started on September 5, 2017 is currently in session. The students are all age 18 to 21 years old. They are enrolled in vocational training classes and internships at Rockland County BOCES or SUNY Rockland Community College. Most of the students will be certified as nursing assistants or teaching assistants or will complete community college classes that will allow them to transfer to a 4-year college by January 2018.

One student, Darius, is thoroughly enjoying his work experience internship assisting the chef at the Center while taking college classes. Another student Samantha is immersed in taking courses on line. John, a long distance runner, understands the commitment required by enrolling in this 100-day intensive program. But he shared that his limited work experience prior to the VRC will not get him the kind of career he is seeking. He is looking forward to graduating from the VRC program in January and getting a well paying job.



YOUNG ADULTS WITH VISION LOSS WANT TO BE EMPLOYED

Join VISIONS in our mission to help young adults with vision loss begin to identify occupational interests and develop an action plan for reaching their career goals. Our students are looking to overcome barriers to succeed in vocational training and job placement. VISIONS vocational rehabilitation center (VRC) is a newly built 16,000 square foot, two-story wheelchair accessible building designed specifically for residential programs for youth and adults with vision loss. Located on the 37-acre campus of VISIONS Center on Blindness (VCB) in Rockland County, NY, the VRC offers a state of the art technology and computer center, experienced, and a caring supportive program staff, all with high expectations for the students.



Students from VISIONS are seeking employer partners in Rockland County to host workplace tours, allow job shadowing and/or short term work experiences (2-3 months part-time) of their work-places so that students can be exposed to potential careers and jobs, build occupational knowledge, learn about the education and training needed for entry in the industry, observe adults in a work-place environment, and foster an understanding of the business's workforce and its contributions to the community.

Workplace tours are a big part of work-based learning opportunities designed to help students gain experience and insight into real-world careers. Work place tours typically last from a couple of hours to half a day; a workplace tour is a modest investment of time that may make a real difference in the students' future education and career choices.

Job shadowing in the community provides students with realistic views of a specific job, observe employees on the job, have a valuable mentoring opportunity and allows students time to ask questions.

Short term work experiences a work based learning experience is a structured, time-limited, career preparation activity in which students are placed at a workplace for a defined period of time to participate in and observe work first hand within a given industry. Internships provide students the opportunity to learn by doing real work and being productively engaged in the workplace.

VISIONS is happy to work with employers to plan a workplace tour, a Job shadowing opportunity or short term work experiences (2-3 months part-time) that will be convenient for you, your employees and of great benefit to our students.

If you are unable to host a tour, give a Job shadowing opportunity or a short term work experience (2-3 months part-time) we are also looking for guest speakers.
