Fellow Lions,

In July, I had the greatest experience attending the 100th Annual Lions Convention in Chicago and representing my Club and District. The Convention opened with the Lions parade through the streets of Chicago and I had the pleasure of marching with the New York delegation of several hundred members, then turning around and watching the rest of the parade, which lasted four hours. Our District delegation was led by PID Dr. Jack Weber, who is 93 years young and included another dozen or so Lions from our district, a good showing for a small district like 20 R-1.

There were many Lions, some in costume and some in traditional native outfits, but no tigers or bears, oh my. There was a 10 foot Snowman courtesy of the Minnesota delegation and a 30 foot Kangaroo, the mascot of the Australia delegation and several dragons courtesy of the Chinese delegation.

The convention formally opened on Day 2 with reports from IP Chancellor Bob Corlew and keynote address by another well-known Tennessean, former Vice President Al Gore, who spoke about the environment. The session concluded with the nomination of PID Judge Haynes Townsend to be the next third Vice President of LCI.

At the second plenary session, IP Chancellor Bob Corlew reported on the Centennial Challenge - to provide 100 million service projects between 2014 and 2018. At present, 166,294,784 service projects have been recorded, it is wonderful to report that we have exceeded our goal possibly reach 200 million service projects, when the challenge ends next year in Las Vegas. I also had the pleasure of meeting 2nd Vice Presi-

dent Gudrun Bjort Yngvadottir, who will be elected the first female President of LCI in Las Vegas.

The final session began with yet another son of Tennessee, Charlie Daniels, and his band who played tunes consistent with it being the Fourth of July. IP Corlew then swore in his successor as International President Lion Naresh Aggarwal who presented his goals for the new Lions year. IP Aggarwal swore in the new International Vice Presidents, International Directors and District Governors including our own DG Mathai Chacko. The convention adjourned until July 2018 in Las Vegas.

When I became a new member 43 years ago, I suddenly felt as if I had left my hometown and become a man of the world. This year, I want every member to download our new mobile app. This will connect all our members on one global platform.

The next stage is beginning to serve. As a member of the Batala Smile Lions Club in Punjab, India, I was proud of how the community began to respect me. This respect depended on the number of people I served and how many people were aware of this service. We now have a new Global Service Team. Your District GST leader will identify projects that serve the maximum number of people per dollar and per hour. They will also train Lions on how to convert a normal project into a Legacy Project via Lions branding and public relations.

The third stage is aspiring for leadership. While I enjoyed rising up the Lions' ladder, I sometimes wished that our leaders focused more on work than on long speeches. A new awards system will incentivize the efforts of Lion leaders in the right direction. We plan to reward retention of members, hence keeping the focus on you—our existing members. New awards will also be given for involving over half the club in service and for creating the most Legacy projects.

As a global leader of Lionism, I want to keep every Lion connected to Lionism. Our new Welcome Home program is an international online club for members unable to attend club meetings. Meetings and fee payments are conducted entirely online.

The last stage is now. I want to give every Lion the same goal for the next 12 months. My dream is that every Lion will serve 10 people each month. If this happens, we will serve 170 million people this year— a big increase from our current level of 100 million and a big step toward our goal of serving 200 million annually by 2020. This is the focus of all my meetings around the world.



During my first year as a member of the Rocky Hill Lions Club – 23B Connecticut, I encountered and faced that question. From working carnivals and ice cream socials, helping Santa give out pencils, and smelling like cotton candy for days, I would be able to take on the club tasks, but continue to wrestle with the question.

The answer for me came several months later, at a regular meeting night – and involves gumballs.

The Rocky Hill Club received royalties from a candy distributor, who maintained candy and gumball machines – with Lion emblazoned gumballs, throughout greater Hartford. Every quarter, they would send the royalty check, payable to the Rocky Hill Lions, to Lion Bert's address. Lion Bert was a 23 year Lion, and well into his eighties. While the royalty checks rarely exceeded \$15 or \$20, Bert handled this Committee assignment with great dedication and enthusiasm.

At every meeting, Bert would get up during the new business portion, and talk exuberantly about gumballs -- how he had seen full (or empty) machines at various drug stores, groceries, and news-stands, and how he was expecting the next royalty check, which he would bring to the next meeting.

One night, Bert became especially gregarious, and proceeded to talk for thirty (30) minutes about gumballs and all manner therein.

I, and others, looked pleadingly at our President Gene, who allowed Bert to complete his full report without interruption.

After the meeting, President Gene sought me out. "Bert is a long, long time Lion," Gene began. "He was widowed ten years ago. He has had a hard time giving up driving. His two daughters live in neighboring towns, and between them manage to handle his daily errands, so that he is able to stay in his house."

"Bert has slowed down considerably, but he is very proud to chair the gumball committee (one member). It allows him to contribute. It gives him hope."

For me, the answer to the question -- What do Lions do (?) -- is very simple.

I am hoping to see a club step forward and host next year's district and regional gathering. We at Cold Spring Lions will gladly offer what ever help/ suggestions we can, to help ensure your success.

*Lion Ted from Cold Spring spoke about the ways we raise money. The annual Pig Roast (very profitable), the beer tent at Cold Spring Fourth Of July parade/ fireworks on the Hudson, and our Discount coupon (a plastic card / like a credit card, listing restaurants and town places that offer discounts with purchase, such as 10% off meal, or free drink, etc) Our community volunteer service includes scholarships for students going to college, Hudson River clean up, spring roadside clean up, free Shredder Day for all tax and personal documents, and donations to local food pantry.

*Lion Ray from Westchester Pride spoke about various raffles being their effective way of raising money. And he described some of the great community outreach through teaching life skills to homeless youth, Children's Village for LGBT community, Anti bullying efforts, and holiday outreach with Toys for Tots.

*Henry Hudson - Lion Tana shared their emphasis for growing membership. The Psychic Fair which has grown exponentially is a great example. And held in a Church... What a unique and popular idea!! Also a themed Comedy&Dinner show, and a Clambake in the springtime to get new people interested while raising funds.

*Croton Lion Mary Ann, discussed hosting an entire community picnic as an outreach. Also Wine Tasting at the Yacht club. Croton also sells Christmas trees which is great, but requires a lot of dedicated physical work. They have an annual crawfish boil also at the Yacht club, a booth at the area's famed Summer Fair, providing gifts for kids, info, and recruiting new members.

*Mt. Kisco Lion Victor spoke about a Downtown Thunder event... bikers who pay a fee to participate. One thing I know, guys and gals with Harleys are well heeled and care deeply about good causes. He also spoke about their Spring Boutique, hosting various vendors, arts and crafts, w/ music. Held at the Boy's and Girl's club in Mt. Kisco. Another fundraiser is an annual dinner, with yummy foods provided / donated by local restaurants.
