Snyder Lions Club began in 1924


Snyder Lions Club was founded in 1922 but only lasted a few months due to lack of interest. The club disbanded and it took a couple of years to gather enough interest to charter another club.

Our records indicate the Snyder Lions Club was chartered again on August 19, 1924 by the Lamesa Lions Club. There were almost thirty charter members.

Throughout the years, the Snyder Lions Club has worked in the community to support growth and to promote fellowship. Projects completed by the Snyder Lions Club will span generations to come.

Now, looking back more than 92 years we see there have been many Lions that dedicated themselves to the motto "WE SERVE."

Notables like PDG "Mac" McCown (The Little General), PDG Max Von Roeder, PDG Howard Harrington, and PDG Jene Steakley



have served and lead District 2-T2 with pride and respect.

There are 78 members, who tackle project after project with enthusiasm and pride. Lion Melissa and I are proud to be Snyder Lions members.

Club marks 65 years of service to young people in 2016

The Lubbock South Plains Lions Club was chartered in May 1951. That same year, the club voted to sponsor a Lubbock Boys Club.

That commitment to support



what today is the Lubbock Boys and Girls Clubs has lasted more than 65 years!

Early funding for this project was dedicated to the construction of a club to serve the northeast part of Lubbock.

Operation of a Boys Club in the northeastern part of the city began

in a temporary facility in 1954 and construction of the new facility was completed in 1957.

In honor of the dedicated and inspirational leadership of its early director, this facility was named for Lion Theodore "Ted" Phea in 1988.

The South Plains Lions have used a wide range of fundraisers over its history to fund its support of the Boys Club.

This included selling Christmas trees; parking cars and operating concessions for Tech football games; producing minstrel shows, circuses, Ice Capades, and football games; holding annual rose sales; and dedicating funds from bingo operations.

This funding has grown from \$2,346 in 1954 to an annual commitment of more than \$30,000.

In addition to financial support, the Lions have invested a tremendous amount of "sweat equity" into the club over the years by holding work days to install equipment, make repairs and modernize the facility, and to paint both the interior and exterior.

The latest addition to the facility is a \$76,000 pavilion.

This project was initiated by Lion Boss Jamie Reynolds in 2010, constructed under Lion Boss Tom Vermillion in 2011, and completed under Lion Boss Vance Gipson in 2012.

The pavilion was dedicated to

Lion Bill Cox for his outstanding contributions to its completion.

The South Plains Lions Club is proud of its commitment to the Lubbock Boys and Girls Club and looks forward to many more years of service.

It's not too late to plan your club's Legacy Project

District Governor Jim Petty asked me to write about Legacy Projects around our district.

This caused me to think of several questions: Why do we serve? Who are we? What was our original



purpose? What is our value? And what is the meaning of Lionism?

2016-2017 is the 100th Anniversary of Lions Clubs International.

2nd Vice District Governor Terry Hawkins Our President, Bob Corlew, is challenging clubs all over the world to engage in and create a Legacy Project.

He defined Legacy Projects as a "visible gift to our community that commemorates the Lions Centennial, which creates a lasting legacy of our service contributions."

President Corlew suggested three ways to achieve this goal:

#1: Raise your Community Visibility by posting Lions signs on highways, donating a park bench, a statue, or a fountain in a local park.

#2: Provide a Community Gift by refurbishing a park or playground, building a footbridge over a busy road, funding resources for the visually impaired, or donating a vehicle to a community organization.

#3: Make a Community Impact by building a clinic, expanding a library or school, or developing a training center or equipping an area hospital.

So what have other clubs done so far?

The first person I go to gather information is my best buddy, Past International President "Ebb" Grindstaff.

Not only could he tell me about Legacy Projects, he told me that his Ballinger Club had already completed its project.



Ballinger Lions Clubs Legacy Project

Members of the Ballinger Lions Club and the Ballinger Breakfast Lions Club created this outdoor area for the enjoyment of town residents. The project also commemorates the 100th anniversary of the founding of Lions Clubs International as noted in the plaque below.

He originally owned the lot on Main Street Ballinger next door to his law practice.

Years ago, he deeded it to the City of Ballinger with the proviso that the city commemorate Lions in some way when it determined how to utilize the property.

After several years of not doing anything with the property, the City deeded it back to Grindstaff. He passed on an opportunity to sell the property and deeded the property to the Ballinger Lions Club.

When the Centennial Legacy opportunity presented itself, the Ballinger Lions Club decided to make this area an attractive outdoor meeting place.

The Ballinger Lions Club planted seed money of \$5,000 and opened the opportunity to other Ballinger entities and individuals to donate funds to complete the small park/ meeting place.

The place backs up to the City's "Pioneer Plaza." So naturally, the



idea grew, and the community and its members helped to raise funds.

The end result is a lovely outdoor meeting place with Lions signs and plaques commemorating Lions Centennial by the Ballinger Lions

Club. The location was so attractive that the City of Ballinger improved the Pioneer Park site. Now city residents can enjoy the tranquil space and be reminded of the importance of the local Lions Club to communities and families.

A little closer to home, the Lubbock Lions Club also has intentions for its Legacy Project.

For many years, we have designated a Saturday each month to prepare meals at the Salvation Army. That project had experienced various changes in necessity and staffing. In the end, the project had run its course.

South Plains Food Bank Executive Director David Weaver spoke to our club, as he has yearly for many, many years.

Over the years, several of us had mentioned to him that he should be a member of our club; however, not one of us followed through. I finally asked him to join our club and he said, "yes, I thought you'd never ask!" (Goes to show you: sometimes you just have to ask and follow through!)

Now, our Lion Boss Mike Massengale and the Board of Directors are working with David Weaver and his staff to identify and formulate volunteer opportunities for our Lions Club members to work on a regular basis to provide necessary services to the Food Bank.

As you know the South Plains Food Bank has been a permanent and vital backdrop to our community for as long as anyone can remember. It is a Legacy in its own right. Even though, this relationship between our club and the Food Bank has been historic, the Food Bank's needs have changed significantly.

Recently, the Food Bank has been the fortunate beneficiary of a grand, capital donation which made it possible to build an entirely new facility. As always, it continues to desperately need food donations. Now, more than ever before, the Food Bank needs the volunteers necessary to take in such donated foods, pack them and distribute them to the less fortunate. That is where Lubbock Lions will fulfill its Legacy. The volunteer services not only provide the service to the Food Bank, it provides the Lion members time together, time working together toward the same goal: to serve. The Perfect Legacy Project.

Special guests were MD-2 Texas Lions Council Chairman Ernesto (T.J.) Tijerina and Lion Juanita of San Antonio.






