From the Governor : There's still time for a Lions Club Legacy Project!

Lions Clubs International has strongly urged all local clubs to initiate and develop Community Legacy Projects during the Centennial Celebration.

You may have questioned the rationale for this effort and the potential financial costs that undertaking such a project



would entail. There were several reasons for encoura-

reasons for encouraging these projects. First and perhaps foremost is the fact

that in a very visible manner, these projects emphasize the history of Lions' service to the community.

District Governor Vance Gipson community. Second, these projects signify the continuing commitment of local Lions Clubs to serve their community.

Third, the visibility of these projects is an outstanding way to advertise and attract new Lions who wish to serve others.

As you consider undertaking and financing a Legacy Project, the point that should be emphasized is that any decisions rest with your local club.

Lions Clubs International has provided three levels of Legacy Projects with increasing levels of size and impact.

Clubs should choose the level that is right for their club and community--but certainly should not feel restrained by those guidelines.

The suggested levels are as follows:

• Raise your club's community visibility by donating a public item, such as a park bench, bike rack, or a new club meeting information sign at your city limits.

• Provide a community gift with a larger contribution -- such as refurbishing a park, establishing a community garden, or providing medical equipment.

• Make a major community impact by building a clinic, school, library, or eye hospital.

As you can easily see, the options have

no limits! Your club has total freedom to determine what fits your community and your pocketbook! Feel free to innovate!

Those of you who attended the second Cabinet Meeting in Lubbock heard several clubs in our district discuss their plans for Legacy Projects.

These ranged from dedication of new park benches, plans to rebuild a gazebo, revitalizing a community garden, replacing an existing landscape with one that is more water-efficient, and building a shelter in a new park.

Although Lions Clubs International

has designated June 2018 as the "finish" date for the Community Legacy Projects, you might consider that as being similar to a Stop Sign in Italy...just a suggestion!!

Also, as you complete your project, make sure that it has the appropriate signage to indicate to the public that your Lions Club completed this project as part of the Centennial Celebration.

Be sure to invite your local media to the dedication/unveiling of the project.

And last but not least, be sure to take time to celebrate your club's Legacy Project! Lions love a good party!

The front of the November issue of "The Lion" magazine features the title "Hunger: Our Common Enemy. How Lions Are Working In Their

This banner is a very bold reminder that fighting hunger is one of the major priorities of Lions throughout the world.

In his introduction to the issue, Lions International President Dr. Naresh Aggarwal reminds us that "nearly 800 million people go to bed hungry each night and a person starves to death every 15 seconds." He adds that "Shockingly, 16 million U.S. households are undernourished..."

At our July cabinet meeting, David Weaver, Executive Director of the South Plains Food Bank, revealed that 1 in 4 children in the South Plains area are food insecure and that the Food Bank serves over 57,000 unduplicated individuals in its service area each year.

Lisa Gilliland, Executive Director of Lubbock Meals on Wheels states that her agency serves over 720 disabled, homebound, and elderly individuals in the Lubbock and Idalou area daily.


These facts show that Hunger isn't just a problem elsewhere, it is a problem right here in District 2-T2!

Monthly club reports important

Stop and consider for a moment that Lions Clubs International (LCI) and District 2-T2 are your parents ... and you haven't written home in six months.

Are the "parents" going to be concerned? You bet!!

That's why it is so important for District 2-T2 Lions Clubs to make sure their Monthly Membership Reports (MMRs) are completed in a timely manner.

Clubs that submit print copies of the report should mail them by the 20th of the month to LCI and District 2-T2

Clubs that submit electronic copies of the report should submit them by the last day of the month via the "MyLCI" portal on the LCI website.

All Lions Clubs are required to submit the MMR each month even though there is no change in membership. This is an important responsibility of the Club Secretary.

As of January 1, 2018, 15 of the 40 Lions Clubs in District 2-T2 have submitted their monthly membership reports. (37.5 percent)

This was based upon information available through the MyLCI portal.

While the reporting method may differ, it is important to make sure that copies are sent to Lions Clubs International, Cabinet Secretary PDG Carmon McCain, and your club's respective Zone and Region Chairman as listed in the District 2-T2 Directory.

Also, be sure to send a review of your club's 2017-2018 service activities (if you are not already doing so) to District Activities Chairman PDG Jerry Marshall of Rotan.

He needs this information to prepare the District activities awards for presentation at the District 2-T2 Convention in April at Lubbock.

Random thoughts from the seat of a cotton stripper

This has been the most frustrating cotton harvest that the South Plains has seen in many years.

The fall weather caused exceptional growth and the warm fall kept the plants

stalks throught the cotton strippers.

There have been many cotton strippers burned (*mine included*) and the cotton gins are fighting fires on a regular basis.

Many cotton modules have burned in the field before they could be ginned. Every farmer I have talked to has expressed frustration and are readily complaining about the harvest conditions.

So, as I sit here moving at 1.5 miles per hour--rather than the usual 4 mph, a thought occurs to me. What have I and most of my fellow farmers have to gripe about?

We have a cotton crop to harvest, although it may be slow. We have our eyesight, hearing, and did not grow up with the handicaps we see at Texas Lions Camp.

We, as Lions, can't do much about the cotton harvest. But we can help those in need of sight, hearing, and overcoming multiple handicaps. Those we help do not

voice frustration about their condition. They live with it.

Lions can be proud that we make a difference in the lives of others. Therefore, I am PROUD TO BE A LION!

Hurricane Harvey impact shared at Cabinet Meeting

Lion Clubs' response to Hurricane Harvey and recognition of Lions' Legacy Community projects highlighted the second District 2-T2 Cabinet Meeting held October 21 at the Scottish Rite Learning Center in Lubbock.

Special guests were MD-2 Texas Lions Council Chairman Rick Talbert and Lion Pita of Weslaco. He is a Past President of the Texas Lions Camp Board of Directors in Kerrville.

The meeting was hosted by Lubbock Lions Club.

An update of club membership and service projects were given by the Zone Chairs in attenance.

Some of the service projects reported at the meeting include:

"Many of our clubs have embraced the Lions Legacy idea. They are making a difference in their communities and raising awareness of Lions among the public," said District 2-T2 Governor Vance Gipson. While Lions Clubs International is recommending that all Legacy projects be completed by June 2018, Gipson said "this is just a suggestion. We don't want to discourage any clubs from completing a Legacy project."

He then asked representatives of the Brownfield Noon, Jayton, Lubbock South Plains, Ropesville, Plainview, Roby, and Slaton Lions Clubs to comment on their respective projects.

During the luncheon, CC Talbert spoke how Hurricane Harvey impacted the lives of thousands in South Texas.

"Our Lions year began in August with the MD-2 Council of Governors meeting. Our District Governors planned to go forward with the Lions' Centennial Challenge and the Lions' Legacy Community Projects. Little did we know that this would quickly change when Hurricane Harvey intensified to Category 4 and made landfall near Rockport,TX.

"We had no idea how bad Harvey would be. However, representatives of Lions Clubs International Foundation (LICIF) called ahead of time. They were looking at those Lions Districts in Texas that could be impacted. Two days after the initial landfall, Lions Clubs International President Naresh Aggarwal and LCIF Chairman Bob Corlew had already approved \$100,000 in emergency grant funds," Talbert said.

The hurricane ultimately impacted 255 miles in 62 counties.

"Our Texas Lions Foundation approved 36 emergency grants. They have spent double their approved budget for emergency grants, close to \$72,000, to help their fellow Texans."

Talbert noted that Lions from across the United States and the world have also provided assistance.

"The Chester, New Jersey Lions Club donated \$40,000 with the stipulation that the funds be used for medical supplies, medical equipment replacement, or eyeglasses replacement," Talbert said. "These funds were not soliticited--it is amazing how many people reached out to us and wanted to help."

He added that the impacts of Hurricane Harvey will be felt for many years.

"Due to humidity, mold will be a major issue. Mold doesn't wait for insurance adjusters to make a determination. Also, there are infrastructure issues. For example, School District A uses the school on Monday, Wednesday, and every other Friday. School District B uses the school on Tuesday, Thursday, and every other Friday."

He thanked the Lions of District 2-T2 who individually and collectively supported Hurricane Harvey relief efforts.

"Every Lion in Texas still has the opportunity to step up and assist those impacted by Harvey. Our Texas Lions Camp and Texas Lions Foundation will need your help as the Lions in South Texas continue to assist those impacted by this natural disaster. Now more than ever, it is great to be a Lion in Texas," he said.

A visionary project: Eye screening on Diabetes Day

Have you ever thought everything seems to happen at the same time? That's the way it has seemed for the Roby Lions Club.

It began last year with our 75th anniversary celebration when people asked if we would plan to do community eye screenings again.

The state legislature cleared the way for schools to use vision screening equipment for children's eye exams--so we decided to combine the two into one project.

Then we were reminded about a special banner patch that could be earned by conducting one project that included youth, vision, environment and hunger.

We decided to go for it. Circulars were placed around town and the project was listed in upcoming events in the newspaper.

On November 14th (*World Diabetes Day*), we hosted the project in the Roby High School auditorium.

That morning, we had PDG Carolyn Keskitalo from Midland and Lion Tom Mills from Big Spring -- both representing Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center, PID Marshall Cooper from Lubbock, and Zone Chairman Charles Ragland from Snyder on hand to help with the project.

We screened approximately 150 school children that morning. At noon, District Governor Vance Gipson and Lion Marilyn joined us for lunch.

Afterwards, we set up for the community screening. During the afternoon, we screened about 20 adults. Of these, six were fitted with glasses and one was fitted with readers.

Roby Rural Health Clinic staff conducted diabetic screenings on 26 persons. Information was made available from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases.

The school's National Honor Society was conducting their annual food drive -- so we asked participants to bring nonperishable food items.

Last but not least, information on preventing rural wild fires was made

available by the Texas Forestry Service.

We covered all five areas of the Centennial Service Challenge!

It was a busy day but it was worthwhile. We appreciate everyone that helped to make the project possible.

On December 2nd, the club dedicated its Legacy Project prior to "Christmas on the Square." We provided a park bench in the pocket park on the square with a plaque attached. Afterward and during the parade, we had a booth on the square featuring a silent auction to raise funds for more park benches and youth scholarships.

Did you know that Lions Clubs International's Leo Club youth program just celebrated its 60th anniversary in December?

Coach Jim Graver started the Leo ball rolling in 1957 and chances are that ball was a baseball. Graver was the baseball coach of the Abington High School in Pennsylvania, and an active member of the Glenside Lions Club.

With help from his fellow Lion, William Ernst, the first Leo Club was charted on December 5, 1957.

As the world's first Leo Club, the Abington High School Leo Club created the Leo acronym – Leadership, Equality, Opportunity – and chose their school colors, maroon and gold to serve as the Leo club colors. Later, Equality was changed to Experience.

In October 1967, the board of directors of Lions Clubs International adopted the Leo Club Program as an official program of the association.

The Leo Club Program has continued to grow within the last 50 years. Leos now constitute an international network of over 6,500 clubs in over 140 countries.

Like their Lion counterparts, Leo Club members enjoy serving their neighbors and watching positive results unfold.

The Leo Club objective is to provide



the youth of the world with an opportunity for development and contribution, individually and collectively, as responsible members of the local, national, and international community.

The Leo Club motto is:

Leadership -- Develop skills as a project organizer, time manager, and team leader.

Experience -- Learn how teamwork, cooperation, and collaboration can be exciting changes to your community and the world.

Opportunity -- Make friends and feel the rewards of community service.

The question then arises, "Are the Lions of District 2-T2 fighting Hunger?" The answer to this is a resounding "Yes!"

As I have visited throughout the district, I have found that both through our clubs and through our actions as individuals, we, the Lions of District 2-T2, are concerned and active in addressing this major challenge in a variety of ways.

I have been pleased to learn that several clubs act in partnership with local churches and pantries to meet community needs.

Several clubs have noted that their club provides food to families in need throughout the year as well as on special holiday occasions.

In a recent visit with Ms. Gilliland, she stated to me that for the last 10 years the Lubbock Lions have provided a grant to fund the emergency food program for the Lubbock Meals on Wheels.

This emergency food program insures that clients have food available when weather conditions prohibit normal deliveries.

She mentioned also that the South Plains Lions and the Industrial Lions Club have provided annual financial assistance and that the South Plains club has driven one of the delivery routes for several years.

As I visited with David Weaver, he noted that Lions have been very supportive of the South Plains Food Bank in numerous ways.

Some of the members of the "Hunger's Hope Giving Society" are Lions who personally provide annual financial support to the food bank.

In addition, he noted that the annual financial support from the South Plains Lions was greatly appreciated.

He also expressed appreciation to that club for its six years of assisting in the preparation of food boxes for Christmas distribution, one of the largest challenges for the Food Bank.

Several Lions clubs in the area are distribution points for the Food Bank.

For example, Lions in Morton, Matador, and Roaring Springs help locate needy families, and then organize and man the food distributions in their communities.

The South Plains Food Bank's recent "U Can Share" food drive drew major support from the Hub Lions Club, the Lubbock Lions Club, and the Lubbock Redbud Lions Club. This drive has been strongly supported by these and other clubs for several years.

I realize that this article is simply a representation of some of the actions that are being taken by Lions Clubs and individual Lions in District 2-T2 in the fight against hunger.

I regret that I cannot mention the actions of every club, but I hope that the major point has been made: Lions of District 2T2 do care about their fellow man and are actively fighting against Hunger!!

"We initially charged a set fee for the Santa visits – but it has evolved into much more than that. You can't put a price on the look on a child's face when they see Santa. Now, we simply ask for donations, which range from \$5 to \$250. Some visits are free – we don't want to turn away an opportunity to spread Christmas cheer to others," he said.

The 2017 project included eight visits to individual homes. In addition, there were 11 visits to local businesses and assisted living centers.

"A couple of the visits were at sporting goods stores. One of them donated about \$300 in hoodies and other merchandise to the club as payment for the Santa visit. Our club, in turn, donated the items to the Boys and Girls Club as well as Paul's Project – Grace Campus to benefit the homeless," said Holcomb.

Another Santa visit was used to promote another store's "Angel

Shoe Tree" benefitting children at Buckner's, Children's Home of Lubbock, and Texas Boys Ranch.

Each "Santa season" is memorable. However, Holcomb and Seale say there are a couple of visits that will forever touch their hearts.

"During one home visit, I was playing Santa. A little girl came up and hugged my neck. I asked her what she wanted for Christmas and she told me that all she wanted was for her mommy to be happy. That really brought a lump to my throat," Seale said.

At a visit to an assisted living center, "Lion Santa" stopped by all the residents' rooms. This one resident was lying on her side facing away from the door. Santa stepped by the side of the bed and she saw him. "Do you know who I am? "He asked. "Yes, you're Santa" was her quiet response. "Yes, I am. I have something for you," he said as he reached into his bag for a stuffed Christmas bear. The woman drew it close to her and smiled, recalled Holcomb.

Even though Holcomb and Seale have put their red velvet top hats in storage, they and the other Hub Lions Club members are looking forward to next year's Santa visits.

In fact, the club already has five visits already scheduled for December 2018.

Both said this is great way to get the club's name before the public.

One person thanked them publicly on a neighborhood Nextdoor page. Another sent a Christmas Card thanking Hub Lions Club for giving back to the community.

"And isn't that what Christmas is all about? We're giving back to others and sharing a smile along the way," said Seale.

100 million people by June 30th, 2018.


As you can see by the graphic below, Lions worldwide have already exceeded the goal.


