Zoom meeting in its place:

COVID concerns prompt cancellation of Jan. 16 Midwinter Conference & contests

Citing an abundance of caution, District 2-T2 Governor Ted Boyd has canceled the January 16 Midwinter Conference in Lubbock.

However in its place, there will be a brief Cabinet Meeting via Zoom from 9:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

Governor Boyd said there is no formal agenda for the meeting. Those who need to give a report or share information with the District Cabinet may do so at this time.

The log-in information is shown at right.

PDG Danny Leake also announced cancellation of the annual Opportunities for Youth Scholarship contests that normally take place at the conference.

In announcing the decision, Leake and Committee Member Cindy Johnson said there are many pieces that must be put together to make the District 2-T2 scholarship contests successful.

"Much of that work has already been done. Many Lions have stepped up to champion the cause. Information has been distributed to encourage student participation. Judges and other volunteers have been recruited to provide a positive experience and "Fair Play". However, COVID-19 and money have proven to be obstacles that are beyond our control.

They said that although a Zoom meeting is being planned in place of the Midwinter Conference--there are simply too many Lions scholarship rules and regulations to allow the contest to

proceed using the Zoom platform.

In addition to the COVID concerns, having adequate scholarship money for the Youth Contests is another issue.

"To date, we have raised less than HALF of the Scholarship funding needed for the contests. This money is provided by District 2-T2 Lions Clubs that are 100 percent in the District Governor's contest," they said. About \$4,500 is awarded each year.

"Certainly, our prayers are that this pandemic will end soon. Our goal is to resume the Opportunities for Youth Contests in 2021-2022," said Leake and Johnson.

Lions are also reminded that the annual District 2-T2 Photo Contest will now be held at the April 24 District Convention--rather than the Midwinter Conference. Please see the entry forms on Pages 7-8 of this newsletter.

Governor Boyd regrets the decision to cancel the Midwinter Conference. However, he said health and safety of Lions Club members is paramount.

We hope the current COVID-19 pandemic will lessen in order to have the April 24 District Convention in Lubbock as planned.

Our District has been very lucky in that no one has contracted the virus as a result of attending our July and October Cabinet Meetings.

Because of this, I really don't want to press our luck.

One of the most difficult decisions I have made so far is to cancel our January 16 Midwinter Conference. This is a "first" -- just like so many other "firsts" that we have had to deal with during the pandemic.

My decision was not easy. However, it was made with a lot of thought as well as counsel from several Lions in the District.

I will say that some of my fellow District Governors have not had an in-person Cabinet Meeting so far this year.

Also, some of our District 2-T2 Lions Clubs have not held an in-person meeting since the shutdown in March. This may or may not be a good idea for some clubs.

Lion Tonya Novak, president of the Olton Lions Club, remarked that not having a regular club meeting may result in a bad habit that may be tough to correct.

But, each club has to make their own decision based upon the makeup of their membership.

Some portions of District 2-T2 are COVID "hot spots" while others have had little to no cases.

Despite the pandemic, some clubs are finding new, exciting, and creative ways to conduct their various service projects. Club Secretaries need to be sure that they report these to Lions Clubs International and District 2-T2.

As we go to press with this issue of *The Windmill*, we have learned that the Jan. 1 "Polar Bear Plunge Challenge," benefiting Texas Lions Camp (TLC) has been canceled due to a rise in COVID-19 cases.

PDG Terry Hawkins was all set to ride a wheeled sled down a 38-foot tall, 116-foot long water slide and shoot out into the icy waters of the Guadalupe River at Mo-Ranch at Hunt, TX.

Instead, TLC's Chairman of the Board Lion Kent Basinger will take the plunge for everyone at Texas Lions Camp during the Board Meeting in February. It will be live-streamed.

"TLC is using funds from the Polar Bear Challenge towards its new campaign (Vision2020 & Beyond) in order to provide new and improved facilities for future generations of TLC campers," said TLC President and CEO Lion Stephen Mabry.

"Our capital campaign was kicked off on February 8, 2020 which will run for 24 - 36 months and be phased to facilitate 3-5 year pledges from our donors.

"The emphasis of Phase I of the CAMPAIGN will be to address the bunkhouses, caretaker dormitory and revitalize aging infrastructure. Specifically, we would like for the Polar Bear Challenge to be used for the purposes stated but more specifically to show traction and support, to provide much needed capital funds, to raise awareness of TLC and to give the community an opportunity to get to know Texas Lions Camp," said Mabry.

District 2-T3 District Governor Javier Morales is another great example of being creative in fundraising and service.

District Governor Javier recently ran two marathons in one day. (That's 52 miles!)

He solicited pledges and raised \$10,184.25 for Texas Lions Camp. I couldn't run down the block unless a bear was after me! DG Javier deserves a big THANK YOU!

Each Lions Club member in Texas owns Texas Lions Camp. We are grateful for any means to provide funds for the Camp so that it can continue its mission of service to children.

I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank PDG Jim Petty for the outstanding job he is doing as our District LCIF Ambassador.

He had the idea of selling 50/50 raffle tickets with funds going to LCIF Campaign 100. Half of the funds raised will go to LCIF and half will go to the winner.

The tickets are \$20 each. Every member of the Lubbock Redbud Lions Club who is regularly attending meetings have already purchased a ticket. Can your club meet this challenge?

This is such a big fundraiser so I encourage everyone in District 2-T2 to participate and help LCIF Campaign 100 meet its goal.

Contact 1st VDG Dr. Ron Miller, 2nd VDG Doug McDonough, PDG Terry Hawkins, or me to get your tickets. Our contact information is in the District Directory and on the back page of this newsletter.

The drawing will take place at the February 2021 MD-2 Council of Governors meeting in Kerrville.

In closing, we're disappointed that we can't meet in-person for Midwinter Conference. However, we hope that progress with the COVID vaccinations will allow us to be together again for the April 24 District Convention.

Bark & Brew 2021 uncertain

As we move forward, club officers are reminded that it is still important that their club appoint a nominating committee, conduct officer elections in April, and report the results to Lions Clubs International and District 2-T2 on the PU-101 form as soon as possible after the election.

Please be sure that all information contained on the form is correct and legible!!

Once the PU-101 is received, Lions Clubs International can send the appropriate materials/website passwords to the incoming club officers.

More importantly, having the information allows the incoming District Governor to prepare the District Directory in order to have it printed and ready for distribution at the first Cabinet Meeting in July.

Also, if your Lions Club wishes to offer a member for a District office such as DG, 1st VDG, 2nd VDG, District 2-T2 Lions Hearing Bank Director; Great Plains Lions Eye Bank Director, or Texas Lions Camp Director, please be aware that a letter of recommendation from your club and the candidate's qualifications for office must be submitted to Governor Ted Boyd a minimum of 30 days prior to the April 24 District Convention.

The brainchild of IPDG Chris Gunstream who serves as MD2 NAMI Champion, the pins are designed to encourage Texas Lions to build the ranks to our clubs statewide and reverse a troubling trend of declining membership experienced over the course of the past 20 years by Constitutional Areas 1 and 2, which includes the United States and Canada. And the troubling decline continues to impact both the State of Texas as well as our very own District 2T2.

Forty-one years ago, in 1980, there were almost 600,000 Lions across the United States.

At the end of November 2020, that number had fallen to 280,755, with a decline of 2,682 members since the start of our current fiscal year on July 1, 2020.

Canada has seen its membership also decline during the past six months, falling by 239 members to a final tally of 33,487 at the end of November.

The ranks of Texas Lionism stood at 22,904 at the close of



November, which is down 187 members from the start of the fiscal year of 23,091 Lions. Unfortunately, we lost more than 3,000 Texas Lions from the June 30, 2015 membership tally which was 26,306.

For District 2-T2, total membership stood at 1,139 in 40 local clubs as of Dec. 29, 2020.

That's down 33 Lions from the 1,172 members in 42 clubs at the start of the current fiscal year.

In comparison, District 2-T2 listed a total membership of 1,875 in 63 clubs at the end of January 2004.

Three members of the Floydada Lions Club will soon be sporting the new 2020-2021 Texas Lions Membership Award Pins.

They are: Zach Cummings II for sponsoring Diane Alvarez; Bob Gilliland for sponsoring Ryan Crowe and Logan Bradley for recruiting Tyler Hammonds.

Lubbock Redbud Lions Victor Howard receives a pin for sponsoring Jimmy Bradley and our very own District Governor Ted Boyd receives a pin for sponsoring his grandson Luke A. Malone as a new Lion.

Morton Lion Suzanne Gillespie gets her membership recruitment pin for signing up Sandra K. Elmore.

Plainview Lion Mike Melcher gets his pin for recruiting his own wife, Debra S. Melcher, to become a Plainview Lion.

Shallowater Lion Paul Scivally gets his pin for sponsoring Alysha N. Alvarado.

For too long, the joys of service and fellowship which come through becoming a part of Lionism has been some of the best kept secrets of our organization.

It's high time that we begin tooting our own horn and start sharing with our communities, friends, coworkers and relatives concerning the lasting fulfillment that flows from becoming part of this worldwide service organization.

And, if you are successful in bring a new Lion into your club during January to March 2021, you will receive an attractive MD-2 Membership Award pin to boot.

It can be as simple as just asking. Who knows, your coworker, friend and/or neighbor might even say yes.

Fellow Lions, please take to heart the suggestion that each one, ask one to join you at your club's next meeting -- whether it's an in-person meeting or a virtual meeting. District 2-T2 remembers PDG Charles Shannon

Past District Governor Charles Shannon, 90, of the Ropesville Lions Club passed away November 10 in Lubbock. A private burial was held at Resthaven Memorial Park Cemetery on Nov. 17. A memorial service will be held at a later date.

Charles was born Aug. 1, 1930.

He moved with his family to Ropesville in 1938 to join other families participating in the Ropesville Farm Project.

Charles spent the next 82 years in Ropesville, where he farmed cotton, worked in agribusiness, and was an active community leader.

He married Jerry Beth Chambers on June 1, 1974.

Charles was a member of the Ropes Lions Club for 65 years. In addition, he was a former Texas Lions Camp Director. Charles served as District 2-T2 Governor in 1998-1999. He was later inducted into the MD-2 Texas Lions Hall of Fame in 2006.

He sponsored 280 members and received the Global Membership Key Award.


Charles was chair of the administrative board of the Ropesville United Methodist Church for more than 40 years. In addition, he served as Mayor of Ropesville, member of the Ropes ISD Board of Education, Hockley County School Board, and Hockley County Farm Bureau

Survivors include wife Jerry Beth; a daughter; a son; a stepson; and several grandchildren, step-grandchildren; and step-great-grandchildren.

PDG Charles Shannon changed the name of the District newsletter from "The Windmill" to "The Shamrock" during his year as Governor.

Here are just a few highlights from those issues:

- Texas Lions Camp designated as a priority goal for the year.
- The Texas Lions Wild West Bike Ride was a 1,600 mile trek from the May 23 MD-2 State Convention in College Station to the June 29 Lions Clubs International Convention in San Diego. The event raised funds and provided publicity about the Camp during its 50th anniversary year.
- Lubbock Lions Club members turned over the first shovels of sod to begin construction of the new Aquatic Center at Texas Lions Camp. The new Aquatic Center replaces two older pools. One of them was dedicated in 1981 in memory of TLC Past President and Lubbock Lions Club member Jim Ed Waller.
- The newsletter featured a series of articles by Lion Jack Wiech recalling events leading up to the creation and charter of Texas Lions Camp.
- Great Plains Lions Eye Bank marks 25th year of service.
- The first Cabinet Meeting was at Texas Boys Ranch, the second Cabinet Meeting was at Jayton, Midwinter Conference was at Brownfield, and District Convention was at Snyder.
- Lions Clubs are starting to use the Internet to tell people about Lions and attract new members.
- Past International President James T. Coffey of Toronto, Ohio was the keynote speaker for the District Convention.
- Wolfforth Lions Club is chartered.
- All District 2-T2 Lions Clubs are 100% participants in Texas Lions Camp for the first time ever.

Whitharral Lions Club donates funds to family

Gone, but far from forgotten is how the Whitharral Lions Club feels about the passing of Caroline Reyna.

To show their support to the family, the Whitharral Lions Club presented a check as a donation to the family. The check included the club's proceeds from the Taste of Whitharral which was held at the United Cotton Growers Gin Yard.

Walter Kristinek, president of the Whitharral Lions Club, said it felt like the right thing to do.

"They have been a part of our community forever. Her boys and my boys all grew up together," Kristinek said.

He said Carolina worked in the cafeteria at Whitharral ISD and helped to raise every student who came through the school system, including his own sons.

"She raised nearly everybody in Whitharral," Kristinek said.

However, Carolina was diagnosed with ALS at the earlier part of this year and recently passed away.

"She had a tough time," he said.

The club wanted to host a fundraiser specifically for Carolina when they learned when she was sick. However, with the COVID-19 pandemic and all events put on

hold earlier this spring, the club was unable to complete it before her passing.

"Despite it all, the club was able to come together for its annual Taste of Whitharral event, which has been held every year as a fundraiser for Whitharral schools and charities since the early 1990s.

"We were just taking one day at a time and didn't even know if we were going to have a Taste of Whitharral," he said. Kristinek said "If I have anything to do with it, we're having it. I don't care if anyone shows up. I don't care if we make money. This is the community get-together, for the start of the school year, to fellowship and enjoy each other."

From there, Kristinek said the club spoke with the Hockley County Judge and the event was approved to go on as planned.

"We figured we will just have it then," Kristinek said.

When Kristinek suggested the club donate the proceeds to the Reyna family, specifically for husband Roy, every member was on board with the idea.

"Roy is a community member. He always cooks for the event and donates his time and good for the good of the Lions Club," said Kristinek. "He's done it for years. He's a good man and she was a good woman. You could always count on them."

Kristinek said the group realizes that there are many good people in their community. However, they felt this family was in need for the donation at this time.

"There are a lot of people



Campaign SightFirst celebrates 30th anniversary

From the LCI Blog

As 20/20 is synonymous with eyesight, it is serendipitous that the year 2020 marks the 30th anniversary of SightFirst, one of Lions Clubs International Foundation's most impactful grant programs.

Lions everywhere are proud of the immense impact we have made in vision around the world.

Established in 1990, the program aims to strengthen eye care systems in underserved communities, enabling them to fight blindness and vision loss and assist those who are blind or visually impaired.

Through SightFirst, Lions, in cooperation with healthcare providers and partner organizations, have impacted sight for millions of people around the world.

It has been an amazing three decades, and it is just the start!

In The Beginning

The year is 1925, and Lions – committed to vision initiatives since shortly after Lions Clubs International's 1917 founding – are gathered at their annual international convention.

Little do they know they are about to experience a transformative moment through a poignant appeal from Helen Keller. In her keynote convention address, Keller implores Lions to be “knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness.”

Lions hear her call loud and clear and embrace the responsibility and challenge. For more than a century, Lions' efforts in sight have increased steadily day after day, year after year, decade after decade.

Fast forward to 1990. LCIF



is in its 22nd year, and makes a landmark decision solidifying Lions' leadership role in vision.

Following its 1990 launch of *Campaign SightFirst*, LCIF is on the cusp of empowering Lions to do even more to save sight and prevent blindness on a global scale.

Through the inaugural SightFirst campaign and the subsequent *Campaign SightFirst II, Lions' Vision for All*, launched in 2005, more than US\$415 million have been raised to support efforts of Lions and partners through LCIF SightFirst grants.

The first SightFirst grants were awarded for projects to treat unoperated cataracts in Mexico and several countries in South America.

Efforts have since expanded, with life-changing funding reaching Lions' projects in 112 countries.

LCIF SightFirst grants have empowered Lions to restore and improve vision for millions by aiding in delivering eye care services, training eye care professionals, upgrading existing eye care system infrastructure, and improving access to eye health education and rehabilitation for people who are blind or visually impaired.

Leveraging Expertise

When you know more, you can

do more. LCIF and Lions knew leveraging the expertise of eye care professionals could dramatically compound their impact.

Increased knowledge could mean more children see their mothers for the first time, more families could achieve economic stability with a parent's sight improved and the ability to earn a living restored, more elderly could see the world's beauty clearly.

Thus, LCIF convened the first SightFirst Steering Committee, now the SightFirst Advisory Committee (SAC), meeting in 1990.

Since then, the committee, comprised of global blindness prevention experts and Lions leaders, has convened twice a year, every year. Discussions are lively, timely, and always relevant to communities Lions serve and challenges they encounter. Each meeting's agenda also finds committee members examining Lions' grant requests for vision-targeted service, ensuring LCIF funding is allocated to projects promising impactful results and meeting humanitarian needs.


“Lions everywhere are proud of the immense impact we have made in vision around the world,” said LCIF Chairperson Gudrun Yngvadottir.

“With SightFirst funding from LCIF, we've heeded Helen Keller's 1925 call to be knights of the blind. We've done so much in SightFirst's initial 30 years. With continued funding from Lions and partners, we'll continue the SightFirst legacy and create more historic changes in vision,” she said.

The World Health Organization (WHO) provided strategic advice and direction to the SightFirst program since its early stages.

Through SightFirst funding, one notable effort with WHO, the

Project for the Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness, has established 54 needs-based Lions eye care centers in 30 countries globally, delivering critical preventive, therapeutic, and rehabilitative eye care services. LCIF and the WHO have further partnered to develop a tool to assess management of both diabetes and diabetic retinopathy and to estimate the level of cooperation and synergy between these two branches of health care.

Since 1994, through its partnership with The Carter Center, LCIF has invested SightFirst funds in Lions' efforts to improve and restore vision through treatments for river blindness and trachoma, and surgeries to reverse advanced trachomas.

Successful SightFirst programming also inspired additional 21st century partnerships that have exponentially increased Lions' impact on vision around the world.

For nearly 20 years, LCIF has also partnered with Johnson & Johnson Vision, establishing *Sight For Kids* in 2002.

Campaign SightFirst by the numbers

To date, more than US\$370 million in SightFirst grants have been approved for over 1,330 projects in 112 countries.

Through these initiatives, more than:

- 9 million cataract surgeries have been performed.
- 2 million professional eye care and community health workers have been trained.
- 1,350 eye centers have been built, expanded, or equipped.
- 310 million doses of medication have been distributed to halt progression of river blindness, an infection spread by infected flies that can cause eye disease and permanent blindness.

It is a school-based eye health program that mobilizes Lions to provide eye health education, high-quality vision examinations, and referral access to professional eye care and treatment.

To date, global Sight For Kids initiatives have screened more than 30 million students and provided treatment to more than 575,000; delivered over 500,000 pairs of eyeglasses to children in need, and educated over 190,000 teachers, volunteers, and Lions on eye health and equipped

them with the proper materials to inform, assess, and refer students accordingly.

As we look back, we must also look forward. In doing so, we see millions more are in need. The WHO reports that globally at least 2.2 billion people have vision impairment or blindness.

"LCIF's and Lions' efforts in vision, especially during the last 30 years through the Foundation's SightFirst program, change lives around the world," said Yngvadottir.
