First District Meeting set for July 22 in Lubbock

Hunger impacts all communities in the Panhandle-South Plains region.

With this in mind, District Governor Vance Gipson invites all District 2-T2 Lions to join him at the first 2017-2018 District meeting set for Saturday, July 22 at the South Plains Food Bank, 5605 MLK Boulevard, in Lubbock.

The theme for the meeting is "Hunger Relief."

Lions Clubs International's website states that "nearly one billion people go to bed hungry every night. That's why Lions and Leos are hard at work addressing this global need by providing help and hope to the children, families, and neighbors who need it most. Lions and Leos distribute food to school children, stock food banks, create



sustainable community gardens and lead community food drives to fight hunger where they live and work."

Many District 2-T2 Lions Clubs support the South Plains Food Bank. This meeting will give them the opportunity to tour the new facility.

Registration begins at 9:00 a.m. and the meeting is set to begin promptly at 9:30 a.m.

Hosts are the Lubbock Hub Lions Club and the Lubbock Lip Lipscomb Lions Club.

"I encourage all newly-elected Lions Club officers to attend our first meeting to learn about the 2017-2018 Lions Clubs International goals and our District 2-T2 goals," said District Governor Gipson.

"They will also receive instructions and materials to perform their duties this year," he said.

Each club will have a packet of

materials, including the 2017-2018 District 2-T2 Directory, to be picked up at this first meeting.

"The Internet service provider moved the website from one server to the other. When this occurred, the older software used to maintain the site was rendered useless. We had no way to update the site," said PDG Carmon McCain, Information Technology Chairman.

fact that the old server was no longer protected from malware. Because of this, scripts were added to the 2-T2 site that could potentially damage the computers of those who visited the site," he said.

The new site uses a free template/free internet hosting provided by Lion Net.

"The left side of the site features information relating to District 2-T2, such as a new Calendar feature, Cabinet members, list of clubs, and club officer resources," McCain said.

The right side has links to various Lions Clubs International links, videos, and other resources.

"This is a resource for all 2-T2 Lions. We value your feedback on ways we can improve the site," he said.

Getting to know your new 2nd Vice District Governor

As the new 2nd Vice District Governor, I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce myself to the Lions of District 2-T2.

I am James Belk of the Plainview Lions Club.

My involvement in Lionism goes back to 1966 when I was a charter member of the Edmonson Lions Club. Edmonson is a small town 12 miles northwest of Plainview.

As with many small towns, Edmonson has felt the pain of just drying up. Our Lions Club was part of that. In 2002, we lost our President and had

just three remaining members--so we closed the doors and ceased to be.

A few years later after visiting a club or two, I landed in the Plainview Club.

In this club, I have enjoyed serving a term as President, being a Director for several years, and being involved in a great number of community projects.

I am an 85-year native of Hale County and am still farming land my Grandfather purchased in 1907.

Except for a stint in the US Coast Guard during the Korean War, I have been here all my life. I am a member of the First Baptist Church of Edmonson and have served for several years as Chairman of the Deacons.

My wife, Betty, and I raised two sons and a daughter in Edmonson. We are still a very close family.

Unfortunately, Betty died in October 2013 so I have relied on those three and their families for support these past few years.

I have had three distinct careers in my lifetime.

Upon returning from the Coast

Guard, I bought my uncle's interest in a dairy that he and my father had. That lasted until 1957, when we sold the cattle and equipment to buy trucks and combines.

My father and my brother operated a custom wheat harvest business, working from south Texas to North Dakota. With the death of my brother in 1964, and my fathers' failing health I fell heir to a farm and a custom harvesting operating, which I continued until 1979 when my son took over.

My second career was in politics. My Grandfather had been the State Representative from our area from 1928 to 1942. He always preached public service to me. In 1978, I announced as a candidate for County

Commissioner for my precinct and won. I served in that office for 16 years.

After leaving elected office and turning 65, I returned to full time farming, which I have done ever since.

When I was approached about running for Vice Governor, my first impression was "I am to old for that learning curve and to feeble to keep up with a bunch of active and excited Lions." After visiting with some of my local club members and some serious praying, I decided to give it a go.

I appreciate the support of all the Lions of District 2-T2 and am looking forward to our Lions' service together!

My focus this year is to embrace our Association's motto, "WE SERVE."

It is a powerful expression. "We" symbolizes the power of our 1.4 million members, and "Serve" expresses our clear, decisive action to convert every dollar into service for the most urgent needs around the world.

THE POWER OF WE

The "Power of We" underscores that my power comes from you, and your power comes from me.

I cannot lift a car, but together we can. One person cannot educate a village, but a group of like-minded people can.

As more of us come together, the world's problems become smaller.

If all of us come together, then the impossible becomes possible.

"We Serve" also highlights our

most important quality: Connectivity.

We are connected to each other as Lions and to the communities we serve.

In a chain, each individual link combines to form an unbreakable line. If our chain has 1.4 million strong links, that becomes a powerful force for good.

As we enter our second century of global humanitarian service, we continue to evolve to meet the ever-changing needs. This is truly an exciting time to be a Lion.

Our new strategy – LCI Forward – was developed as a road map for Lions to plan, implement and achieve our vision for the future and meet the growing needs of the world.

This new strategy will enhance our service framework, reshape public opinion and improve visibility, improve our club, district and organizational excellence and improve our membership experience while reaching new markets.

New products, such as the new Lions mobile app, will provide our members the ability to connect with each other like never before –

I have always believed it is important to leave the world better than we found it and a better place for our children and their children. That philosophy has served me well.

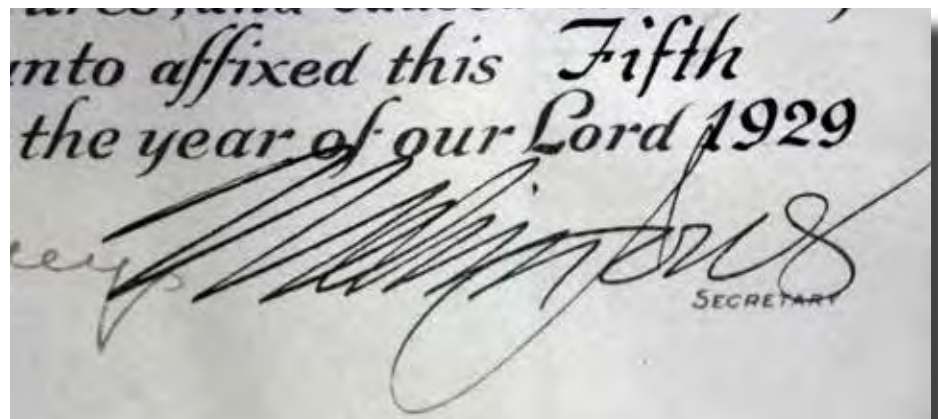
With your help, it will continue to serve me as your international president. And together we will expand our legacy of service.

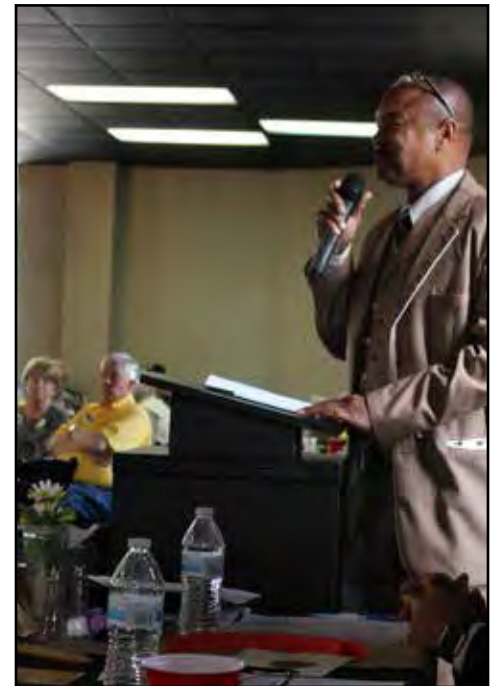

jumper!” Glass said. “Remember Sea Biscuit? Let them be themselves. You can’t force leadership upon them – but for those who accept it, give them trust and support. With that, they will do great things.”

To have Lions for life, it is important to let people do things their way. Folks are more prone to “episodic volunteering” now. They may not want to attend meetings each week. Therefore, we must adapt and let them have freedom,” Glass said.

At the conclusion of his remarks, PID Glass presented the International President’s Award to Region Chairman Byron Garrison.

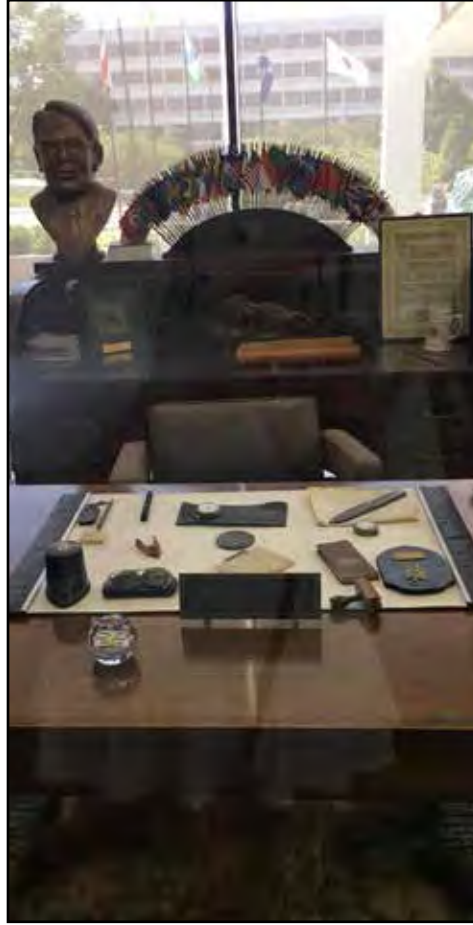

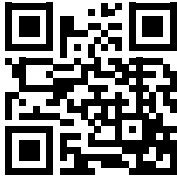
