LCIF approves grant funding

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) approved matching grant funds of \$11,460 to support vision screening efforts of the Lamesa Centennial, Roby, and Snyder Lions Clubs.

The clubs asked LCIF for partial funding to purchase three Welch-Allyn SPOT vision screeners and cases.

Approximately four independent school districts and five communities would be served by purchase of the vision screening equipment.

"I take this opportunity to congratulate IPDG Vance Gipson and your fellow District 2-T2 Lions for efforts on behalf of those in need in your communities," said IPIP Naresh Aggarwal, LCIF Chairman.

It just needs to be anything to get a conversation started about what Lions really do and what we stand for as an international association.

To date, I have not yet come up with such a statement--but I am thinking on it and would appreciate your input. What do Lions DO??


years. However, many do not know about this Lions supported project.

According to their website, "The

Julien C. Hyer International Youth Camp represents a group of students from countries around the world that participate in a program to expose them to life in Texas through stays in Dallas/Fort Worth, Lake Texoma, San Antonio, and Lubbock, to promote peace and understanding."

The Camp is named in honor of Judge Julien C. Hyer of Fort Worth, who served as Lions Clubs



International President in 1931-1932. He was an active Lion for 55 years and founded the Lions Clubs International Youth Exchange Program. He passed away in 1974 at age 79.

The Julien C. Hyer Youth Camp was organized in 1973 and the first camping session was in 1974.

Participating students are ages 18-21. Most are from Europe; however, there are a few from Asia and South America

They spend about six weeks in

Texas and visit District 2-T2 for a few days.

Lions who volunteer to host these students in their homes are greatly enriched.

We do a lot of fun things, including a trip to Palo Duro Canyon to see the outdoor musical, "Texas."

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank PDG Danny Leake, PDG Peggy White, and all the District 2-T2 Lions who are involved in this Youth Exchange project. Thanks for all your help!

Two years ago, I witnessed an unusual event involving these youth exchange students.

They formed a circle of prayer for a dying mother of one of their own from Germany. They learned how to pray by watching Lions do the same over and over.

We never know the influence we have on others. This was a great example of coming together in global unity. Wouldn't it be great if our world leaders followed the same example as these young people?

"New Voices" initiative launched earlier this year

New Voices is about creating a variety of conversations. It is about collaboration - getting men and women together so we can harness our full potential.

It is about putting a spotlight on women. We need to make it known that Lions are men and women.

If we create excitement amongst our female members so they want to get their friends, family and associates involved, ultimately, it will mean more members.

Engaging in conversation is where it all comes together. Choose to cross the invisible line from being a person to whom things happen to a person who makes things happen.

Engaging starts with finding your voice, literally. That's easy for some, but for many, speaking up is daunting. To lead you must be heard. You must have presence. You must put yourself out there.

The initiative was officially launched on July 1 during the 2018 International Convention in Las Vegas. Around 1,000 delegates were present in the large conference hall while a few hundred watched the live stream.

Incoming President Gudrun Yngvodottir introduced the program.

"Honestly speaking," she said, "when I became the 2nd Vice President, I had no intention of having a women's initiative. In fact,

when I made my first official visits, I was careful not to touch on women's membership or leadership. But, to my surprise, wherever I went, I was asked what would be my strategy to promote women in Lions Clubs International. The women would come up to me and say how they were waiting to see what I would do. I thought to myself - if not me - who? I felt this is what Lions want - so here we are!" she said.

But why New Voices? We have been around for 30 years now - so why this name?

"As I traveled around the world, I saw a lot of diversity in embership and leadership between men and women. Even in many places where women were not members or leaders, they were playing an important role behind the scenes - in organizing meetings, in running projects, in managing activities. They were silently working, but did not have a voice. I felt they needed a voice.

"We don't have to look for women - they are there - all that we need to do is bring their ideas, their talent, their commitment to the table. They needed a new voice. And I thought this would be the right time to give them a platform so that together we can take this organization forward,"she said.

Yngvodottir also said she would like this team to work with our Global Action Team, District Governors, and Council Chairs to create awareness.

She would like them to identify those Lions who have made a difference, but whose voice has not been heard.

She understands that we cannot expect to see magic in one year. It will take time to reach gender parity - but this year, through this team, she would like to see a strong impetus given to women worldwide.

She said, "I would like to see the New Voices team empower women around the world so that they can create the traction needed to take us forward."

all these areas.

My nominations will be judged against nominees in our multiple district of Texas. The winner from Texas will be put up against the USA winners, and then finally the USA winner will go up against the other constitutional area winners. The global winner will get a free trip to the next International Convention in Milan, Italy in July 2019.

I spent lots of time in breakout sessions learning about what other clubs are doing to make themselves more visible and to help tgrow in membership. In addition, I learned how other clubs are serving their communities.



Attracting millennials into our clubs is always intriguing to me and I have many ideas as a result of the sessions.


