Used Hearing Aids Needed

Many Lions Clubs find used hearing aids in their eyeglass collection boxes. If you have no other use for them, please consider donating them to the Troy Lions Club. They have established a collaboration between the club and a local audiologist. When the Lions turn in a pair of hearing aids, the doctor professionally checks and cleans them. For patients identified by the Lions Club, the audiologist provides a hearing test and then reprograms the aids to match the needs of a patient. The Troy Lions, in addition to collecting the used hearing aids, are providing administrative and logistical support, such as providing the financial needs screening. There is either no charge or a very minimal cost to the patients. You can help by recycling collected hearing aids to the Troy Club. 




