

Lions Clubs International's Centennial Celebration at Convention

More than 30,000 Lions from all over the world arrived in Chicago last month to celebrate LCI's 100th anniversary at the International Convention. Among the many events that took place, a highlight was watching the Special Olympics – Leos "Mission: Inclusion" Unified Basketball Clinic presented by NBA great, Sam Perkins. Leos and Special Olympics athletes participated in basketball drills and scrimmages while working together and learning more about one another.

Convention is a great time to thank the generous Lions who donated. A special thanks is in order for Melvin Jones Fellows, Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows, Melvin Jones Fellowship clubs, and those in the Humanitarian Partner program. This year, we raised one of the highest donation amounts in LCIF Convention history. Because of your contributions, communities all around the world will receive help when it is needed.

The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness

For more than 15 years, LCIF's SightFirst program and the World Health Organization (WHO) have partnered to serve more than 127 million children by working to eliminate avoidable childhood blindness. The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness is an initiative that began in 2001. Since then, 51 Child Friendly Eye Care Centers have been established and supported in 50 countries within Africa, the Americas, the Eastern Mediterranean, Europe, Southeast Asia, and the Western Pacific. The centers provide preventive, therapeutic, and rehabilitative eye care services for children aged 0-15 years. To date, more than 67,000 pediatric eye care staff have been trained, more than 13 million children have been screened for eye diseases, and more than 127 million children have received treatment. There have also been nearly one million education sessions for parents, caregivers and healthcare staff. Because of your donations to LCIF, millions of children have been given the chance to avoid childhood blindness.



Club LCIF Coordinators Position Update

The <u>Club LCIF Coordinator</u> is an ambassador for LCIF at the club level and is crucial to the promotion of our foundation. This person shares LCIF stories, motivates fellow Lions to support LCIF, and enables LCIF to advance its humanitarian work both locally and globally.

Club LCIF Coordinators will be equipped with resources that will allow them to champion the goals of the foundation to Lions.

A new policy has been put into effect to help fill this vital role at the club level. In addition to serving as mentors to the club president and vice presidents, immediate past club presidents will now serve as Club LCIF Coordinators. If he or she is unable to serve in this capacity, the position may be filled by another club member.

Touchstone Story #81–Digital Connections

During Lions Clubs International's 50th anniversary celebration in 1967, an article appeared in the LION Magazine predicting how

technology would change the way people communicate by the Lions' 100th anniversary. Sharing news would be instantaneous. "Walking along the streets of Chicago, you'll be able to talk to a friend in Hong Kong and see him in full color at the same time," the article said. The author was right. In the 21st century, staying connected with Lions around the globe has never been easier.

Through Lions' digital channels and social media, members can gather ideas, express their Lions pride, exchange tips and share the results of projects and events immediately. With more than 1.35 million members across 210 countries and geographic areas, Lions Clubs International is truly a global network of service and friendship.

"We do live in a world community," Past International President Jim Ervin said. "We share together, we learn together and we help each other together."

Staying connected has always been key to the health of Lions Clubs. It is why, early in Lions' history, the organization established a "News from the Clubs" section in the LION Magazine, hosted conventions and maintained extensive written correspondence.

Today, communication between Lions is just as likely to occur on Facebook or Twitter as by email, phone or newsletter. Minute after minute, Lions somewhere in the world are sharing snapshots of their work—a vision screening, a blood drive, cleaning up trash, planting a tree, hosting a fundraiser.

In Indonesia and Hong Kong, Lions use the free mobile messaging app WhatsApp to communicate the latest Lions news and to call meetings. On the Channel Island of Jersey in the United Kingdom, Lions share their latest fundraising news on Twitter: "Jersey #LionsClub Swimarathon raises more than £133,000 for local charities."

Conventions, newsletters and traditional forms of communication aren't going away. But increased digital communication means that Lions can connect quicker than ever. For example, when the Barasoain Host Lions Club in the Philippines donated eyeglasses to students in March 2015, the club posted a photo of their project on the Lions Facebook page. Instantly, Lions worldwide could see the project and share the news with others. Hundreds of followers expressed their enthusiasm

for the project, encouraging the club to keep up the good work.

As the world gets smaller, Lions are making sure members know how to stay connected. Lions Clubs offer workshops on how to effectively use technology to engage with club members and the local community. In 2012, Lions in Europe began Social Media in Lions Europe (SMiLE) seminars on the best practices of social media. The program quickly spread to the entire Lions organization and continues to educate members.

No one knows what technology will develop during Lions' next 100 years to help members better connect with each other. Social media may soon be a relic of the centennial celebration era. But whatever the method, robust communication among members will remain a hallmark of Lions Clubs International.

The Ohio Attorney General's Charitable Law Section provides in-person training on multiple topics and hosts monthly webinars.

In-person trainings, available by request, include:

- Bingo School Learn the duties of officers and board members, state rules and requirements, and other issues of interest to bingo operators.
- Minding the Business While Changing the World: Legal Obligations of Charity Leaders Understand the basic requirements all charitable boards must follow and how to protect an organization and its beneficiaries.
- Charitable Fundraising: the Good, the Bad, and the Ugly – Learn about the legal requirements for fundraising, how to select and work with professional solicitors, and problems to avoid.

UPDATE From the Tri-Village Lions: Milestones for Sydney

Two years ago, we learned that Sydney Harrison had been diagnosed with Juvenile Myositis. Juvenile Myositis is a life-threatening and incurable disease that causes a child's own immune system to attack healthy tissue and cells, which can cause pain, organ failure and even lead to death. The Tri-Village Lions have focused on doing something active for Sydney and all the other children with Juvenile Myositis through our fundraising efforts in support of CureJM. Over the last two years,

TeamSydneyforCureJM has added \$10,000 to the coffers of the research organization that is dedicated to finding a CURE for this devastating disease, and we don't intend to stop now. Many Lions throughout MD13 and, particularly, OH5 have joined our efforts, and we thank you!

That being said, we thought it was time to share some really wonderful news. Sydney turned six years old last week, and her obvious joy and vitality shine through in recent pictures.



There is still no cure for JM, but we are happy to report that Sydney is officially considered in remission, and next month she will have her last IVIG treatment (hopefully for a long while!) at Children's Hospital.

There is still no cure for JM, but they are getting closer! We'll keep finding ways to support that research, and hope that Sydney stays happy and healthy until they do!!



SUNBURY LIONS CLUB SPONSORING 73rd OX ROAST ON LABOR DAY

The Sunbury Lions Club will be sponsoring the 73rd Ox Roast and Community Festival on the Square in Sunbury on Labor Day, September 4th between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. There will be activities for everyone. The Ox Roast and Festival will feature vendors offering products such as antiques, jewelry, and furniture as well as other items. There will also be activities such as a bounce house and slides. The Big Walnut High School Band and the Central Ohio Harmonica Association will provide additional entertainment.

The Lions Club will be serving breakfast from 7-10 a.m. for vendors and early shoppers. The menu includes egg sandwiches and egg and sausage sandwiches as well as coffee and juice.

From 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. the Lions Club will be serving their famous ox roast sandwiches along with hotdogs, baked beans, coleslaw, potato salad, chips and soda or water. A drive-thru for purchasing the meals will also be set up. The drive-thru entry will be located behind Linda's Antiques, and the exit will be by Whitney Insurance. The sandwich stand will be located next to Whitney Insurance.

The first ox roast occurred in 1944 and has taken place every Labor Day rain or shine. The Vendors market was introduced in 1965. The Ox Roast and Vendor Market attracts 5,00-7,000 visitors every Labor Day. On average, the Lions Club sells 2,000 sandwiches, 100 pounds of potato salad, 50 pounds of coleslaw, 70 pounds of baked beans, 100 pies, and 30 cases of soda.
