VOICECORPS AMBASSADORS AVAILABLE AS MEETING SPEAKERS

Voicecorps reading service, long known for reading newspapers and other print for blind and disabled Ohioans, has expanded its geographic service area. Voicecorps is asking for your help by telling your Club members the good news. Plus, you can now book a speaker from Voicecorps at your next virtual Lions Club meeting.

Established in 1975 in central Ohio and serving thousands of people living with blindness, low vision and other conditions that prevent reading print, Voicecorps provides daily news and information 24/7. Originally available in central Ohio, Voicecorps is now in the Black Swamp area of northwest Ohio and the Appalachian corridor leading from mid-Ohio to the southeast corner of the state. Voicecorps Ambassadors can tell you how.



A long-time friend to Lions Clubs, Voicecorps had to cease in-person outreach with the outbreak of the pandemic. Now that Lions Clubs are using Zoom for meetings online, Voicecorps Ambassadors can fill your guest speaker needs with a relatively short notice.

Voicecorps continues seeking guest speaker opportunities with central Ohio clubs. Time to File

For the large majority of clubs, now is the time to file your IRS return and your Attorney General return. If you are using the standard July to June fiscal year, then your returns are due. Both returns will cover the 2019-2020 year. At this time **only 44%** of our clubs have filed with the IRS and **only 51%** have completed their Attorney General return. UPDATE: OH5 Buckeye Mask Project

IT'S NOT TOO LATE TO BE PART OF OUR PRIDE!

It's not too late for YOUR club to have a part in the OH5 Buckeye Mask Project – and earn some points in the District Zone and Club Contest along the way!

We have more than 1300 masks of different sizes, colors, and patterns. We even have masks in “kids” size. Each mask has been sealed in a separate plastic bag with a tag that identifies it as coming from the Lions of Central Ohio (but the tag could say it was specifically from YOUR club, if you choose).

Our goal is to sell 1000 masks and donate the rest. If we can meet that goal, the Buckeye Food Alliance (BFA) on OSU's campus will receive a donation of at least 200 masks to be distributed to students who worry about food insecurity and now worry about their safety, and that of their families, in the midst of the pandemic. Additionally, a donation of \$1000 will go directly to the BFA. You can read more about the mask project and about the BFA at <https://tinyurl.com/BuckeyeMasks>

First, though, we have to sell those 1000 facemasks. We are about half way there, and you can help us reach that goal – while we help you!!!

We know that many clubs have had to forego their regularly scheduled fundraisers and



service projects this spring/summer because of the pandemic. And we know that many Lions are still hesitant about coming together. Now you can join with Lions from throughout OH5 to be part of a service project that is important not “in spite of COVID-19,” but “**BECAUSE** of COVID-19.”

For each contribution of \$125, your club can purchase 25 facemasks to be donated for use by vulnerable members of your community. You may choose to donate them to a local food pantry, or a community center, or as a “thank you” to first responders in your area who put themselves in jeopardy every day to serve.

A SPECIAL OPPORTUNITY for next week's FALL INTO SERVICE (October 4-10th). For every 25 adult masks that your club buys from the Buckeye Mask Project, the Tri-Village Lions will supply an additional 25 masks for you to share with children in your area, doubling your impact.

International Convention Committee

According to the Ohio Lions Bylaws, the International Convention Committee is set up as follows:

1. **PURPOSE:** Prepare plans and make provisions for necessary activities at the annual International Convention for the Ohio Delegation:
2. **MEMBERSHIP:** Voting members consist of one (1) member from each Sub-District of Multiple District 13 - Ohio Lions, Inc., to be appointed as hereinafter provided.
3. **APPOINTMENT:** District Governor of each Sub-District shall appoint a qualified Lion from within his/her district for a three (3) year term. Appointment schedule: Refer to Section 14 of this Article III.
4. **TERM LIMIT:** A committee member in good standing may serve two (2) consecutive terms and then be ineligible for appointment to this committee for one (1) Lions year.
5. **AUTHORITY:** All actions of this committee not otherwise assigned by the MD13 Constitution or MD13 Bylaws shall be subject to the approval of the Council of Governors

As stated above we plan the functions that take place at the International Convention involving Ohio Lions and their families that are in attendance. This includes hospitality room, socials, convention giveaways, the parade uniform, and breakfasts. Our functions are paid for with a small amount of dues revenue and the sale of the Ohio Lions Annual State Pin

This year the committee is looking at subsidizing the cost of the Midwest breakfast, planning an Ice Cream Social and looking at a possible reception honoring ID Steve and Becky Thornton.

We are in the process of selling the current Ohio Pin which commemorates the upcoming Convention in Montreal

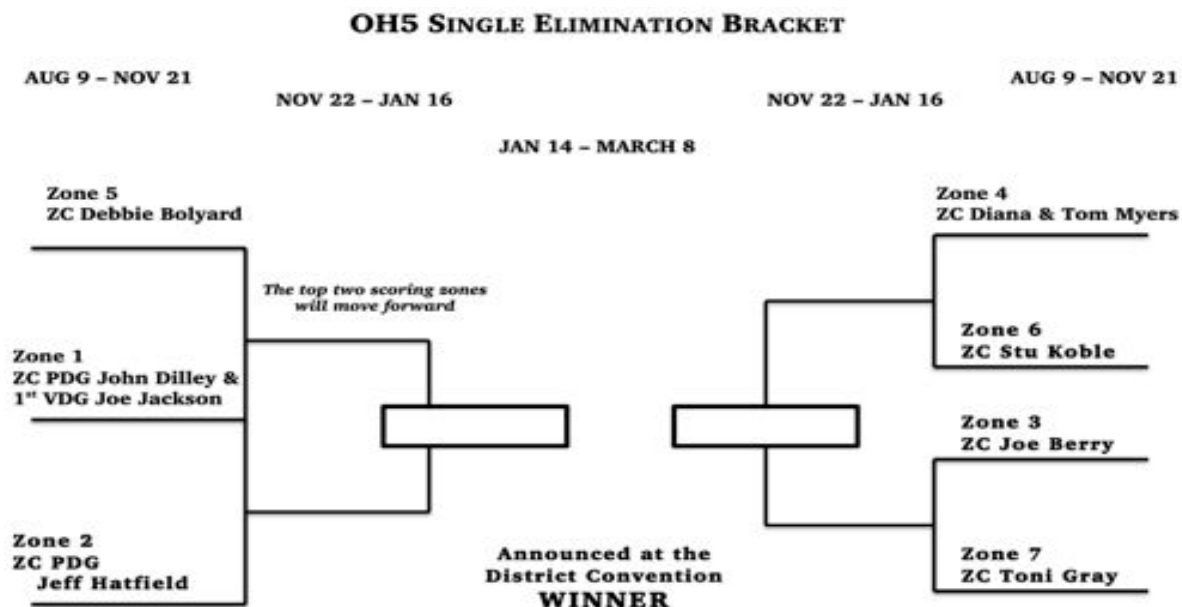
Pin trading is still very active at the International Conventions/ the cost of the pins are \$2.00 each and can be obtained from me or one of the District Officers.

“Can We See” - The Possibilities?

VISION: 1925 when Hellen Keller stated: “Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?” This request served as the vision for Lions Clubs for the past 95 years, thus we have aided the blind and worked toward preventable blindness. Maybe VISION can help preserve and grow Lionism. Words often have multi-meanings when applied to different situations. Here’s a different definition of Vision extracted from “*Full Steam Ahead*” by Ken Blanchard & Jesse Lyn Stoner, 2011, page 169:

What is Vision?

- Vision is knowing who you are, where you’re going, and what will guide your journey.
- Knowing who you are means being clear about your purpose. Where you’re going is your picture of the future. What will guide your journey are your values.

Why is Vision Important?

- Good leadership starts with vision; leadership is about going somewhere.
- Vision helps you get focused, get energized, and get great results.
- Vision keeps you going during times of adversity.

Thus, I am suggesting that each Lions Club search for their vision in today’s environment. Lions need to re-discover what it means to them to be a Lion. **Who they are?** Our Club leaders need to build a picture that we can see, not vague, be proactive not reactive, and focus on the end results. **Where are you going?** Lions should contribute to answering the question, “**how**”; using as a guiding for your daily behaviors and acting consistently on their values. **Guide you journey?**

Being a volunteer and having other responsibilities, you may not have the knowledge, skills, or time to construct a vision for your club. You can request outside assistance, research what is available, or participate in training. Each District has an assigned GAT, GLT, GMT, GAT, and a NAMI Champion, which may assist you in building a vision for you club and its members. NAMI – North American Membership Initiative Process is: Opt-in, build a team, build a vision, build a plan, build success. All the GMT Chairpersons has materials that covers several aspects of membership, also material can be found on line at LCI – Membership. If you have exhausted your contacts, you can contact ME. I will be happy to assist you and your club, zone, or district.

□ **Book Drive:** Volunteers of all ages can host a new or gently-used book drive through their own personal networks, community groups, or businesses. *Reach Out and Read* children receive new books during checkups, and gently-used books are given to an older sibling, provided at a sick visit, or simply help to build a child's home library. Since the book drive can last days, weeks, or even

months, this is a great long-term volunteer option.

□ **Virtual Book Drive:** You can also host a book drive online. Deep discounts from publishers, as well as our innovative bulk purchasing program, enable *Reach Out and Read* to buy books at more than half off of standard retail pricing, allowing your gift to benefit more children. The Virtual Book Drive is a terrific way to introduce your organization to *Reach Out and Read* and easily make a meaningful impact to the 4 million children and families we serve annually. OLPCF

The OLPCF, established August 2019, was born from the statewide STEPS walks that began in 2017. It just recently gave its first grant, a \$25,000 donation to Rainbow Babies Children's Hospital in Cleveland. It has 3 missions: support childhood cancer research; to provide emergency assistance to families in need; and to provide clubs and districts who are doing a qualifying event for pediatric cancer with access to a 501(c)(3) restricted fund. It also is a support structure for the various STEPS walks around the state, which are incorporated into the OLPCF. Through the STEPS walks and donations made directly to OLPCF from around the state, over \$100,000 has been raised and donated to pediatric cancer hospitals and organizations around Ohio.
