- ⇒ Get your IRS e-postcard done early. You don't have to wait until November.
- ⇒ Same holds true for the Attorney General's office it takes less than 5 minutes to report your status and if you have significant assets, to write the required check.
- ⇒ Secretaries and presidents, get those service hours entered into MyLCI. Each entry takes very little time. Having them entered isn't just for show or for LCI, by the way prospective members do sometimes look at these, and they can. Even if your club is super active, if you don't take the time to report the events, it looks like you have a dead club. Not a good impression.
- ⇒ Find a new service project for the year. It can be anything, and it only has to be one, but a new project, especially in a dead time for your club (i.e. winter) can rejuvenate the membership. I saw it happen in my own club and in several others last year.
- ⇒ Find something real for every member in your club. Ownership is a retention point if your club doesn't engage a member, why should that person stay as a member?

- ⇒ Use not only any communication tools your club has, but also the district newsletter, the district Facebook, the district website, and the statewide email program to advertise your events and to brag a little after. Spread the word that you have things going. Makes your own members feel good, and it can help with attendance as well.
- ⇒ Have guest speakers at your general meetings. If nothing else, get someone from the many programs we all donate to and have them give your members an update on the program. They'll come!
- ⇒ Don't forget to ask people who you think would be good Lions if they are interested in helping at an event, or attend a meeting. Avoid hitting them with the membership word right away; let them see for themselves what it's all about.
- ⇒ Most of all, make sure you get something out of it as well! Have fun and enjoy the experience.

District Project for the Homeless

We have been getting plenty of hard eyeglass cases from all of you. Thank you so much for the outpouring of support in this great endeavor in such a short period of time! We have more than 500 cases. While we'll still take those cases and continue with this project in the upcoming years, we are now in need of donations to fill these cases and we are looking for donations of the following items:

- Bandaids (big and small)
- Wet Wipes
- Antibiotic Ointment
- Sample size meds—Tylenol and Aspirin
- Chapstick
- Toenail clippers
- Tissues (small hand pack)
- Sewing kits (small travel size)

We've applied for a Grant from the Memorial Fund to purchase these items to try and fill somewhere between 500-750 cases. We'll keep you posted on where that stands as we find out more. We'll label the cases as a "First Aid Kit" and put our Lions logo on the sticker. If we can get enough donations to fill the cases we can begin distributing them to the homeless in January. You can bring these items to your zone meetings and turn them over to one of the officers, or we can pick them up from you when we visit your club.

Communication is the key to making ALERT work within the Districts throughout the program. Get to know your County Emergency Management Agency Director and work on building those relationships. If you are not sure who your County Emergency Management Agency Director is you can contact your ALERT representative, Lion Debbie Horn, at country_girl740@yahoo.com or you can go to the State of Ohio Emergency Management Agency Website at www.ema.ohio.gov.

Currently we have one district utilizing ALERT funding. OH6 is securing funds for flooding victims of Ohio River flooding and tornado damage. OH2 is currently speaking to clubs and zones about what ALERT is and how they can get involved and building relationships with other volunteer groups and local Emergency Management Agencies.

The State of Ohio Emergency Management Agency and FEMA says this September is National Preparedness Month (NPM) the Ready campaign's theme is Disasters Happen. Prepare Now. Learn How. They have set up different campaigns for the month of September and encourage you to get involved by participating in NPM's weekly themes:

Week I: Sept I-8 Make and Practice your Plan

Week 2: Sept 9-15 Learn Life- Saving Skills

Week 3: Sept 16-22 Check your Insurance Coverage

Week 4: Sept 23-29 Save for an Emergency

Another way we can all be prepared for an emergency is by encouraging our communities to take advantage of our "Message in a Bottle" project. District 13-OH5 Vision Resources

There are many clubs who might not be aware of the resources the District has for Vision services when you get a request for help pay for eye exams or eyeglasses. Although you are not required to assist those in need with one of these resources, they are available should your club be willing to help.

- ✓ The club has money in their budget to handle this type of help and may work with a local eye doctor to get discounted exams and eyeglasses.
- ✓ Prevent Blindness Ohio (PBO) can help meet the need. There are two levels of club involvement with this option. See the District website Resources for these options and PBO assistance. www.district13oh5.org. You can also contact District Sight & Hearing Representative, Bob Medley, who can help you through this process.

Rules:

- 1. Any club participating must have at least two forms of communication, including at least one that is electronic. (i.e. website, Facebook, Twitter, etc.) Clubs should identify these when they submit for participation. MAKE SURE club is easily identifiable with all communications!
- 2. Communication must have at least one form for member information, and at least one form for public information. These can be combined in each type of communication but do not have to be.
- 3. Websites should be regularly (at least once every two months) updated; Facebook and other social media should be updated at least once a month; newsletters (emailed and mailed) should be monthly. Promotional brochures highlighting the club will be acceptable as well. Flyers highlighting special events will also be viewed favorably. Email communications with simple notes to members are considered, but do NOT simply copy DG Mike on a thread this will be deleted without consideration. Relevant communications of this nature should be forwarded only, as a sample.
- 4. Criteria include regularity of updates; appearance; content; ease of navigation; and promotion.

Contest will run from October 1 to March 1. Final results and awards presented at the OH5 Convention Lunch.

Deadline for registration is **September 30, 2018**. Any club wishing to participate needs to submit an email to DG Mike at mjkerek@msn.com by that date by the club contact. Specify the methods of communication your club wishes the panel to take into account, and provide account name (in the case of social media), website address, and/or newsletter for October if this is something used. An email will be sent to acknowledge. DO NOT ASSUME registration until the response email is received!

Send all newsletters to the above email, where DG Mike will forward to the other judges. Websites and social media will be regularly monitored.



We are pleased to inform you that the MD 13 GLT will once again be offering a "Regional Lions Leadership Institute" to the Lions of Ohio. We are also pleased to announce that we again will offer a third level this year. Levels I and II will be limited to thirty participants. Level III will be limited to 15 participants.

The Lions Institutes are indeed the "Ivy League" of leadership training. The institute at all levels will be a three-day immersion into developing and improving your leadership skills. This training will not only help you in your work with Lions, but also in your profession and your life.

Hands-On Activity: Who Do You Know With Diabetes?

Part Two:

Now that club members understand the impact of diabetes among their fellow Lions, it's time to start thinking about diabetes-related service activities that can make an impact in your community.

Facilitator Instructions:

- Divide participants in small groups.
- Give each participant a fresh piece of paper/card stock and a marker.
- Ask each group to take about 15 minutes to discuss the types of activities that could help prevent and manage diabetes locally.
- 4. After the group discussion, gather all the participants in one large circle.
- Have each participant write down an action item they could take, related to diabetes prevention and control.
- One by one, ask each participant to hold up their papers and name their suggested action.
- Discuss the different action items as a group.
- Summarize all the great ideas that have been shared and narrow down a list of service activities your club could do.
