Sometimes, we just need a good story to make us smile. I came across this story the other day and as I read it, I realized I had a smile on my face. I thought I would share it with you, with the hope that it put a smile on your face too.

Firefighter Spencer Caradine, 21, of Dallas, Georgia, couldn't help but burst into tears when his colleagues at the Douglas County Fire Department surprised him with an enormous American flag draped over their fire engine on the Fourth of July.

"I was overwhelmed," Caradine told InsideEdition.com. "I didn't know what to think or say. It was like entering into a whole new world. I didn't know how to explain any of it."

His good friend and roommate, firefighter Jordan Gardner, said he organized the surprise because he knew Caradine wanted the first thing he saw in color to be the American flag.

"It's been almost three weeks, and every time I look over, he's just staring off at something," Gardner joked. "I can't help but smile thinking about how he can finally see like the rest of us."

They explained that they were on a hike together last December when Gardner was stopping to point out certain things in the scenery and Caradine realized he wasn't seeing the world around them in quite the same way.

"When we were on the hike I was trying to point stuff out. I would stop at all these places and look out at everything," Gardner said. "I love doing stuff like that, I love [looking at] the [water]falls." Caradine added, "I couldn't figure out what he was talking about at all."

That's when they came to the conclusion together that Caradine was colorblind, and at that moment, Gardner decided he would eventually surprise him with a pair of EnChroma glasses.

Gardner then spent the next several months trying to figure out what kind of colorblind his roommate is, by asking him to do various colorblind tests under the guise of helping him learn more about his condition.

By the time Gardner placed the order, many of their colleagues at the fire department knew about the surprise and wanted to pitch in.

"I didn't know how to explain why we had a 6-foot-by-10-foot American flag hanging off the side of the engine," he said. "I was like, 'This is your first Fourth of July at the station. We're having a big breakfast, that's just what we do at the firehouse."

After breakfast, Caradine was given the glasses and led out to the courtyard to see the flag.

"Neither of us are emotional people at all and we both cried," Gardner said.

Ever since then, Caradine has rarely taken off his new glasses.

"We got him five coloring books, couple hundreds of pencil crayons. We color on shift just so he can learn his colors," Gardner said. "It's like I'm a proud dad; our fridge at the house is covered in all these coloring papers."

The pair has since watched fireworks, gone to the aquarium and hiked the route again that led them to their original discovery.

The next thing on Caradine's to-see list: "I want to see the sunset on a beach."

I was struck by how one person could motivate a small group of people to change a someone's life. It is exactly what all of you do in your clubs and in your communities every day. Thank you for all your hard work, but more importantly, thank you for being a leader in helping people in your community.

# What Is the F&P Committee?

The Ohio Lions Finance and Long Range Planning Committee (F&P) is a large committee of 17 members. There are 7 elected district reps who are the voting members and there are an additional 10 non-voting exofficio Lions. Just as a reminder, "ex-officio" means "by virtue of office" -whomever is the Council Chair, Chair of the Liaison Committee, and others by their position are included.

The Planning part of F&P looks at areas where we Lions can next serve, future concerns for Ohio Lions, growing Lion Clubs and new Lions Clubs, and the future opportunities that we Lions should explore. And yes, sometimes, this means looking at redistricting.

The Finance part of F&P looks at financial trends,

where our dues money is going, where it should in the future, and making sure the Ohio Lions have enough money to do its mission. And yes, sometimes this means a dues increase. The administrative part of F&P includes audits, contracts, recommending approval of financial documents, and regulations that we need to meet. Of course, with all this paperwork, there are still opportunities to explore.

The F&P committee has a strong presence to suggest and recommend changes to the Council of Governors. One of the strengths of F&P is that 4-7 voting members return each year while all 7 District Governors and the Council Chair change each year. This continuity of year after year is bolstered by the large number of ex-officio members. This allows F&P to look at longer term trends and issues. Why would you think about running to be a Finance and Long Range Planning Rep? Mainly because you can shape and make a significant difference in where the Lions of Ohio go. How do we best manage money to drive our next set of needs and initiatives? How do we change our dues structure due to changes in our Ohio needs and Lion membership? How do we plan?

We must change. We must adapt. Lions on the Finance and Long Range Planning Committee get to influence these changes. This is why I choose to be on the Finance and Long Range Planning Committee. If you have an interest in getting involved, talk to me or the incoming Vice Governors. We are always looking for someone to grow the cause.

## What Is A Club Administrator?

(We hope this information from LCI is helpful for you!)

In order to assist some club officers who may have difficulty operating certain technologies, Lions Clubs International created the role of "club administrator" to support a club president or secretary with administrative tasks that are completed through MyLCI/MyLion. This role has access to the same information in MyLCI/MyLion as the club president and secretary. Together and in consultation, the president and secretary may assign this administrative role if deemed beneficial for effective club operations. The club administrator is not a formal position recognized by LCI, but functions to provide administrative assistance only.

Holding an online or event fundraiser is an excellent strategy for bringing a community together and increasing visibility and support for a local need. The Service Toolkit features a **Fundraising Guide**, designed especially for clubs looking to elevate their next service project. The guide includes:

- 1. Fundraiser planning checklists
- 2. Volunteer planner
- 3. Club service story template
- 4. Promotional checklist


