The AG in Ohio is coming down on all non-profits, not just Lions. **This is not going away.** And, if your club's status with the IRS is revoked, your club will risk losing its charter with LCI and the ability to continue serving your community. We do not want that to happen. Think about this...how would your community suffer if you were no longer able to continue to make the impact in your community that you do now? PLEASE get filed and get compliant, if you haven't already.

Across the globe, Lions are rolling up their sleeves and taking action. With over 1.4 million members, we're the largest service organization in the world. And we're as dedicated to helping those in need today as we were in 1917, when we first began.

Lions serve. For over 100 years, we've served with uncommon kindness, putting the needs of our neighbors and our communities and our world first. We look back at our storied past with pride, but we know it's only the beginning. Every day, we're building on our legacy with the goal of making an even greater impact in the future.

After more than 100 years of serving humanity, we continue to grow and expand through "The Power of WE." There are more than 1.4 million Lions, in more than 47,000 Lions Clubs, in 200+ countries and regions around the world.

OHIO LIONS SIGHT AND HEARING FOUNDATION

The Ohio Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation is a charity available to all Lions Clubs in the state of Ohio, Multiple District 13. The main goal of our Foundation is to help provide funds for those medical services that are beyond the limits of local Lions Clubs or District Foundations related to eyes and ears.

Lions are famous for our focus on sight preservation and assistance to those with sight impairment. Our goal is to help those who fall beyond the scope of government programs, can't afford their deductibles or coinsurance, or possibly do not have any medical insurance coverage. In addition, some treatments are not typically covered by insurance such as vision therapy and hearing aids. Individuals whose income is at or below 200% of current Federal Poverty Levels are eligible to apply for assistance. One in three residents in Ohio fall within this income level.

Our medical directors will review all applications, medical necessity of treatments, and consult with the applicant's surgeon, as needed, to choose the best option for treatment. As there are limits for the aid available, we will negotiate the lowest cost for treatment, and no treatment will be allowed without prior consultation. Each case will be considered on an individual basis.

Examples of procedures we will consider providing financial help for are:

- corneal transplants,
- cataract surgery,
- laser eye treatments,
- other approved eye surgeries,
- assistance with purchase of special, expensive eyeglasses and vision equipment,
- and hearing aids.

All inquiries are to be sponsored by a Lions Club, Zone or District. The sponsor should help the individual complete the application, coordinate with the District Sight and Hearing Chair, and contribute towards the care needed, if possible.

The Foundation will NOT consider:

- Purchase of ordinary glasses or exams. These can be provided by local Lion Clubs or through our partnership with Prevent Blindness Ohio.
- Any treatment already received. All cases MUST have prior approval by the Board.
- We will only pay out of state doctors within 50 miles of the Ohio border, and typically in cases when those providers are the closest available for some of our rural Ohio areas.
- We will not provide funds for anything covered and paid by the individual's own insurance.

The Foundation accepts donations from individuals, businesses, and Lions Clubs, and all donations are tax deductible. Please work with Board members in your District for donations and applications for assistance.

LCIF 100 CAMPAIGN

ALERT COMMITTEE

(From Chair, Lion Deb Horn)

ALERT: With the weather changing are you prepared for the upcoming winter? Have you checked your smoke alarms? When was the last time you changed your battery in your smoke detector? Do you have a smoke detector?

If you don't have a smoke detector or know someone in your community who could use a smoke detector, contact your local Red Cross. **They will provide and install a smoke detector for FREE.**

From the Desk of Ohio Emergency Management Agency:

This month is National Earthquake Month. Do you know what to do in case of an earthquake? An earthquake is the sudden, rapid shaking of the earth, caused by the breaking and shifting of subterranean rock as it releases strain that has accumulated over a long time. Initial mild shaking may strengthen and become extremely violent within seconds. Aftershocks may follow the initial earthquake.

During an Earthquake:

If inside when the shaking starts

- Drop, Cover and Hold On. Move as little as possible.
- If you're in bed, stay there. Curl up and hold on. Protect your head with a pillow.
- Stay away from windows to avoid being injured by shattered glass
- Stay indoors until the shaking stops and you are sure it's safe to exit. If you must leave the building after the shaking stops, use stairs rather than an elevator, in case of aftershocks, power outages or other damage.

If outside when the shaking starts

- Find a clear spot and drop to the ground. Stay there until the shaking stops (away from buildings, power lines, trees, street lights).
- If you're in a vehicle, pull over to a clear location and stop. Avoid bridges, overpasses and power lines, if possible. Stay inside the vehicle until the shaking stops.
- If a power line falls on your vehicle, do not get out. Call and wait for assistance

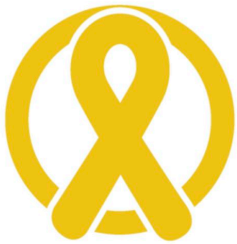

SOMETHING NEW HAS BEEN ADDED!

In honor of the 100th anniversary celebration of the Ohio Lions, this month we begin a new feature. We will be examining one of the most unique traditions of Lionism – pin trading – and sharing some background on the unique pins that Ohio Lions have worn (and traded!) over the years. To begin, we are pleased to share an excerpted history of pin trading from the MD13 website:



PIN TRADING IN LIONISM

Background

The first "friendship pins" were introduced in the late 1940's and 50's and were, for the most part, little plastic replicas of States or items from the various States. Many were thrown from the floats that were entered in the big Lions parade that traditionally kicks off the Lions Clubs International (LCI) conventions. Because they were disposable, these items have now become some of the most sought after collectibles in all of Lionism.

Trading pins as we know them today, arrived on the scene in the late 1960's and 70's. At present all 50 States and Multiple Districts within the U.S.A. and within most of the provinces of Canada issue at least one so-called State/Province pin each year to commemorate the site of the LCI convention. In addition to all of these pins, almost every known country or geographical location within Lionism issues pins. Further, individual Districts and Clubs issue pins, as well as scores of individual Lions and Lionesses. The number of pins issued each year is not known, but it is safe to say that there are literally thousands upon thousands produced on an annual basis. Not to be overlooked are the special or so-called prestige pins that are issued from time-to-time by many of the aforementioned sources. One of the unique experiences that one can have at an LCI convention is the opportunity to collect pins from all over the world. Thousands of attendees become pin traders for at least the week they are enjoying the convention activities.

Lions International Trading Pin Club

The Lions International Trading Pin Club (LITPC) was "born" on June 27, 1973 during the LCI Convention in Miami Beach, Florida. From the less than 50 Lions, representing 11 States and Provinces who signed up in 1973, the LITPC has grown into an organization with a membership from 50 States, the District of Columbia, most Provinces of Canada and 18 other Districts/Multiple Districts from outside of North America. The LITPC was organized for the purposes of fostering and developing friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding through the avocation of trading

and collecting Lions friendship pins, which are more commonly referred to as trading pins. The founding fathers of the LITPC hoped that this association would have a lasting and continuing influence on their desire to strengthen international Lionism through international good will. There is no doubt that this objective has and continues to be achieved.
