From DG Pauline

Well, Happy New Year, Happy Valentine's Day and Happy St Patrick's Day (and maybe I should add Happy Easter to this!?) Yes, I have been very lax in getting this newsletter written. I have completed almost all of my visits to clubs. I have 8 club visits scheduled and yet to do and I am still having a little trouble scheduling visits with 4 clubs but hopefully it all clubs will be visited before the beginning of May and the MD Convention in Bozeman.

One of the 'challenges' this year (besides redistricting) is that there are only 4 zone chairs in the district – 2 in Alberta and 2 in Montana. We should have 7. I have been trying to fill in as Zone Chair in eastern Alberta but I haven't been doing the job I should be – nor have I done anything for the other two zones in Montana. The DG team is working together on all of the

the issues that arise from the creation of the new District. For District 37 (Montana), the DG Team will be Richard Gessling from Red Lodge, 1st VDG Jayne Pfeifer. On February 7th, there was a Council meeting followed by a special MD Convention for the endorsement of PID Patti Hill as a candidate for International President. It was unanimous in support of PID Patti!

March is busy with the Advanced Lions Leadership Institute in Calgary and the Regional Lions Leadership Institute is scheduled for Lethbridge in April. Officially the deadline has passed, but there are still some vacancies. Contact our District GLT Leader PDG Sharon West and/or the MD GLT Coordinator PDG Christine Lank immediately if you are interested. This is a rare opportunity to improve your skills – for your personal life, your professional life and, of course, your Lions life!

There are options upcoming for club officer training – April - Strathmore, AB (District 37-O), May - Lethbridge, AB and something is in the works on the Montana side of the District –(more info forthcoming). It has taken me longer to get this newsletter together for you – and I will try to do better for the remaining months of my term as your District Governor.

Special MD 37 Convention Huge Success

February 7, 2015 will be remembered as a milestone date in the history of Multiple District 37. Close to 190 Lions gathered at the Bowness Lions Hall in Calgary at the call of the Council of Governors to consider the endorsement of Lion Dr. Patti Hill for the office of Second Vice President of Lions Clubs International. They travelled from all corners of the MD, as far north as Athabasca and Grande Prairie and south to Bozeman, Montana. They came by plane, bus and car to show their support for an exceptional candidate for this high office. 135 voting delegates were unanimous in their support for the endorsement of Lion Patti. The results have been filed with Lions Clubs International and the campaign moves into the next phase as we communicate the results to the Lions of Canada and our International leaders. We hope to see many of our Lions in Bozeman, Montana May 1 and 2 (the regular and final MD37 convention) to celebrate this journey to victory. We will have special edition pins and other opportunities for all to join the campaign. All in preparation for the Honolulu convention which begins June 26, 2015.

LIONS YOUTH CAMP & EXCHANGE

In the summer of 2015, students from our local Canadian high schools in District 37N will have the opportunity to participate in a three-to-six week youth exchange program sponsored by the Lions of District 37N. This exchange program promises fun and an opportunity for travel to another part of our country or to a foreign country of your choice. As well, students will have the opportunity to make new friends, experience a different culture, and be exposed to a variety of new experiences. Yes, there will be much fun in this venture.

As Lions Clubs, you have the interesting task of providing all of this for a young person in your community. This person – female or male – does not necessarily have to be related to a Lions member. This is open to senior high school students who have good leadership potential and have a strong leaning towards meeting and learning about new people in another part of our universe.

Each successful applicant will be provided with monetary assistance of One Thousand (\$1000.00) Dollars from the District 37N YCE Committee. The rest of the monies will come from the student and his/her family and, hopefully, from the sponsoring Lions club. The YCE Committee will also provide each successful applicant with an appropriate wearing apparel (jacket, vest), business cards et al. The foreign countries include, of course, our neighbors to the south, Mexico, overseas countries such as France, England, Scotland, Germany, South Korea, Japan, and more.

The District 37N YCE Committee will be sponsoring four high school students. If more than one student apply in your community, it will be the club's responsibility to select one student who will represent that club and community. This is the first phase. The second phase will be that once all the applications have been received by the District 37N YEC Committee, the Committee will interview each applicant recommended by the local Lions Club and, if there are more than four applicants, the Committee will select the four successful candidates to go on the exchange next summer.

Where there are Leos in the District, the person(s) in charge of the Leo Club will select the candidate and the candidate's name and application form will be forwarded to the Committee.

The application forms are available on the website. Go to the Lions Clubs International website and type in "Youth Camp" in the upper right hand corner of the MYLCI webpage. You will also find a list of countries involved in exchanges and camps on this website.

Because of the popularity of this important Lions' program, it is best if you could seek out students who are interested in participating in the 2014 YCE program and get their application forms in to us as soon as you can. Once we receive all the application forms, we will interview each one and finalize the selection of the successful candidate. Their application forms will then be sent to the appropriate YCE Chairperson of the country of their choice.

Save the date for the Montana Lions District 37 Convention.


October 9-10, 2015, at the newly remodeled Red Lion Colonial Inn in historic Helena, Montana.
