District Governor Message

Greetings to Lions, Lioness, and Leos!

It is now near the end of January and winter is almost over - depending on the ground hog's forecast coming Sunday! Hang in there, spring will get here eventually.

I have completed 46 of my 52 club visits with the rest to be scheduled by the end of March. As with my previous term as DG in Wyoming 20 years ago, I have found there are as many ways to serve a community as there are clubs. Each does things a little differently, but the goal is the same: to serve our communities. I would like to thank each club that I have visited for the warm hospitality shown to me and also their generosity to my charities of choice.

As of last week all districts have had their conventions and have past the redistricting proposal by the required two-thirds margins. One more vote is needed at the Multiple District Convention in May. It is expected that it will pass and the council is beginning to work on the proposal to be submitted in July. The Montana Past District Governor's Association has been meeting periodically to begin the transition to a single district and the District Governors in Canada have been in touch with each other on the process for their side of the border. On the membership level there is good news and bad news. The good news is that we have chartered a club in Eureka as of January 16th. The charter night dinner will be on March 21st. If you are interested in attending please contact me or Cabinet Secretary Jessica Falcon. The bad new is that the Crows Nest Pass club has turned in their charter. It does us no good if we trade one club for another. Membership and retention are important parts of a viable Lions Club. The continued decline in our membership is the root cause of the redistricting proposal.

While the year is half over, this is a good time to re-evaluate your goals and objectives for the year and expand your efforts to achieve them.



VISION SCREENING PROJECT

It's time for an update on our efforts regarding the Vision Screening Project, using the Plusoptix Vision Screening Devices. This Lions project has been very successful because of the efforts of a number of Lions around the State of Montana. While getting the funding was a necessary starting point it is the Lions that have been involved with the actual vision screening that have really made this project a success.

One update is that all of the paperwork has been sent off to LCIF to close out the grant that resulted in the § Lions of Montana getting \$529,400.00 g that was used to purchase vision screening devices. Lions' Tales December 2013

Lion-hearted

On his 100th birthday more than a year ago, Theodore "Ted" Allen, born at 11:55 p.m. on Feb. 28, 1912, remarked that if he arrived five minutes later he would have only been turning 25.

It was a leap year.

And the now 101-year-old Allen, the longest-serving Lions Club member in the world, still has his sense of humour; say current Taber club president Wayne Baker and member Jerry Farrage.

The pair were at Allen's current residence at St. Therese Villa in Lethbridge Monday

afternoon to give the life member the club's new official shirt for 2013.

"He always came to the meeting and he always had a joke; he has a tremendous sense of humour," said Baker, who has known Allen for 35 of years.

8 "He's been a Lions member longer 8 than anyone else in the world. Of course, he was that 10 years ago, too. That is something. It's so special."

Allen was asked last year if he wanted to keep his membership - Baker said he got mad at him for even asking.

"I've been a member of the Lions Club since 1935," said Allen, the former Taberite who has lived in Lethbridge for the past five years.

Allen is the only one of the Taber Lions Club's 26 charter members from 78 years ago who is still alive. The club's next longest-serving member has been there for 46 years.

Baker said Allen, who was a generational farmer and also raised competition race horses, was instrumental in having Taber's first arena built.

The Lions Club bought two old Sec-

ond World War-era airport hangars from Claresholm in the early 1950s, dismantled and moved them to Taber and re-assembled them as the first indoor arena. When it burnt down in 1970, the Lions Club gave the insurance money to the town to build the current Civic Centre.

Baker said Allen's long-term involvement is also even more applaudable

because of how hard it is to recruit and retain new club members. The Taber Lions Club has 16 current members.

"You can't get young people interested," Baker said.

"Young people these days don't have any community emotions at all. A lot of stuff isn't done by the aovernment. It's

been done by service clubs over the years."

"People are going to depend a lot on the charity from service clubs now because of the cuts in the budgets (provincial and federal)," Farrage added. "They'll be knocking on our doors."

The Lions Club International was founded in 1917 as an organization aiming to meet the needs of communities on a local and global scale. There are more than 1.35 million members between 45,000 clubs in 205 countries worldwide.

The Taber Lions Club has contributed to the town by sponsoring guide dogs, donating to the handibus and STARS, furnishing a room in palliative care at the Taber Hospital and supporting sports teams. It also runs the concessions at Cornfest and sells Christmas trees and sandbags in the wintertime.

Its most recent project involves the installation of a walk-in cooler for the Taber Food Bank Society.

In our own district the Bow Island Lions Club has been recycling for the community for the past number of years and just this past year opened a new recycling facility. Below is an article from the Bow Island Commentator.

By Jamie Rieger For the past 60 years, the Bow Island Lions Club has been dedicated to serving the people of the community and raising funds to help with a wide range of projects. From playground equipment and local sports teams to equipment at that Bow Island Health Centre, other health facilities, and recently, for service dog for a boy who suffers from seizures. On Saturday, the club celebrated not only its 60th anniversary, but also the opening of its new recycling facility. In October, 2011, the Bow Island Lions club members began discussing what to do with their building; whether to do necessary repair work or replace it altogether. "At that point, I was in my first year as president and I asked the club to give me a couple months to see how economical a new, environmentally-friendly building would be," said Bouw.Bouw soon learned that grant funding was available for energy efficient facilities, so he began applying for grants and along with donations from contractors, local businesses, and individuals, soon was able to raise the capital needed for a new recycling facility. "All the donations and a big dose of good luck made it all happen," he said. That dose of good luck came in the from a generous unnamed inheritance fund that came from a spouse of a past member. The new recycling centre is now able to handle a lot more product than just paper. cardboard, and specific plastics. With a recently installed plastic chipper and tin crusher, they can now accept all plastic containers, tin cans, and other recyclable that get shipped to Calgary or Edmonton for further processing. Past International president, Judge Brian Stevenson, was in attendance for the grand opening and said, "This facility is a representation of all the efforts the Lions Club members have put into the community and have for the past 60 years."Club members were honoured for their years of service to the club, including Dave Robertson, who has been involved with the Lions Club for the past 60 years and was made a charter member of the organization. Besides Stevenson, other dignitaries to attend the event were Bow Island mayor, Gordon Reynolds, MLA Drew Barnes, and district governor, Monte Weisser."To me, the Lions Club are the epitome of volunteerism," said Reynolds. "Our community is made better, made stronger because of them. The hours they have put in at the recycling facility has been an absolute asset.
