








We Create Change Campaign

Update from the MD 37 Council of Governors

On January 18th, the Council received a proposal from the Lions of Montana with information on redistricting Multiple District 37. The proposed action would leave the Lions of Alberta as a Multiple District. However, the Lions of Montana would unify into a single District that is completely separated from MD 37. The Council recommended that a committee composed of Lions from Alberta and Montana research this complex proposal and report back to the Council at the May meeting in Helena.

The actual presentation is contained in the link below and I strongly encourage every Lion in 37 N to take the time to review the presentation and examine this issue closely. It is best to be proactive and develop a recommendation that supports ALL Lions, regardless the outcome of the redistricting proposal. I have developed this presentation in conjunction with DG Lary Garrison (District S) based upon the request of the Lions in Montana. I am inviting you into a conversation that discusses changing our district boundaries. We all recognize that change can be scary, even when properly thought out and planned. I ask you to share your wisdom, experience and information with me and the committee as we research this issue over the next several months. Lethbridge Host Lions Project

One of the main programs that the Host Lions are involved in is the collection of eye glasses. Every three months the members get together and package used eyes glasses which are sent off to Calgary. On January 17th we met at Lion Beth Campbell's house and boxed 1500 glasses. Locally the Lions Club has collected over 47,000 glasses. We have 25 bins around the city of Lethbridge and Williams Moving and Storage transport them to Calgary free of charge. Calgary correctional Centre and offenders at the Centre sort, sanitize, inspect and read prescriptions on 4 lensometers, then package and label them individually. The glasses are packed and stored 350 to a box and stored at the Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre in Calgary, which was started in 1996. Since then over 3 million glasses have been distributed around the world.

The following are the qualification for the position for you information:

ARTICLE 5 QUALIFICATIONS FOR PROVINCIAL DIRECTORS

Section I: To qualify as a Candidate for Provincial Director on the Lions Foundation of Canada Board, he or she must;

- (a) Be a Lion in good standing; and
- (b) Any one of the following:
 - (i) Served as a District Representative for the Lions Foundation of Canada as appointed by the Provincial Director
 - (ii) Served as a District Representative for the Lions Foundation of Canada as appointed by the District Governor
 - (iii) Served as the Multiple District Representative for the Lions Foundation of Canada as appointed by the Council Chairman
 - (iv)Has served as District Governor, and has participated in the Lions Foundation of Canada's orientation program;
 - (v) Has served as a Representative, appointed by the Lions Foundation of Canada Board promoting and supporting one of the Lions Foundation of Canada projects.
- (c) It shall be the duty of the sitting Director to advise the selecting body of the qualifications required to be nominated as a Provincial Director.

Section 2:

- (a) All nominations as a candidate for the position of Provincial Director shall come as the result of whatever process has been adopted by each individual province for selection of its Provincial Director, and all such nominations, together with a resume of the candidate's Qualifications, including but not limited to his/her Business Experience, Community Activity, Lionistic Record and Current Involvement, must be received at the Foundation's Head Office in Oakville, on or before December 31st, of the year immediately preceding the year the Director would be elected to office.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the current Director to notify the Corporation in writing of the name and address of the candidate for Director for his or her Province &/or Territory.

Section 3: All nominations received by Lions Foundation of Canada for the position of Provincial Director are subject to final approval, without prejudice by the Board of Directors of the Lions Foundation of Canada provided the nominee meets the qualifications set out in Section #1. Such approval shall be at the mid-winter meeting held each year. (See Policy Manual: Appendix 1, for Provincial Selection Procedures).

Sadly, I am also reminded of the violence our children our witnessing not only across the world, but right here in the United States of America. Our children and schools are becoming victims of violent acts. More than ever it is time to take a stand to protect our nation's children.

As an educator I am reminded daily of the importance of providing an environment that supports and promotes our children not only in academics but in health and safety as well as to help them grasp a vision of the world before them. Children should have the opportunity to see themselves as citizens who have the power to change and improve their communities and the world around them. As a member of LIONS I am given the opportunity to serve the community and its children. One way to give our children a voice and an opportunity to share their vision of Peace is through this poster project.

The theme for the 2013-2014 Peace Poster Contest is quite fitting of our time, "Our World, Our Future." Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, 201 are eligible to participate in this contest. The contest promotes the arts, spreads peace and provides a voice for our children to express their vision of peace. Children use a variety of mediums, including charcoal, crayon, pencil and paint, to express the theme. The art will express the life experiences and culture of the child. Approximately 100 countries join together in this venture and near 400,000 worldwide children participate. Children compete locally and twenty-four international Peace Poster entries are selected each year. Posters are shared globally via the Internet, the media and exhibits around the world.

As stated within the LIONS Peace Poster brochure all posters are judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme. Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners. The grand prize grand prize winner will receive US \$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony with the sponsoring club president and two family members at Lions Day with the United Nations (subject to change). The 23 merit awards to be awarded will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.
