There were several changes to the LCI Standard Club Constitution & By-Laws at the LCI Convention in Boston MA on July 11, 2023. It is recommended that all District 36-R Clubs adopt the July 11, 2023 version of the Standard Club C&B's that were updated by LCI. It has many revisions to our older Club C&B's that most of the clubs are currently using.

Just have a club board/general meeting to vote and recommend adoption of the LCI July 11, 2023 version of the updated C&B's. Then have a committee review them for amendments your club may want to make, or wish to include past Amendments that your club may have made. Attach any Amendment(s) that are voted on with the date(s) they were voted on with the Club C&B's, then the club Secretary will keep the records.

I have been contacted by several clubs that needed further explanation and assistance in completing this task. This is a very necessary step that needs to be taken to get all clubs are ready when LCI, District 36, or the Multiple District sends out information referring to an Amendment and/or Section by roman numeral or sub-section letter or number. If those numbers and letters are not in sync, you may not know exactly what we may be voting on at future conventions.

Foundation trustees met at Rockaway Beach on Saturday October 28 at Rockaway Beach Lions Club.

Actions taken at the meeting:

- Approval of 2022-23 audited financial statement
- Approval of September 2023 financial report
- Approval of certain Bi-Laws changes and updates

Informational items presented and discussed

- The Foundation maintains its ranking as the #1 school screening program in the nation/world
 - In excess of 45,000 students screened YTD toward the FY goal of 165,000
 - Discussions in progress to regain Beaverton SD and Salem Kaiser SD
- Patient care guidelines are being revised to establish funding priorities for different types of service
 - Funds are typically available to fund \$45,000 of an estimated \$75,000 of requests
 - Patient services placed in three categories from highest to lowest priority
- Announcement of upcoming strategic planning process to cover years 2025-30
- Halloween Gala sales/donations of \$94K (vs. \$74K last year) resulting in \$50K-\$60K net of expenses

Foundation Ambassador Program

Each Lions Club has been assigned a trustee to act as an ambassador for the foundation. The ambassador is requested to contact each assigned club to schedule additional contact which in most cases is expected to be a video clip tailored to that club. The next Foundation trustee meeting will be on February 2 in Springfield Holiday Inn Express in conjunction with the convention.

Our goal this year is \$18,441.00 to date clubs have donated just over \$1,000.00. The District 36-R website continues to be developed and updated on an ongoing basis. All club activity information should continue to be sent in to be included on the Calendar page. New information about all District projects should be communicated to me so I can keep the Projects page updated. The surveys on the Survey page get little response, so that page may be changed to another use. Options are being explored to possibly include an online registration capability on the Convention page in addition to the traditional mail in forms.

The file for the logo graphic shown below is available for use to promote the district and the site. There is also a QR code graphic that can be used in any media including flyers, documents and newsletters. The QR code is read by phone camera apps that will then provide the phone with a direct link to the website.



Security Question: Some people clicking on the www.LionsDistrict36R.org link, or a hyperlink using it, have received a security warning and block from automatically proceeding to the website. Is the website “safe”? Can I click the “proceed to this website” button safely?

Short Answers: Yes. Yes.

Long Answer: The website is hosted on servers provided by Lions International and the page url’s are set and provided by the e-clubhouse template administrators. Our provided District website homepage url is: https://e-district.org/sites/district_36_r/index.php This is the permanent location on the internet where our homepage is located. The page can always be accessed, and there should never be a security warning, by clicking this link. This link can be used when creating any bookmarks or hyperlinks in any browser, document or publication. [Like This>>](#)

For better site recognition and promotional purposes, the descriptive domain name of www.LionsDistrict36R.org has also been separately registered and set to redirect clickers to the actual website homepage shown above (think filling out the form at the post office to forward your mail to another address). This is a rather common practice. So why do some people get a security warning by clicking on the www.LionsDistrict36R.org link while most do not? It’s typically because the user has their computer browser security settings set to higher than common, or has a third-party security program installed. These higher security settings typically like to block redirects as possible “phishing”, even though they cannot detect any actual security threat. So, they provide the ominous security warning and let the user decide whether to proceed or not.

District Facebook Page

Since the last meeting, I have secured control of the previously dormant District 36-R Facebook page and have started using it. All clubs should make sure their club page “likes” it so posts are seen and shared.
