District Governor Report for 36-R Cabinet Meeting March 16, 2024

As we navigate through our 2023/2024 Lions year, we continue to see good things happening in our district. We just held our District 36-R convention in Springfield attended by 142 Lions. 25 first time convention goers meeting and hearing from our International Director Lion JoAnne Ogdon. I have visited most of our clubs with only a few left to visit. Clubs continue serving their communities and making a difference. Congratulations Eugene Downtown Lions who celebrated 100 years February 24th, 2024, they were chartered Feb 24, 1924, and Cottage Grove Lions 100 years March 1924.

This Lions year had more clubs involved with the Peace Poster contest thanks to our District Peace Poster Chair Lion TiAnne Rios. She has gone out and encouraged clubs to sponsor the contest and the district had five clubs involved, Central, Newport, Waldport, Yachats and Cottage Grove. I want to thank those clubs that stepped up and know that next Lions year we will have even more clubs involved. The winner for the district was 1st place Jonah from the Central Lions, 2nd place Scarlett from Waldport Lions and 3rd place Abbigal from the Newport Lions.

Great news on the \$100.000 Hunger Grant we applied for from LCIF! We have received word from LCIF that it has been approved after the LCIF Board of Trustees met in January 2024. The grant was to help build a new Food Bank in Polk County. The Ella Curren Food Bank is in Independence Oregon. The Grant was for \$100,000 with \$75,000 coming from LCIF and \$12,500 coming from the district Lions clubs and \$12,500. coming from other resources. Any clubs still wishing to donate can still do so by making out a check and sending to the Central Lions Club. The food bank currently serves 16 different zip codes in our district. Last year they served over 37,580 people in need. That's 3,132 people a month!

Our Service reporting is at 88%. Thank you clubs that have turned in your reports on service and thanks to our District Administrator Lion Michael Ward for your help.

Though we have lost members, we continue to "ASK" as we move forward with Mission 1.5 membership growth. I just got a call from Woodburn President Lion Pat Paradis that their little club just grew by 4 with a possible 5th. We continue working with clubs and retention. For us to grow we need to work as a team and ASK.

I read something from Tim Tebow that I believe I see from each of you Lions as we serve together as a team. I say team because that is what we are, and I know it takes all of us. I know I cannot be a good leader if I try to do it all myself. He said "ONE OF THE THINGS I LEARNED FROM SO MANY OF MY TEAMMATES IS, IF YOU DON'T GIVE IN, IF YOU DON'T QUIT, IF YOU KEEP FIGHTING, GOOD THINGS CAN HAPPEN".

I'm looking forward to the rest of the Lions year with good things happening and accomplishing great things for our clubs, communities, and our district. Each of you Lions make our district what it is today. A strong district that cares about our communities!

Being at the District level has shown me the necessity of this communication. As a Cabinet we have the responsibility to facilitate the connection between communication and real application. We can assist each Club to use that information to participate in actions that increase their own strength, and to reach out to support other Clubs in our District.

Together, we will stand stronger!

We are having a great year! So many positive things are happening. I see a momentum toward positive changes, looking at things in a new way, simplifying some things, and trying new ways to make a difference. **Adaptation means survival!**

I appreciate those who respond to my emails in general, and especially those who get their reports in to me before a Cabinet Meeting. - The P&L shows a net gain for the convention of \$3,349.99. While I would love to see that number stand, if you will look at line 6 on the spreadsheet, you'll notice the entries for the facility rent are in bold italics and no dollar amount shows in the expense column. That is because I have not received an invoice from the HIE for use of their facility. Lest you think I've tried to get away with something here, let me assure you that I have sent two e-mails and placed one telephone call to the hotel manager, Jessica Wilson without receiving a response. I then placed a call to Joi Laird, the person with whom Craig and I met to reserve the facility, and so far nothing has come from that contact, either. This was an excellent location and an excellent venue, and I made it clear to Joi and Jessica that we want to be welcome back in the future, but I've reached out to them for the last time about this event.

Should you have questions or comments about this report or about this convention, you know how to reach me. As things stand now, we will be in Corvallis for next year's convention, but that's subject to change.

DISASTER RESPONSE – Linda Stent 3RD Q CABINET MEETING – MARCH 16, 2024

The Disaster Preparedness Project committee is currently working on an LCIF Disaster Preparedness grant.

Working in partnership with ODART (Oregon Disaster Airlift Response Team), Lions Clubs throughout District 36-R will be participating in disaster response by assembling and distributing emergency kits using aircraft and Lions vehicles.

The grant is in its final draft and should be submitted soon. Upon award, donations will be researched and supplies for the emergency kits will be identified and purchased. The kits will be stored at Albany airport and Creswell airport.

Upon notification of a disaster, Lions will load emergency kits into an airplane and an ODART pilot will transport them to the disaster area, where local Lions will offload and distribute the kits. This approach will provide quicker response than many other first responders.

Every club in the District will be visited and encouraged to participate by a Disaster Preparedness Project (DPP) committee member. Training will be provided.

District 36-R Q3 Cabinet Meeting Report District Information Technology Chairperson March 16, 2024

In November, 2023 I opened the "District 36-R Cabinet Lions Club" online account with Square. I then linked the account to the District Umpqua Bank checking account. The purpose of the Square account is to allow and facilitate the District's ability to accept cashless payments. This can now be done in several ways, including: Online Website Checkouts, Remote QR Code (or any style) Direct Payment Links, Emailed Payment Links, and Point of Sale Card Readers.

All electronic transactions are securely processed through Square. The transaction net is held in the Square account until transferred to the District checking account. A great feature of the account is that it is always available, even if rarely used.

The initial use of the Square account was for 2024 District 36-R online convention registrations through the district website, and credit card registrations at the convention site through point-of-sale card readers. There were 73 online registrations and two onsite credit card registrations. This represents 57% of convention registrations being paid electronically.

A welcome and sponsors slideshow was created for the convention, as well as a post-convention slideshow of Peace Poster entries. Both are hosted on YouTube and were posted on the District website and Facebook pages. The Peace Poster slideshow can be used to show to teachers to help promote the program with schools.

The biggest issue facing District 36-R Information Technology is, and always will be, getting information. The source of all information is human based. Without this initial communication of information from clubs, the technology platforms are irrelevant. There are many things that happen within District 36-R that are not communicated so go unpublished and unpromoted district wide. All clubs should be continually encouraged to communicate using the online submission form, or direct email to District36Rit@gmail.com

The 3rd Grade Benchmark: A student who can't read at grade level by third grade is four times less likely to graduate than a child who reads proficiently. According to the most recent test results from the Oregon Department of Education, only 40% of third-graders are reading on grade level.
