District 36-R District Cabinet District Governor's Report Fourth and Final Quarter – 2024–2025 Fiscal Year

Submitted by: District Governor Linda Stent **Date:** June 21, 2025 (Yachats Club House)

The fourth and final quarter of the 2024–2025 fiscal year marked a strong finish for District 36-R. We prioritized leadership transition, strengthened community engagement, and continued to support club-level development. With strategic planning and collaboration, the district is well-positioned to enter the next fiscal year with momentum and clarity.

Key Highlights

Club Visitations

 completed 31 out of 32 official club visitations. DGE Karen Norton accompanied me on several visits, introducing herself to clubs she will oversee in 2025–2026 and reinforcing the district's continuity and support.

Leadership Development & Transition

Officer and Zone Chair training was held for June 21 in Junction City. Clubs were encouraged to complete their elections prior to training and report the results to LCI through the Portal. New officers are urged to attend in person and supplement their training with available **online training from LCI**. Initial onsite training will be held in August.

Community Service Initiatives

Over 25 service projects were completed across the district this quarter, focusing on youth programs, environmental efforts, and hunger relief. More than **4,000 volunteer hours** were logged by members.

District Convention

The annual District Convention was held in Corvallis last February, with over 100 Lions attending. Programming highlighted innovation, service recognition, and strategic planning for the year ahead.

State Convention

 The State Convention was held in Pendleton and District R received several club awards and one International Lion Leadership Award (which went to Lion Jan Wilbur, president of the Florence-Siuslaw Lions Club).

Club awards included Cottage Grove for Best Club Brochure, Newport for Best Facebook Page, West Salem for Best Community and Cultural

Membership

Membership in District 36-R is growing by leaps and bounds. Almost every club I visited reported adding new members, with success noted across both urban and rural clubs. CC Lynn Coon's club in Junction City led the way with a remarkable surge—potentially welcoming up to 41 new members, far exceeding expectations. Overall, the district saw a **net growth of 4%**, with momentum continuing into the new fiscal year. We are +34, the best in the state.

Challenges & Lessons Learned

• New Member Retention: While growth is strong, retention especially in the first six months—remains an area to monitor. Mentorship and engagement strategies are

- vital. The search for younger members is of particular importance.
- •Communication Consistency: Some gaps in communication between clubs and zone leadership were noted; future efforts will include digital tools to support real-time updates and more transparent reporting.

Looking Ahead:

- Efforts to organize clubs in Veneta and Sweet Home are ongoing, with continued outreach and support planned to bring these communities into the district network.
- •Planning is already underway for the 2026 District 36-R Convention, scheduled for February 6–7 at the Holiday Inn Express in Springfield. Early coordination aims to ensure another successful and well-attended event.
- •2026 State Convention. District R is responsible for this upcoming state convention. Initial plans are to hold it in Keizer, which is a more central location and hopefully more clubs will attend. Past International President Douglas Alexander has agreed to be our International guest.
- Additional focus will be placed on supporting clubs experiencing leadership transitions or structural changes.

<u>available for use.</u> Half of the kits are stored at Infinite Air Center at the Albany Airport and the other half at the Creswell Airport Resilience Hub.

<u>Training was conducted for Lions ground volunteers/drivers on May 31</u>. Both the morning session at the Albany Airport and the afternoon session at the Creswell Airport were well attended. Topics included:

- Description of the Dist. 36R Disaster Preparedness Program
- Chain of Command and Deployment Protocol
- Emergency Contact Information
- Identification & Map of relevant facilities at the two airports
- Notification process/phone tree
- Sign-in instructions and Safety Briefing
- Form for Drivers Information & Dispatch
- Driver Instructions upon arrival at destination
- Do's and Don'ts's

At Creswell the Lions moved the 150 buckets and other DPP items from a hangar to the Resilience Hub Conex Box where they are being held pending deployment.

<u>Hands on training occurred at June 14 ODART Cascadia exercise</u>. Silverton Lions responded to the Albany Airport, loaded their vehicle with ODART supplied food and water, and transported it to the Siletz tribe at Siletz, Oregon. Cottage Grove and Eugene Lions responded to the Creswell Airport where they prepared boxes of food and water for transport by airplane, they sorted the boxes and prepared them for loading onto airplanes which then delivered the boxes to food banks along the coast.

<u>Up Next</u>: Prepare training slides/handout for Lions on receiving end of disaster relief supplies and conduct training session via Zoom. DPP Committee needs to meet to decide direction of the program and next steps.

Information Technology Committee Chairperson Report District 36-R Q4 Cabinet Meeting June 21, 2025

The District 36-R Website is continuously tweaked and updated. It has a LOT more potential to be effective if usage and input of clubs and members increased. The club website directory page now includes links to all club brochures that I currently have access to.

We have started using online Google forms to solicit District wide responses for Registrations, RSVP's and Surveys. While this may seem like something new to many Lions members, it's been a standard online Google tool available for years. Hopefully the online forms will gain more responses as using them becomes the norm and members become more accepting of them.

On May 15th the MD36 Council of Governors adopted my re-write of the Information Technology Committee section of the MD Policy Manual at their State Convention meeting. The updated policy now provides for better structure and guidance. The full Policy Manual for all committees can be found on the District Website information and documents page.

I have been asked by DGE Karen Norton to continue as District 36-R ITC Chairperson for 2025-2026 and I have asked Lion Diane Bash from Junction City, Lion Tandy Curtis from Eugene Downtown and Lion Crystal Weber from Philomath to join me as the first committee as provided for under the new Policy Manual structure.

Q4 actually seems like the beginning of a year not the end as we are preparing with the incoming Governor to be able to hit the ground running at the start of her term. A new "Governor's Page" has been created on the website. It has DGE Karen's full schedule of upcoming club visits and will have her monthly message published on it. Material is being created to aid Zone Chairs in working with clubs, including a District Brochure and a Talking Points document. A monthly district-wide notification email has begun and scheduled training workshops are being promoted.

There are tentative plans to include some IT/Communication training time at the August 2nd training workshop in Tangent.

7 Summer Reading Tips (2025)

Take advantage of your local library

School is out of session, but your local library is open! Not only can you check out new books from the library all summer long, but your library likely has storytimes and activities for kids planned. They may also have a summer reading challenge with prizes for kids who reach their reading goals. Look up your local library today and see what they've got going on!

Set summer reading goals

You can also create a personalized summer reading challenge for your child, either a certain number of minutes reading a week/month or a certain number of books finished. This method lets you create a schedule that best meets your child's needs, as well as rewards you know will be particularly motivating for them.

Plan a reading adventure

If your family is going on vacation or visiting anywhere new, find a book about the place or written by an author from where you'll be traveling. Ask questions about the stories like "What do you remember learning about this place?" or "Do you recognize that food or landmark?" If you're not planning any travel, you can also make reading an adventure by reading in a new place or in a new way, like in a park, in a tent, or in the dark with a flashlight.
