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#### Lions changed my life

Earlier this spring I went to Central Oregon Eye Care in Redmond to pick up some glasses and have them fitted. Instead of the gentleman who usually takes care of this, I was met by a young woman. It took me a moment to recognize her. It was Anna, my club's first scholarship recipient. She looked and acted so grown up. Quite different from when we first met her 10 years ago as a high school senior.

After she fitted my glasses we chatted about the scholarship program and I told her how it had grown. "Unlike the early years when we could only give one scholarship, we now give up to ten." Then I said, "But none were more meaningful and special as the one we gave to you." And her reply to me was, "Receiving that scholarship changed my life. Without it I would not have been able to go to college and I wouldn't be where I am today."

While Anna was not valedictorian or salutatorian of her class, what won us over was that it was clear she had a servant's heart. The first in her family to go to college, she is now thriving. Her boss Jim told me that Anna is instrumental in keeping the office running smoothly and that she is currently working on optician certifications. If ever we ever made a "right decision", it was in selecting Anna to be our first scholarship recipient.

A month or so later I was having my yard thatched. The gentleman doing the work brought his two sons to help. I mentioned our scholarship program and he said, "Oh, you're a Lion?" I answered affirmatively. He went on to say, "I was raised by a single mother. We didn't have any money. You bought me glasses. And that changed my life."

Twice in two months I heard this. "Lions changed my life." While not all our service can be placed in the "life changing" category, we do many things in service to others in many ways. And for those of us who desire to serve our communities and help others, Lions provides us with an amazing vehicle. As individuals, we can certainly do some things in service to others. But when we combine our talents and energies with likeminded people, our service is increased exponentially. So much can be done when we have "A Common Heartbeat for Service". What a gift Lions is both to those who need help as well as to those who wish to serve.

Having recently returned from the Lions State Convention in Bandon, I am reflecting on the wonderful time that we had in this beautiful location. ## Used Eyeglasses, Sunglasses, Hearing Aids and Cell Phones Get Recycled

The Eugene Downtown Lions Club has six members who have specific drop-off locations from which to collect used eyeglasses, sunglasses, hearing aids and cell phones. They are sorted, then boxed up and shipped to the Lions LEAP (Lions Eyeglass Assistance Program) lab in the Portland area. Each Lion has been packing up the collections on an individual basis and delivering them to Albertsons/Safeway stores and the store puts the boxes on one of their trucks that is headed for Portland.

Fairly recently the Club started a once-a-month sorting party after one of the Clubs meetings at the Eugene Mission. On February 21st KEZI-TV sent a photojournalist to cover one of the sorting parties. They ran a story a few days later on their "Recycle Reuse" segment about the Eugene Downtown Lions Eyeglass Collection program. They showed the Eyeglass Sorting party held after the February 7 Club meeting. They interviewed Lion Past President Susan Pfanner who explained that we collect used eyeglasses, sunglasses, hearing aids and cell phones. Lion Susan did a great job explaining the process. Thank you KEZI for spreading the word. It is a privilege for me to be one of the collectors.




## to be Remembered!

Two tables were set up with photos of the many Past Presidents who guided the Club during their time as President and two poster boards displayed the events and publicity the Club garnered over the years.



## Unlocking Potential: The Importance of Low Vision Treatment for Young Students



Vision is essential for children's learning and development, yet some young students face challenges due to low vision, which affects their ability to see clearly even with corrective lenses. Recognizing this critical need, the Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation established the "Low Vision Clinic" program, led by pediatric optometrist Dr. JP Lowery.

Since the early 1990s, the Low Vision Clinic program has been a cornerstone of support in Oregon, serving as a lifeline for children with visual impairments. By focusing on each child's specific needs, Dr. Lowery empowers them to maximize their existing vision capabilities.

Each year, the program touches the lives of around 150 children and families, offering hope and practical solutions. By addressing low vision early in a child's academic journey, the program plays a vital role in fostering educational success and overall well-being. It equips families and educators with tools to create inclusive environments where every child can thrive.

The impact of the Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation's initiative extends far beyond vision correction; it nurtures potential and provides equal opportunities for all students. Through advocating for low vision treatment and support, we ensure that young learners with visual impairments are empowered to embrace their abilities and reach for their dreams.

In essence, the work of Dr. JP Lowery and the Low Vision Clinic program exemplifies the transformative impact of early intervention and tailored support. It underscores the profound significance of addressing low vision in young students, paving the way for a brighter, more inclusive future where every child's vision, regardless of its limitations, is a gateway to boundless possibilities.
