Call to Order by DG Linda Stent at 10:04 Pledge of Allegiance by VDG Karen Norton Invocation by Lion Diane Bash

Welcome: DG Linda Stent thanked everyone for coming to the meeting.

Approval of Minutes: The Q1 Mtg minutes were reviewed by Cabinet Secretary Diane Bash.

Motion: Council Chair Lynn Coon moved to approve the minutes from September 14, 2024; Seconded by VDG Karen Norton; Passed unanimously.

#### Officer Reports

**District Governor DG Linda Stent** highlighted her report. She is still working on scheduling visits with some remaining clubs in the District. New members are joining several clubs. Officer training is coming up in June. Lion Fran isn't present as she has a bad knee. Details for this training are TBD. She explained what the Global Action Team (GAT) members do. Sweethome area needs their own Lions Club. 2<sup>nd</sup> ID Mark Lyon led a 2-day workshop in Keizer on Mission 1.5, and 27 clubs were represented there from MD 36 and MD 19. Use of Al was encouraged.

The convention committee is working hard to prepare for the upcoming- Feb 8<sup>th</sup> meeting in Corvallis. Convention speakers include keynote speaker Lions International Director Judge Anthony Paradiso, District IT David Nielson; Lion TiAnne will do the Peace Poster Presentation; Candlelighters, OLSHF hearing program (ROAR), Lion Jim O on Disaster Preparedness, LCI presentation, Awards, voting, and election results by Lion Craig. Register online; Friday night meet and greet must be registered for ahead of time.

Immediate Past District Governor PDG Lynn Coon - It would be nice to have the whole Cabinet present at the Cabinet meetings. Our service reporting needs to increase. We are at 60+%, leading the multi-District at present. Clarification was made regarding what counts as service and an email of information will be sent out by Lion Diane. Make sure your club hosts the DG so her messages get to each one. PDGs need to work on getting a 1st and 2nd VDG for the next year.

First Vice District Governor Lion Karen Norton – She is preparing for becoming the next District Governor. She will be securing Cabinet positions for next year, and getting ready to go to Chicago in February, and to the conventions of other Districts. All information from the Keizer training can help us quickly get helpful information for us – see chatgpt.com.

Cabinet Secretary Lion Diane Bash would like to hear from each Cabinet member and get all reports prior to our quarterly meetings. Turning in your Cabinet position service hours is important. Please do so to enable me to report them at the District level. Please let me know any important information you would like me to get out to other clubs or cabinet members, as well as get them on the district website.

#### 2025 CONVENTION PLANNING COMMITTEE

#### Report to the 36-R Cabinet

March 15, 2025

The 2025 District 36-R Convention is in the books. As with all events of this sort, there are pluses and minuses. In the interest of preserving my image, I'll forego mentioning the pluses and instead will focus on the minuses, most specifically, this convention was a dismal failure from a financial standpoint. While I have not sat down and compared notes with Treasurer Brain Rangitsch, as of this writing, my records indicate that we are \$1,348.80 in the red for this year's convention, and that doesn't include the hotel charges for our visiting ID and Phyllis Carlin, which would add another \$1,500 to the deficit. There are two main issues behind this \$2,700 turnaround from last year's convention which ended up \$1,350 in the black.

- 1. The catering accounts for the bulk of the shortfall. Although the Saturday lunch was reasonable, the rest of the menus were expensive, and I should have reduced the numbers from 120 to 80. Although we had just more than 100 people registered and a few guests, food for 80 would have been more than adequate.
- 2. We received no support in the way of sponsorships this year. The importance of obtaining community financial support in exchange for advertising and recognition can't be overestimated. The amount of these sponsorships need not be large. Every dollar contributed by community businesses is invaluable in offsetting our convention expenses and keeping the cost down for our convention-goers.

I noticed a couple of problems with this year's convention relative to the event format and scheduling, but there's no need to go into those here. I can bring those up if and when our planning committee holds its post convention meeting.

As for the plus side of the ledger, while I don't know much about the other districts and therefore have no basis for comparison, my impression is that we in District 36-R are doing wonderfully in putting our service and membership front and center, and that certainly was evident at our convention. There was much to be proud of on display in our convention thanks to the efforts of our district leaders who are finding new and innovative ways of publicizing the many service and fundraising projects of our 36-R Lions clubs and of encouraging our clubs to report and be recognized for those projects.

Linda Stent, Fran Silbernagel, and incoming DG Karen Norton will be taking the lead on next year's convention. I will gladly share any info I can to help them achieve a better result than we did this year.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE (DPP) REPORT Lion Jim Origliosso March 15, 2025

Last year District 36R received a \$10,000 grant from LCIF to assemble 300 Emergency Kits ("Buckets") for adults and 100 kits for children. Home Depot Foundation matched this grant by contributing over \$5,000 of supplies plus additional in-kind labor to assemble the kits.

The Buckets/Kits were assembled and half of them (150/50) were allocated for storage at the Albany Airport and the other half at the Creswell Airport. The buckets/kits are available to any 36R Lions Club upon request.

The strategy for distributing the Buckets/Kits in response to a disaster within 40 miles is for Lions volunteers to go to the airports and load the buckets/kits into their vehicles for delivery. If the disaster is beyond 40 miles the volunteers would help load the buckets/kits into small airplanes for delivery by air.

The response to the "Call for Volunteers" has been remarkable with about 100 Lions expressing interest in being involved. The plan is to provide training to the Lions volunteers in May with inperson sessions at each of the airports and Zoom sessions for others located further away and along the coast. These sessions are to be followed up with an actual "live fire" exercise on June 14.

After that, the DPP Committee will meet to decide what next steps can be taken to further enhance the resiliency of our Lions Club communities.

## Information Technology Chairperson Report District 36-R Q3 Cabinet Meeting March 15, 2025

The District Website is being kept up-to-date as much as possible with the little club input I receive.

All of the funds received through Square from convention registrations and donations have been transferred to the District checking account.
