Oklahoma Lions Children's Park Update

Great News! The parking lot at Oklahoma Lions Children's Park and the road leading to it are being improved right now!

The Oklahoma City Water Trust has let a contract (approximately \$170,000) for the work, which is to be completed by early spring.

The present parking area is being enlarged, with two slots for large buses and a bus turn-around loop added. The road to the playground is being widened and thickened with curb and gutter added.

The park is the most-used playground in Oklahoma City, and contin-

ues to grow in popularity.

Two of us Lions visited the park one warm Saturday in January. We counted 54 - yes, 54 - vehicles in the 28-slot parking areas and along the road leading to it. Both picnic shelters were occupied and the kids on the playground equipment were as thick as ants swarming over a watermelon rind.

Makes our efforts all worthwhile, doesn't it?

Note: The Oklahoma Lions Children's Park playground was recently renovated through efforts of Oklahoma Lions led by the OKC Downtown Lions Club and their fundraising efforts for the new equipment and other improvements.

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Attitudes and Meanings

The meaning of things lies not in the things themselves, but in our attitudes towards them. Antoine de Saint-Exupery

As I sat on my patio last weekend, relaxing and enjoying the sunshine, I felt a drop on my hand. Fearing rain was moving in and ending my outdoor laziness, I looked down. To my surprise and delight, I realized it was not rain, but a gift from a bird perched in the tree above me. It was a beautiful day, I was surrounded by nature, and rain was not going to interrupt me. It occurred to me that this was not usually an action greeted with happiness, but rather an action greeted with cursing and disgust. What is the point of the story? Sometimes things have a deeper meaning than is initially appar-

In February, I had the opportunity to work in two Lions service projects that focused on feeding the hungry. We filled food-sacks at the Oklahoma Food Bank during the 3-H district convention, and we filled food-sacks in the basement of a Stillwater church in an annual Stillwater Noon Lions project. Both events were a great deal of fun. The participation, as with any project I've done for this purpose, was outstanding. Everybody had a great time. We laughed and chatted as we enjoyed the fellowship of our fellow Lions, working together for a great cause.

As the work progressed, and the boxes filled, and the conversations at the individual stations created a cacophony of sound, another thought occurred to me; it is appalling that this type of service project is necessary. In both projects, Lions labored to ensure that kids would have some sort of nutrition on the weekends when food from the school programs is unavailable. In Stillwater, 217 food-sacks are necessary every weekend to stave off the hunger of needy children.

In Oklahoma City, the Lions were one of many teams working, and filled about two-and-a-half pallets with weekend food-sacks before the project ended. During a tour of the Oklahoma Food Bank a few years ago, the director told the story of a young girl in Oklahoma City who was found in the closet of her classroom eating balloons because she was so desperate to have something in her stomach. The amount of rampant hunger in such prosperous cities is alarming. Even in the midst of the fun and fellowship, especially when the human factor was consid-

ered, there was a deeper meaning.

This may seem to be depressing, and it is. But, as Lions, there is yet another different and deeper meaning: we are part of the greatest service organization on the planet, in the country, and in the state. As Lions, we can rise to meet any challenge to help our communities and our neighbors. We do this every day on the local level, but sometimes seem to overlook the impact of our actions. When we see reports of the number of eyeglasses donated every month, it is just another number. When we put faces with those numbers, and think of somebody in our community who was able to earn a living to feed their family or continue an education to better themselves, all because of the efforts of the Lions, it has a deeper meaning.

The same can be said of the work that the Lions of Oklahoma do on the state level. Last year, through the Mobile Health Screening Unit, the Lions of Oklahoma screened over 7,000 people, with about 3,000 failing at least one of the tests. At first glance, these numbers are definitely impressive; over 3,000 Oklahomans were guided toward follow-up medical care due to the efforts of the Lions. Recently, one of our own, Sherrell Taylor from the Sapulpa Lions Club, participated in a screening by one of our sponsoring partners, Advanced Body Scan. Some abnormalities were caught, and thanks to early detection, Sherrell's husband, District O Governor Gary Taylor says her life was saved. How many neighbors in your community were screened? How many lives were saved by the volunteers who caught a potential healthrisk early? When we put a face to them, the numbers have a deeper meaning.

The Öklahoma Lions Eye Bank provides a very important function in the state. It is the only source providing corneas to surgeons in Oklahoma, who use the donated corneas to restore sight. Through the work of the Eye Bank, corneas that are not in good enough shape for that purpose are used for research, further advancing the practice of corneal transplants, and in turn, sight restoration. This is fantastic information, but when we drill down and put a face to this, as in the recent story of a young Oklahoma mother whose sight was restored after she lost her vision in her early twenties, our work has a deeper meaning.

The Oklahoma Lions Boys Ranch is

another source of great pride for the Lions of Oklahoma, and continues to do a great job molding young lives. As Lions, we know that over 800 boys have been served by this facility over 60 years. While this is certainly an impressive statistic, it is more impressive when you focus on what the Boys Ranch truly does. When OLBR director Lion Bryan Larison recently shared a story about a former resident of the Boys Ranch serving his country, earning a Purple Heart, marrying his high school sweetheart, and becoming a solid citizen, the work we do has a deeper meaning.

The point of all of this is that we, as Lions, need to get excited about what

we do! Our state has one of the longest histories of service in the history of Lions. We have projects at the individual and community levels, and certainly at the state level, that should make you swell with pride. And while there is absolutely nothing wrong with focusing on numbers, think about the difference in your level of excitement and pride when you think about the stories behind the numbers. How much more effective could vou be in your fundraising efforts; how many more members might you recruit, if you put a face to our story? Remember, as Lions, We Serve! But let everybody know that behind our motto lies a deeper meaning!

The Smudging

This week we had our house smudged!

Many of you may be like me and don't have a clue about what smudging is. A member of our staff is Native American Indian and is very knowledgeable about native practices, ideas and lifestyles. We were talking about how our house had over the years seen so much trauma and fear and pain. He asked if I knew about smudging. He explained that it is a kind of "cleaning of the energy" of the house. Just as our bodies have meridians and nerve pathways that hold and direct energy, where we live has good and bad energy and the idea is to keep it balanced.

It seemed like a good idea, couldn't hurt. He asked permission of everyone in the house and all said yes. Two of our guys are part Native American and they were kind of interested. So the next day he came and with the left wing tip from a red-tailed hawk in one hand and a smudge pot with burning sage in the other, we went through every room. Before he started, he scattered cornmeal along the whole outside foundation of the house except for one door. As I watched him I suddenly felt very humble and exposed. The feather moved as if still in flight, sometimes flapping slowly and sometimes beating the air in a frantic rhythm. The smoke from the sage at times would swirl in slow circles, and at other times it streaked in one direction and made a jagged trail like lightening. The smell of the sage was very calming, earthy and not heavy enough to choke you, but strong enough to leave the imprint of peace and sereni-

It was interesting to watch. Sometimes a room needed just a little swirl of the smoke and at other times a room had to be smudged in every inch from ceiling to floor and over again. Sometimes a corner would be the focus of the hawk wing. When each room was done, he went out the door and laid a trail of cornmeal sealing the house. We watched as he sent up prayer smoke on our behalf, sending that smoke in the direction of the North, South, East and West.

No matter what Great Spirit you believe in, the whole process can change you; it changed me! I became more aware of my attitude. Sometimes we don't think our environment affects our attitudes. If life is all about keeping things balanced, the place where we spend most of our time should be as positive and peaceful as possible. So maybe next time my attitude starts to stink, I will "smudge it." A regular cleaning and balancing of ourselves must be a good thing! So maybe take a walk through the rooms of your life and see if a little "smudging" is needed. We want to do the best we can for the boys in our care because they deserve a chance for a peaceful posi-

Sapulpa: Paid for 7 pairs of eyeglasses. Donated \$250




