Lions Jacque and Gerald Mooney (Midwest City LC) delivered a trailer load of eyeglasses (93 filled "banana" boxes) on 8/26/13 to Midland, Texas, and met with Carolyn Keskitalo, interim manager. PDG Carolyn has been in Midland for 2 months. They also met with PID Marshall Cooper (Lubbock, TX) who was volunteering for a few days. Lion Marshall had some interesting stories about PID George Hazelbaker and PID Pat Shurley at an International Convention. They also met Lion Frank Pickens from 2X1, also a good friend of PID Pat Shurley. PDG lke Fitzgerald was there doing a bit of manual labor, helping build a deck. He is the FOUNDER of TLERC and a Lion since 1946.

Over the front windows are framed photographs of 6 people known as the Platinum Knightspeople who have donated or had donated in their name \$10,000 or more to the Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center.

Lion Carolyn gave the Mooneys

a tour of the facility; it is filled to the brim, and recently received 15 skids of new frames from Eye Works and 25 skids of eyeglasses that blocked up their warehouse. There are shelves that go to the ceiling. Many boxes of eyeglasses were on the loading dock and unfortunately, there was rain which destroyed those boxes so they will now have to re-box it all when they can be moved into the warehouse. THEY REALLY NEED A COVER FOR THAT DOCK. With so many eyeglasses being delivered, VDG Jacque asked her if there was a lot going out. Carolyn replied "Oh My,

There is a room full of uncut lenses that are used to make eye-glasses, probably more raw lenses than most eyeglass companies have in stock. TLERC can make eyeglasses but it seems to be rather sporadic. They have a great laboratory to do this work.

Midland has 5 Lions Clubs and someone comes out nearly every

I'm Not in Kansas Anymore! (But I was...)

I just attended my first USA/Canada Forum in Overland Park, KS (essentially, the south side of Kansas City). Not really knowing what to expect, I was delighted to find that some of the seminars were fantastic, and all of them were good. Greater yet was the interaction with Lions from all over North America. I met Lions from British Columbia (about an hour-and-a-half from where I grew up), from Nebraska (where I was born), from Eagle River, Alaska (where one of my uncles lives), Puerto Rico (who will host the Forum next year) and from just about everywhere else in North America.

I had my first "I must have that pin!" moment when I saw the Nebraska pin from the convention in Hamburg, which features Herbie Husker (the University of Nebraska mascot). In the true spirit of Lion giving, the gentleman wearing it (from Norfolk, home of Johnny Carson) immediately gave it to me when I asked about the pin. I gave him one of my OLSF pins in exchange. I met a lot of fantastic individuals, and had a lot of fun. Most importantly, I heard a lot of good ideas and had the opportunity to learn some new techniques and methods in serving as Lions and spreading the word of Lionism. While it is still fresh in my mind, and my excitement is peaked, I want to share some of these items with you.

My first session addressed keeping members involved. Some ideas have been mentioned before, and some were new to me. Most of us have members that do not get around as well as they once did; their physical limitations limit their attendance and involvement. Consider using Skype to broadcast your meetings to these members (www.skype.com). Members can still be active in your club even if they cannot attend physically.

Another important aspect of keeping members involved is making sure you have projects that are both appealing and functional for your membership. For your members with physical limitations, consider getting them involved with a project that does not depend on mobility, etc. One example was mentioned in this paper over a year ago - get involved with the Oklahoma Library for the Blind (www.library.state.ok.us or 405-521-3514). They have a program that involves reading and recording various publications to be made available to the visually impaired. The best part about this program, aside from the fact that it fits perfectly with our Lions' commitment as "Knights of the Blind," is that it can be done from your home. All of the recording is done over a telephone line.

Your club should not stop there! Try performing a club assessment to see if your current service projects (or fundraising projects, for that matter) are still relevant in your community, and are of interest to your membership. If your club members are not really interested in your projects, it will be very difficult to keep them engaged, and you run a greater risk of losing them; you may never know this is an issue until the member leaves if you do not evaluate your club from time to time. Take advantage of the resources available through LCI (www.lionsclubs.org). There are many great ideas and programs that will help you take a deeper look at your club, such as the Club Excellence Process, etc. The tools are there; you need to use them.

Another topic mentioned during a number of seminars was the need to bring in younger members. We hear this frequently – If we do not bring in the next generation of volunteers and keep them involved, the Lions Club is doomed. I saw a graph that showed our membership decline. If we do not turn around our trend, there

may be no more Lions Clubs in North America by 2050 or so. If we follow a few basic rules, though, we need not fear this trend. The common thread of all of these rules is this: Keep your new members involved.

To be clear, this does not mean that once you get a new member, you turn all of the work over to them. This can lead to burn-out, dissatisfaction, and ultimately, resignation. What it means is that these younger members provide fresh ideas, new perspectives, and a lot of energy, and we need to give them the freedom to utilize all of it! The single greatest quote I heard at the seminar was "Young people don't know it can't be done!" This is true, and a fact that we should harness in growing and rejuvenating our clubs. How many times do they need to hear things like "We've always done it this way," or "We tried that once and it didn't work," before they lose their enthusiasm, and eventually leave the club.


When discussing this concept, one Lion told us, very frankly, that these new members are not here to help us! We are here to help them! Our duty as Lions is to serve our community. Part of that duty is to ensure that our legacy of service succeeds us. That commitment to service means that we are planting the seeds for future generations to have the tools, knowledge, and support to continue the Lions' thread that began nearly a century ago. Do not fear change! Embrace it!

So, my first USA/Canada forum was an absolute success! It was refreshing and uplifting to see that the enthusiasm for Lions has not waned. Times have changed. Communication has changed. Traditions have changed. Predilection toward formality and protocol has changed. The Lions have changed. What has not changed is the reason we became, and continue to be Lions, and it still stands as our motto: **We Serve!**


Missouri Lions Planting Trees at Irving Elementary in Joplin



The Art of Recognition invites us to use skill and imagination to find ways to recognize the accomplishments of others. As Lions, we know there are many occasions for recognition. Formal recognition is an important tool. Recognition can also be a more personal reinforcement to let someone know you have noticed something they have done, and you appreciate it. This type of recognition can take many forms, like saying "Thank You!," or sending them a note. While formal recognition is usually planned and awarded after a set of criteria have been met. informal

recognition is usually "unexpected" and is most effective when it is presented in a "timely" way. Use the Club Supplies on the LCI website, or one of many catalogs available offering motivation and recognition gifts, purchase a few small items to have on hand for timely

recognition. You can reward small achievements with ballpoint pens or notepads personalized with a message of thanks or congratulations for a job well done. Use your own hobby to recognize others. Find out the dates of meaningful events, acknowledge and celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, and other special occasions.

Diversify! Don't get in a rut use a variety of verbal acknowledgements, written commendations, awards, gifts, etc. Keep a camera on hand to record special events and special people. Post the pictures somewhere that everyone can see

them.

Introduce them! Use every opportunity to introduce deserving Lions to the district governor, the mayor, etc. It sends the message that "You are important...and I want people to meet you." Encourage your club to create its own certificates to recognize special service, etc. Use club or district newsletters to honor good works. But it's hard to replace an honest and sincere "Thank You."


Weatherford will sell hotdogs and chili at the Windfest October 19. They had a garage sale August 24.

volunteers come from other clubs outside of Midland; the Mooneys <u>were</u> invited to stay and work. Also, anyone who is assigned to community service through the courts is frequently assigned to the Center. They are able to utilize an organization called <u>Experienced Work Groups</u>, which are people trying to re-enter the work force. Some work out, but others do not.

Once eyeglasses are received they are sorted into bifocal, single vision and reader groupings. They are then re-boxed and sent to the prison in Big Spring, TX to be cleaned, graded and bagged. They are then placed into white boxes and shipped back to the center where they are re-sorted again into like prescriptions and boxed into small boxes marked with the prescriptions, and then stacked on shelves. Overflow is boxed into larger boxes for bulk shipments.

New information Lion Jacque: all the eyeglass cases are tossed. In OKC the Midwest City Lions were already doing that, for convenience. TLERC throws away all eyeglass cases because eye disease is easily passed through the cases. Makes us look at those cases a bit differently; Lion Jacque says she may start wearing gloves to sort eyeglasses.

Only one distribution center is allowed per state BUT Texas has as many as 15 satellite locations. TLERC has 1 full time employee and 1 part time employee; all others volunteer.

They furnish eyeglasses to anyone requesting them, mostly to foreign countries. They have a map of the world with pins marking locations the Texas facility has supplied. They regularly go to clinics in Rio Bravo, MX and Chihuahua, MX. They also have shipped to several locations in South America, Mexico, Europe and Africa, just to name a few. They can ship to US locations but there must be a doctor in attendance and the prescriptions are identified as "near prescription match." They can only be ½ +/- from the actual prescriptions. If someone picks up a load there is no cost. If delivery is required, they ship UPS to the club or to a border town and the requesting entity has to pay the freight.

TLERC took 5 16-to-18 foot trailer loads of eyeglasses and set up "shop" after Hurricane Katrina. They were up and ready to go in less than 24 hours. These trailers are all painted bright yellow/gold and marked as TEXAS LIONS EYEGLASS RECYCLING CENTER. Teams came from various Lions Clubs to work. Several doctors volunteered their services. They were there about 8 weeks. When bigger companies (LensCrafters, EyeMart, etc.) saw what was happening, they brought in their BIG busses and also worked. There was an enormous need. Once the publicity subsided, the commercial companies pulled out but the Lions stayed.

They also have training available on how to use the equipment. It is the third Saturday of each month at the TLERC facility. This might be something we need to look at if we add this service to our LIONS ALERT Disaster Relief efforts. Also, they may be a source for auto refractors.

Lastly, TLERC has a new "Pride & Joy," a "Bunkhouse" like an oilfield housing trailer. The cost is \$20 per person. It is used to house visiting Lions who might be there to work or delivering eyeglasses. They also use it for the Experienced Work Group employees, community service workers, or Lions Club volunteers who might need a place to stay. It is very clean but pretty basic with 4 bedrooms, each having 2 sets of bunk beds. Two rooms are on one end and two rooms are on the other end; they are joined by a common area with kitchen, washer and dryer, and large dining room table. There is a bathroom with shower on each end and a large closet on each end. If a group of workers show up with both men and women, they ask that the men stay at one end and the women at the other. A couple can stay together if there are not other occupants. It does not have living room furniture or a television. Lion Carolyn is staying in one end and Lion Marshall is on the other end. All motels stay full, and with the oil boom, housing is at a premium price. The Mooneys stayed at the Hampton Inn/Suites in Big Springs, about 40 miles from Midland; \$110/night includes breakfast.

**Of interest: Lion Carolyn lived in Cushing, OK in 1992-1993 when her husband was assigned there for his job. She did not join the Cushing Lions Club because they did not admit women. Lion Jacque says, "Just look at her record; what a loss that was."
