
Applicants are requested to be present on Saturday morning, March 17, in Oklahoma City, to answer questions and interview.

job lying before the OK Lions Service Foundation, the truth in the words above rings true. There is a lot of work to be done: none of it more important than taking the first step!

In way of introduction, my name is Troy Jenkins. I am taking over the role of

Executive Director of the OLSF on Feb. 1, 2012. I grew up a Navy brat. I was born in Nebraska, grew up in Washington State, graduated high school in Florida, and moved to Oklahoma from Atlanta, where I spent 2 years at Georgia Tech as a Navy Midshipman. My father was a Naval Aviator, who was killed in a training exercise when I was 11. His influence has always been a large part of my life; one of the things I still remember clearly was his belief that everybody should serve their

I have done my best to live up to my father's expectation of service, though I have focused it more directly on my community in a variety of programs. including Brothers/Big Sisters, where I served as a mentor in 3 cities, and on the board of directors in Stillwater. I have been a Lion for over 10 years; this organization and the projects it



supports mean a great deal to me. I've had the opportunity to meet many of you over the years, and look forward to working with all of you in the vears to come.

So what is the gameplan? First and foremost, the connection between the individual Lions and Lions Clubs in Oklahoma and the OLSF needs to be restored. Obviously, the Foundation is only as strong as the support and faith behind it. In that spirit, I encourage you to

reach out to me if you have any questions or concerns. I may not have all of the answers yet, but I commit to you that I will find them. I will also be happy to come to your club to talk about the Foundation and its work in supporting the Boys Ranch, Eye Bank, and the Mobile Health Screening Unit.

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The second step is revitalizing the "Building the Foundation" program. When I first joined the Lions, I was essentially told that giving \$5 each month to the OLSF was part of the gig. This money, it was explained, would help support state projects, and further the service provided by the organization. Currently, less than 200 of the over 4,500 Lions in Oklahoma are giving to the Build the Foundation program. I know you have all seen the statistics: if every Lion in the state gave \$5/month to "Building the Foundation" the result would be over \$270,000 annually.

Let's look at that in real terms: that money would cover the cost (above what is provided by DHS and the Irrevocable Trust) of all 12 boys at the Ranch for a year, with almost \$73,000 left to go toward the new Lions Family Resource Center. Your \$5/month could help to provide the quality of care that separates the OLBR from a group home that warehouses children, and allows the OLBR to be a therapeutic family environment where youth who are destined for poverty or prison have an opportunity to achieve. This same amount would have covered over a quarter of the cost of the new building for the OK Lions Eye Bank. Regardless of how the money is split between our state projects, a small amount from all of us makes a tremendous difference!

Another early goal is to revitalize our current fundraising efforts. Ideally, we could get the majority of our clubs to participate in White Cane in the same month, and promote the statewide event through press releases and corporate sponsorships. Likewise, Cowboy Cadillac could be bettered through promotion, donated or discounted prizes, etc. Ultimately, though, these events are driven by club participation; let's all get excited about why we are serving and the end results!

There are other points of focus, including grant-writing, developing new streams of revenue, and creating an OLSF fundraising event. The most important thing, however, is that an open line of communication is developed between the Lions, the Clubs, and the Foundation. The more we work together, the more we can and will achieve.

This last weekend, I had the opportunity to take 4 of the OLBR boys to the wrestling match at OSU. We had a good time-we listened to music in the car, watched the match, then ate enough appetizers to ruin everybody's dinner. The best part was the chance to just hang out and get to know these kids. I learned a little bit about their pasts. Some revealed that they had incarcerated parents; others mentioned that they had been in trouble in the past. One of my key take-aways from this outing is that though the past helped to shape our current state, it is never too late to start fresh and achieve great things. I look forward to our fresh start and the great things we will achieve together!

It's That Time Again

The Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation has 3 major fundraising events each year, Cowboy Cadillac, Sheet Sales, and White Cane. The past several years' contributions to White Cane are down, dropping to the point it is hurting fundraising for our state projects. Our clubs have started to put a small amount in their budget or not giving anything at all to White Cane.

Fellow Lions, we have 2 very important state projects, the Oklahoma OK Lions Eye Bank and the OK Lions Boys Ranch. Each is among the best in the nation and plays a very important role in the lives of many people in Oklahoma and around the world.

Again we are having trouble meet-

ing the budgets for these projects. If we continue to give at the present rate or less, we will find ourselves looking at the possibility of having to give up one of the projects and that is unacceptable.

As your state White Cane Chairperson, I am calling on the Lions of Oklahoma to come together and reverse this downward trend in our giving. I also am asking each Lions Club in the state to give a minimum of \$20.00 per member to the White Cane Project. This would go a long way in meeting the budget of our projects.

GUIDELINES FOR OKLAHOMA TRADING PIN CONTEST

- **1.** Each Lion may submit only **one entry.** The Club may submit an entry as a group effort, or hold a club contest of individual's designs, selecting the representative design.
- 2. All entries must be received NO LATER than March 1, 2012; mail all entries to Lions of Oklahoma, 4123 NW 10th St., Oklahoma City OK 73107-5801
- 3. The pin must represent Oklahoma Lions and not an individual area or region.
- 4. The design (drawing) will be submitted on an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper or art board.
- **5** The design will be no smaller than 3"x5" or larger than 4"x6" to provide the pin company with an adequate sample to produce the pin. Actual size to be determined by the designing company and pine coordinator.
- **6.** A short narrative will accompany the design explaining the meaning and color representation.
- 7. Only Lions may enter the contest.
- **8** The initial design will be selected by the OK Lions state pin committee and be submitted to the incoming Governors at the state convention or at the DG training.
- **9.** The winning design will be announced at the State Convention.
- 10 The design will be given to the appropriate pin committee member and sent for final art development and production. Upon receipt of the finished pin the Lions of Oklahoma State Office will have them available.

GUIDELINES FOR OKLAHOMA LEO TRADING PIN CONTEST

- 1. Each Club may submit only **one entry.** The Club may submit an entry as a group effort, or hold a club contest of individual's designs, selecting the representative design

- 3. The pin must represent Oklahoma Leos and not an individual area or region. 4. The design (drawing) will be submitted on an $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ sheet of paper or art board.
- 5. The design will be no smaller than 3" x 5" or larger than 4" x 6" to provide the pin company with an adequate sample to produce the pin. Actual size will be determined by the designing company and pin coordinator.
- 6. A short narrative will accompany the design explaining the meaning and color representation.
- 7. Only Leos may enter the contest.
- 8. The initial design will be selected by Leos at the OK Lions State Convention.
- 9. Judges (Leos) will be selected at random from registered Leos at the State Convention. Lions from the Oklahoma Pin Trading Club will be selected to **assist and advise** the judging.

They seemed to understand that some of our "rules" were in place to protect them and help them learn to be successful. We stood in quiet amazement at this special moment. One young man just stood against the counter and didn't say a word, but he was listening and you could almost see a million thoughts going through his mind. For some reason their guard was down and for a few minutes we had a tiny insight into their hearts. It was so good to hear that we were making a difference, that in some areas they wanted to change and make a better life.

It was a moment of hugs and tears and laughter and, yes, pain. None of them would have chosen to be here if the circumstances of their lives hadn't been so crazy. Tulsa Metro-McCullough: Club continually collects eyeglasses, ink cartridges, aluminum cans. Donated \$500 to Lakeside Residential Center for Juveniles. Club members donated \$8,300 to the OK Lions Boys Ranch and \$3,000 to the OK Lions Eye Bank.

Wagoner: Nov. and Dec. were very busy months. Jim Marsh and Jeanne Portello hosted the hospitality room at the 3-O convention. A great time was had by all as we went by trolley to the Castle for appetizers and on to the OK Country Music Hall of Fame where we had a wonderful dinner and entertainment. We also spent Sat. at the Muskogee School for the Blind. We attended classes, worked on community service projects and had a wonderful lunch. In Dec. we held our first annual food drive, collecting nearly 3,000 pounds of food and about \$1,000.

Christmas party was held Dec. 6 with the Muskogee County Lions in attendance. Club donated to Help in Crisis, Wagoner Area Neighbors, Wagoner Community Outreach, TyDarius Penney Funeral Fund, and the OK Lions Boys Ranch. Presently planning our annual Bowling Tournament to be held on Feb. 25.

A Handicapped Ramp for a Wyandotte Resident

A member of the Wyandotte Lions was made aware of an emergency experience by an 80-year-old member of the Wyandotte community. The lady collapsed in her trailer and the emergency crew summoned to retrieve her had to lower her out on a blanket due to the steepness and poor condition of the steps providing access to the trailer.

After receiving emergency treatment and being released, she had to temporarily move in with a relative, as it was apparent that she would be unable to return to her home due to her now ambulatory limitations and her home's difficult access. The same entry steps that made it precarious for the responding emergency crew to transport her to the emergency hospital now made it impossible for her to easily enter and leave her home unaided.

Immediately upon learning of her circumstances, the Wyandotte Lions responded by approving a motion that allowed appropriate funds to be allocated and an ADA compliant ramp to be constructed and installed at the lady's mobile home.

By the end of the next week, with full participation of the Wyandotte Lions Club, a professional handicapped ramp was constructed, installed and highly approved of by the lady in question. One of the results of this project was recognizing that an on-going community need for handicapped ramps exists for a number of people, who, for a period of time, are not able to negotiate the existing steps to their homes upon returning from medical care.

The Wyandotte Lions are using the experience of the completed ramp project as a Beta Model to now attempt to design and build a compliant modular handicapped ramp. The completed ramp would be made available to "lend out" to those in the community with such temporary physical limitations in a further effort to be of service to the community.

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Okemah's Finest

Dr. Claud D. Evans, President Okemah Lions Club was recently spotlighted in a newspaper article sent to me by PDG Gary Wilburn. I would like to share part of this newspaper article with the Lions of Oklahoma.

"Okemah veterinarian and former Oklahoma State University Regent Dr. Claud D. Evans has been elected as the 2012-2013 national chair of the Council of Agricultural Research, Education and Teaching. CARET works to promote support for and understanding of the land grant university system's food and agricultural research, extension, and teaching programs that are mandated by state and federal law to actively engage in enhancing people's quality of life.
