



The Blandon Lions Club became a Charter in 1956. The Club was sponsored by the Muhlenberg Lions Club.

We are currently at 41 members and growing! We are constantly spreading the word about the Lions Mission to the community and beyond.

We join in many of the local parades with our 1948 Lions Chevy Pickup Truck along with our own free community events throughout the year, such as the Halloween Frolic and Music in the Grove.

We have annual fundralising events, such as a Car, Tractor and Motorcycle Show; a Chicken BBQ and many others.

We installed an Eye Glass Collection bin at our local township office where hundreds and hundreds of eye glasses are collected annually.

We award annual scholarships to the Fleetwood High School Seniors along with Lion family members who are eligible.

We supply those in need of medical equipment - such as walkers, wheelchairs, bath seats, commodes, and hospital beds for as long as they are needed.

We are also caretakers of Maler's Grove which was entrusted to the Blandon Lions Club by Andrew Maier. The grove is also available to the community for rental during the summer months.

STRAUSSTOWN LIONS

The Strausstown Lions Club was chartered on May 27, 1947. There were 25 charter members, Currently, we now have 37 members. We meet the second and fourth Thursday of each month at the Strausstown Lions Park. Some of our winter meetings are held at the Strausstown Community

Campus. We meet at 630.

The main project of our club is the Lions Club Community Park, which is located in the village of Strausstown. The park was purchased in 1959. Over the years, the club has made improvements to the grounds, which included a pavilion with kitchen, a stage, tennis court, pickle ball court and a basketball court. A few years ago, we constructed handicapped accessible men' s and vomen' s bathrooms. The club also purchased Christmas decorations, which are installed by the members along Main Street in the village of Strausstown.

We also pay for the electricity to run the decorations.

Our major fundraiser is our antique auto show and flea market. We just held our 52nd show. We average about 415 antique autos and 250 flea markets. The club supports our local fire company, ambulance company, and we also donate to 2 county libraries, and Beacon Lodge for the Blind, Berks Vision Center, Delaware Valley Eye Bank, and other Lions projects. We also present an award for the highest ranking senior in science at Hamburg Area

High School.

Our Multiple District 14 has accepted a goal of donating \$27 per member to LCIF this year. LCIF Chairman, Brian Sheehan would like to see \$36 per member, but we kept it at the lower amount. To date, three of our District 14p clubs have donated a total of \$2650 or about slightly less than \$3 per member. Our District 14p goal is \$24,500.

Our District 14p has a total DCCG grant eligibility of \$11,010. This can be used for any type of humanitarian project, but it must be submitted and approved by LCIF. We still have a number of years to use this grant. This grant could also be used toward the local match for a larger grant from LCIF.

LCIF has been active in disaster relief projects including the wildfires in Maui, and earthquakes in Morocco, Turkey, and Syria. We also continue to help refugees from the war in Ukraine. I am sure we will also be helping in Israel and Gaza.

Our District 14p received a \$10,000 emergency grant to help in flood relief in Northern Berks County, but could not spend it in the allotted time, and returned it to LCIF.

Other items discussed in our last Zoom meeting with LCIF District Coordinators included the following:

This newsletter probably will not be published by Nov. 28th, but please encourage gifts though the Christmas holiday season. I hope that the manual donation form is included with this newsletter, or you can donate online at lionsclubs.org.

January 8 to 13, 2024 is LCIF week ending with the birthday of Melvin Jones. We are to do a service project or fundraiser for LCIF.

Telethon 4.0 is scheduled for June 2, 2024.

A cookbook fundraiser is being planned. We will hear more about this project in the near future.

News & Update

December 2023

The News:

In the first five months of the Lion's year, we have screened over 2200 children in Berks and Chesters county. At this pace we are starting to return to our pre COVID-19 numbers.

In October we received an e-mail from Welsh Allen informing us the first three cameras that were purchased in 2012 will no longer be covered by a warranty, due to the redesign of the camera and the lack of repair parts. With two of the cameras not working and the other without a warranty if it failed it was decided to purchase three new cameras. The cost of each camera was \$8,190 which includes a five-year warranty (1,736 value) for a total of \$24,570 for all three cameras. To cover the cost for the new cameras we applied for a \$9,000 grant from the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation.

The Update:

With the help of a donation by the *Coventry Lions Club* and the \$9,000 grant from the Lions of Pennsylvania we have purchased three cameras with a five-year warranty and three new HP printers which are now up and running. Your club donations are needed to help refurbish the KidSight bank account.

Now that the equipment problem is solved it is time to put out the HELP WANTED SIGN. In the past year KidSight has lost several key people due to relocation and life changes. The foundation needs people to come forward to help train and coordinate screenings with the clubs to ensure the continuation of the program. Please contact me at peshober@ptd.net

What is Elder Abuse?

Elder Abuse is a term used to describe any knowing, intentional, or negligent act by a caregiver or any other person that cause harm or a serious risk of harm to a vulner able adult. Elder abuse can come in vari

Physical/Sexual Abuse Hitting, pushing, kicking, punching, pinch-ing, biting, unnecessarily restraint, intentionally causing pain, intentional misuse o medication, sexual abuse/exploitation, etc

Verbal Abuse

ins, making fun assing/humiliating, criticism, etc.

Emotional Abuse

Threats of harm or abandonment, manipi ireats of narm of abandonment, manipution, mind games, gaslighting—making to feel crazy, isolation, non-mmunication, intimidation, control, etc.

Pressure to make or making undue changes to legal, financial documents, theft of or withholding of funds, identity theft, etc.

Neglect & Self-Neglect

Deprivation of basic needs: food, water housing, clothing, hygiene, medical care emotional/social engagement, etc.

care for themselves leading to an environment threatening to health and safety.

Risk Factors for Elder Abuse

There are some factors that can put an old er adult at increased risk for experiencing abuse including:

- An adult child who is still dependent on their older parent for financial assis-tance or housing—especially in cases where the adult child suffers from mental illness or a substance abuse disorde
- tal illness or a substance abuse disorde (addiction). A history of domestic violence in the home or family—as families grow and age, present problems of domestic vio-lence often continue. Living with others in isolation—pre-versts likelihood of renorting of abuse.
- vents likelihood of reporting of abuse.

PA Statistics on Elder Abuse national statistics, 1 in 10 adults 60-ave experienced some form of abuse. Ir ennsylvania, since 2016, we have seen a 32% Increase in number of reports of elder abuse—with a 38% Increase in substantiat ed, or proven, claims of abuse.

- The age group most reported to be in nne age group most reported to be in need of protective services in PA were those between the ages of 81—90 and almost half of them lived in their own homes.
- between the ages of 30-59 and 16.7% were identified as family members
- The most common substantiated for of abuse were: self-neglect, can neglect, financial exploitation, cal, and emotional abuse.

Reporting Abuse








KENNETT SQUARE LIONS




