# WONDERFUL FEATS ARE DONE BY BLIND MAN

# Builds Himself Home That Is Marvel of Good Workmanship. HEARING ABNORMAL - Only Object in Life Is to Encourage Others Similarly Afflicted.

GLASGOW, Ky., June 22. -The assembling of the helpers of the blind at Columbus, OH. recently calls to mind the fact that Glasgow has, without a doubt one of the most remarkable, if not the most remarkable. blind man in the United States in the person of Willie F. Settle. who attended the convention as a delegate from this county and whose self-reliance and work, coupled with his efforts, have acted as an incentive to other unfortunates and caused them to become independent breadwinners instead of dependents.

Blind from early boyhood, Settle was educated at the school for the blind in Louisville. After completing his education he took up broom making and for several years he managed the business very well until competition cut the prices and there was hardly a living for him. He was forced to cast about for something more remunerative.

Builds a House. It was at this time that he gained public prominence here by offering to build himself a home, doing all the cabinet work, if the town of Glasgow would donate him a lot. The matter was looked on as a joke for a time, for the idea of a blind man doing carpenter work seemed simply out of the question.

At a public meeting called for the purpose, Mr. Settle demonstrated to a good-sized audience that he was physically able to carry out his part of the contract. A lot on Front street was selected and today there stands as a monument to his energy and skill a neat little three-room cottage which on the closest inspection

bears no trace of the misuse of tools.

Manufactures Mottoes.

Something like a year ago he began the manufacture of mottoes for residences, schools, churches and business houses. These mottoes are made by the sawing of strips the size he desires his letters, cutting and joining them on a hoard.

To get a sufficient amount of these strips was a problem. To saw them by hand would make the manufacture of the mottoes unprofitable, so he conceived the idea of sawing them at a band saw at one of the mills here. If the people were astonished when he agreed to build a house the proprietor of the mill was dumbfounded when Settle asked permission to use the band saw. A band saw is considered one of the most hazardous pieces of machinery used in a planing mill, and only the most skilled and painstaking men are allowed to run them.

Had Mr. Settle requested the manager of the mill to saw his head off he would not have been more astonished. After explaining his methods he was allowed a trial, and did the work successfully which allowed him to manufacture his mottoes and realize three times as much on the same amount of labor as it required to make brooms.

Acute Sense of Hearing.

Mr. Settle has so trained
his sense of hearing that he
can tell most any article by
hearing if dropped on the
ground. (line missing) ...of
letting a person drop a number
on the floor. Recently he
underwent the test of bits,
such as used by a carpenter in

a brace and bit, and so acute was his hearing that he almost invariably told the size of the bit by the sound.

He is unusually fond of children and has an acquaintance of from one to two hundred of them, whom he meets and calls by name, from hearing them speak, another test of his wonderful power of memory and hearing.

Mr. Settle has invented a machine to be used by carpenters and expects to place it on the market at an early date. While the exact nature of his invention is known only to him, it is destined to become popular, according to reports.

Recently Mr. Settle surprised his neighbors by climbing to the highest point on his roof and placing a sign. To convince skeptics that he performed this feat he had a photo made while standing erect on the comb of the house.

When asked why he took such seeming unnecessary risks he summed it up in one short sentence, «To encourage other blind people to try.» His whole being seems centered on helping afflicted ones like himself and should any of his inventions bring large returns, or he come into possession of a large sum through other channels, it will be used to further the interests of the blind.»
