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

Get your Nominations process going so that your slate of officers can be accepted and then put in to MyLCI. This will make the District Directory process easier and more efficient.



23B Lions Serve at Red Cross Blood Drives

In 2019, PDG Everett Lyons, who as a high school principal in Bristol hosted many blood drives throughout his long tenure, had a service goal for our district: increasing the number of Lions Clubs hosting blood drives. So he tapped me, a Harwinton Lion and Red Cross Donor Ambassador, to take on the project. DG Heidi Zacchera continued the appointment in 2020. And today, I am happy to report that Lions Clubs have been pitching in, volunteering as they always do, for a great cause: supporting the Red Cross at blood drives around our district.

I have been a blood donor since 1990, so when I moved to Harwinton in 2002, I began donating in my new town. You may know PDG Harry Schuh and his wife, Carol Kearns. They were always at the blood drive's registration table, and always encouraging me to join the Harwinton Lions. After retiring in 2017, I joined the Lions, and also became a Red Cross Donor Ambassador. I spent fall 2019 speaking with fellow Lions at zone meetings — in person.

Fast-forward to 2020 and COVID's arrival: Harwinton's twice-a-year blood drives, always held at Town Hall, were cancelled because the hall was closed. And in-person meetings were no longer going to work as I had originally presented them. So I gradually emailed every club president, and began making Zoom presentations to groups that expressed an interest.

We're making progress. As of this writing, our initiative, "Lions and the Red Cross, a Partnership that Saves Lives," has resulted in Terryville, East Hartford, Avon, Bristol, and Harwinton clubs hosting drives at Red Cross-approved locations. Plainville is scheduled for April 30, South Windsor is picking dates, and Windsor is making plans, too.

The board of directors appreciate the continuing support of our district clubs for this important service to our clients who deal daily with significant sight loss.





The East Windsor American Heritage River Commission overseas the maintenance of trails at the Scantic River State Park section in our town.

The Commission approached the East Windsor Lions Club and asked for a donation to help in the purchase of Braille signs to be placed along a trail in a newly developed section of the Park. The Lions were able to donate \$1,300 toward that purpose. Now, 11 ADA-compliant signs are permanently installed and a definite addition to the trails. These signs report on the character of the river and woods of the park and identify the flora and fauna of the area.

Who is Rose Amanda Freeman?

Lions District 23B has created a new award for those Lions who go above and beyond in service to their club and community. It is named for Rose Amanda Freeman, who was instrumental in the formation of what we now know as Lions Clubs, International. But who is she, and why was she picked to represent this level of service?

Born in 1885, her family lived in Moline, IL, but soon moved to Buffalo, NE, where her parents were one of the early settlers in the area. Working on the family farm, Freeman received her early education in the local school system, and then attended Grand Island College and Conservatory of Music. After graduation in 1904, she moved to Chicago and worked there until 1909, when she married a local insurance broker. After marriage. she continued her music studies. but abandoned them to enter the world of competitive golf when she and her husband moved to Maywood, IL, finding a home across from a golf course.

Spending most of her spare time learning the game, she began entering the Women's Western Golf Tournaments in 1914, winning her first title in 1915, and her first championship in 1916, a feat she repeated in 1921, 1922, 1924, 1929 and 1930. Her 1921 win was also her first slam win, taking the title at not just the Chicago District championship, but also the Women's Western Golf Association championship, and the Women's Western's Golf Medal championship.

In 1936, she was offered the presidency of the Western Women's Golf association, but turned down the offer to play more golf. She was elected to that position the next year, and served her one-year term.

So, what does a champion golfer have to do with the formation of Lions Clubs, International?

Remember that insurance broker she married? That was Melvin Jones!

After moving to Chicago, Melvin Jones started his own insurance agency, and joined a luncheon club called The Business Circle, a club for the leaders of many fields in the city. But Jones wasn't satisfied with the mutual support that the Circle gave its members, and thought that their resources could be put to better use in service to other areas of the community.

With the Circle's blessing, in 1915, Jones started contacting other civic groups in the hope that a national service organization could be formed. And, it was Rose Amanda Freeman Jones who handled most of the correspondence—almost two years of letter writing, answering questions, and organizing a meeting for those clubs interested in providing service in a large way.

The rest of the story, we all know.

So, while we thought we knew the whole tale, the footnote to this story is that the Lions, as we know them today, might not exist except for the woman who believed in her husband's vision, and put in the time and effort to make the difference, and did not receive the recognition she deserved. As they say, "Behind every great man, there's a great woman!"

And, this is why the award is named after Rose Amanda Freeman Jones.

Without community service, we would not have a strong quality of life. It's important to the person who serves as well as the recipient. It's the way in which we ourselves grow and develop.
