

Collect new or gently used bath towels (collection boxes are located in Barkhamsted at the Town Hall and Barkhamsted Senior Center). Or you can call Jackie Martin at 860-379-2019 to coordinate pickup.

Sign up for the Home for the Weekend Home Handler program. Home handlers assist in teaching home manners, giving the dogs a break, socializing them with dog friendly activities, and continuing their education. It's quick and easy to sign up...all you have to do is complete this <u>short application</u> and a member of the ECAD team will get in touch with you.

Sign up to be a Nursery Team volunteer to welcome an ECAD puppy into your home for 6-7 months until it is ready to begin training. ECAD provides food, kennel, etc. Nursery Team volunteers begin to teach the puppy basic commands (sit, come, down, stay, etc.), household manners, and get to explore new and different things. It's quick and easy to sign up...all you have to do is complete this short application and a member of the ECAD team will get in touch with vou.

Be on a call list to volunteer to drive "service dogs in training' in your POV to the veterinarian. Volunteer to help groom dogs at the Winchester campus (149 Newfield Road, Winchester). My Lions journey started in 2005, when I, and seven other family members, were asked to join the Winsted Lions Club. We all said "yes", and in the 2005/2006 Lions year, we were all sworn in by DG Francisco Medina, and Lion Leonora Lemlyn, known to me as "Grandma Lee", sponsored and pinned us all. I received a perfect attendance award for that year, and Lion Blanche Sewel nominated me for club president, and in my term, received two DG's Outstanding Lions awards for the Winsted Lions.

About this time, the director of the Beardsley Memorial Library in Winsted reached out to me to ask if the Lions could help them with delivering books to shut-ins. This came after the Winsted Lions performed a Community Needs Assessment (they DO work!) This is a project we assisted with for several years.

In early 2008, my service on the Winchester United Rec Soccer board made me aware of a 5-yearold in town who was battling cancer. An account at a local bank was set up in an effort to raise funds to assist the family with uncovered expenses from the insurance company. I shaved my head and wouldn't grow it back until \$2500 was raised: The Winsted Lions started the fund with a \$350 donation. After the Waterbury Republican-American ran my picture and wrote a story, the money came from everywhere, and we soon reached our goal (Yes, I did grow my hair back.)

In September of 2008, a storm blew through town and left debris over several soccer fields. The Rec Director reached out to me, and I led a team of Lions, soccer parents, and other volunteers who picked up sticks, rocks and other trash from all over the park so that we could play safely on them for the weekend.

In my time as a Lion since then, I became active with Lions on the District level, being Zone 1 chair,

the District CRIS Radio Chair, completing a "Train the Trainer" course, completing Certified Guiding Lions Training, co-chaired the District publicity committee (receiving a President's Certificate of Recognition from Dr. Naresh Aggarwal for that), appeared on the verv first episode of "Lion Around Connecticut" on Winsted Public Access Television Channel 13, and began hosting the Lion Around Connecticut Radio show on WAPJ Torrington 89.9 and 105.1 FM, an effort I continue through today, hosting the 314th episode on February 13 of this year. I have been nominated for the new LCI Marketing Award for this. I am currently working on a Multiple District "Beeper Baseball" project that will allow children and adults with vision impairments to participate in America's National Pastime.

I am now with the Enfield Lions Club, having moved from Winsted in 2012, and finding a club closer to me has allowed me to spend more time with Lion activities, instead of spending it driving across the state. My experience with the Winsted Lions Club has helped both me and my new club, as they recognized my contributions to Lionism and elected me their Vice President.

My year as 2nd VDG will be a learning year as I intend to learn as much as I can in order to lead our district into the future. Someone posted on the Lion Around Connecticut page that "Beware of people who brag about who they are; a Lion will never have to tell you they're a lion". The problem is that we don't need to brag, but we need to passionately talk about it, and our enthusiasm will cause them to ask. "How can I be a part of that?" Not everyone knows who we are, and why we do it, so we have to tell them.

We are Lions, hear us ROAR!

After that, we lit up the town of Woodbury with our annual Christmas Eve Luminaria display, which we reduced to three areas due to the frigid weather. However, we still managed to bring some light to the town.





Lions Pin Traders

Most of you are aware that pin trading is done by many Lions, but few understand what Lions' Pin Trading is all about, and that is a subject for a club presentation at a later date that Phil Dzurnak and/or I would be pleased to provide. However, this is to introduce Lions International Pin Trading Club's Youth Scholarship Program.

In 2010 LITPC president Jim Minnich convinced a few other traders that we should establish scholarship program for deserving children/grandchildren of Lions or Leos. The initial effort produced funds to award one scholarship in the amount of \$2,500.00 which was awarded in 2012.

As funds have amassed, we have been able to increase to two, three, or four such scholarships as funds are available each year. Over this period we have awarded twenty-four such scholarships to deserving high school seniors from our Lions family. Each MD scholarship committee is allowed to submit two applications each year.

In 2021 and 2022 LITPC again advertised for applications for scholarships and received thirteen as of March of that year. After careful evaluation of these deserving students' applications three and four were chosen. Connecticut had one in 2021, and two in 2022.

In 2021 Abby Lynn St. Martin from the Putnam II Leo Club was awarded a scholarship. In 2022 as competition was very strong our applicants were not as successful. I was extremely proud to submit all three applications and am hopeful that 2023 will bring even more interest.

In this coming year Phil, and I are expecting many more applications to present to the LITPC committee. Applications may be found in litpc.org under the subheading Scholarships, or by contacting me and I will forward one to you.

Leos Are NOW! District 23B Leo Chair Cindy Daniels

"Together we can." Leos believe this too! Leos from East Windsor, Granby and Windsor Sage Park served together at the Special Education Christmas Party held at St Bellarmine Community Center in Windsor Locks on December 7th and 8th. Leos served, made new friends, had fun and brought smiles to all in attendance! Some of our Leos serving at this event told me that they were turning 18 and are ready to graduate. Each year we have Leos who age out of Alpha Leo Clubs at 18 and out of Omega Clubs at age 30.

Deciding when to transition to Lions membership is a very personal decision for Leos to make. However, it's extremely important to provide information of the options available to them so that Leos can develop plans for future service before the end of their last eligible year serving in an Alpha or Omega club.

Please take an opportunity over the next four months to discuss these options with your Leos. I am available to come and talk with Leos to present options and answer questions. Our Leos are Leaders and we need to offer them continued opportunities to serve and form friendships with likeminded individuals.

Youth can transition to Traditional Lions Clubs: Many Leos choose to continue serving as Leo-Lions in their sponsoring Lions club. Traditional community-based Lions clubs offer flexibility to reach new groups of people and serve a variety of communities. Students ages 30 and younger joining any club type pay half international dues and get a charter or entrance fee waiver.

Leo-Lion Clubs: Leo-Lion clubs offer a special opportunity for former Leos to continue serving together.

Lions of all ages may join a Leo-Lion club to form dynamic multigenerational clubs. Club members ages 30 and younger, who are not Leo-Lions, are eligible for the same international dues discount and fee waiver as their Leo-Lion friends under the "Young Adult" membership type. Leo-Lion clubs offer Leos distinct opportunities.

Campus Lions Clubs and Student

Membership: Campus Lions clubs offer a great opportunity for Young Lions interested in serving while pursuing their education. Leos who are used to serving in school-based clubs may find this club option particularly appealing. Clubs can be formed with students from one or more educational institutions including: universities, private and junior colleges, career preparatory schools and technical learning schools.

Club branches: Presently, District 23B has a Leo-Lion Club Branch accepting new members. Only five members are required to form a Club branch of a sponsoring Lions club. With support from the parent club, members can meet and choose service projects that they are passionate about. Members can use this Leo-Lion Branch Club as a forum to discuss, plan and report community service endeavors.


Spring is a very busy time for our Club!

With further sorting necessary, by the time you read this, we will have delivered to the Manchester Regional Academy, Prudence Crandall Center, Village for Families and Children and Covenant to Care for Children. A special thanks to the participating clubs for extending your hearts to add comfort to a child's sleep time.

38 of our district's 55 clubs contributed to the 343 Service projects conducted between July 1, 2022 and now and reported in MyLion. Two Leo clubs have reported service projects and their counts are included here. To achieve the governor's goal, we need five or more clubs to 'REPORT' their Service projects in MyLion within the next several months. I can assist you with reporting this information if needed. Nepal Program for Child Wastepickers

- Wastepickers are children who, instead of going to school, pick through trash at local landfills, looking for food to eat and items to sell, in order to contribute to their family's income. We target children whose mothers and families also eke out a living by 'Wastepicking'.
- Donations go directly to pay for school fees, after school tutoring, uniforms, school, supplies, and health check-ups.
- Donations also provide their families with weekly food supplies, so these children do not go hungry or are forced to return to the landfills.
- In Kathmandu, dire poverty forces thousands of people to eke out a living by picking through rubbish along rivers, streams, and drainage ditches.

Cost to support a Wastepicker child in Nepal

Cost to support a wastepicker child in Nepal is \$60 per month. We currently have 15 children in the program. The **goal of this joint project is to add 10 more children**.
