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

The 1.5 million Global Membership Initiative is a program designed with input from Lion's Leaders worldwide. The purpose of this program is to strengthen membership within our clubs to a total membership worldwide of 1.5 million members. Lions Clubs throughout the world provide a valuable service in many ways to their local community, and to the State /Territory and Country in which they reside. The need for our services and financial support continues to increase and a strong membership base is essential to fulfill these needs. I have asked each Zone Chair and Club President to evaluate the status of their Club Membership and work together to identify areas where we need to focus. A club can have a membership roster of 35 members but in many instances, there may only be 20 active members due to health issues, time availability or just plain lack of interest. Clubs in these types of situations can rapidly descend to a level where it will be difficult for them to serve their community at their current level. The purpose of the 1.5 million initiative is to be proactive in dealing with declining membership. I recently emailed all Club Presidents information on how to start the steps to evaluate and design a program to strengthen their membership. On a positive note, Membership in District 23B is at + 18 members through November. I will be sending more information in January on how to build your clubs membership. I am asking that each of work together within your club as a team to evaluate where you stand in membership and set a goal and program to take you where you need to be. The District Team and I are here to support you. We look forward to working with you. My hope is that you have a Wonderful Christmas with Family and Friends and a Healthy New Year.

I am waiting to go blind.

I was born with a rare degenerative retina disease called Retinitis Pigmentosa. In the early 1970s, my retina doctors at the Massachusetts Eye & Ear Infirmary in Boston informed both me and my older brother with the same disease that we would be 100% blind by our teen years. Not a fun diagnosis. Life went on, but it went on with this overriding uneasiness that at any moment I could wake up and life as I knew it would be over. I'd be blind. There were sports, girlfriends, vacations, proms, and more, but still, the uneasiness. I was waiting to go blind.

I was a happy child. My teen years turned into my 20's, and life went on. These years brought college, a marriage, a move to Florida for a few years, beginning law school, and being in a rock band. I was still waiting to go blind, but life went on.

In my 30's, I was blessed with my two daughters. I graduated from law school, passed the bar, traveled, and enjoyed a blossoming career. I was still waiting to go blind.

My 40's brought a very difficult divorce, a successful rock band, trips to Kenya, and the realization of my biggest fear: that when I go blind, I will never see my daughters' faces again. I was terrified. Yet, I was still waiting to go blind.

I am in my early 50's now, and I am

still waiting to go blind. My vision has decreased, and I gave up driving years ago. I am grateful, though. I have a full time job, I am very active in the blindness and low vision space, I still play music, and I am happily remarried. However, I am still waiting to go blind.

Vision loss has been a blessing in my life. Although I have been waiting to go blind for 50 years, vision loss and the threat of complete blindness have served to motivate me. As a result, I do not sweat the small stuff, and I know that almost everything day to day is small stuff.

Since my earliest years, I have known what it is like to have a disease you cannot control. The upside of this fact is that I clearly understand those things that I can control and those things that I cannot control. The early realization that I control almost nothing is the blessing of vision loss. I do not fear blindness anymore. Life has taught me that being blind is not what holds us back. Blindness is not the problem. It is the all too frequent negative internal dialog we have with ourselves combined with the lack of education from the sighted world about blindness. I remain passionate about the social and emotional needs of the blind and educating the sighted world.

I am still waiting to go blind, but I am not waiting around for it to happen.

Activities of the New Britain Lions Club

WARM THE CHILDREN

The New Britain Lions Club will provide warm winter clothing to 900+ needy children with the support of hundreds of volunteer shoppers, a grant from the City of New Britain, thousands of dollars donated from the community and the help of our school social workers who identify those in need. We spend \$70 per child at JC Penney (which gives us addition discounts and support). We'll raise and spend approximately \$50,000. Started by UNICO New Britain 20 years ago, we inherited the program ten years ago when UNICO died. We are also supported by our local New Britain Herald newspaper. This is led by Lion Stephanie Frank and Club President Francine Austin.

ANNUAL LIONS TRIVIA NIGHT

Trivia Night has become an annual fun night out for Lions, family, friends and business associates. A professional Trivia firm leads 60-70 trivial "pursuiters" at New Britain's historic 19th century Trinity on Main (formerly Trinity Baptist Church). It's free to members with \$10/person for the many guests. There are prizes, a cash bar, plus coffee and desserts provided by members. Lion Maria Bernacki leads this event.



All requests will then be submitted to our committee for review. Depending on how many requests are received will depend on how funds will be distributed.

We have already started to receive requests, so make sure you get your request in before the deadline on December 31st, 2023.
