OUR SILENT MEMBERSHIP KILLER

"I wonder why Jim doesn't come to the meetings anymore?" "Hey, remember that woman who always sat on the far end of the table? You know. What's her name?" I wonder what happened to her?" "I heard Jack's wife is really ill. I guess that's why he stopped coming." "Did you hear there was a big layoff at the Acme Anvil company? I bet Cindy lost her job."

We have been challenged to grow our international Lions family to 1.5 million members. As such, we have been urged to start new clubs and attract more members. There is nothing wrong with that plan, and as your district's membership chairperson, I URGE YOU TO GROW YOUR CLUB!

But there is a silent killer in our membership growth. It is called non-retention. When it comes to membership, we often say, "They're coming in the front door, but slipping out the back door."

Sadly, many clubs do not follow up on why a member quit the club or stopped attending meetings. One club officer, when asked if we should follow up on why a member stopped attending, replied, "He knows when we meet."

That reply is a membership killer.

Did the member stop attending because the member lost interest in the club? Did the member feel his/her needs were not being met? Was the member offended by some off-color or smart-alecky remark? Does the member have a financial problem? Did the member lose her/his employment? Is the member or family member seriously ill? The questions can go on.

Many years ago, when I was the retention chair for our district, I was able to see all dropped members and the reason for their drop. With that information, I sent a letter to each drop asking why they dropped out of the club. A stamped, self-addressed postcard was included with a printed check-off form citing various reasons for a dropped membership.

Simply by reaching out, we retained three members that otherwise would have been dropped. Three may not seem like a big number, but that is three members who returned.

As the club's membership chair or as the club's president, you need to reach out to those members who have stopped coming to your meetings. And you need to find a way for them to return. Obviously, those who dropped because of natural attrition cannot return.

Can you offer a payment plan on the dues? Can you offer to sit with an ill family member so the Lion can attend a meeting? Can you drive past and pick up the member? Can you. . . What can you do to retain your club's members? They are a part of your Lions family, and family matters.

Retention isn't just a numbers game—it's a reflection of our service mission. Every Lion who stays is a testament to the power of purpose, the strength of community, and the legacy we built. When we nurture our members, we're not just keeping names on a roster—we're keeping our motto, We Serve.

Quick tips for effectively recruiting new members

- 1. **Prepare Your Club.** Without proper preparation, your club's recruitment efforts will not be as effective as possible.
 - » Decide what your club would like to accomplish and how new members will help achieve this.
 - » Develop a member recruitment team that can focus on all aspects of member recruitment.
- 2. Create your club's growth plan. Develop an action-oriented plan that clearly outlines your recruitment efforts.
- » Determine who you will be recruiting. » Determine where you will focus your recruiting efforts.
- » Gather the materials you will need for your outreach. » Set and promote your informational meeting.

3. Implement your growth plan.

- » Reach out to target members as outlined in steps one and two. » Host your informational meeting.
- » Follow up with meeting attendees. » Review your growth plan and adjust timelines if necessary.

4. Welcome new members.

- » Conduct an induction ceremony.
- » Ensure that new members are properly onboarded.






DUQUOIN LIONS CLUB VISIT


